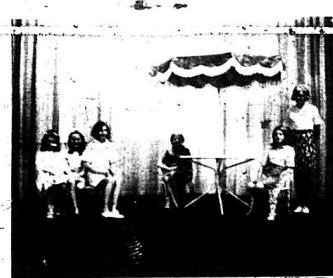

Sauce Party Kabobs With Canned Gravy



Necessity is the mother of invention, even in the world of food. The shish kabob is something very special today, but it probably started as a Middle Eastern housewife's answer for a hurry-up meal, since in just minutes both meat and vegetables could be cooked to a turn and ready to serve.

Try this recipe for fun-to-eat kabobs at your next dinner party. You can heighten the dramatic moment when the kabobs arrive at the table by serving them with a spectacular pour-over sauce. The sauce is easy to concoct when you start with canned beef gravy and add a touch of onion, garlic, arrabon, Burgundy wine—the perfect accompaniment flavors.

Your guests will think you spent hours in the kitchen to arrive at such a heavenly blend of gourmet-oodness; but you'll know the truth. It takes just a flick of the car owner and prep!

Round out the menu with a tossed green salad.

PARTY BEEF KABOBS

1 pound boneless sirloin, cut in 1-inch cubes
12 cucumber slices (1/4-inch thick)
12 cherry tomatoes
2 tablespoons chopped onion
1 medium clove garlic, minced
3/4 teaspoon tarragon, crushed
2 tablespoons butter-flavored margarine
1 can (10 1/2 ounces) beef gravy
4 egg whites
1/4 cup sour cream

On 4 skewers, arrange alternately beef, cucumber, and tomatoes. In saucepan, cook onion, garlic, and tarragon in butter until onion is tender. Add gravy and wine; heat. Broil kabobs about 15 minutes, turning and basting frequently with sauce. Add sour cream to remaining sauce. Heat; stir now and then. Serve over kabobs. Makes 4 servings.

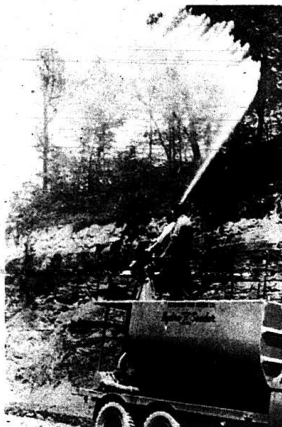

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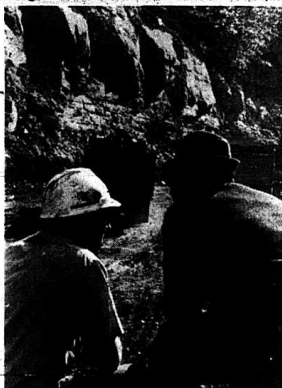

A Hydro-seeder sprays grass and tree seeds, combined with fertilizer over a wide area under heavy water pressure. This new method of planting has proven economical and effective in producing a vegetative cover which often meets Strip Mining Requirements within six months. This compares with waiting two to four years for results with methods used in past years.

Reclaiming The Land

On a strip-mine tour through Eastern Kentucky, Gov. Louie B. Nunn took a first hand look at progress in reclaiming areas from which coal has been mined.

Pictured below are some new seeding, grading, and conservation techniques he inspected at three sites in Perry County, owned by Tarheel Coals Inc., Caperton Coal Co., and Black Eagle and Diamond R. Coal Co.



Gov. Nunn and his party inspect an area readied for hydro-seeding by an experimental shaping plow which produces a trench-ridge-trench effect to control rain where it falls, thus preventing soil erosion. The Black Eagle and Diamond R. Coal Co. is conducting the experiment.



Knee-deep in rye grass planted by Caperton Coal Co. on a reclaimed area only last fall are William Sturgill, operator; Elmore Grim, director of the State's Division of Reclamation; and Gov. Nunn. At this location the Company used the "slope reduction method" of mining in which overburden removed from the pit area was leveled off to a gentle grade and hydro-seeded.

eran and receive 50 per cent disability compensation for myself, wife and two children. One of my children will be 18 years old four months from now. Will I continue to receive benefits from him?
A - Not unless he plans to continue in school. Three months before your son's 18th birthday, the Veterans Administration will send you notice of discontinuance of benefits for myself. However, VA will also send at that time an application to be filled out if he plans to continue in school. You will continue to receive benefits for him until he reaches age 23 if he remains in school and is unmarried.

VETERANS QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q-- I was recently discharged from the Army. Can I obtain a G.I. home loan as a veteran even though I am not yet 21 years of age?

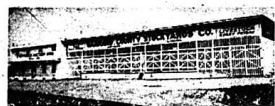
A - Yes. If you qualify for the loan in other respects (income, for instance), your age is no bar to obtaining a G.I. loan in most states. You may obtain detailed information and assistance in applying for a VA loan guaranty from your nearest Veterans Administration regional office.

Q - My pension was discontinued because my estate was determined by the Veterans Administration to be excessive. I own E bonds jointly with my wife and reported the total maturity value of the bonds as my assets. Is it possible to obtain a different decision on my pension claim?

A - You should write to the VA and point out that your E bonds are owned jointly by yourself and your wife. Joint ownership means that your wife's

share of the bonds—half their value—will not be considered in determining the value of your estate. Reconsideration of your pension entitlement will be based on your wife's share of the bonds as joint owner.

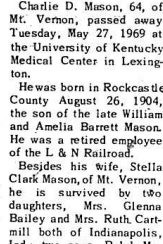

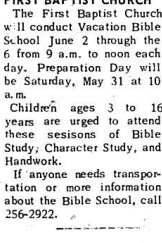

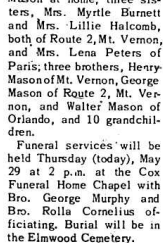

In a surprising upset victory in Tuesday's Republican Primary, Attorney William D. Gregory captured the County Attorney's office from incumbent James W. Lambert by a majority of 445 votes. Most political observers in the county had predicted that the race would be close with Lambert the winner. Gregory polled 1820 votes to Lambert's 1475.

In another major county office race, that of County Judge, Charles Carter beat off strong campaigns by Hubert Thorpe and Sheriff Tip Repper to emerge victor with 1510 votes. Carter has previously served as County Judge for four terms, the last term in 1961-65. He was also State Representative for one term and Deputy Sheriff in 1930. Thorpe came in second with a total of 1094 votes and Sheriff Repper received 736.

Incumbent County Court Clerk Clifford Bales won re-election by defeating Clarence Carter 1864 votes to 1263. Bales second term of office. Election in the May Primary is tantamount to election since no Democrats filed for any of the major county offices.

Money Ed Cummins will be the Circuit Court Clerk for another six years when he is elected.

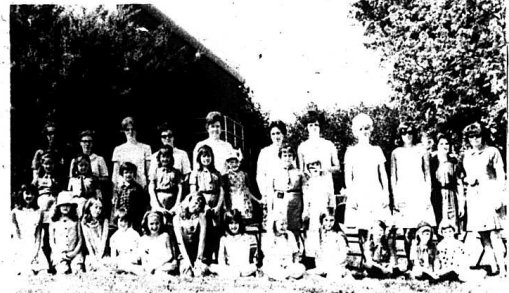

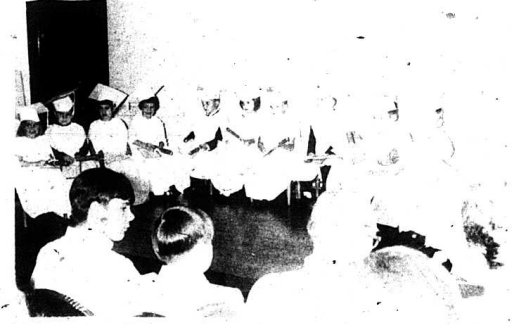

Area Agent's Notes

Cautions Must Be Used With Tobacco Insecticides

"Some farmers are not using tobacco insecticides with the proper care," Dr. Richard Thurston, University of Kentucky entomologist, said today.

"These tobacco insecticides are very toxic and can be extremely hazardous to humans, farm animals, pets, and fish if the label directions on use and safety are not followed," he added.

One of these materials, Di-Syston, is thought to have killed several hogs. Some of the material either was applied accidentally in the hoglot or drifted into the lot from a nearby field, Dr. Thurston reported.

All insecticides must be stored, handled, and applied with care; however some of the materials used on tobacco such as Di-Syston, Mospup, parathion, and Guthion, requires extra care because they are especially hazardous.

"Always read the precautions on the label and follow the directions carefully," Dr. Thurston stressed. "Be sure that humans and animals do not touch, inhale, or feed upon these compounds."

For additional information, a copy of UK College of Agriculture publication, Misc. 335, "Protect Yourself When Using Pesticides," is available in the local county Extension office.

Insect Control Measures Given For Trees, Shrubs and Flowers

Insects are now causing problems on some trees, shrubs and flowers. This is the time to spray for bagworm control. These little worms which build a protective covering about themselves from bits of foliage upon which they are feeding can cause considerable damage to trees and shrubs. Several insecticides give good bagworm control is used now, but if you wait until the protective "bags" are finished, spraying will do no good and you'll have to pick the bagworms off by hand.

Check the labels of the insecticides you have and use only those that lists bagworms among the pests it will control. For good control, a second application will be needed 5-10 days after the first one.

Spider mites are especially troublesome on spruce and hemlock trees. Some very large spruce trees may have heavily webbed branches and the trees look grayish. Check your spruces and hemlocks for signs of these mites and, if you have an infestation, treat them immediately; if you don't, these trees may have very few needles next year.

Use one of the following miticides for spider mite.

Kelthane -- 1 1/2 percent emulsifiable concentrate; Ovatran -- 50 percent wettable powder; Dimite -- 25 percent emulsifiable concentrate; Aramite -- 2 pounds per gallon emulsion; Chlorbenzilate -- 25 percent emulsifiable concentrate; or Pentax 50 percent wettable powder. Mites have a short period of development and the eggs usually are not killed by a miticide treatment, so a second application 7-10 days after the first is needed to control newly-hatched mites.

Check your roses for thrips damage. These tiny, long and narrow, brown or yellow insects attack rose petals with their sucking mouth parts. The injured areas become discolored and die. Dusting or spraying with DDT or malathion will give reasonable control; Cygon (a systemic) also may be used. Weekly applications probably will be necessary. Prize rose buds may be protected by enclosing them in a cheese cloth or sack.

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Social Security News

An estimated 4 million young people in the country will be going to work for the first time this year. Many of them, James Mustian, social security officer-in-charge, said, will be trying out their wings in summer jobs. He reminded young people in the Rockcastle area to apply for a social security card before they go job hunting. "You'll need the card to show to your employer," he pointed out, "so that your earnings can be reported to your individual social security account." The number on a person's social security card is the key to his social security account, he said. Your earnings during your whole working lifetime will be credited to the account set up for you under that number and will be the basis for figuring the benefits payable to you and the family you will someday have.

Mustian said that many young people may have the mistaken idea that social security is just for old folks. This is not true. Over 2.2 million disabled workers under 65 are now receiving monthly payments, along with more than 1 million of their dependents.

Many of them are under 30 and some are still in their teens.

He cited the case of 19-year old Bob Heffeman. Less than a year after his graduation from high school in 1967, Bob had both legs broken in an accident. He underwent four operations in the more than five months he spent in the hospital.

Last November, his doctor suggested that he get in touch with the social security office to see whether he might qualify for social security disability benefits.

His part-time work after school and during summer vacations had given him enough social security credit to qualify for payments. A person disabled before he is 24 needs credit for only 1 1/2 years out of the 3 years before he became disabled.

The monthly checks will come to Bob Heffeman for as long as he is unable to work. In the meantime, he is eligible for job training and counseling. Applications for social security cards may be obtained from any post office or from the social security office in Somerset.

cific requirements with which developers must comply when offering lots for sale by mail or other means of interstate commerce. The Act exempts developers of subdivisions of fewer than 50 lots.

The regulation requires that developers register with the Department of Housing and Urban Development and provide lot buyers with property reports.

The guidelines prescribed for these "property reports" to buyers call for at least 19 items of information. Included are facts about distance to nearby communities over paved or unpaved roads, whether sales contracts are recordable and whether provision is made for refund in case of buyer's default, existence of liens on the property, whether contract payments will be placed in escrow, availability of recreation facilities, present and proposed utility services and charges, number of homes currently occupied, soil and other foundation problems in construction, type of title buyer will receive and others.

If you receive a letter or brochure offering unim-

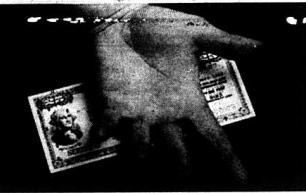
proved lots for sale, this is the information which must be supplied to you along with the offer. It should be remembered, however, that the fact that the developer is complying with the law does not in itself reflect the soundness of the offer. This is a decision which the prospective customer must make for himself. Caution should always be the word when considering an offer by mail, by salesman whom you do not know, or by a company or firm with which you are not familiar.

How many others have you received through the mail in which you could buy a choice lot in the sunny South, the breezy seashore, or the majestic West?

Buyers of unimproved lots offered for sale by mail or by other means of interstate commerce are now offered certain protections under a federal regulation enacted in Title 14 of the Housing and Urban Development Act of 1968.

This regulation, the Interstate Land Sales Full Disclosure Act, is administered by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development. It sets up spe-

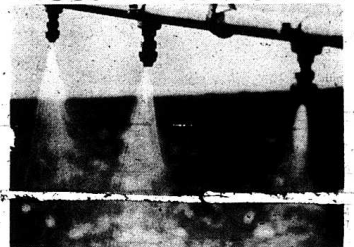
