## Registration Closes September 6th

September 6 is the last day to register to vote in this year's Nov. 4 election, according to County Court Clerk Clifford Bales.

In the state-wide election this year, Kentuckians will elect a State Auditor, 100 Representatives, 19 of 38 State Senators, and will vote on two proposed amendments to the State Constitution.

One amendment would provide for annual instead of biennial meetings of the Legislature. The other would assess agricultural

and horticultural land according to its value for such uses.

On the local level, city officials will be up for election in the three towns, and State Representative Harold DeMarcus will face Democrat Denny Manning. All of the county offices and Circuit Judge Lawrence Hall are unopposed.

To be eligible to vote, one must be 18 or older by election day, and must have lived in the state one year, the county six months and the precinct 60 days.

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## Area Agent's Notes

Time to Plant Spring Flowering Bulbus Materials

September is the time to plant all kinds of spring-flowering bulbus plants as soon as you get them from the retailers. This includes tulips, daffodils, crocuses, hyacinths, bulbous iris and all of the other "Dutch" bulbs.

Most of these bulbs do not store well during winter "on the shelf." Bulbs such as most of the lilies that flower later in the season (summer) can be stored and planted in the spring. Many thousands are handled in this manner, but they often are also fall-planted, often to their good. Plant the Madonna lily, however, during August or even in July because it makes a fall growth which other lilies do not make.

Fall Planting Woody Plant Material

Kentucky homeowners often plant woody plant materials about their homes in the fall. The fall season usually starts sometime in September. It can continue into November and, in favorable seasons and in favorable areas, well into December. During this fall period, "balled and burlapped"

plants are usually the most successful. You can also plant many bare-rooted deciduous plants after leaf drop and up to two or three weeks before winter freeze-up. However, these bare-rooted plants need better anchoring than balled plants.

For successful fall planting, don't go too far south to get woody plants. A distance of 100 miles doesn't make too much difference in most years. What the exact distance should be depends on the length of the fall season each year. You can plant Southern-grown plants of vegetatively propagated varieties that are reliably hardy in Kentucky. The difference between them and Kentucky-grown plants is that they usually mature later in the fall, and their tissues are not hardened properly early enough. Stock from your locality or further north is best for fall planting, especially late fall planting.

Fall-planted stock of any type requires proper care for desirable results. Extra care for fall planting, especially late fall planting, is necessary except for acid soil plants and rose beds. Don't mix too much peat, well rotted manure or large amounts of fertilizer with soil in the immediate vicinity of the plant. If you do, the

roots tend to grow too much in that area. Thus, the root zone is restricted, making the plant more likely to be damaged by drought later on. Make the hole for the plants large enough to hold the roots or ball of soil and allow room for filling the replaced soil. To firm the soil, use your feet. The ends of 2 x 4's, 2 x 2's, shovel handles, etc. Water is one of the best firmers. Use plenty of it about the roots or ball of the newly set plant when the hole is about half or two-thirds filled. You can use it to the extent of "puddling" the plant in if the soil does not have too much clay in it. As you firm, fitting the hole, leave enough basin around the plant for future waterings.

Evergreens as Ornamental Plants

The evergreen is a plant that holds enough of its foliage throughout the year to give it a year-around appearance. The plants grow anywhere from 18 inches to 40 or 50 feet tall and have different colors of green foliage. Some produce cones of various size, and this is an added attraction.

Like other plants, evergreens have preferences for soil and location, so get very exact information before setting the plants. The foliage on evergreens is thick and waxy. However, some kinds have true leaves like shrubs and trees.

Most evergreens grow very slowly, and therefore are more expensive than some other plants. But by the same token they also live longer and are good-looking for many years. This accounts for the higher cost of evergreens may be transplanted, starting about the middle of September and continuing until the soil is frozen, and again in March through the middle of May. Setting an evergreen is rather exacting, and whether the plant lives or dies will be determined very largely by the way it is set. If you

are considering planting any evergreens, get Ky. Coop. Ext. Serv. Leaflet 198, "Planting Evergreens" from your county Extension office. It contains information and drawings on just how to plant evergreens.

\* Now is the time to make preparation to sow cover crops on all cropland. Immediate attention should be given to tobacco land and land where silage is harvested. Why should land have a cover crop? There are several reasons for sowing cover crops. A good cover crop can prevent soil loss from erosion. Even on very gentle slopes much soil is lost during heavy rains of fall, winter and spring where there is no cover to protect the soil. Too, there is less plant nutrients by leaching where there is no cover crop used. On tobacco and silage land where high amounts of fertilizer are applied, this amounts to a considerable amount of money in plant food. Cover crops help, also, to maintain organic matter in the soil so that it will hold more water and remain in good farming condition or till. Some farmers use cover crops for grazing and this lessens the cost of feeding animals in winter and early spring before pastures are producing grazing.

Many cover crops are being used as cover crops. Oats, barley, wheat and rye are small grains that are being used. Crimson clover and vetch are legumes that are used. A combination of a small grain and a legume is usually considered best.

Farmers who make arrangements for their seeds and inoculation ahead of the day they expect to seed are usually the ones who have the best cover crops. Even a few days delay after crops are harvested

## Social Security News

Social security can pay \$50,000 or more in benefits to a family of a younger worker if the worker becomes severely disabled before his children are grown.

Social Security Manager James Mustian, disclosing the figures today, said he doubted that one in ten Americans realizes how much protection social security provides young families in the form of disability and survivors' insurance. In fact, social security is so much a protective umbrella for the young that one out of eight people who receive social security benefits each month is under 18.

The number of children getting social security checks, Mustian noted, has increased from 54,648 when the cash benefits started 29 years ago to over 3 million at present. Make that figure 4 1/2 million, if you add in kids who are receiving benefits between ages 18 and 22 while they are attending school.

Why so many young and middle-aged beneficiaries? The law has changed over the years, Mustian pointed out, to protect families faced with loss of income because their breadwinner is too disabled to work, as well as the families where the breadwinner has died. A million and a third, disabled workers under 65 are now drawing social security disability benefits to offset income loss, and payments are going to an additional million of their dependents. The average monthly payment to a disabled worker's family with children is \$235, the official declared. When a worker applies for

these benefits he is also referred to his state rehabilitation agency so that he can be considered for possible rehabilitation services. These services can help many disabled people to go back to work, if not at their old jobs, at new jobs for which they have been specially trained. Social security often pays money to the rehabilitation agencies to help meet the cost of rehabilitating disabled workers.

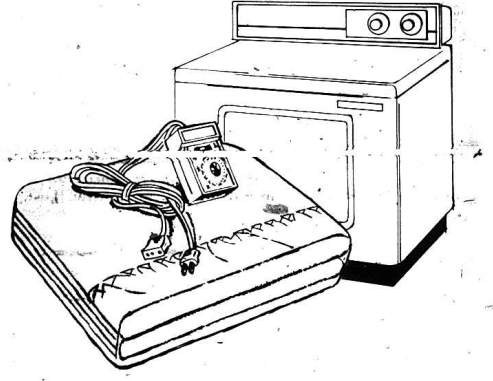

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of supply and after securing the necessary rights of way, shall begin to construct and lay such pipe line and conduits from its said source of gas of a capacity sufficient to meet the demands of the inhabitants, industries and businesses of the City of Mt. Vernon, Ky., provided however, the grantee shall not be liable for any delays, failures, or defaults in the construction, maintenance, and operation of said system of gas mains, and pipe lines occasioned by any acts of God, strikes, the public enemy, lockouts or any other vis major which by the exercise of due diligence the grantee is unable to avoid or overcome; and it is further provided that if the grantee of this franchise shall have contracted with a third party for a source of supply of gas, and a copy of such contract is furnished to the City of Mt. Vernon, Ky., then and in the event the contract made between the grantee here of and the said third party for said gas supply exceeds the said third party from supplying said gas to the grantee for causes beyond the control of said third party, then the grantee of this franchise shall be excused for its failure to furnish gas as herein required to the same extent and for like causes as are specified and set out in the contract between this grantee and said third party.

No bids shall be considered for acceptance if the amount thereof is less than \$100.00 plus the total cost of advertising, which amount is fixed as the upset price for the bidding. The Clerk of the City of Mt. Vernon, Ky., shall report the name of the successful bidder and the amount of his said bid and upon the granting of said franchise and the acceptance of said bid by the Board of Council of the City of Mt. Vernon, Ky., the purchaser shall immediately pay to the Clerk of the City of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, the full amount of said purchase price for said franchise as bid. It is further ordered that upon the final passage of this ordinance and the acceptance of the successful bid by the Council of the City of Mt. Vernon, Ky., the successful bidder shall be notified of the acceptance of said bid by the Clerk of the City of Mt. Vernon, Ky. The Board of Council of the City of Mt. Vernon, Ky. reserves the right to reject any and all bids.

**SECTION VI:** - The grantee of said franchise, its successors and assigns, may sell, transfer, or assign said franchise to any utility or construction company, or any other person, individual, partnership, group of individuals, or corporation, with, and only with, the consent and approval of the Board of Council of the City of Mt. Vernon, Ky.

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**ORDINANCE NO. 301**

AN ORDINANCE CREATING AND OFFERING FOR SALE A FRANCHISE TO ACQUIRE, LAY, MAINTAIN AND OPERATE IN, ALONG, ACROSS AND UNDER THE PUBLIC STREETS, AVENUES, ALLEYS, ROADS AND OTHER PUBLIC STREETS, WAYS, AND PLACES OF THE CITY OF MT. VERNON, KENTUCKY, A SYSTEM OF MAINS, PIPES, CONDUITS AND APPURTENANCES FOR THE DISTRIBUTION AND SALE OF NATURAL, OR MANUFACTURED AND, OR MIXED GAS AND FURTHER PROVIDING FOR THE ADVERTISEMENT AND ACCEPTANCE OF SAID FRANCHISE AS PROPOSED AND THE SALE OF SAID FRANCHISE AS PROPOSED AND THE ACCEPTANCE OR REJECTION OF BIDS THEREOF.

THE BOARD OF COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MT. VERNON, KENTUCKY, DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

**SECTION I:** - There is hereby created a franchise for acquiring, laying, maintaining and operating in, along and under and across the public streets, avenues, alleys, roads, and other public ways hereinafter called, "streets" and public places of the City of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, a system of mains, pipes, conduits and appurtenances for the distribution and sale of natural or manufactured and, or mixed gas and providing for the advertisement and offering of said proposed franchise for sale and the acceptance or rejection of bids therefor.

Vernon, Ky.

The grantee, subsequent to the purchase and acceptance of this franchise shall immediately begin negotiations to secure an adequate supply of gas and within one year after securing said supply of gas from the grantee's source

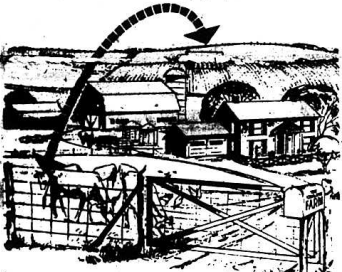
