

There are several reasons why a wage eamer or self-employed individual who is or over should contact s social security office d discuss his individual

and discuss his individual case. One, a person who is 65 or older may be able to re-ceivy some benefit pay-ments even though he or she is still working for over 51680 a years. Two, it is possible and usually ad-visable, for a person who is 65 or older to file a claim, obtainnecessary documents, and have the claim proces-sed in advanced of retire-ment. He can then get ban-fit payments started much more promptly aftem he re-tires and still have the shown of benefit payments refigured to include exam-






