ing of skinned areas and small cracks and thus reduces the possibility of decay.

Cured potatoes will store best at temperatures of 40 - 50 degrees F, but any reasonably cool, dark place will serve. Root cellars, basements, garages, or ground pits are the most usual storage places for home-grown potatoes.

Provide for ventilating my potato storage to prevent the development of disorders brought about by a shortage of air. Tubers are living plant material and require oxygen to remain in a normal, healthy condition.

**Making Top Quality Corn Silage**

According to Mr. Manuel B. Amett, Area Extension Agent in Agronomy, Williamsburg, Kentucky, full dent stage is the best time to harvest corn silage. A 200-ton crop will increase in value at the rate of \$10 per day from tassel stage to full dent. This value is based on \$5 per ton for silage.

A field that will make 20 tons per acre when cut in full dent will make 13 1/2 tons per acre in tassel. When the water is squeezed out, about 6 1/2 tons dry weight per acre. If cut in tassel it will weigh 1 1/2 tons and in milk stage, 4 tons per acre. Also, the energy value for silage cut is 40 per cent higher than tassel cut.

Keep your chopper knives sharp for fine, clean cut. Pack the silage tight to keep out air. Add water to the silage as you fill if necessary on dry crops. You can nearly double the value of a corn crop by making silage instead of feeding the grain and leaving the stalks in the field.

**Insect Damage To Lawn Trees**

Many homeowners are asking about insect damage to trees in their lawns.

Hackberry and sycamore trees may be crawling with tiny, square-looking bugs that have lace-like, neatly white, transparent wings. These are known as lace bugs; they suck juice from leaves, causing the leaves to turn a faint yellow and, if infestation is severe, to drop from the tree. Control measures at this time of year will do little good. Wait out this last infestation of lace bugs and spray the trees next spring with malathion, lindane, Sevin, or Cygon.

**Curing and Storing Irish Potatoes**

Irish potatoes should be dug and picked up from the field on the same day. Potatoes which are exposed to sunlight develop a green pigment (solanin) in the skin which has a bitter taste. In sufficient concentration, this pigment is toxic to human beings.

After harvest, wash potatoes to be stored to remove field soil, and air dry them. For maximum storage life, cure the tubers in a dark moist place at 60 + 75 degrees F for a period of about 2 weeks. This allows heal-

**PULL OVER TO THE RIVERBANK**—It's hot, it's hard and sometimes it's pretty monotonous, but without members of the Kentucky State Police Patrol, such as Trooper Henry C. Shipp things would be more hectic and hazardous on Kentucky waterways. Stopping pleasureboaters (left) for a routine inspection to insure they have all required safety equipment aboard is a big part of Trooper Shipp's job.



Back in June and July, they feeding tamed many old leaves into mere skeletons -- the present drought is causing these leaves to fall. Insecticides usually will not control insects in the pupae stage, so spraying now is a waste of time. Here, too, wait until next spring. The loss of leaves will not kill the elms.

Many different kinds of trees also are being attacked by fall webworms. Their presence is easy to spot -- you'll see loosely-woven, dirty white webs enclosing foliage at the end of branches. These webs enclose many pale yellow, black-spotted, hairy caterpillars about an inch long. If possible, remove the infected branches, or cut out the webs, and destroy them. Spraying with DDT (25 percent emulsifiable concentrate -- 2 1/2 tablespoons per gallon of water), also will help control this pest.

# Social Security News

There are many people who are still working full time even though they are 65 years of age or older. They have not applied for social security payments because they are not ready to retire. James Mastin, Manager of the Somerset Social Security Office, said that a recent survey found a considerable number of such workers.

There are several reasons why a wage earner or self-employed individual who is 65 or over should contact his social security office and discuss his individual case.

One, a person who is 65 or older may be able to receive some benefit payments even though he or she is still working for over \$1680 a year. Two, it is possible and usually advisable for a person who is 65 or older to file a claim, obtain necessary documents, and have the claim processed in advance of retirement. He can then get benefit payments started much more promptly when he retires and still have the amount of benefit payments required to include earnings after his claim was filed.

The Social Security Administration cannot take any action to make benefit payments to anyone until a claim has been filed. Mastin advised all persons who have reached retirement age to contact their local social security office even though they are still working. "The people in the social security office will give you proper advice for your individual case and make certain you do not lose benefit payments to which you may be entitled," Mastin said.

The social security office for this area is located in the Tradewind Center in Somerset. The office hours are 8:45 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday. The telephone number is 678-8168.

### ORDINANCE NO. 301

**AN ORDINANCE CREATING AND OFFERING FOR SALE FRANCHISES TO COHERE LAY, MAINTAIN AND OPERATE IN, ALONG, ACROSS AND UNDER THE PUBLIC STREETS, AVENUES, ALLEYS, ROADS AND OTHER PUBLIC STREETS, WAYS, AND PLACES OF THE CITY OF MT. VERNON, KENTUCKY, A SYSTEM OF MAINS, PIPES, CONDUITS AND APPURTENANCES FOR THE DISTRIBUTION AND SALE OF NATURAL GAS MANUFACTURED AND, OR MIXED GAS AND FURTHER PROVIDING FOR THE ADVERTISEMENT AND SALE OF SAID FRANCHISE AS PROPOSED AND THE ACCEPTANCE OR REJECTION OF BIDS THEREFOR.**

**THE BOARD OF COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MT. VERNON, KENTUCKY, DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:**

**SECTION I:** - There is hereby created a franchise for acquiring, laying, maintaining and operating in, along and under and across the public streets, avenues, alleys, roads, and other public ways hereinafter called "streets" and public places of the City of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, a system of mains, pipes, conduits and appurtenances for the distribution and sale of natural or manufactured, and, or mixed gas and providing for the advertisement and offering of said proposed franchise for sale and the acceptance or rejection of bids therefor.

**SECTION II:** - The person, firm, corporation, company, his or its successors or assigns, hereinafter called "franchisee" acquiring this franchise shall have the right and privilege of acquiring, laying and maintaining a system of mains, pipes, conduits and appurtenances in, along, across and under the public streets and places of said city to transmit, distribute, and sell natural, or manufactured, and, or mixed gas therefrom to the inhabitants of said City of Mt. Vernon, Ky.

The franchise, subsequent to the purchase and acceptance of this franchise shall immediately begin negotiations to secure an adequate supply of gas, and within one year after securing said supply of gas from the grantee's source

of supply and after securing the necessary rights of way, shall begin to construct and lay such pipe line and conduits from its said source of gas of a capacity sufficient to meet the demands of the inhabitants, industries and businesses of the City of Mt. Vernon, Ky., provided however, the grantee shall not be liable for any delays, failures, or defaults in the construction, maintenance, and operation of said system of gas mains, and pipe lines occasioned by any acts of God, strikes, the public enemy, lockouts or any other vis major which by the exercise of due diligence the grantee is unable to avoid or overcome; and it is further provided that if the grantee of this franchise shall have contracted with a third party for a source of supply of gas, and a copy of such contract is furnished to the City of Mt. Vernon, Ky., then and in the event the contract made by the grantee here of and the said third party for said gas supply exceeds the said third party from supplying said gas to the grantee for causes beyond the control of said third party, then the grantee of this franchise shall be excused for its failure to furnish gas as herein required to the same extent as for like causes as are specified and set out in the contract between this grantee and said third party.

All work to be performed by the grantee shall be in a workmanlike manner and performed so as not to interfere unreasonably with the public use of the streets and public places of said City of Mt. Vernon, Ky., and the grantee shall not interfere with the Municipal Sewer System or the water and electric distribution systems in Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, nor shall it interfere with other utilities or quasipublic utilities authorized to use the streets and public ways of the City of Mt. Vernon, Ky. When a street is opened by the grantee for the purpose aforesaid, it must be restored within a reasonable time by the grantee in or to as good a condition as it was in immediately prior to the opening thereof.

**SECTION III:** - The grantee shall indemnify the City of Mt. Vernon, Ky., for all damages to its streets and public ways and public places caused and brought about by the negligence of the grantee, its agents and servants, and the grantee shall defend any and all actions caused or brought about or arising out of the construction and laying of said gas mains, pipes, conduits and appurtenances in, along and across the streets and public ways of said City and in the construction and operation of said system of gas mains, pipes and appurtenances.

**SECTION IV:** - The period of this franchise shall extend for twenty (20) years from the effective date thereof.

**SECTION V:** - That for the purpose of effecting a sale of said franchise it is ordered that the Clerk of the City of Mt. Vernon, Ky., shall advertise the time, date, terms and place of sale, together with the purpose thereof and the provisions and conditions of the proposed franchise to be offered and the date for acceptance or rejection of bids by the Board of Council of the City of Mt. Vernon, Ky., at its regular meeting of the City of Mt. Vernon, Ky., on September 4, 1969, by publication in the Mt. Vernon Signal, a weekly newspaper of general circulation published in the City of Mt. Vernon, Ky., for the issues of August 21, 28 and September 4, 1969 and also by written or printed notices posted on the streets and public places in the City of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky. No bids shall be considered if the amount thereof is less than \$100.00 plus the total cost of advertising, which amount is fixed as the upset price of the bidding. The Clerk of the City of Mt. Vernon, Ky., shall report in writing to the Board of Council of the City (her) actions under the order and the regular meeting of the Council of the City of Mt. Vernon, Ky., on September 4 at the hour of 7:30 p.m. E.D.T., September 4, 1969, stating in said report the name of the successful bidder and the amount of his said bid and upon the granting of said franchise and the acceptance of said bid by the Board of Council of the City of Mt. Vernon, Ky., the purchaser shall immediately pay to the Clerk of the City of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, the full amount of said purchase price for said franchise as bid. It is further ordered that upon the final passage of this ordinance and the acceptance of the successful bid by the Board of Council of the City of Mt. Vernon, Ky., the successful bidder shall be notified of the acceptance of said bid by the Clerk of the City of Mt. Vernon, Ky., the Board of Council of the City of Mt. Vernon, Ky. reserves the right to reject any and all bids.

**SECTION VI:** - The grantee of said franchise, its successors and assigns, may sell, transfer, or assign said franchise to any utility or construction company, or any other person, individual, group of individuals, or corporation with, and only with, the consent and approval of the Board of Council of the City of Mt. Vernon, Ky.

**SECTION VII:** - The grantee, its successors and assigns shall sell gas to the residents, inhabitants, plants and consumers of the City of Mt. Vernon, Ky., upon terms and at the rates specified by the Public Service Commission of the Commonwealth of Kentucky and shall serve the residents, inhabitants, plants and consumers adequately in accordance with the rules, regulations, control, and supervision of the Public Service Commission of the Commonwealth of Kentucky or such other agency as may be authorized and empowered by law to regulate the same.

**SECTION VIII:** - It is hereby ordered that the grantee shall be exempt from taxation insofar as concerns such taxation which is based on an assessment of its physical, tangible and intangible assets, where such taxation is levied by the City of Mt. Vernon, Ky. When a street is opened by the City of Mt. Vernon, Ky. (5) years from the effective date of starting construction.

**SECTION IX:** - The granting of this franchise shall not interfere in any manner with the sale of bottled gas in the City of Mt. Vernon, Ky., by any person, firm or corporation, other than the grantee of this franchise; and the grantee of this franchise shall not interfere with any such sales by engaging in any bottled gas business for retail to consumers in the City of Mt. Vernon, Ky.

**SECTION X:** - Any other provision of this ordinance to the contrary notwithstanding, if gas is not available under said franchise to consumers with the City of Mt. Vernon, Ky., on or before 24 months after the date that the bid for such franchise is accepted, then such franchise may be renewed by the Board of Council of the City of Mt. Vernon, Ky., at its option, without refund to the successful bidder.

**SECTION XI:** - It is hereby ordered that this Ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage, approval and publication as provided by law.

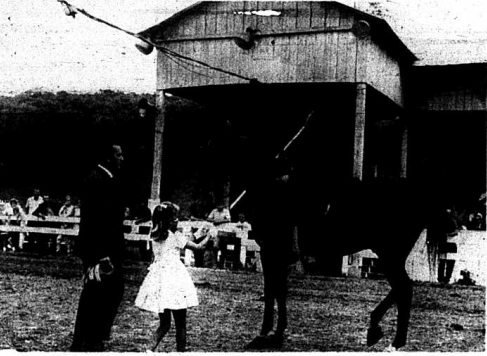

A goal of \$300 has been set by the Rockcastle Chapter of the Arthritis Foundation for its 1969 campaign which begins in September. To start the drive, a Bake Sale will be held Saturday, September 6 in front of the Bank of Mt. Vernon and the campaign will be culminated with a drive on Tuesday, September 23 from 6 to 8 p.m.

Mrs. Joe Gay, Chairman, said that in addition to raising money to aid the arthritis sufferers, the campaign would seek to expand public knowledge about arthritis and its symptoms. "Too many people think of arthritis as a disease of the elderly. That simply is not true. It is most crippling form it strikes most frequently between the ages of 18 and 40. And it strikes people from all walks of life. It is a major health hazard, in fact, the nation's number one crippling disease," she said. "Not

nearly enough is being done about it. It is imperative that we continue and step up our programs to aid the country's 17 million arthritis sufferers."

The chairman said that neighborhood volunteers will pass out flyers during the door-to-door campaign listing the major warning signs and symptoms of arthritis: (1) Persistent pain and stiffness upon arising. (2) Pain or tenderness in at least one joint. (3) Swelling in at least one joint. (4) Recurrence of these symptoms. (5) Pain and stiffness in lower back, knees and other joints. (6) Tingling sensations in fingertips, hands and feet. (7) Unexplained weight loss, fever, weakness or fatigue.

Those experiencing these symptoms are urged to see a qualified physician. "No case of arthritis is hopeless if caught early and properly treated."

However, it was necessary to vote on each appointment separately since the original motion, which included the hiring of Mrs. Barbara Thacker as secretary at Roundstone, failed to get a second on Willie Taylor's motion.

On the separate motions, all appointments were made except Mrs. Thacker's which again died for lack of a second. Mrs. Glenna Baker asked why Mrs. Jean Payne was not elected as secretary at Roundstone. ## \$81,213 Is State's Share Of Nat'l. Forest Receipts

Forest Supervisor Robert F. Collins said today that 21 Counties in Kentucky will receive a total of \$81,213 as their share of receipts from National Forest operations last year.

Federal law provides that Counties with National Forest land share receive 25 per cent of the Forest income. These funds are to be used on schools and roads.

Among the 4 major forest resources, wood, water, wildlife, and recreation, the sale of timber provides the largest part of Daniel Boone National Forest Fund Receipts. Timber sales over a quarter million dollars were made during the 1969 Fiscal Year.

Supervisor Collins said the amount of money each County receives is based on the number of acres of National Forest land within its boundaries. Supervisor Collins said that the Forest Service's system of land management makes certain that there will always be a supply of timber to be used by private operators. It also provides for continued protection of the wildlife, recreation and aesthetic values of the Forest.

The money returned to Kentucky Counties is part of more than \$5 billion being distributed in the 13 State Southern Region of the U.S. Forest Service.

Kentucky Counties receiving National Forest funds are Bath, Bell, Clay, Estill, Harlan, Jackson, Laurel, Lee, Leslie, McClary, Menifee, Morgan, Owsley, Powell, Pulaski, Rockcastle, Rowan, Wayne,

Whitley, Wolfe, and Pike. Rockcastle's share of the National Forest Fund Receipts for the year is \$1,691.49 for net acreage of 11,415.

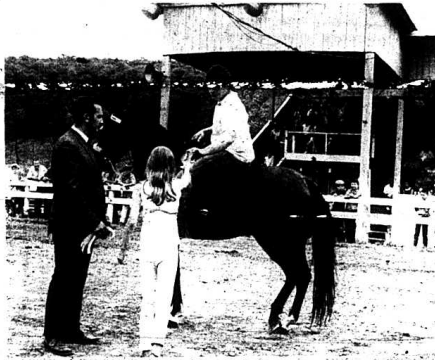

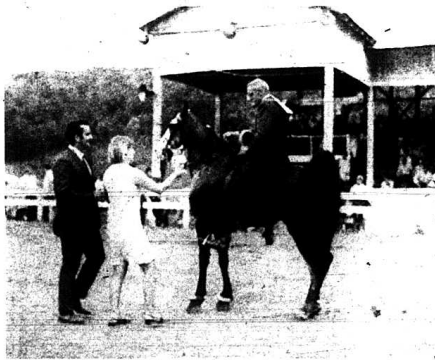

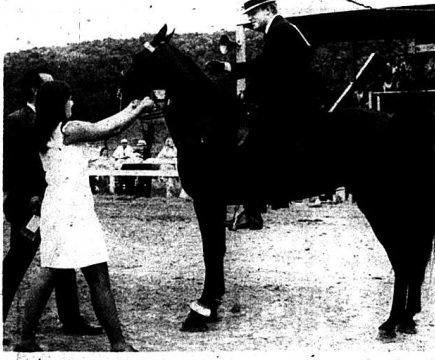
