

Winter Tetuny?

Most beef cow deaths between now and spring will be hamed on "genss tetany," regardless of the actual casse. Probably some cows will die of a tetany condition, possibly some of them of grass tetany-but not very many. The main cause will be unbalanced diets, bad feeding memagement, and underfeeding during late fall and winter after the cows have call wet. during late fall and winter after the cows have calved. All of these conditions are actually nutritional deficiencies that favor a ketosis syndrome which accompanies, brings on, or enters into a condition best described as "winter tetany." In most of the cases of cow deaths attributed to (resses?) tetany the situa-

cow neaths attribute to (gross?) tearly the situation can be characterized in the following manner. A. Cows were in fat condition, rather than thin, at calving time. B. After calving the cows go into milk production and are usually left to forage for themselves since the owner in these cases seems to think the cow deem't need any help. Without needed feed source the cow begins breaking down her own body fat, ketone bodies build up and cannot be utilized due to a deficiency in crabolydrates, and consequently a teimy condition follows.

C. This telany condition begins as soon as fat breakdown has proceeded long enough for ketone bodies to build up. Death usually occurs between the 4h and 8h week after calving. Conclusions: 1. The ctany condition occurs almost always in cowa that are good milken, are fleshy at calving, and do not have access to sufficient cause in fields called "winter posture." 3. Steers, buils, replacement hefers and dy cows are seddow victures of tetany. 4 Mort occurs almost the second of the cowa sufficient cannot be considered to the constant of the cowa suchling calves during the winter months. 2. Make sure minerals (Ca. P. & salt) are available to the cow sufficient quantity for the cowa suchling valves during in the lafter fall and winter months make available to the cow sufficient quantity of feede (not in excess) to feed and raise a healthy calf.

Now is the best time of year to tear up grass fields for seeding to legumes next spring. By this time, I hope you have grazed these fields closely to make till-age easier. weight to make the disk "take the ground." Set the blades nearly straight so you "chop the sod" rather than "cut it loose." For most fields, it will take two diskings to do the best job. Very often, at this time of the year, once over with the tiller is enough.

Tear loose 50 percent or more of a good sod, On thin, weak grass stands, expose 40-60 percent of the soil surface. Leave the ground rough, and on slopes, do your tillage on the contour to prevent erosion. Do not smooth the ground until just before seeding, This should be done from mid-February to mid-March.
