Draft Lottery Held; First In 27 Years

For the first time in 27 years, a draft lottery was held Monday night to determine which 18-year olds would be the first ones called for the draft.

The historic event took place in Washington, D.C. It was the first lottery since 1942. The lottery was canceled during World War II, when it became necessary to induct all qualified men. Since 1948, men have been drafted in order of age, the oldest first, up to the age of 26.

The lottery affects every man in the country between the ages of 19 and 26 who has not served in the military. Each of these men will be given a number, with those whose birthday was drawn first assigned No. 1, and so on through the 365 dates, plus one for Leap Year's extra day, Feb. 29.

Beginning in January, potential draftees will be called in the order in which their birthdays were drawn Monday night. Thus, each draft board will select all men with No. 1 or September 14 (the first date drawn in Monday night's lottery), except those with deferments or exemptions, before any man with No. 2, April 24 (the second date drawn, is taken).

Men in next year's draft pool whose assigned numbers are not reached by the end of the year will be free from draft liability entire unless there is a national emergency.

The last third drawn (approximately those with numbers from the mid-200's through 366) can be almost certain to be free from the draft. Those with birthdays drawn among the first third

But the number he was assigned in last night's lottery will stick with him. When his deferment lapses, even if it is several years from now, the number he got in the drawing will determine his place in the draft selection order.

Men whose birthdays were drawn last night were born between January 1, 1944 and December 31, 1950. Future lotteries (there will be one each fall) will determine the order of selection only for men who are 19 years old that year.

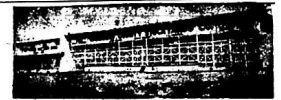

Winter Tetany?

Spot beef cow deaths below and spring will be blamed on "winter tetany," regardless of the actual cause. Probably some cows will die of a tetany condition, possibly some of those of grass tetany but not very many. The main cause will be unbalanced diets, bad feeding management, and underfeeding during late fall and winter after the cows have calved. All of these conditions are actually nutritional deficiencies that favor a ketosis syndrome which accompanies, brings on, or enters into a condition best described as "winter tetany."

In most of the cases of cow deaths attributed to (grass?) tetany the situation can be characterized in the following manner: A. Cows were in fat condition, rather than thin, at calving time. B. After calving the cows go into milk production and are usually left to forage for themselves since the owner in these cases seems to think the cow doesn't need any help. Without needed feed soaking the cow begins breaking down her own body fat, ketone bodies build up and cannot be utilized due to a deficiency in carbohydrates, and consequently a tetany condition follows.

C. This tetany condition begins as soon as fat breakdown has proceeded long enough for ketone bodies to build up. Death usually occurs between the 4th and 8th week after calving.

Conclusions: 1. The tetany condition occurs almost always in cows that are good milkers, are fleshy at calving, and do not have access to sufficient carbohydrate when milk flow is the greatest. 2. Death usually occurs between 4 and 8 weeks after calving. Cows that die usually in fields called "winter pasture."

3. Steers, bulls, replacement heifers and dry cows are seldom victims of tetany. 4. Most so-called "magic remedies" haven't saved many cattle. Recommendations: 1. Good cattle management and good feed management, particularly for the cows suckling calves during the winter months. 2. Make sure minerals (Ca, P & salt) are available free choice, and that clean water is always available. 3. Immediately after calving in the late fall and winter months make available to the cow sufficient quantity of feeds (not in excess) to feed and raise a healthy calf.

Tear Up Grass Fields For Renovating Now

Now is the best time of year to tear up grass fields for seeding to legumes next spring. By this time, I hope you have grazed these fields closely to make tillage easier. Also, you should have had the soil tested, limed, and fertilized with phosphate and potash. If you haven't, do it immediately.

When using a disk, add weight to make the disk surface. Leave the ground rough, and on slopes, do your tillage on the contour to prevent erosion. Do not smooth the ground until just before seeding. This should be done from mid-February to mid-March. Put your return pastures on a full-time production basis by renovating them. It's cheap, easy to do, and highly rewarding.

Kentucky Seedman Will Hold Open Meeting in Lexington, Dec. 11-12

Improved seed production will highlight a multitude of topics scheduled for discussion at the Seventh Combined Annual Seed Meeting. The two-day conference, December 11-12 in Lexington, is open to all seed growers and will include members of the Kentucky Seed Development Association; Kentucky Seedmen's Association; the Kentucky Department and Division of Regulatory Services of the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture.

The opening session at 10 a.m., at the Phoenix Hotel in Lexington, will emphasize all aspects of seed quality, and the producer's role in the seed industry. Topics open for discussion will include: proposed changes in regulation of the Kentucky Seed Law, and the variation between seed labs on similar tests, and new seed testing techniques.

Dr. Charles Bamhart, Dean of the UK College of Agriculture, will address the group at 9 a.m. on Friday, December 12.

Persons interested in attending the meeting should register at 10 a.m. on Friday, December 11. All interested seed growers are invited to attend.
