Homemaker's Help

Homemaker's Help

The Christmas decorations have been carefully boxed for another year, and the last remnant of the holiday season has disappeared from the family scene. But what about the beautiful holiday flowers you received on Christmas morning? With proper care they can continue to provide you with many days of pleasure!

Specialists in Horticulture at the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture offer the following tips on the care of your Christmas plants.

Pointsettia, cyclamen, chrysanthemum and Christmas begonia are the four most popular plants that decorate the home during the festive season.

The most common problem in the care of pot plants is the watering method. Constant and uniform moisture should be maintained at all times. Overwatering and drying may result in the leaves turning yellow and dropping. The roots need watering like other parts of the plant, but too much moisture will shut off the oxygen supply and result in wilting. The plant should be watered only when the soil feels dry, or when the soil begins to pull away from the side of the pot.

When the plant is watered the water should be allowed to drip out of the bottom of the pot. This insures complete wetting of the soil ball. Increasing the humidity in the room will help to keep the soil from drying as rapidly.
Most plants will grow better if they are placed where light is plentiful. Although the window sill is a favorite location it rarely provides the necessary light to sustain the plant. The temperature near win-

Facilities Survey Report Delivered

James W. Daniel, Director of the Division of Statistical Services for the State Department of Education, met with the Rockcastle County School Board Monday night to deliver a report of the Facilities Survey conducted last year for Rockcastle County, at the request of the School Board.

Due to a lack of preparation time on this comprehensive report, a complete feature article on the findings of the survey will appear in next week's issue of the Signal.

In other business before the board, Katherine Bradley was hired to teach grades one through four at the Blue Springs School. Mrs. Bradley replaces Miss Valerie Bullock who resigned recently from that position.

The site, on the Old Brodhead Road near the Vocational School, already chosen for the new consolidated high school was brought up for discussion by Superintendent Charles B. Parsons. Mr. Parsons told the Board that at a

recent teacher in-service day, a majority of the teachers present indicated dissatisfaction with the site.

Chairman Preston Nunneley told the board that he also had heard several comments on the site and felt that there was a general feeling in the community that there were better locations for the new school.

The board members did agree that the site now chosen would probably not provide enough space for adequate athletic facilities and that the cost of removing the rock from the area would be prohibitive. Mr. Parsons reported that the contractors for the vocational school were turned in two bills totaling over \$5,000 just for removal of trench rock and he also pointed out that the vocational school was built almost on the surface.

However, a point in favor of keeping the present site, Mr. Parsons also pointed out would be the facilities students using both the high school and vocational school would not have to buss.

The board finally passed a motion to ask the State Buildings and Grounds Department to come back for a look at other sites for the school.

Jess Tom Pike was approved as a substitute teacher by the board, subject to Mr. Pike's certification.

Mr. and Mrs. Byron Baker, Cecil Rimell, and Alton McCollum were present to inquire as to why two bus routes in the Roundstone area had been discontinued.

Mrs. Baker told the board that Mr. Rimell had spoken recently with Willard Whitaker, Director of Transportation, about having their school bus travel the road the Bakers and Rimells live on so that they would not have to send their children down to the main road to catch the bus.

Mrs. Baker reminded the board that the bus had traveled the road (off of U.S. 25 about three-quarters of a mile south of Roundstone) up until two years ago when it was discontinued because of the bus having to stop on U.S. 25, then heavily traveled.

Mrs. Baker then reminded the board that the traffic was almost nil now on U.S. 25 except for a little local traffic and this factor was no longer applicable to the bus route. She told the board that Mr. Whitaker had given them the impression that the bus driver did not want to take the bus up the road since he considered it too dangerous.

However, Mrs. Baker told the board that the road was not any more dangerous than it had been when the bus had traveled the road for so many years before.

Kenneth Adams, School Board member from the Roundstone District, then asked the board why Mr. Whitaker look into this situation again and see if something couldn't be worked out. He expressed the feeling that he personally could see no reason for the bus not servicing the road. The motion carried.

Alton McCollum then asked the board why the bus had been discontinued on the Roundstone-Conway road. He stated that the bus ran on that road for about five years but had recently been discontinued which made a neighbor of Mr. McCollum's, Glenn Coffey, have to transport his child and Mr. McCollum's.

The board also agreed to look into this matter.

Salaries Raised, Rent Hiked; As F. C. Holds First '70 Session

The first of what will undoubtedly prove to be high-lying and informative Fiscal Court sessions, was held Tuesday morning with County Judge Charles C. Carter presiding.

Proving out his reputation for being a man with the ability to get things done, Judge Carter made two important recommendations to the Fiscal Court which were promptly carried out by the Magistrates.

The most important of these recommendations no doubt concerned raising the rate of all non-county offices in the courthouse with the exception of the Agriculture Extension Office, which the Court decided was already paying a reasonable rate of rent.

The blanket increase is expected to realize the County approximately \$174,000 in additional revenue from this source. The increase will be effective April 1, 1970.

Perhaps the most important news for county truck drivers and election officers was the pay raise which the Court voted them. The truck drivers were raised to \$2.00 an hour, effective Tuesday, January 6, and instead of \$3 a day for their twelve-hour day, election officers will now receive \$12. Judge Carter pointed out to the court that one-half of this increase would be paid by the state.

On the subject of outgoing Sheriff Tip Reppert's settlement with the Fiscal Court, Judge Carter read the Kentucky Statute which covers this settlement and which says, in effect, that in October of each year the Court shall appoint some one to make a settlement with the County Sheriff and that this settlement shall be published. Judge Carter told the Magistrates that even though it was several months past October that this settlement of fees and taxes collected and expenditures made was required and would have to be done now.

On motion of Magistrate C.W. "Wally" Phillips, seconded by Magistrate Cleidith Thacker, the court voted to hire Mrs. Jack Cromer to make this settlement.

In other business before the court, James O. Sells, Mr. and Mrs. Dolie Abney, and other landowners in the Renfro Valley area along Lake Linnville were on hand to ask the Court if they could do something about the road built last summer around the lake and which had now silted in several places making passage impossible.

Judge Carter immediately informed the landowners that the County was not in any way responsible for the new road since the City Council had authorized, without permission of the County, the building of the new road which did away with or covered up the county-owned road except in a few places.

The City Council also refuses to own the road contending that after the road was built the County voted to take the road over thus relieving them (the City) of any responsibility for maintenance or repair.

However, County Attorney William Gregory stated during the discussion that it appeared the road was not taken over legally by the City in the first place nor returned to the County property when the new road was completed and that he could not see the basis for the County now being liable for the condition of the

road.

However, Gregory did recommend to the landowners that they enter a suit against the County, City, and State which, according to Mr. Gregory, would settle the question of who owns the road and is therefore responsible for it once and for all.

The landowners did not agree, however, with this recommendation and instead suggested to the Fiscal Court that they themselves file suit against the City for illegally taking over the road.

After much further discussion, it was decided by the Court to serve the City with a written notice to the effect that the County will not assume any responsibility for the road the City constructed around the lake at Renfro Valley.

Ernest Robinson of the Scaffold Cove section also met with the Court to request at least one-half mile of gravel on the road in his section which runs by the old quarry since the road had received no gravel for two years and is getting in bad shape. The Magistrate for that section, Cleidith Thacker, assured Mr. Robinson that this would be taken care of.

Some minor items of business were also disposed of by the Court Tuesday.

W.B. Thomas was awarded the contract for supplying coal to the courthouse at \$10.50 a ton; a motion was made and voted to hire help to clean the courthouse and then to hire a painter to paint several of the offices, and Sheriff Billy Kirby was authorized to begin collecting taxes on January 6.

Mason Poynter, Jr. Killed On Interstate 75

Mason Poynter, Jr., 49, of Route 3, Brodhead, was killed instantly about 2 a.m., Wednesday, January 7, on Interstate-75, 9.6 miles north of Mt. Vernon.

According to State Trooper Stanley Hele, Poynter, who was traveling in the southbound lane of the

Interstate, apparently pulled over to the side of the road and got out of his car leaving the door open. A car, driven by John William Martin of Toledo, Ohio, carrying three passengers also traveling south, topped the hill and did not see Poynter's car to avoid it. Martin swerved in an attempt to miss Poynter and skidded over 120 feet after impact.

It was snowing heavily at the time of the accident and the lights were on in Poynter's car, Trooper Hele reported.

Coroner Bill Dowell ruled the death accidental and no charges have been filed.

The body was taken to Cox Funeral Home in Mt. Vernon where arrangements were incomplete at press time.

TODD REPORTED MISSING IN VIETNAM

Wayne Todd, 21, son of Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Todd, Route 1, Brodhead, has been reported missing in action in Vietnam. Todd reportedly jumped into a body of water on New Year's Day in an unsuccessful attempt to save a fellow serviceman who had fallen ill.

Young Todd's tour of duty would have been by February 26, 1970.

1970 Legislature Is - Younger, Better Educated, More Women

If you are looking for a younger man, the place to find him is the 1970 Kentucky General Assembly which convenes in the capitol on Jan. 6.

The average age is 46, which is seven years less than the 53 average age of the 1960 legislator.

Comparison of these and other statistics bring out some interesting facts regarding the men and the embarrassingly few women members of the two groups.

The average age is 46, which is seven years less than the 53 average age of the 1960 legislator.

There was a significant growth in the members with college or university backgrounds. The total who graduated or attended college in 1960 was 78 compared to a 98 total for 1970.

There was a jump, too, in the number of men who saw military service. The increase was from 47 to 81.

For instance, business holds up pretty well over the 10-year period. The number who would come under this classification was 65 in 1960 and about 59 at this session.

The trend definitely is toward the law in the 1970 legislature, however, with 30 recorded as against 22 in 1960.

Farmers in the 38-member Senate and 100-member House appear to be on the wane, however, with only 18 showing up in the 1970 assembly compared to some 34 in 1960.

There are few more teachers in this year's body. Some are retired or part time, but the comparison is 7 now against 3 a decade ago.

The Baptists aren't losing any ground when it comes to religion. The number professing that in 1960 was 38, whereas the number this year is 44. Methodists number 21 this year, 26 in 1960.

The number of Christians has remained about the same, 18 in 1970 compared with 19 in 1960.

Catholics showed a larger membership growth than any other denomination in the decade just past. There are about 32 of that group in the upcoming session as compared to 15 in 1960.

It might be well to point at this stage in this comparison that the figures are not absolute, or guaranteed, mainly because some legislators in both assemblies did not include all facts concerning age, business, religion and other subjects in biographies furnished.

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Although not great, there is a rise in the number of women members. The Senate had one member on the staff side in 1960 and the House none. This growing in the Senate has one and the House four.

Another difference that no doubt will be noted when the 1970 assembly convenes will be in the length of the sittings of the male members. But, after all, they're younger now.

"As much as I would like to help the cities, every state dollar is already committed to vital services, many of which go to Kentucky's city residents."

This was Gov. Louie B. Nunn's reaction to a share-the-sales-tax plan advanced by Louisville Mayor Frank W. Burke.

Burke's proposal was that the state return to Kentucky counties and cities of 3,000 or more population, 10 per cent of the state's sales tax collections.

He said that based on estimates of total retail sales in 1968, the cities and counties would have had an extra \$21.4 million in revenue.

The governor said he has "the greatest concern for our cities, large and small" because "they, like the states, are caught up in the usurpation by the federal government of all available areas of tax revenue."

"However," he asserted, "the cities should face up to their obligations by seeking enabling legislation to pass their own taxes as the states and federal governments do."

Had Burke's plan been in effect, an estimated \$5.7 million would have been returned to Jefferson County last year, with \$3.8 million going to Louisville.

HUNTING AND FISHING IN KENTUCKY

A New Year's Resolution is something that is put into words on the first day of January after having crystallized from many months of thoughts which on the second day of January may be discarded.

Thus we hold that resolutions are not of much value. If a change is needed, and if more intensive work is required any day of the year will do to start it.

You simply do not have to wait until Jan. 1. And if you do wait many months until that time to put an idea into effect, then the worth of the resolution is of no great moment.

But Jan. 1 is the time for resolutions and while we aren't advocating that they be indulged in we do think that the beginning of a new year is a good time to re-evaluate ourselves and our activities and see where we stand. So in place of resolutions this year why not give a thought to the condition and position of our natural resources?

Why not think a while about:

DDT - This seems to be uppermost on conservationists' minds. For years we have promiscuously scattered this insecticide to the four winds. We have placed it on our trees and on various crops and eventually it has found its way into streams and lakes and then to the fish that inhabit those bodies of water and when we eat those fish we are again loading our fatty tissue with this long-lived pesticide. But we hope. Before we become a statistic to DDT it may well be banned as indicated by the Health and Agriculture departments of the Federal government.

Spilled waters - Streams that 20 years ago ran clear and pure are today unfit for a child to play in or a fish to live in. Garbage and sewage from our cities and towns and villages and from farmhouses make up a good part of the "contents" of our waters and acids, too. Salt water from oil wells spill into streams, as do the hillslides and coal dust from mines. All these make our waters unfit, unsightly and unusable.

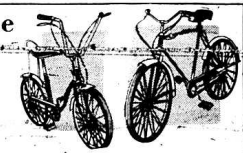
