Globe was 19 days over their contract deadline. According to the contract they should suffer a penalty of \$50 a day for each day they run past the completion date.

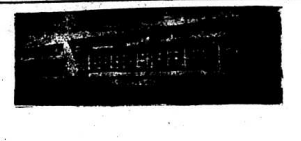

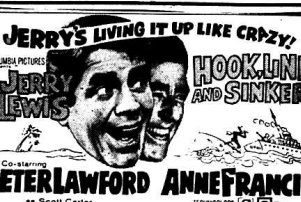

# Facilities Survey - Rockcastle County Schools

The basic purpose of the Facilities Survey, recently conducted by the State Department of Education for the Rockcastle County Board of Education, was to provide for the local district an objective evaluation of its educational program and facilities with constructive recommendations for their improvement.

Working toward this goal, five members of a state survey team spent several days last year in Rockcastle County and a comprehensive 32-page report emerged which will be of invaluable aid to the local board in planning the school facilities for Rockcastle County children.

The report begins with a synopsis of the community characteristics of Rockcastle County and before getting into the school system, tables on population data, age classification, employment data, and source of employment for Rockcastle Countians are included.

According to the statistics in the report, the median years education of the population in the county is 8.0 years as compared with 8.7 state average. The percent of total population who have graduated from high school is 13.3 for the county while the state average is 27.6.

And, the percent of males 25 years and older who have graduated from high school is 10.5% while the average statewide is 25.9%.

In the Statistical Profile for Rockcastle County Schools, based on information from the 1967-68 school year, the report shows that Rockcastle County spends \$338.02 annually on each pupil in average daily attendance compared with the Kentucky Average of \$356.71. Perhaps the most startling difference is the amount of percent of revenue from local sources which is 11.6% in the county as compared with 29.6% for the state average. Running ahead of the state average is the cost per child for administration, \$13.57 to \$11.03; cost per pupil for educational supplies and books, \$7.98 to \$8.06; cost per pupil for transportation, \$34.55 to \$37.74; percent of revenue from state sources, 64.3% to 46.3%; percent of revenue from federal sources, 23.3% to 17.7%; and percent of disadvantaged children, 51.5% to 33.4%.

The percent of high school graduates entering college is only 6% under the state average at 36.4%, the percent of attendance is down 6% at 93.6%, the pupil-teacher ratio is 25.4 compared to 26.6 statewide; the percent of

staff with less than Rank III is 5.6% compared with 5.9% statewide; the percent of teachers with Rank II or higher is 16.1% compared to a state average of 22.1%; the percent supplement for instructional salaries is 20.1% compared to 39.0% statewide, and the average annual salaries for classroom teachers is \$4,969.00, or \$552.00 under the state average.

However, Rockcastle did come ahead on the percent of ninth graders completing high school with a 72.5% average compared to 69.1% statewide.

Breaking the school system down into reports of each of the consolidated schools and the rural schools, the survey reads as follows:

Brodhead High School (9-12) is rated "Standard." Listed as primary needs for this school are the addition of foreign language, to the program and expansion of offerings in most other areas. Also additional library and guidance personnel are needed, according to the report.

Livingston High School (9-12) is also rated "Standard." The report specifies a need for the addition of industrial arts to the program, provision of full-time principal, library and guidance service, and for expansion of offer-

ings in most areas.

Mt. Vernon High School (9-12) is rated "Standard." There is a need to add art to the program, and to expand time of librarian and guidance counselor, and to expand offerings in most areas to provide a comprehensive program. Home economics, science, and music areas are limited.

In the four elementary schools, the survey indicates a need for art and the expansion of music and library services.

Concerning the eleven rural schools, which are unclassified for accreditation, the report recommends that consolidation of these small schools be accomplished as soon as possible.

Average annual membership in the Rockcastle County Schools has remained at approximately 3,100 for the past six years and projections indicate that membership will decline very slowly through 1976.

The report on the building and site of Brodhead School concluded that with regard to the site, there is a drainage problem of water standing on the grounds after a

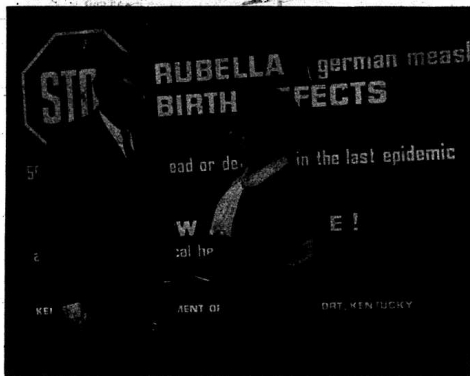

**IT PAYS TO GROW, PICKLES**  
As pickle acreage contract time is upon us once again and with a price increase in the offering for 1970, it might be well to review the earnings potential by looking at the 1969 facts.

With 13% fewer growers delivering in 1969 versus 1968, there was an 84% increase in the number of growers earning the equivalent of \$1000 or more per acre, with the "Champion Grower" earning \$1067.65 on 55/100 of an acre which equals \$1942 on an acre basis. These 123 leading growers averaged \$1205 per acre.

There was an increase of 141% in the number of growers earning the equivalent of \$900-\$999 per acre. The yield was increased

49% to an average of 200 bushels to the acre, with the leading growers producing 700 to 800 bushels to the acre. Those high yields are attributed to several factors: a) Pickle patch planted on ground previously used for tobacco, and/or b) Land was manured, and/or c) Use of 1000 pound of 5-20-20.

Even with the above increases in mind, the price for No. 1 size pickles will be increased to \$9 per 100 pounds with the other sizes retaining the same high prices as offered in 1969. The University of Kentucky Agricultural Extension Service cites the following advantages of growing pickles: 1) Guaranteed Market 2) Guaranteed Prices 3) Quick cash crop (12 to 13 weeks from planting to end of harvest) Planting is normally completed between 1st and 10th of May. Pickling starts around July 1.

and normally ends after the first week in August. 4) Good family project 5) Most labor takes place at a date which doesn't interfere with other crops such as corn and tobacco 6) Grower is paid in time of delivery to the receiving station 7) No special machinery or equipment is required 8) Out of pocket expense is small 9) Income is received when other crops are not ready for sale 10) Cucumbers are easy to grow 11) You don't have to be a big farmer to get a contract 12) Acreage is not government controlled.

In counties where pickles were not grown in 1969, you may contact your County Agricultural Extension Office, or Hirsch Bros. and Company, Louisville, Kentucky for further information.

In counties having a pickle receiving station in 1969 interested parties were not grown in 1969, you may contact the local Pickle Station Agent or the County Extension Office for 1970 Contracts.

**PRUNING SHADE TREES**

Each year we receive many inquiries about pruning shade trees and particularly about the best time to do it. Actually, shade trees seldom, if ever, need drastic pruning. The occasion may arise, however, when some of them will need to have a few branches removed to improve the form, prevent branches becoming crossed, or keep them from interfering with other plants, or the roofs of nearby buildings. This kind of pruning is corrective and is practiced only under these conditions. The idea that shade trees, especially younger ones, need to be pruned every year is not sound. To know this is true, just look at some of the most beautiful trees found growing in pasture fields from which a single branch has never been removed.

The best time for corrective pruning when the tree is absolutely dormant. January is one of the best months because even maples will not bleed or lose leaves from pruning. Also, the leaves are off the trees at this time, and you can readily see how much cutting needs to be done.

The idea that trees must be topped to keep them from growing too tall is false. Trees that are inclined to shoot up two or three very tall branches will not get too tall, because after these branches have made this growth they slow up and wait until the trees fall in winter. This is especially true of the silver or water maple. If you look at maples that are growing native, you see old trees that have the regular shape, especially true of the silver or water maple. Young trees should not have the lower branches removed until the tree is from 4 to 6 inches in diameter since these branches cannot be replaced once they have been removed. Allow some size before cutting off the branches to the desired height. For example, if the lawn has sufficient space leave the lower branches on a sugar maple so that they are almost on the ground. This makes for a more beautiful specimen. Of course, where space is limited this cannot be done. Grass and weeds do not grow under these branches when they are left on, and the ground becomes bare; nevertheless, it makes a beautiful, picturesque tree.

**REMOVING DEAD PLANTS**  
Now is the time to remove all dead plants whether they are trees, shrubs, or evergreens. Dead plants do not contribute anything to the attractiveness of the place. Half-dead plants come in the same category as those that are entirely dead. You often see half-dead evergreens that are still in the front foundation planting. Homeowners say they have \$4 or \$5 invested in the plant, and they intend to keep it as long as it has any life left in it. They should realize that very often the effect is terrible when a half-dead evergreen stands beside one that is good-looking.

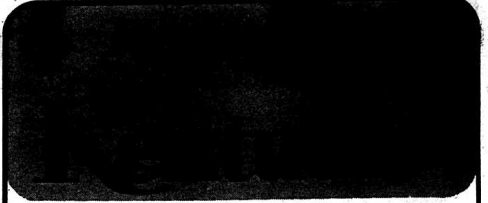

The Rockcastle County Board of Education employed J. Courtney Horton, Jr., Certified Public Accountant, Mt. Sterling, Kentucky to audit the financial records of the board for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1969.  
The report of the audit was submitted to the board at the January regular meeting. Each board member was given a copy. One copy of the audit is filed with the superintendent and one with the finance officer.

#### MINUTES AND RECORDS

Properly signed and approved minutes of all meetings of the Board were inspected. These appear to be kept in accordance with requirements of the Department of Education. Bid laws appeared to have been followed in connection with both purchase and sale of supplies and property. Claim forms for presentation to the Board for approval were signed by the Superintendent. Board members are paid \$10 per diem plus \$c per mile for conduct of school business.

Monthly and annual reports of taxes collected by the Sheriff appeared to be on the proper forms. His fee was 4% of collections. There was no statement of cost of collections available.

Considerable improvement was made in the manner of keeping records for the Basic Adult Education Program.

We obtained signed statements from Board members and the Superintendent stating that no known conflict of interests existed.

The annual financial statements were published in the Mt. Vernon Signal on August 28, 1969. All funds were included.

The activity and lunch room funds were audited by the Treasurer of the Board and other committee appointed by the Board.

#### TEACHERS SALARIES

Salaries paid to teachers and administrators were compared to the approved salary schedule on a test basis. Only minor differences due to lost time were noted. Substitute teachers' salaries and procedures were also examined, and were found satisfactory.

#### FOUNDATION PROGRAM CAPITAL OUTLAY FUND

In addition to normal capital expenditures, this fund is also being used to pay for the vocational school presently under construction. The Department of Education is providing part of the funds for this construction.

#### BOND INTEREST AND REDEMPTION FUNDS

Sufficient amounts were transferred to these funds during the year to provide for the payment of all bonds and interest due during the year.
