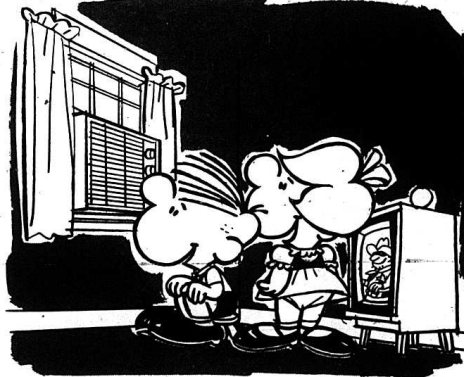

Junction City Men Indicted For Destroying Mailboxes

LEXINGTON (Sp.) — Indictments against two Junction City men were returned on March 16 by the Grand Jury convened for the Eastern District of Kentucky at Lexington, containing six counts charging violation of United States laws.

The two men, Buford Green and Raymond Hammons, were charged with willfully and maliciously injuring and tearing down six rural mailboxes on Route 1, Junction City, on October 26, 1969.

The men were arraigned before Judge Mac Switzer, U.S. District Court, Lexington, on March 17. They entered pleas of guilty and were sentenced to 60 days for each of the six counts.

Although many people are not aware of it, the theft or intentional destruction of rural mailboxes is a felony violation of U.S. laws, and those caught are dealt with accordingly.

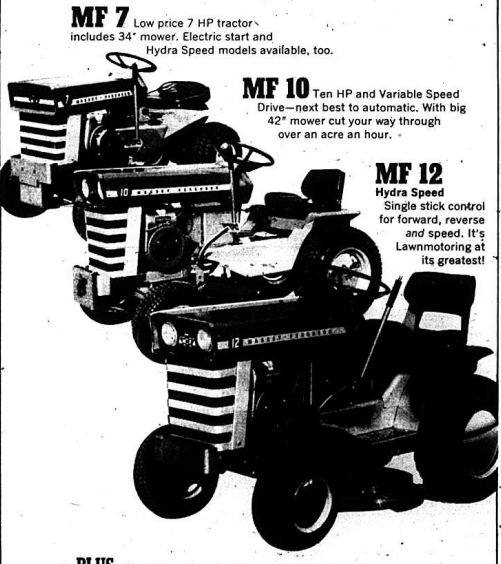

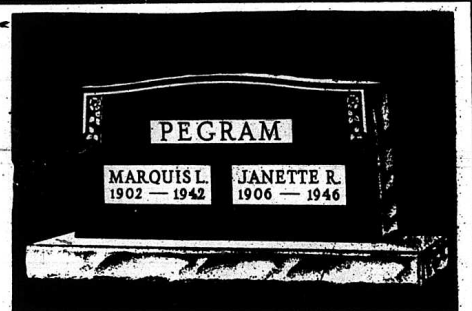

S.F. Bowman, 92, Dies

S.F. Bowman, educator and holder of several elected county offices, died Thursday, March 26, at the Sowder Nursing Home in Brodhead at the age of 92.

Mr. Bowman was born May 16, 1877 in Owsley County, the son of Isaac A. and Mary Hensley Bowman, the second son in a family of eight boys and one girl. He was reared on a farm, attended county schools, and in 1898 was married to Ida Farmer. To this union was born one son, Dwight M. Bowman. His wife, son, mother and father, and five brothers and sisters, preceded him in death. After the death of his wife, he married Pearl Bray Dailey, widow of Charles W. Dailey, who survives him. Two brothers, Sheridan Bowman of Berea and Bob Bowman of Scaffold Cane, besides nieces and nephews, also

survive.

He taught in the public schools for eight years; was elected County Court Clerk and served three terms; was elected County Judge and served two terms, and was elected County Attorney and served two terms.

Ed Winstead Named Mayor; Henderson New Councilman

Former City Councilman Ed Winstead was appointed by the Mt. Vernon City Council Tuesday night to serve as Mayor of Mt. Vernon until the November General Election.

The vacancy occurred upon the resignation of Clyde Linville, effective March 31. Mr. Linville plans to move his residence outside of the city limits within the near future and thereby under Kentucky Statutes would be ineligible to serve as Mayor of the City.

Another vacancy, that of councilman, was also filled when, on a motion by Councilman McKinley Perciful, David Henderson was unanimously named to the Council. This vacancy was created by the resignation of Wayne Stewart.

In November, the offices of Mayor and two councilmen, those of Mr. Henderson and Charlie Hines (also a recent appointee), will be on the ballot in the general election. The elected Mayor will serve the remainder of the term, through 1973, and the councilmen elected will serve through 1971 when the entire council will be up for re-election.

Mr. Linville's letter of resignation was accepted with regret by the Council and Councilman James Robinson served as Chairman of the meeting until Mr. Winstead could be sworn in.

In other business before

the council, Bro. Charles Shivel, pastor of the Mt. Vernon Pentecostal Church met with the Council to request permission for the church to pour a concrete slab over the city's storm sewer, adjacent to the Mt. Vernon Christian Church. Bro. Shivel told the Council that his church had recently purchased the old county building and adjoining land and intended to tear the building down to make a parking lot for the church. He said the slab was needed for a better entrance to the parking lot and he also asked that if City would grant permission for the slab to be constructed that the sewer be cleaned out by the city before the construction began.

The Council agreed to permit construction of the concrete slab and to clean out the sewer.

Ovie Smith, a resident of the Chestnut Ridge section, also met with the Council to see if they (the Council) could help residents along Chestnut Ridge obtain city water. Mr. Smith told the Council that over 20 residents within the first mile of the road had incorporated themselves into an Association and applied for funds from the Farmers Home Administration to buy and lay the water line. However, Mr. Smith said that Mr. Winn, a representative of FHA had met with them and informed them that at the rate, which the Association would have to pay the city for bulk water,

their loan would not be approved. The rate is determined by the amount of water purchased and with no more users than this particular line would have, water bills would have to be extraordinarily high to meet the loan.

The Council told Mr. Smith that they did not have ready funds available for constructing the water line on their own but they would be glad to meet with Mr. Winn, Crawford and Crawford Engineers, and residents of Chestnut Ridge to see if something feasible for supplying the water couldn't be worked out.

The Council then adjourned and next Tuesday night will meet again for their regular April meeting.

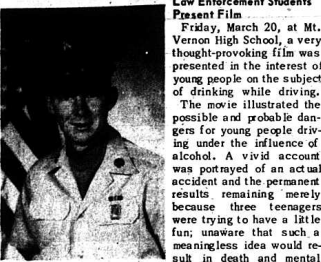

Homemaker's Help

Just about anything is liable to end up in a trash can these days. In fact, anywhere from 900 to 1,500 of these metal containers are opened in the average household each year. For convenience, many women are outfitting their kitchens with electric can openers. In most models, the cutter completely severs the can top, which is lifted out of the way by a magnet while the can itself is held in place until removed. However, most of these magnets will not hold a aluminum lid; these must be "hinged" by stopping the cutting action before the lid is completely cut. Rimless cans, like those which contain evaporated milk, cannot be opened electrically. So don't throw away your "old faithful" manual can opener just because you have an electric one.

Every electric opener has either a cutting wheel that revolves freely or a stationary cutter — wheel or blade — that holds the can and then removes the lid as the can is turned against it. Fixed cutters usually handle the corners of square or rectangular "rimmed" cans, but only on new models open all sizes and shapes of cans. Like any type of cutting device, electric can openers must be kept clean.



They become encrusted with food, and this clogs the action, is very unsanitary and can transfer flavor from the food in one can to the next one opened. In addition, a clean cutter stays sharp longer. And both cutting wheels and stationary blades should be kept sharp. When dull blades are forced through a can, tiny pieces of metal may fall into its contents. However, electric can openers should never be immersed in water because of motor damage and personal safety. Wipe the cutter with a sudsy cloth after use and, at frequent intervals, remove it and scrub it in hot soap or detergent suds. The cutting assembly must come out for washing. Some types are hard to remove and this is a factor to consider when buying an opener. Models with exposed rather than enclosed units are usually the easiest to handle. First, unplug the opener and then follow the manufacturer's directions for removing the gears. Most use, care and warranty manuals include detailed, diagrammed instructions for moving and replacing the parts. This is often just a matter of loosening and tightening a pair of screws. Wash in hot suds, rinse, and thoroughly dry the cutter wheel or blade and the magnet before replacing she recommends. The point at which the cutting wheel or blade is attached needs to be lubricated occasionally by 100. Check the manual for other care suggestions. The cabinet of the opener also should be wiped off often with a clean cloth wrung out of hot suds; abrasive cleaners are not recommended. The cord, too, should be disconnected, pulled taut through a folded damp cloth and then wiped dry before reuse. Many can openers include one or more accessories, such as bottle openers, sharpeners, ice crushers, and even pencil sharpeners. If your opener also has a knife sharpener, remember that it's important to wash and wipe knives

Ticks Also a Medically Important Pest
During the past few years

our knowledge of the brown recluse spider in Kentucky has greatly expanded. Although we knew it occurred in a few counties of the state in 1965, periodic news stories about this poisonous spider stimulated interested persons to send us suspicious looking spiders from all over the state. Many of the spiders were not the brown recluse, but some were. The list of 10 or so counties in which the spider was known to occur in 1945 has now grown to 47 counties.

However, the brown recluse is not the only "critter" of medical interest in Kentucky for which we do not have good distributional records. There are several kinds of ticks which have special medical interest.

Nearly everyone knows what ticks look like and even may have had experience with getting them off his pet dog or horse or even himself. These flat-bodied, 8-legged, brown pests can be very abundant in some areas from spring to mid-summer. You can hardly walk in the woods or fields without bringing one home with its "head" buried in your skin and sucking your blood. The thought of having any parasite sucking your blood may be revolting enough but there are dangers associated with ticks. If you are too anxious in dislodging a tick from yourself, the tick's mouthparts may be left in the skin. This can lead to secondary type infections. Also, some

ticks are capable of carrying the eastern form of Rocky Mountain spotted fever. The mortality rate among persons contracting this disease was estimated to be as high as 20 to 25% in a 1944 report. Fortunately, the cases of spotted fever in humans is low for several reasons. Only a small percent of the ticks capable of carrying the disease actually have the virus. An infected tick must feed at least an hour before it can transmit enough virus to its host to cause infection in the host. Prompt removal of an infected tick greatly reduces the possibility of symptoms developing in the bitten person. To help us gain more knowledge of the tick struc-

ation we would like your help. In the same way that you send us spider specimens, we would like to have you send us any ticks you encounter. A record of the specimens and the contributors will be reported in this newsletter as specimens are received. It is not possible at this time to determine if any of the specimens are infected with Rocky Mountain spotted fever.

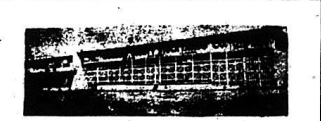

Social Security News

Have you ever thought of using a tombstone to prove your age?

No? Well neither had the lady who did it.

It seems the lady was 62 years old and was applying for her social security. The normal sources of proofs weren't working for her though. She had never married. Her family had kept no records, and her school records were destroyed in a fire. Finally, she mentioned that her mother had died giving birth to her. The social security representative made a trip to the grave and looked at the tombstone. The lettering was worn, but still legible, and the date of her mother's death agreed with the date of birth she had given. Her age was established.

James, Mustian, Manager of the Somerset Social Security Office cites this as one of the more "far-fetched" ways that the administration had used to prove a person's age.

Most people, says Mustian, are able to prove their age with much less effort. In fact, with less effort than they expect.

The best proof of age is a birth certificate issued at birth, but since Kentucky didn't begin issuing birth certificates until 1911, they are now available for people now reaching retirement age.


Many people attempt to have the state issue them a delayed birth certificate.

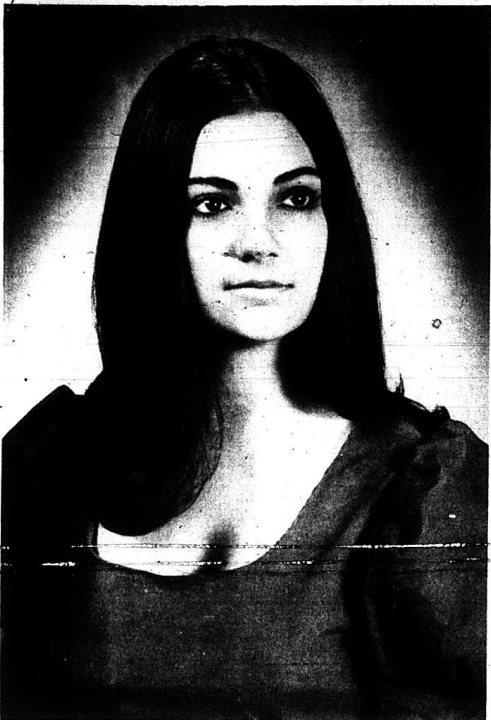
