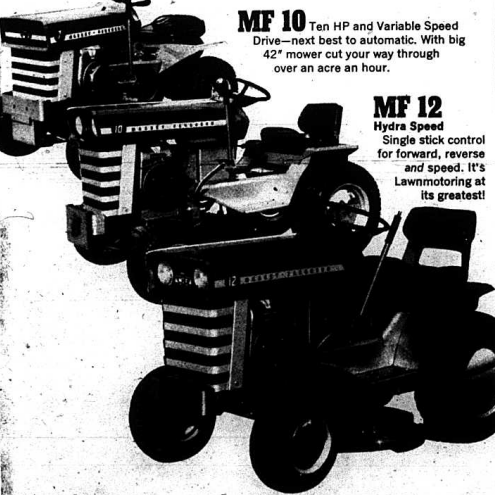

School Board Meets; Insurance Bids Opened

Bids were opened, at the last meeting of the Rockcastle County Board of Education, for insurance on the school buildings and boilers.

William K. Bullen, agent for Farm Bureau Insurance, submitted a low bid of \$4,496.29 annual premium for the three-year policy agreement on the buildings and also the low bid of \$696.40 annual premium on the boiler insurance.

On motion of Board Member Willie Taylor, these bids were accepted.

A motion was also made and approved to revise the school calendar and to make application with the State Department of Education to take the "Calcutiny" recently proclaimed by the state.

A motion was made by Willie Taylor and seconded by Kenneth Adams to approve the use of one school bus by Brohead School for a student trip to Florida. The board also approved the use of two school buses by Mrs. Verla Scott's class for a trip to Mammoth Cave. The board specified in the motion however that the school would pay the bus driver and reimburse the Board the rate of 15¢ per mile.

Two substitute teachers were approved by the board, pending certification. Jennie Lee Barnett and Shelby Jean Pike were both approved by the board as substitute teachers.

The Council however declined at this meeting to draw up and pass any rules and regulations governing the size of motor, type of activity, etc., for the lake. They did agree to adopt the State Fish and Game Club regulations.

These regulations, among other things, gives the local Fish and Game Warden authority to determine if a boat has a motor too large for it attached. Also under these regulations, each motor is required to be equipped with a life preserver.

MRS. SAMANTHA NEWCOMB DIES AT RESIDENCE

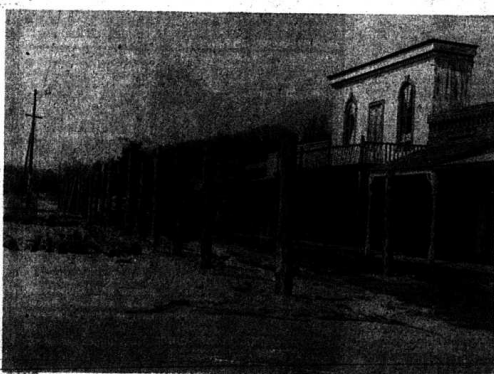

Renfro Valley Inc. Expanding Operation

Construction of a campsite that will accommodate approximately 300 campers is presently underway in Renfro Valley by Renfro Valley, Inc. Plans are to have the campsite in operation by June, according to Wade Ray, Renfro Valley, Inc. executive. The campsite is located just north of the Big Barn on U.S. 25 on land formerly belonging to Gettiff Craig.

Included in the project is a main building which will house a small grocery and supply store, lounge, bath rooms, and laundry mat.

Campers will have a wide choice of site ranging from complete accommodations down to just parking areas. They will also have a dump station and Mr. Ray said that a swimming pool will be constructed in the area within the near future.

Construction is also underway on a Frontier Street in the Valley. On this street will be a country store, saddle shop, ice cream parlor, lumber shop, and gun shop. A pioneer cabin with blacksmith shop will also be constructed and plans are to have frontier shows on this street.

County Consolidated Schools Are Now Serving Breakfast

Where can you feed a child a nourishing breakfast for 5¢? Well, the principals of at least four of the county's consolidated schools know the answer to this question.

Last Tuesday morning, students at Maple Grove School became the first students in the county to purchase doughnuts, milk, and juice for 5¢ at the school. Mrs. Edna McGuire, teacher at Maple Grove, said that the menu would be varied with hot food items being introduced into the menu often. An average of 80 children are now taking part in the program at Maple Grove. Mrs. McGuire said, and all seem to be, very enthusiastic about the idea. Mrs. McGuire voiced her support of the project calling it "one of the best things that has happened to our school."

Enrollment at Maple Grove now stands at 131 and Mrs. McGuire said that the children who were not participating in the program were the ones who lived the closest to the school.

The schools are able to offer this program through funds provided by the State Department of Education, Division of School Lunch. A representative of this department, James Durham, met with County Superintendent Charles Parsons, all school principals, and head teachers recently to apprise them of the fact that funds were now available through his department for this program. Mr. Durham told the educators that the state would pay 15¢ per breakfast served, which would just about pay for the food, and that the 5¢ each child paid could be used for the additional labor required.

Brohead School, on Wednesday of last week, served their students down to ham, eggs, oatmeal, toast, jelly, and milk. A total of 147 students were served Wednesday and D.A. Robbins, principal of Brohead, said that hopefully by the September school term, bus schedules could be arranged so that all students who wished to take advantage of this program would be at school in time to do so.

At present, only those students who can be at school between 8 and 8:30 a.m. are able to eat. This of course rules out some of the students arriving on buses.

Monday morning, two more consolidated schools, Livingston and Mt. Vernon, followed suit.

At Livingston School, pancakes were served to 328 students Monday and the trimmings were served to 225 Tuesday morning. Buford Parkerson, principal of Livingston School, stated that the children were very enthused about the program and that the teachers had commented on the fact that the children were more alert in the classrooms since this program had started. Mr. Parkerson also voiced his own support of the program and said that he had been interested in obtaining it for his school for some time.

Parkerson also stated that there had been an increase in the number of students participating in the school's lunch program in the three days that the breakfast program had been in existence.

At Mt. Vernon School, the menu varied slightly from the other two major consolidated schools. Monday, a sweet roll, milk, and juice were served to 147 students and Tuesday morning, a doughnut, milk, and juice were served.

Cleston Saylor, principal of the school, stated that he preferred to call the program a "morning snack" and that he felt that he would be defeating his own purpose if the children were fed between 8 and

8:30 a.m. and then were expected to eat a hearty lunch around noon. However, Mr. Saylor did state that "as long as this program doesn't interfere with the teaching program," it would be continued. He also indicated that the menu would be varied very little from the cold food items.

Roundstone Elementary School has not to date instituted a breakfast program, according to Tom Payne, principal of the school. Mr. Payne said that with 40% of his students on the free lunch program that he was in doubt whether or not he could afford the program.

Mr. Payne said that at present, he was getting more money from the state lunch program than he would be under the new system. He said, however, that he had written Mr. Durham apprising him of the facts pertaining to his school and was awaiting a reply before making a final decision on whether or not to institute the program.

On the whole, however, the principals seemed to be under the new system. He expressed the hope that next year they would be able to serve more children with a re-arranged bus schedule.

Ky. Telephone Donates Electrical Equipment

Harold Crawford, district manager, announced that Kentucky Telephone Company has donated electrical equipment valued at approximately \$70,000 to the Harry Sparks Vocational School at Mt. Vernon, Kentucky. This equipment was recently replaced by the latest of carrier equipment to provide service between Mt. Vernon and London.

Crawford said that since the telephone company is now using a more modern version of this equipment the vocational school was of the opinion that it would make an excellent training tool.

Henry E. Todd, radio and television instructor for the vocational school, said that the equipment would enable the students to learn practical knowledge of very high frequency radio signal transmitting and receiving.

Mr. Todd remarked that he felt that this will better equip the students to become productive employees as soon as they leave the

vocational school and enter the industrial world.

The Harry Sparks Vocational School hopes to have an enrollment of 36 students next year. The majority of these students will be studying electronic theory as well as practical application of radio and television equipment repair.

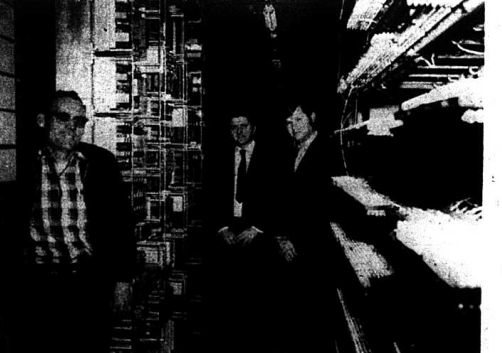
VIRGIL WAGNER, 50, DIES SUDDENLY

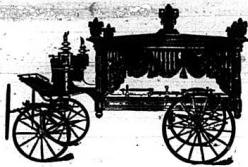

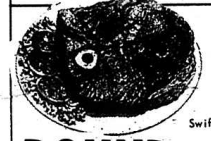

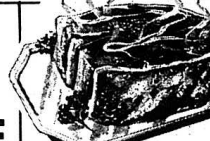
