NOTICE

The County Sheriff and deputies of Rockcastle County are by law required to levy against the personal property of taxpayers an amount sufficient to satisfy their 1969 tax bill, if this bill remains unpaid. This law applies to all taxpayers listed in the Mt. Vernon Signal as not having paid their 1969 tax bill. If the ownership of any of the property listed on the delinquent tax bills has changed, the present owner should advise the sheriff of this change in ownership in order that tax records might be brought current.

A levy will also be taken against persons who have not paid their 1969 tax bills on cars. If the tax bill remains unpaid, the car (or another one bought to replace the one originally taxed) will be towed in by the Sheriff's Department and sold to satisfy the tax.

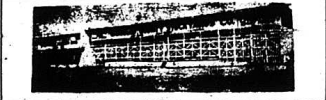

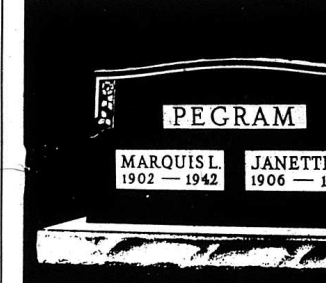

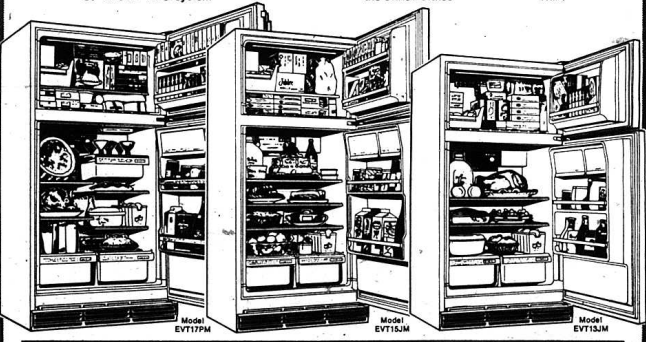

Fast Time Back April 26

With roosters it makes no difference, but for us humans on April 26 it will be "Wake Up...You're on Daylight Saving Time." That's the alarm that will ring on the last Sunday of the month throughout Kentucky and the rest of the nation except for the self-styled states of Michigan, Arizona and Hawaii. The way to make sure you will be on time—proper, daylight saving time—when you arise that morning (or afternoon) is to turn your clocks, watches and other time pieces ahead one hour before retiring April 25. The nation will revert to regular standard time at 2 a.m. on October 25, which is also a Sunday.

Researchers believe DST was conceived by Benjamin Franklin in 1784 while he was U.S. Ambassador to France. Supposedly, he woke early one morning in Paris, and seeing daylight, thought of moving ahead to lengthen the working day. DST in the United States has been controversial for years. Before the bill requiring it was signed into law by President Johnson in 1966, all states were given the option to legislate against it for their particular states. Efforts to exempt Kentucky from daylight saving were unavailing then and as recent as this year's January-March General Assembly.

The transition in Kentucky from regular standard time to daylight saving time is a bit more confusing than in most states because Kentucky is split through the middle into two time zones. The eastern and central sections are in the Eastern Zone and the western section in the Central Zone.

On Eastern Daylight Time for the next six months, therefore, will be all counties east of and including Meade, Hardin, Lane, Taylor, Casey, Pulaski and McCreeky. On Central Daylight Time will be all counties west of and including Breckinridge, Grayson, Hart, Green, Adair, Russell and Wayne.

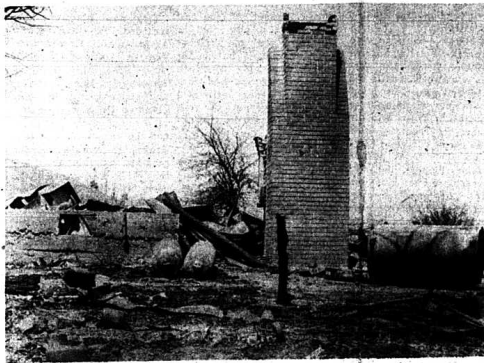
CEMETERY WALL FUND STARTED

MONTANA MAN ARRESTED ON MURDER CHARGE
Hiram Peters, about 61, of McCone County, Montana, has been arrested there on a warrant, charging him with murder, taken by local law officials.

According to County Judge Charles Carter, Peters is believed to be the same man, then going by Earl Peters, who was involved in the killing of Wade Graves on August 11, 1931. Carter was then deputy sheriff of Rockcastle County. Graves was killed during an alleged attempt to hold-up of his service station on old U.S. 25 just south of Mt. Vernon.

Two other men were sentenced to life imprisonment on charges of murder for their part in the killing. Peters was never apprehended. A hearing will be held May 12 in Montana to establish whether Hiram Peters is in fact the Earl Peters sought for so many years. According to Judge Charles Carter, Peters has stated that he is not the man named in the warrant.



The above one-story five-room home residence, owned by George Jones of Brodhead, burned Sunday night about 11 p.m. The home, located on U.S. 150 west of Brodhead, had been occupied by the Elmer Vaughn family. Mr. Vaughn had moved some of his furniture earlier in the day but lost several articles of furniture and appliances in the fire. Eleven members of the Rockcastle County Fire Department answered the call, but the fire was too far along when discovered by neighbors. According to Mr. Jones, the dwelling was covered by insurance.

Absentee Ballot Deadline For Primary Is May 7

Registered Republicans and Democrats who will be absent from their home counties have from now until May 7 to apply for absentee ballots to vote in the May 26 primary. The primary is to choose party nominees for U.S. representative from Kentucky's seven congressional districts, where there are two or more candidates, and for judge of the Court of Appeals from the third appellate district. Applications for absentee ballots must be made to the applicant's county clerk on forms he provides, according to Assistant Secretary of State Mary R. Galvez.

The applications must be notarized and so must the voted ballots. The latter must be returned to the county clerk so they will be in his hands by the time the polls close at 6 p.m., local time, on primary day. Opening time for the polls is 6 a.m.

Registered Republicans only are entitled to vote in the Republican primary and registered Democrats only in the Democratic primary. Persons registered as Independents may not vote in either. All incumbent congressmen have filed for re-nomination in their respective party primaries. The only one assumed of election, however, with no opposition either in the

primary or general election, is Second District Rep. William H. Natcher, Bowling Green. Candidates in the other districts, some without primary opposition are: First-Democratic primary: Incumbent Rep. Frank A. Subbelleff and Bobby Jo Sims, both of Murray. No Republican filed. County Agent's Notes

By: H. Les Durham

A-lalfa is on the way back in Kentucky, says University of Kentucky Forage Specialist, Warren C. Thompson. Following the massive 1964-1965 invasion of the European alfalfa weevil and the recent recognition that the weevil can be combated, many Kentucky farmers are seeding large acreages this spring. Besides, with the increasing numbers of cattle, more high quality feed is needed. Many of these seedings have already been made, yet because of the excessive rainfall, most often have been delayed. When making late spring and early summer seedings, there are some real important benchmarks that must be followed.

Soils. Pick well-drained, highly productive soils. If a field has been in alfalfa previously and was productive for four or more years, it's a good bet that it is a fine field to use again. Fertilizers and limestone should be applied according to a recent soil test.

Seedbed Preparation. When the seedbed is prepared by plowing or by disking following a row crop in 1969, nitrogen should be used. The spring rate for nitrogen under these conditions ought to be 25-40 pounds of actual N per acre. Where renovation is done to prepare the seedbed, nitrogen is not needed or recommended.

Weed Control. When making late seedings, one of the most bothersome problems is annual weeds; both grassy and broadleaf types, says University of Kentucky Weeds Specialist, J.W. Heron. In past years, farmers have resorted to the use of spring oats, to give shade competition to these weeds. In recent years, this practice has nearly faded out of the picture because of over-complexity of these "nurse crops." The coming of two herbicides, EPTC (Eptam) and Benfen (Balan) are giving satisfactory weed control when used according to manufacturer and college recommendations. These two materials should be used on plowed or thoroughly prepared seedbeds just prior to seeding. They should be worked into the soil as they are applied. The rate for Eptam is 3 pounds of actual ingredient or 1/2 gallon of 6 E per acre. With Balan, 1.1 to 1.5 pounds of actual material or 3-4 quarts of

1.5 E per acre is needed.

The herbicides should be worked into the soil at once by disking and cross-disking to 2-3 inches, using 20-30 gallons of water per acre to get good distribution. Donot seed grass or small grains when these herbicides are used, since they will be killed also.

Other important factors to getting a good stand are: Inoculate your seed. Do this the day you make the seeding. Sugar mixed with the water to sprinkle the seed before adding inoculant helps stick it to the seed.

Use a dependable variety, check with your county agent for the ones that work best on your farm.

Plantings made between now and May 1 should not be harvested until full bloom. Most years there will be about the first week of July. Second harvest will usually be ready about mid-to-late August. When a third harvest is made in the established year, it ought to be done after freeze-down.

Recommendations for home lawns care

Take a soil test every 3 or 4 years -- this should be the basis of all lime and fertilizer recommendations. Ground limestone may be applied anytime, but the most favorable times for liming lawns are winter and early spring. Soils should be limed to a pH of 6.5 to 7.0 for turf grasses in Kentucky. Without a soil test, an application of 50 to 75 pounds of ground limestone per 1,000 square feet, every 3 or 4 years, should keep the soil's reaction about right.

Most Bluegrass, Fescue, Bermuda, and Zoysia lawns should receive about 3 or 4 pounds of nitrogen, 1 pound of phosphate (P2O5), and 2 pounds potash (K2O) per 1,000 square feet per year. For Bluegrass and Fescue, apply 1 pound in November and 1 in March or April. All the phosphorus and potassium can be applied in the fall, but it would be better to apply half in the fall and half in the spring.

For Zoysia and Bermuda grass, the nitrogen should be applied during the growing season, which is in hot weather. Apply about 1 pound of actual nitrogen per 1,000 square feet in July and August. Apply the phosphorus and potassium to Zoysia and Bermuda grass lawns in August. Do not use over 1 pound of actual nitrogen

at any one time per 1,000 square feet, unless a slow-release source of nitrogen is used.

Most grades of fertilizer (10-10-10, 10-6-6, etc.) can be used on turf if you are cautious not to use enough to burn or over-stimulate the grass. The preferable lawn fertilizers are those specifically marketed for turf. They are usually high in nitrogen with ratios of 2-1-1, 3-1-2, 4-1-2, etc.; they are usually a mixture of fast-release and slow-release nitrogen. Many contain ureaform, a synthetic nitrogen fertilizer that is medium to slow in its rate of nitrogen release. All do an excellent job when used according to directions.

Over-fertilization of Blue

grass and Fescue lawns should be avoided in the spring to prevent succulent grass being subject to diseases and requiring frequent mowing. Watered lawns will require somewhat higher rates of fertilizer.

Weed Control

Many broadleaf weeds in lawns can be controlled with 2,4-D. Wild onions can be controlled with 2,4-D, but should be treated when young. Use low-volatile formulation of 2,4-D for lawns. Silvex is effective in the control of Chickweed, Henbit, Clover and others. Dicamba (Banvel-D), which controls many broadleaf weeds, is especially effective on Sheep Sorrel. These materials

often come mixed for broad spectrum weed control. Be sure to follow directions given on the container.

Most annual grasses, such as Crabgrass and Barnyard grass, can be controlled by the application of pre-emergence herbicides. Since they kill the germinating weed seed, they should be on the ground when the seeds begin to germinate. These materials should be applied before April 1 in Kentucky. These materials recommended by the University of Kentucky are Balan (benfen), bandena, betasan (bensulide), dacthal (DCPA), tupersan (sulfuron). Only tupersan can be used if reseeding in spring. If any of the other materials are used, delay reseeding until fall.

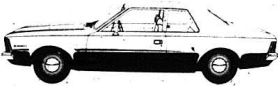

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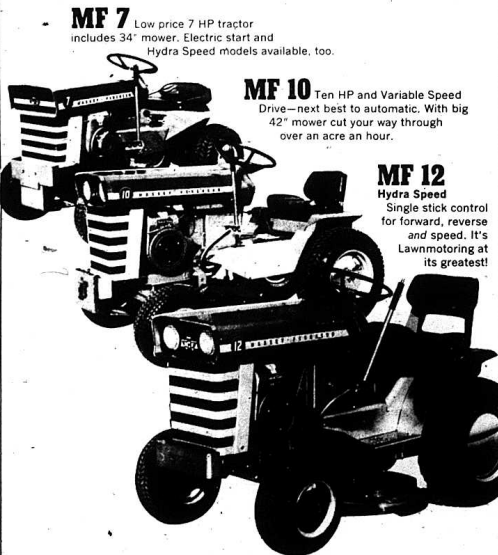
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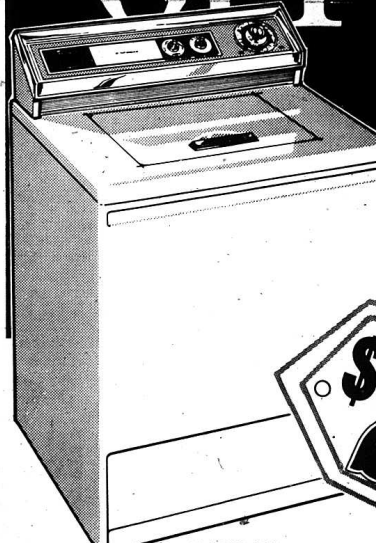
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
