





Anthracnose

Anthrenose causes small an spots on the leaves of tobacco which later turn to a papery white. The spots gadually enlarge while stunting the plants.

The following recommendations for anthrenose control in plant beds have proved effective:

Spay or dust the beds with a fungicide such as Ferbam or Zineb, starting when the plants are about the size of a dire. Spays Anthracnose causes small

The antibiolics, such as streptorycin used for wild-fire control, are of no value for anthranose control.


