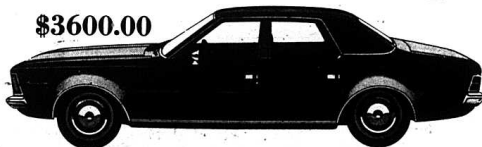

\$158,500 Suit Filed By County Attorney

County Attorney William D. Buckhorn Slated For Big Improvements
Some \$1 million worth of improvements at Buckhorn Lake State Park were announced at an area luncheon at the Eastern Kentucky resort by W. James Host, commissioner of Parks.

The improvements include a 12-room addition to the lodge, a swimming pool, new lodge furnishings, new boat slips, horseback riding facilities, a fishing pier and camping facilities.

The project is to be financed with a \$774,000 grant from the federal Eco-

nomc Development Administration and from supplemented state funds.

KFWC And Its President Recognized By Governor
A silver bowl from Gov. Louie B. Nunn was presented as a special award to the Kentucky Federation of Women's Clubs (KFWC) and its president, Mrs. Oscar Sowards of Pileville, at the federation's 75th anniversary convention in Lexington.

Allocation of \$1.1 million in federal funds to help finance building projects at 12 Kentucky colleges and universities has been recommended by the Kentucky Commission on Higher Education.

Community colleges on the list are Jefferson, \$327,321; Somerset, \$32,366; Hopkinsville, \$48,586; and Hazard, \$144,399. Other institutions: University of Kentucky, \$26,940; Transylvania, \$26,940; and \$80,559 each to Union, Alice Lloyd and Kentucky Wesleyan colleges and to Murray State, Western and Eastern Kentucky Universities.

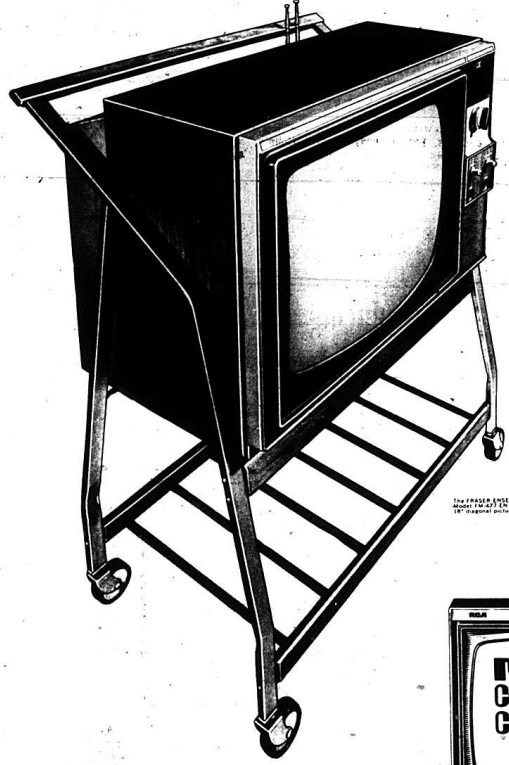

County Agent's Notes

Farmer and Consumer
Food prices rose less than three-fourths as much as all other consumer goods in the past 10 years according to the latest report from U.S. Department of Agriculture economists.

Statistics on the farmer's gain in efficiency during the 1950's show that he produces over 20 percent more on 6 percent fewer acres than he did in 1957-59. Output per man-hour on all farms increased 83 percent between 1957-59 and 1969.

One U.S. farm worker supplied food and fiber for 45 persons in 1969, and in contrast to the 23 consumers he supplied in the 1957-59 period.

Prices for food away from home have increased more than food served at home. By December 1969, prices for restaurant meals were 50 percent higher than in 1957-59. Prices for all food at retail stores were up 26 percent.

When the American consumer spent \$1 on food at the grocery store in 1969, she bought 41 cents worth of products and 59 cents worth of marketing service.

Control Blue Mold

Blue mold is not considered a serious yeast in Kentucky. Occasionally blue mold can occur early in the bed season and become a serious threat. If blue mold appears early in your neighborhood, treat the bed with Ferbam or Zineb either as a spray or dust, twice a week, and after each rain, from the time the disease is first reported in the neighborhood until the plants are set. Use 3 table-spoons of Ferbam or 2 of Zineb to one gallon of water, and apply 4-6 gallon per 9x100 feet of bed. If using dust apply 2-3 pounds of the proper dilution per 9x100 feet of bed. Beds severely injured with the blue mold should be irrigated to hasten recovery. Removing the cover during the day is helpful.

Anthracnose

Anthracnose causes small tan spots on the leaves of tobacco which later turn to papery white. The spots gradually enlarge while stunting the plants.

The following recommendations for anthracnose control in plant beds have been effective:
Spray or dust the beds with a fungicide such as Ferbam or Zineb, starting when the plants are about the size of a dime. Sprays

should be applied at about 100 pounds pressure to insure coverage of both sides of the leaves. Dust should be applied with a hand-powered crank duster for good coverage. Plants should be well covered with either the spray or dust. Spray or dust two or three times a week until setting.

The antibiotics, such as streptomycin used for wild fire control, are of no value for anthracnose control.

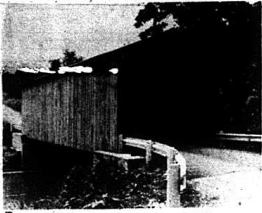

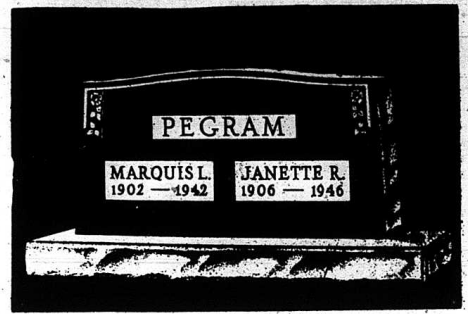

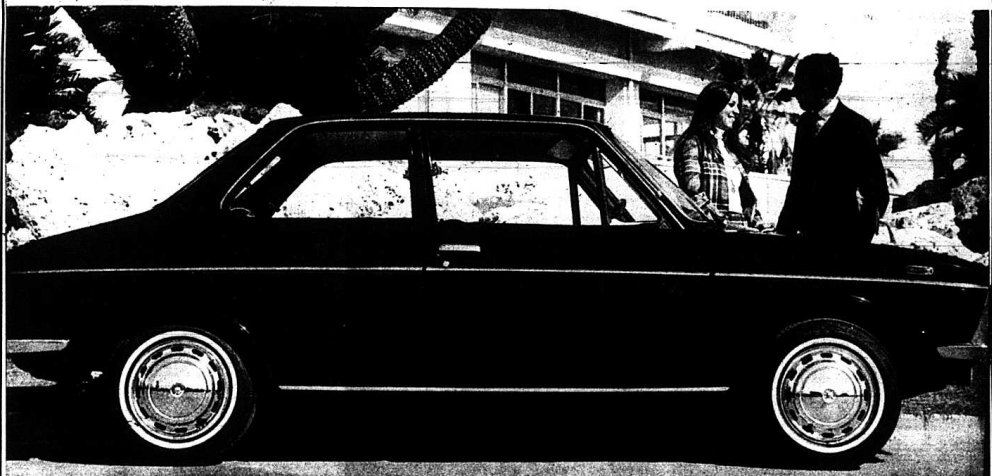

Social Security News

You can get your first social security check sooner by following this simple rule: "Prove your age before you retire." James Mustian, manager of the Somerset Social Security Office said. This will only take a few minutes of your

time but can save you much time and trouble in the future.

If you have a birth or baptismal record (that was made before you were age 5), this is all you will need. Take it to your social security office and tell

them you want an advanced determination of your age. If you do not have such a record, take two of the oldest records you have.

The social security office will assist you in obtaining more proof if needed. The records you furnish will be sent to Baltimore, Maryland, your date of birth will be established for social security purposes, and you will receive a notification of the determination. Keep this notification, then when you retire present it to the social security office.

James Mustian said he could practically guarantee that you'll get your social security check 15 to 20 days sooner, if you will establish your date of birth before you retire. Shouldn't you get in touch with your

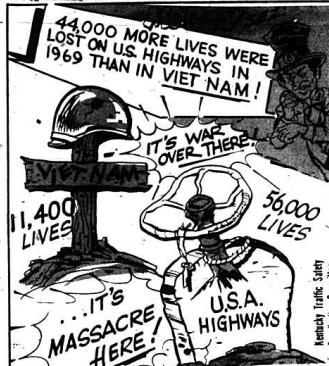
