### FOLK CURES

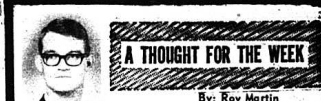

He obtained his B.A. degree in social science from Eastern Kentucky University in 1965 and his M.A. degree in administration also from Eastern in 1969. He plans to complete Rank I in administration this summer. Before going to Brodhead as assistant principal, Mr. Towery taught four years. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. B.W. Towery, Sr., of Conway, and is married to the former Doris Griffin of Mt. Vernon. They have one son, Bige William Towery, III.

Bales reportedly found the child face down in about the middle of the pond. He brought the child to the bank and applied artificial respiration but to no avail. He then left the scene to get help. The child's father arrived at the pond, by a route other than the one taken by Bales, and brought the child to a local physician who also tried to revive him.

### Capital Digest

Statistics released by Gov. Louie B. Nunn show that non-agricultural jobs in Kentucky rose by 29,300 a year during the two years of his administration compared with 26,300 annually during the last ten years.

The statistics also reveal that non-agricultural employment in the state hit a new high in March, as did the average wage of factory workers.

Some 898,500 persons had non-agricultural jobs in March, 23,900 above the corresponding month last year, and the average weekly wage last year increased by \$5.72 for a high of \$126.72, the governor said.

He also reported "Official statistics now have confirmed the fact that the economy surpassed the billion-dollar mark in 1969 for the first time."

The governor said a recent economic analysis by the state Department of Commerce offers "convincing evidence that Kentucky's record during the 1960s was truly spectacular and the outlook for the next 10 years is even brighter."

#### State Plan Averts Hospital Strike

A threatened strike was called off by employees at Central State Hospital after the state presented a plan for promotions and salary increases for "deserving" psychiatric aides beginning next month.

Dr. Dale Farabee, state commissioner of mental health, flew to Louisville from San Francisco to take part in the negotiations. He was attending a meeting of the American Psychiatric Assn. in the California city.

The plan for Central State also applies to other state mental hospitals at Lexington, Danville and Hopkinsville—and to institutions for the mentally retarded at Frankfort and Dawson Springs.

#### Child Labor Law Revision Implemented

Kentucky's Commissioner of Labor John W. Young approved after a public hearing a regulation that would relax Kentucky's child labor law by allowing children under 14 to work in programs approved by their schools.

The regulation implements a revision enacted by the 1970 General Assembly which also affects youths 14 to 18.

Along with the revision, the regulation will take effect June 18, if filed with the Legislative Research Commission by May 18.

What factors are present in 1970 that enable students to know what they want that were missing for their peers one twenty or thirty years ago?

Why does co-education have to mean that boys and girls must live together as they were married? Perhaps this attitude is partially responsible for the deterioration of the family as the primary social unit. When are parents going to cease saying "I don't like it" and instead say, "You are not going to do it?"

After reading and considering the page-one article "Where the Boys Are" (Mar. 31) I feel compelled to respond because of the article's relevance to recent changes at Berea College in Berea, Kentucky, where I am currently enrolled as a student.

Pickard, who received the award at a recognition dinner in Frankfort, is an executive both of the state's air pollution control and water pollution control commissions.

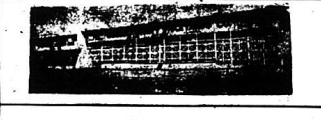
#### KSC Coworkers Honored For 145 Years

## County Agent's Notes

4-H Fashion Revue

The Rockcastle County 4-H Fashion Revue will be held at Roundstone School Saturday, May 23, 1970 at 1:30 p.m. Clothing entries in all divisions will be judged at the County Extension Office on May 21 to be modeled by the 4-H members on Saturday. Knitting entries will be judged at the same time. Ribbons for both clothing and knitting entries will be presented on Saturday.

#### Watch for Insects and Pests

Watch your holly and boxwood plants for signs of leaf miners. If they were infested last year, it might be wise to treat them again. The newer insecticides such as dimethoate do a good job in controlling these insect pests.

Bagworm larvae will start to appear sometime during the month. Timely applications of malathion or sevin will control these pests.

Dogwood, rhododendron and mimosa need protection from the attacks of borers. Paint the trunk at 10-day intervals during May and early June with methoxychlor.

#### Control zoonyms scale by spraying with dimethoate in mid-May and repeating application in late July.

White fly on azaleas is sometimes a problem in early June. Check to see if the problem exists. If so, spray with malathion, being sure to hit the undersides of leaves.

Stop slugs now before they become a problem. Special slug baits containing metaldehyde, an attractant, are available on the market. Researchers have found that beer (that's right, the alcoholic beverage) placed in pie tins at ground level will attract slugs and drown them.

#### Prune After Flowering

Forsythia, spirea, and dogwood should be pruned after flowering. Remove about one-fifth of the oldest stems at ground level. On lilac, prune off the flower cluster, but be careful not to remove any buds just below the cluster. This is the site of next years flowers.

Rhododendrons and azaleas can also be pruned after flowering. Pick up a copy of the new Home and Garden bulletin, No. 165, from the County Extension Office to help you with your pruning problems.

In order to enhance the beauty of perennial alums, creeping phlox, arabis, and iberis, prune them back immediately after flowering. Whigs complete its flowering, remove the old flower heads. Pinch chrysanthemums when they reach 6 inches in height. Pinch back by releasing out the terminal bud. Continue pinching until July 15.

# May-Mental Health Month

"Cast from shackles which bound them, this bell shall ring out hope for the mentally ill; the victory over mental illness." The above statement is inscribed on a real bell, the official symbol of the National Association for Mental Health. Of interest is the fact that the metal in this bell came from the chains, handcuffs, and other metal restraints formerly used to bind mental patients.

New Era

Good mental health means many things—appropriate feelings toward our fellow man, reacting appropriately to our surroundings and having inner peace. Also, good mental health has physical manifestations. For example, tension affects rate of heart beat, digestion, and the thinking processes. To assist those in need of mental health services, and to encourage activities to insure continued good health, the Southeastern Kentucky Mental Health Center has been initiated. This being National Mental Health Month, the staff at the Center is interested in relating to the community what is happening in mental health especially in Southeastern Kentucky.

The Center is a non-profit corporation composed of persons in Whitley, Knox, Clay, Laurel, Jackson, and Rockcastle counties to plan, coordinate, and implement mental health and mental retardation services in and for residents of these six counties. Of special note is the fact that the program, while financed largely by state and federal funds, is governed by local persons and requires considerable local support to be successful. This represents an effort to bring mental health and mental retardation treatment facilities to local areas on a scale that will significantly reduce the future need for hospitalization at distances far from home.

### Services

The services include out-patient as well as in-patient treatment programs for emotionally disturbed and retarded persons. Partial hospitalization is available. A twenty-four hour emergency service is provided. Speech and hearing training, recreational therapy, counseling for the alcoholic, and marriage counseling are offered. That is, social workers, counselors, psychologists, educators, and psychiatrists jointly plan and implement treatment programs. Consultation and coordination with other care-givers is strongly emphasized. Members of the Mental Health Center staff are not only available but actively encourage requests of individuals or groups to answer questions about and explain the entire program and the role of every citizen in its success. To be successful, the continued backing and moral support of the entire community is vitally important.

**Day Care.** A strong emphasis of the Center is treatment for the mentally retarded persons in including day-care training for children. To date, four classes for the trainable mentally retarded children have been initiated—two in Barbourville, one in Williamsburg, and one in London. The classes are designed to provide a basic curriculum for these pre-school and school age children allowing them to become independent adults.

**Mentally Retarded Adults.** Staff members have plans to establish classes for the mentally retarded adults in five locations—Manchester, Corbin, London, Williamsburg, and Barbourville. The objectives for these classes include teaching social skills, and equipping these persons with the wherewithal to meet the demands for survival. Furthermore, a sheltered workshop to provide job training is proposed.

**Family Services.** Six full time staff members work with the families of the mentally retarded. Assisting them are college students from Union and Cumberland Colleges.

### DISPERSION OF SERVICES

The central coordinating (ISR) facility is in Corbin, but the decentralization of the treatment activities has been accomplished in two primary ways: (1) area teams, and (2) mobile clinic teams.

**Area Teams.** Three area teams of mental health and mental retardation professionals serve two counties in the six county area and are housed in the county served. These teams, headed by master social workers, are close-at-home resources for patients in need.

**Mobile Clinic Team.** In addition, a mobile clinic team composed of the psychiatrist, a psychologist, and an alcoholism counselor visit each county, seeing patients, and designing treatment plans.

### Referral Sources

Sources of referral are local physicians, clergymen, health agencies, schools, interested individuals, and persons having a role in the care and treatment of the retarded persons or persons with emotional problems. Emphasis is placed on close coordination of the Mental Health Center's efforts with other persons involved in providing care and treatment.

### Current Status

During several years of advanced planning and preparation reference has been made to what the Mental Health Center will do, but now reference can be made to what the Mental Health Center is doing. The staff has been assembled and all key positions have been filled. The process of gearing up by obtaining physical facilities has been completed. At this time the Center has seventy (70) full time staff members, and they are actively providing services. During the period October, 1969 - March, 1970, staff members saw 6 per cent of the total population being served. Furthermore, the area team, the mobile clinic, and the ISR have reduced the region's number of patients at Kentucky State Hospital by 50 percent.

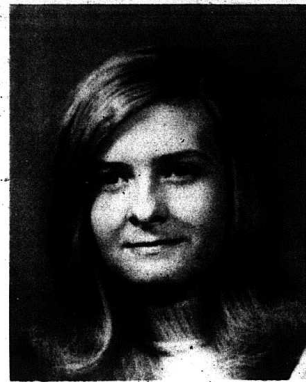

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# Carter Pledges Support To Food Stamps Program

County Judge Charles C. Carter, Mt. Vernon, of the Rockcastle County Court said today that his agency is in full accord with the purposes of the Food Stamp Program, and pledged agency support of both the program and compliance with food stamp regulations.

The Food Stamp Program is administered by the U.S. Department of Agriculture to help low-income families purchase a nutritionally adequate diet. The local representative is George W. Claunch, Officer-in-Charge of the Food and Nutrition Service Field Office at Room 200, Security Building, Somerset, Kentucky.

Qualified recipients exchange for food coupons the amount of money which they can reasonably spend for food. They receive food coupons which are worth more than they pay for them. Authorized food dealers accept the coupons in payment for eligible foods and exchange them for value at banks or wholesale food concerns which participate in the program.

It is against food stamp regulations for stores to accept food coupons for non-food items or for certain imported foods. Any diversion of food coupons to the purchase of ineligible items decreases the purchasing power with which the recipient is expected to buy more and better food to improve his diet. Merchants who violate the regulations may be disqualified from participation in the program. They may also face serious penalties imposed by the courts.

Judge Carter urged all participating food dealers in the area to comply fully with all regulations governing the program so that

recipients and food stores alike may receive its maximum benefits.
