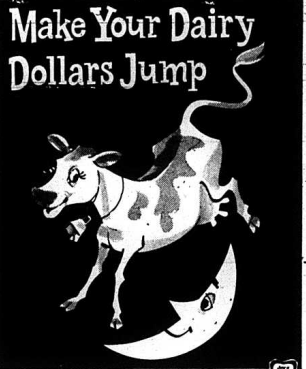

SCHOOL BOARD MEETING WILL BE JUNE 11

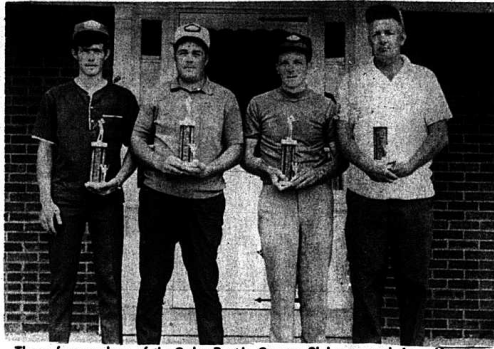

Factory "Possibility" For County Now Almost A "Reality"

A telegram from Congressman Tim Lee Carter was received late Wednesday afternoon announcing the approval of a loan to the Rockcastle Improvement Council, Inc. (formerly the Rockcastle Development Corp.) for the construction of a factory to house a factory and for the purchase of a building site.

The telegram read: "Congressman Tim Lee Carter today announced approval by the Small Business Administration of a local development company loan in the amount of \$250,000 to the Rockcastle Improvement Council, Inc., in Mt. Vernon, who's president is Roy G. Brown. The council will assist the Columbus Electric Manufacturing Company, manufacturers of electrical components, through the purchase of land, machinery, and equipment for the construction of a new building for a new branch operation of an existing company. This will create 150 jobs.

Financing consist of \$225,000 from the Bank of Mt. Vernon, 90% of which will be guaranteed by the SBA. The Rockcastle Improvement Council will contribute \$25,000." According to former mayor Clyde Linville, the building site will probably be 15 acres on the old Brodhead Road across from the vocational school. Mr. Linville also said that the company is still definitely interested in moving a branch operation here and if everything goes well bids for the building could let within the next few months.

Representatives of the manufacturing company have said that they will only move in one or two workers and the rest would be hired locally.

Larry Van Hoose, the governor's press secretary, noted June 30 marks the end of one year fiscal span and July 1 the beginning of another. Among topics listed for discussion were: Problem areas, goals and objectives, and present and future programs and projects of each department.

Overall goals of the Nunn administration and policy decisions which are not being cleared through his office. Coordination of federal grants and other federal-state matters through the Kentucky Program Development Office.

Budgetary considerations, the personnel situation in each department and the amount of time each commissioner devotes to his job.

NOW IS THE TIME TO

REGISTER FOR NOVEMBER. Now is the time for unregistered but otherwise qualified Kentuckians to register to vote in the Nov. 3 general election.

Registration books were to be reopened June 1 after being closed March 29 through May 31 due to the May 26 primary elections. They will be closed again Sept. 6 until after the November election.

Kentuckians in November will elect seven members of the U.S. House of Representatives and a judge of the Court of Appeals from the Third District.

They also will vote on a proposed bond issue of \$48.3 million to finance construction projects for mental health, corrections, child welfare and schools for the deaf and the blind.

RECREATION DEVELOPMENT CALLED "INDUSTRIAL."

Private business should get more deeply involved

In making Kentucky the recreational heartland of midwest America," Gov. Louie B. Nunn declared in dedicating the new \$6 million Barkley Lodge at Lake Barkley State Park near Cadiz.

He described the 120-room lodge as "the crown jewel for Kentucky's State Park system" but said state government cannot continue "to underwrite such an elaborate travel and recreation effort at the expense of other needed facilities."

The governor said thousands of acres are available and "developing these lands with resorts and campgrounds is just as much 'industry' as bringing in new factories."

BUSINESS, GOVERNMENT COOPERATION GETS RESULTS

Modernizing the paper and plastic cup plant of the Lilly-Tulp Cup Co. near Bardoson, Gov. Louie B. Nunn praised cooperation between business and government, saying:

"Working and winning an installation... is a feat for which many individuals and units of government at all levels must share credit."

"It is this type of cooperation that has enabled us to attract a multitude of blue-chip companies to the Commonwealth—86 last year alone."

GOV. NUNN CHALLENGES KMI GRADUATES. "With your degrees intact, your appreciation of this land unspoiled, and your dedication to service undiminished..." That's the way Gov. Louie B. Nunn, in a commencement address, challenged 48 graduates of the Kentucky Institute, Lyndon, to graduate from college four years from now.

MCELWAIN TO SUCCEED TEAGUE AT HEALTH POST. Dr. William P. McElwain, Lexington, now serving as acting commissioner of the State Department of Health, has been named by the State Board of Health as commissioner to succeed Dr. Russell L. Teague after Dr. Teague retires in August.

McElwain, 37, is a former associate director of the Lexington-Fayette County Health Department. He has been director of local health services in the state health department since September. He is a native of Warren County.

STATE POLICE CAMPS FOR BOYS BEGIN JUNE 14. Kentucky State Police will initiate the 1970 series of week long camping trips for needy boys at Trooper Island, Dale Hollow Reservoir, June 14.

The first contingent will consist of some 40 boys, ages 11 to 14, from Kentucky's 14 westernmost counties. The counties: Fulton, Hickman, Carlisle, Ballard, Christian, McCracken, Graves, Livingston, Marshall, Muhlenberg, Lyon, Trigg, Hopkins and Todd.

PERKINS ADDRESSES SOCIAL WELFARE SEMINAR. Child Welfare Commissioner George Perkins suggested in an address at Lexington that social scientists study communities of people rather than individuals to learn how to develop a society in which fewer persons are forced deviants.

Perkins was addressing the Social Welfare Research Needs Seminar sponsored by the Social Welfare Research Institute and the Center for Developmental Change at the University of Kentucky.

Mr. McElwain went on to say, "I am more than happy to lend my support to this campaign and urge my fellow ministers to do the same."

Both Mr. McElwain and Dr. Chambers said that safe driving was a moral obligation, and that it not only involved the life of the individual driver, but the lives of other drivers and passengers on the highways as well.

Gov. Louie B. Nunn pledged continued confidence in the vast majority of Kentucky's young people and assured them their pursuit of "intellectual excellence" in the state's colleges and universities will be protected with "unyielding firmness."

Addressing the annual commencement exercises at Frankfort High School here, the governor insisted that young people who are "concerned for the preservation of our basic institutions have rights, too." They have the right to study, to attend class, to take examinations and to be honored at commencement without fear of arson, intimidation or interruption.

The governor's 18-year-old son, Stephen, a graduating senior, was among the audience in the packed high school gymnasium.

The address by the chief executive was broadcast on several television stations and on a special statewide radio network.

Within the past two years, the governor pointed out, Kentucky has addressed itself to the

problem of campus unrest and has "set an example for the nation by effectively meeting the threat of violence while developing innovative outlets for student dissent."

He cited specifically establishment of the Governor's Student Advisory Commission 18 months ago, major positions of responsibility that young leaders hold in the present state administration and the state's unique Legislative Intern Program.

Kentucky was the first state in the nation, he said, to "welcome student leaders" to membership on the boards of all public colleges and universities.

In expanding on that theme, the governor announced that he will appoint "qualified students" to serve on both the State Air Pollution Control Commission and the State Water Pollution Control Commission. Presumably, they will fill one or more of the seats added to each commission by the 1970 legislature.

These appointments, the governor said, should "again disprove the claim that our system of government is closed."

Speaking as much to his radio and television audience as to those in the auditorium, he told the young people that "the people of Kentucky have paid unselfishly for the costly privilege of applying tonight. Over the years, they have shared more and more of their substance with you."

Today, he said, 78 cents of every General Fund tax dollar is allocated to education in Kentucky.

In the next 48 hours another "habe laena", similar to the one in the 1950s, will be in full swing, according to the National Industrial Conference Board.

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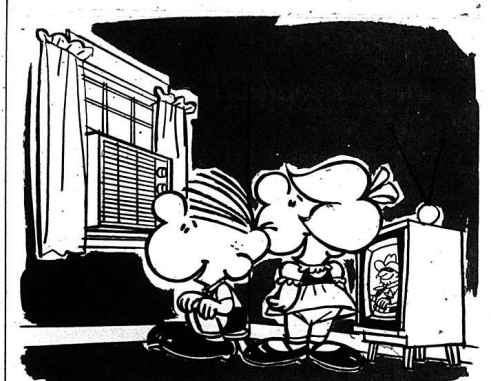
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Library Notes

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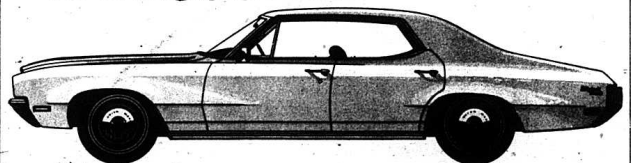

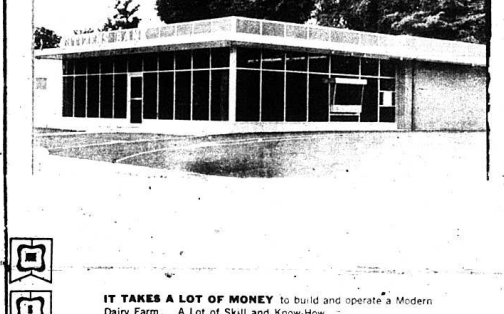
