we've all practically ignored for so long? Well, heads up people, things are changing.

At a recent meeting of the Mt. Vernon City Council, the Council members voted to adopt Ordinance No. 303 which says, in effect, that the fine for an overtime parking violation shall be \$1.00 if paid within 24 hours of the time such ticket is given and that if not paid within the first 24 hours but within three days of said notice the fine will be \$3.00 and if paid within 10 days of notice, the fine will be \$5.00.

The ordinance is published in its entirety elsewhere in this week's Signal.

So, read it weep people because the word is that the new ordinance will be strictly enforced. Ordinance No. 302, also passed recently by the City Council, deals with prohibiting certain types of boats on any reservoirs of the City of Mt. Vernon (primarily Lake Linville).

The Ordinance makes it unlawful for "any person to place, or to own or maintain a houseboat on any reservoir of the City of Mount Vernon."

A "houseboat" is defined by the City Council as "any boat having more than two seats which permanently enclose a portion of the deck space of said boat."

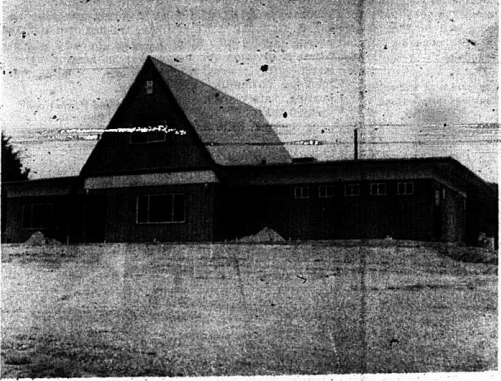
The fine for this offense, according to the ordinance, will be not less than \$25 nor more than \$100 for each offense. Each day a boat of the type mentioned above remains on any of said reservoirs constitutes a separate offense, the ordinance states.

Fiscal Court Meets

At Tuesday's called meeting of the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court, the agenda was light. However, the Magistrates did transact the following business:

Accepted Mrs. Mattie Hasty's road as a new county road; voted to advertise for bids for two new dump trucks and a new grader, and to raise the grader operator's salary to \$2.25 an hour.

During the meeting, the Magistrates also made two motions to clarify motions originally made at the June 30th meeting. The Magistrates first motion concerned setting County Judge Carter's salary at \$9600 per year. A motion was made by C.W. Phillips and seconded by Hewitt Jones with all voting yes, that the following resolution be accepted:

WHEREAS, on the 2nd of May, 1969, the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court purported to fix the salary of the County Judge for the term commencing in January, 1970 at the sum of \$3900, and WHEREAS, the Rockcastle Circuit Court has found said order to be void, and WHEREAS, the sum of \$3900 was the salary paid to the County Judge of Rockcastle County during the term prior to that commencing in January, 1970, and WHEREAS, the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court finds that a salary of

\$3900 is unreasonable low, and WHEREAS, the issue of the salary for the current term of the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court is still open.

Now, therefore be it resolved by the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court that the salary for the County Judge for the current term to be fixed at the sum of \$9600 and further be it resolved that the County Judge be entitled to fees in accordance with said salary but that said salary and fees shall not exceed the sum of \$12,500 and be it further resolved that the expense account paid the County Judge by the Commonwealth of Kentucky shall not be considered in determining the amount of salary and fees to which the County Judge may be entitled.

On a motion made by Sherman Sargent and seconded by C.W. Phillips, the magistrates voted that the minutes of the previous meeting, June 30, 1970, concerning the magistrates expense account, be clarified to read as follows:

That Under House Bill 125, passed by the 1970 Legislature, each magistrate be paid the sum of \$100 per month as an expense account in order to assist them with the expenses of his office, said expense account to become effective July 1, 1970.

ramblings.... Jurors Called For July Circuit Court

It seems that in last week's Signal, in our story on the raised voted County Judge Charles Carter by the County Magistrates, that we erred. After having it brought to our attention, several times, we think we now have the information sufficiently straightened out to report a clear picture of the action.

First of all, according to Circuit Judge Lawrence Hall, his opinion on Judge Carter's suit, which he handed down recently, mainly stated that the order of the County Court, in fixing the County Judge's salary last May was void since the minutes of that meeting were not signed by the County Judge, in accordance with KRS 67.100, until a few weeks after the meeting.

Judge Hall took exception with our statement that "he found in Judge Carter's favor" and reminded us that no where in his opinion did he state that the Magistrates should vote to pay Judge Carter the maximum allowable salary of \$9,600 (maximum allowable at that time) a year; but did state that "From the record in this case, and as the court (Circuit Court) understands the law applicable thereto, the court (again meaning Circuit Court) does not have the authority to re-quire or order the Fiscal Court of Rockcastle County, Ky., to fix the salary of the County Judge at the maximum amount set forth in KRS 64-535."

According to Judge Hall, the Magistrates could have set Judge Carter's salary at any "reasonable" figure as long as the order was made in accordance with KRS 67-100.

We hope this clears up any misunderstanding which might have occurred from last week's story and deeply regret the error.

County Judge Carter also took us to task on two items in the story of the June 30th Fiscal Court proceedings.

According to Judge Carter, the expense money of \$200 a month paid him by the state, which we mentioned in the story, comes out of the state's share of fines and forfeitures and the amount paid to each County Judge in the state each month, is determined by the amount of money taken in by the state from this source.

We now find, however, that this expense money is not to be counted as part of the \$12,600 maximum amount Judge Carter may receive yearly but will be paid to him in addition to his \$9600 salary and fines and forfeitures, up to \$3,000, for a total allowable of \$12,600.

One other little item, which the Judge asked us to clear up concerned the poll tax which the county voted on during the June 30th meeting.

The tax was voted on every male citizen between the ages of 18 and 65 and is to be used for "school purposes." Since we didn't specify to what use the tax would be put in the story, Judge Carter felt there might be some confusion on the part of the taxpayers.

Oh, well, maybe I will be able to clear up some of the confusion on the part of the taxpayers.

Offices, counties and school districts are taking steps to save millions of dollars in supply purchasing, through state discount price contracts, under an enabling act passed by the last General Assembly.

The law, effective June 18, allows any political subdivision to contract with the state Finance Department and receive the benefits of quantity buying. Full information has been sent by N.B. McCubbin, state purchasing director, to all governmental units in Kentucky.

Awaiting federal ap-

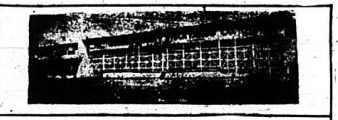

ORDINANCE NO. 303 AMENDING ORDINANCE NO. 203, AND PROVIDING FINE FOR OVER-TIME PARKING VIOLATIONS:
 THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MOUNT VERNON, KENTUCKY, DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:
 Section 1. Section 13 (b), Paragraph Two (b) Ordinance No. 203 is hereby amended so as to provide as follows:
 The Police Officer shall place upon each vehicle parked in violation of Ordinance No. 203 (Parking Meter Ordinance), a notice to the owner or operator thereof that such vehicle has been or is parked in violation of the provision of Ordinance No. 203, instructing such owner or operator to report to the Police Judge of the City of Mount Vernon in regard to such violation. Each owner or operator may pay the sum of \$1.00 to the Police Judge within 24 hours of the time such notice was placed on said vehicle as full penalty for said violation. In the event said sum is not paid within 24 hours, the owner or operator shall pay the sum of \$3.00 to the Police Judge if said sum is paid within five days of said violation. If the owner or operator shall not pay said sum in satisfaction of said violation within ten days thereof, the penalty for said violation shall be the sum of \$5.00.

Section 2. Any provisions of any prior ordinance in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance is hereby repealed.
Section 3. This ordinance shall be effective upon its publication.

ORDINANCE NO. 302
 AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF MT. VERNON, KENTUCKY, PROHIBITING CERTAIN TYPES OF BOATS ON CITY.

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person to place or to own or maintain a houseboat on any reservoirs of the City of Mount Vernon.
Section 2. A "houseboat" is defined as any boat having more than two sides which permanently enclose a portion of the deck space of said boat.

Section 3. Any person violating Section 1 of this ordinance shall be fined not less than Twenty-Five Dollars nor more than One Hundred Dollars for each offense. Each day said boat remains on any of said reservoirs con-

stitutes a separate offense.
Section 4. This ordinance becomes effective on the date of its publication.
