

### Library Notes

New books received at the Rockcastle County Library. Among them are:

**AMERICAN FOLK PAINTING**, by Mary Black and Jean Lipman. A comprehensive book about the charming and interesting art of the self-taught American painters who worked in the small towns and countryside.

**ANOTHER PART OF THE HOUSE**, by Winston Es-Yes. A penetrating novel of family life in the Texas Panhandle in the 1930's.

**LIVING IN SPACE**, by Mitchell Sharpe. A comprehensive book on the psychophysiological problems involved in sending men into space and of the solutions that have been successfully used.

**MY DEAR COUSIN**, by Peggy Hoffman. A historical novel which is the dramatic and tragic love story of Lydia Hollingsworth, a Baltimore belle in the early Nineteenth century and John Foster, a British ambassador to the U.S.

**ANTICHRIST**, by Cecelia Holland. With a plot based on historical fact, Miss Holland has created a novel of the Holy Roman Emperor Frederick II of Sicily, who was known in his time (1194-1250) as the "wonder of the world."

**THE CALLAHAN'S GAMBLE**, by Francis Ames. A family novel filled with adventure, humor, and authentic details of this last era of pioneering Americans.

**THE PLANT HUNTERS**, by Tyler Whittle. Here is a vivid account of botanists, their travels and the interesting and valuable specimens they brought back to their gardens and laboratories.

**A CHILD'S MIND**, by Muriel Beadle. Constantly focusing on the inter-relationships between heredity and environment, the author describes the steps by which children develop emotionally and mentally.

**COUNTRY EDITOR'S BOY**, by Hal Borland. Here Mr. Borland recalls the years from 1915 to 1918, the years following his family's move to Flagler, Colorado, when his father became the owner and editor of a weekly newspaper. A delightful reminiscence.

**STOCK MARKET PRIMER**, by Claude Rosenberg. An excellent, easy-to-read introduction to the art of investing in stocks.

**THE DARK WORLD OF WITCHES**, by Eric Maple. This is the story of witchcraft from the beginnings of magic until the repeal of the last of the Witchcraft Acts in England in 1951.

**THE BROGEE AND THE LIZARD**, by Patricia Lynch. Brogee, the leprechaun, befriends two lonely children, meets a fortune teller, and joins a circus as she searches for the monster which threatens the homes of the little people. Grades 4-6.

**THE FLAG BOOK OF THE UNITED STATES** by Whitney Smith. This book combines the history of the American flag and the flags of all 50 states. It also covers state seals, important U.S. government and armed forces flags and flag etiquette.

**THE DAY FORT LARKING FELL**, by Will Henry. Preacher Nihemiah Bleek refused to allow his small Indian charges to be sent East to boarding school and his refusal prompts one of the most hilarious adventures in the "Old West." Grades 8-12.

**FROM LAUREL HILL TO SILVER'S BOY**, by John Terres. While working in a wildlife sanctuary, the author observed the small animals and birds with great patience and he writes about their habits with enthusiasm.

**THE INNOCENT**, by Leon Garfield. The innocence of Charlie Samson affects all those about him as he takes part in the wars in France. However, he finds that he cannot remain apart from the trouble and darkness in the lives of his comrades. Grades 7-9.

**GARBAGE AS YOU LIKE IT**, by Jerome Goldstein. How does your town dispose of its garbage? This book hopes to make you care about what happens to garbage after it leaves your home, and before we're all buried in it.

**THE FAIRY TALES OF WILHELM MUFF**, by Wilhelm Hauff. An enchanting collection of stories which will enthral adults as well as children. Grades 5-9.

**THE HALL OF FAME OF WESTERN FILM STARS**, by Ernest Corneau. A nostalgic history of all the important cowboy stars in motion pictures--with illustrations and biographies.

**THE INTRUDER**, by John Rowe Townsend. Arnold's search for his true identity and his attempt to get rid of a menacing stranger provide abundant material for this novel of mounting suspense. Grades 6-9.

**HOW TO PLAY BETTER BRIDGE**, by Terence Reese and Albert Dormer. In this concise, easy-to-follow book, the authors have refined point count bidding and simplified play strategy to where the average player can understand and use techniques of the master players.

**LET'S LOOK AT MORE TRACKS**, by Ann Kirt. A follow-up volume to Ler's Look at Tracks, this small book gives more information on tracks in nature and the animals that make them. Grades 2-3.

**JULIE ANDREWES**, by Robert Winders. The biography of a famous movie and stage star.

**THE ROCK OF GIBRALTAR** has a fascinating history and has played a significant part in several historic events as is pointed out in this informative volume. Grades 6-8.

**THE LIFE AND TIMES OF MUHAMMAD**, by Sir John Glubb. Sir John Glubb has written the life of one of the most influential figures of the world. This biography is without rancor or bias.

**THE LITTER KNIGHT**, by Syd Hoff. A comical presentation of the ever-growing litter problem which will prove extremely useful in teaching youngsters about keeping their surroundings litter free. Grades K-2.

**THE OTHER SIDE OF THE CLOCK**, collected by Philip Vandoren Stern. Twelve exciting and highly imaginative stories by famous science fiction writers. All ages.

**PEGGY'S NEW BOY**, by Eleanor Schick. Everything she does seems to go wrong as Peggy attempts to help her mother with the new baby, however, she finally discovers one thing that she can do for him that no one else can do. Grades K/3.

**WHERE DO BEARS SLEEP?** by Barbara S. Flaten. The sleeping habits and habitats of animals are the subjects for this marvelous little book for children. Grades K/2.

**Tornado victims** in Lubbock, Texas, have had some of their problems eased with the donation of 55 VA-owned homes for their use during readjustment.

**Social Security**

On July 6 in the U.S. District Court for the southern district of Florida, a Miami doctor entered a plea of guilty to three counts of violation of the fraud provisions of the Social Security Act, according to James Mustian, Social Security manager in Somerset.

Mustian said that sentencing of Apostolos G. Chakmakis, M.D., was deferred until completion of an investigation by a probation officer. The maximum sentence which could be imposed for these offenses would be three years imprisonment and a \$3,000 fine. Mustian indicated that this section of the law states in effect that it is a misdemeanor to make false statements to receive medicare payments.

Dr. Chakmakis had previously been indicted by a Federal Grand Jury for allegedly making false statements to receive payments for treatment of medicare patients.

When sentenced, Dr. Chakmakis will be the fifth physician in the country to be convicted for violating the medicare law, said Mustian.

New rehabilitation treatment technique to promote self-confidence in long term mental patients will be used throughout VA's hospital system. Based on simulated social systems, the program has been proven successful in five years of tests.

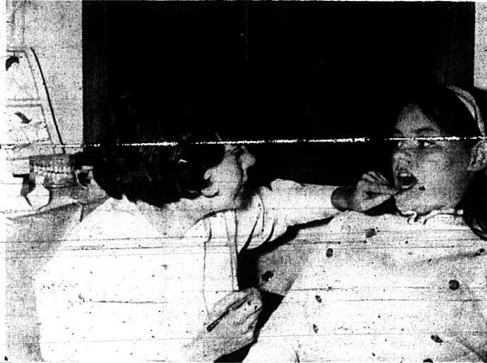

## City Council Purchases 1968 Police Cruiser

The City Council of Mt. Vernon voted recently at a meeting to buy a 1968 Ford, two-door custom sedan, for a city police cruiser. The car, a former state police car, was purchased from the Division of State Police for \$800.00.

At the regular monthly meeting of the Council held on July 13, the Council also voted to buy new uniforms for the city police.

They also decided to purchase a pontoon from Curfew Holt for \$400 which will be kept on Lake Linville and used to store materials needed for the water plant and boat dock. The pontoon originally belonged to Roger Kitchens and is the same boat which created such a furor over whether or not to allow houseboats of any kind on the lake. The Council eventually passed an ordinance prohibiting houseboats on the lake. Councilmen Henderson and Rush voted against the motion to purchase the pontoon.

### ALBERT F. ST. CLAIR DIES AT RESIDENCE

Mr. Albert F. St. Clair, 88, of Mt. Vernon, passed away Wednesday, July 15, at his home. He was born in Leland, Mississippi on March 19, 1882, the son of the late Albert and Charlotte Pel-tus St. Clair.

He was a retired plumber and heating contractor, a member of Barker Lodge #129 at West Point, Ky., and a member of the Mt. Vernon Christian Church.

Survivors are his wife, Mrs. Ina McCoy St. Clair of Mt. Vernon; two daughters, Mrs. Charlotte McDonald of Louisville, and Miss Ina St. Clair of Mt. Vernon; two sons, Albert St. Clair of Louisville and Jack St. Clair of Mt. Vernon; 4 grandchildren and 8 great grandchildren.

Funeral services were held Thursday, July 16 at the Cox Funeral Home Chapel with Bro. Bradford Coffey and Dr. L.R. McDonald officiating. Burial was in the Elm-wood Cemetery.

The Council also passed a motion to borrow \$5,000 from the Bank of Mt. Vernon. This money will be used on the boat dock and campsite and the motion also authorized the borrowing of another \$5,000 if needed. To date, the City has spent \$6,221.00 on the boat dock and camping area and \$1405.00 on widening the road around the area.

Ted Jackson of Mt. Vernon, who was appointed Building Inspector for the city several months ago, resigned that office at the July 13th meeting. Mr. Jackson told the Council that if he fulfilled the requirements of this office, it would tend to hurt his business. In order for the city to have a Workable Program, the Atlanta office of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) requires that there be 31 houses to see whether or not they meet housing standards. The Council did not name another Building Inspector at the meeting.

### MORE ROAD WORK ANNOUNCED BY STATE

Highway Commissioner Eugene Goss today announced the addition of three road projects to Rockcastle County's 1970 71 Rural Secondary Program.

Bituminous resurfacing is planned for 0.4 mile of Little Renfro Creek Road.

Bituminous surfacing is planned for 1.6 miles of Wilde-Clear Creek Road.

Grade, drain and rock surfacing improvements will be made to a 1.4 mile section of Level Green-Willalla Road. Rural Secondary projects are financed by two cents of the seven-cent-per-gallon motor fuel tax.

## Funds Approved For City's Housing Project

Approval of the necessary additional funds needed for construction of 30 low-rent housing units in Mt. Vernon has been received from the federal government, according to Jess Bullock, Executive Director of the Mt. Vernon Municipal Housing Commission.

The approval for the extra funds brings the total of the project to \$590,154. Actual construction of the units will cost the housing commission \$448,000 which was the low bid submitted by J.T. Goggons Co., Inc., of Danville.

Ten of the units, for the elderly, will be constructed on Lovell Avenue in Mt. Vernon, off of Richmond Street. The other twenty units will be built on Carter Drive off of Town Hill.

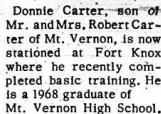

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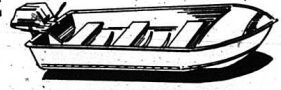

 Many of the changes in the Tax Reform Act of 1969 apply to farmers, and how they run their farms this year will determine how much income tax they will pay at the end of 1970, according to Steve Q. Allen, University of Kentucky Farm Management Specialist. New exemptions and allowances, Allen pointed out, give farmers greater opportunity to pay reasonable wages to their children. The law requires a true employer-employee relationship, and definite jobs should be assigned with regular wages paid to them the same as any other employee, he added. Another advantage to this arrangement, Allen pointed out, is wages paid by a parent to his children are not subject to social security tax until the children reach 21. The holding period for cattle and horses eligible for capital gains has been extended from one to two years. However, the one-year holding period still applies to breeding sheep and hogs, Allen said. The law allows farm-

ers to deduct certain expenses for land clearing and soil and water conservation in the year the expenditures were made, Allen stated. Such items claimed in 1970 and later years may have to be recaptured as ordinary income if the farm is sold at a profit within 10 years, he explained. Allen advised farmers to: 1. keep good records, including depreciation schedules and inventories; 2. consider hiring your children on a true employer-employee relationship; 3. give income-producing property to your children so they can report income for tax purposes; and 4. estimate your taxable income well before the end of the year so there is still time to make adjustments. "Remember, tax management is a year-round job," Allen concluded. **"OTTAWA"** (Cont. from 8)
