Nothing makes for a hotter fight in Kentucky than agreement—between those who favor mandatory jail sentences for those who aid minors in obtaining alcoholic beverages as well as sellers.

So the successor to the agency closing and Daylight Time battles of recent Legislatures may be brewing in the realm of liquor laws.

A legislative subcommittee is embarking on a study at the behest of Democratic Rep. James Murphy of Newport, who said:

"I believe it is time for the laws and court decisions relating to the alcoholic beverage industry to be reviewed and modernized to accord to this industry rights under law equal to rights enjoyed by other businesses."

Murphy picked the subcommittee, leaning heavily toward his fellow Northern Kentuckians.

They would agree with Murphy's view that the industry shouldn't be placed under special legal burdens "for moral or any other reasons."

And the chairman of the State Alcoholic Beverage Control Board, Shirley Palmer-Ball, agrees a study is needed.

He wants an updating and reworking of both laws and regulations. He's ready to co-operate with the subcommittee—but his views are toward "stronger laws for all violations."

Palmer-Ball would extend this into the area of drunken drivers and a general tightening against violations involving minors.

**You And The Draft**

Occasionally our mail includes letters from disgruntled young men who claim they have been erroneously classified because of the presence of a local board member, and the influence that person had on the other members of the board.

We can understand why a registrant might be dissatisfied if a local board does not give him a desired classification. That fact is insufficient reason to say he has been given unfair treatment by his local board. To our knowledge, malice in the process of classification of any registrant has never been proven upon full investigation. We suspect the unhappiness has been generated by the fine line of judgment shown by board members in their official meetings.

As we have told so many young men and other persons interested in deferments, it is most important that files be fully documented since classification is based on case documentation. The Selective Service Law provides for a timely appeal from the local board classification. If there is a dissenting vote on the Appeal Board, the registrant has the right to make a Presidential Appeal.

We would like to remind our readers many occupational deferments are now being placed pursuant to Executive Order 11527. The same Executive Order precludes any registrant for whom a written request for a III-A deferment is received or postmarked on April 23, 1970 or later for being considered for such deferment on basis of paternity alone.

I married in December, 1969. I became 18 years old on June 28, 1970 and registered on the draft. At the time of registration, I furnished verification of marriage and documentary proof of a stepchild with whom a bona fide family relationship is maintained in my home. The woman at the draft board told me that the local board could not consider me for a father deferment as information of marriage and proof of a stepchild was not furnished prior to April 23, 1970. My question is, is the woman at the draft board correct?

A. Yes, even though your 18th birthday occurred 2 months and 5 days after the issuance of Executive Order 11527 your local board may not consider you for a paternity deferment.

Q. Is it true that the Selective Service Number has been replaced by the Social Security Number?

A. No, there has been no change in the issuance of Selective Service Numbers. On July 1, 1969, the Social Security Number replaced the Military Service Number.

Q. Following roll call by the clerk of the draft board, I left the local board office to board the bus for the examining station. I tripped on the curb and sprained my ankle. This required emergency treatment at the hospital. Is there any way to receive reimbursement for doctor and hospital expenses? If so, how much will be paid?

A. The Selective Service System has funds available for payment of emergency doctor and hospital expenses incurred by the registrant who is acting under orders issued by or under authority of Selective Service. Reimbursement will be made for all actual and reasonable expenses incurred for emergency doctor and hospital care.

Application of computers in the legislative process is the topic of study for two staff members of the Legislative Research Commission (LRC), at a seminar to be held in Hershey, Pa., Aug. 10-13.

James T. Fleming, director of LRC, indicated his Agency may be inter-

ested in the use of computers as it would serve as a drafting area.

Hugh Morris, assistant director of LRC for research, and Melbourne Mills Jr., assistant director for legal, will attend the seminar marked on the topic conducted by the Council of State Governments.

Fleming said, "Computers may also be of great help in the reapportionment task which lies ahead for Kentucky." The 1970 Census figures indicate that there will be a reapportionment of the General Assembly and the federal congressional districts.

Actual demonstrations will be conducted for legislators and staff of various states at the Hershey seminar.

The General Assembly's Interim Committee on Judiciary will study legislation passed by the 1970 session but vetoed by the Governor.

Interim Committee elects Representative John O. Hardin Jr., D-Hopkinsville, as its chairman and Senator Carroll Hubbard, Jr., D-Mayfield, vice chairman.

Chairman Hardin asked that the Kentucky Crime Commission, the Kentucky Bar Association and other groups interested in legislation within the committee as soon as possible so it might be studied thoroughly prior to the 1972 session.

Hardin also voiced an interest in a bill to regulate licensing of private detectives.

James T. Fleming, director of Legislative Research Commission, noted some matters the Judiciary Committee might want to consider before the next regular session of the General Assembly.

Such matters are: The Crime Commission's draft of a revision of the state's Criminal Law; Supreme Court decisions relating to juvenile courts and assigned council; the Kentucky Bar Association's suggested probate code revisions, and financing of court operations.

at 72, congress felt that this is the only way to return any of their investment to them, and therefore we have the annuity concept at that age. However, if we knew we had no choice but to pay everyone at 65, the taxes would have to be increased to accommodate this. Right now your taxes are as low as they are—about a nickel on the dollar—because we know there will be a certain number of eligible workers continue in full time employment beyond 65. They keep on paying into the trust fund, and until such time as they actually retire, or reach 72, their money is used to help defray the cost of benefits to others who have already retired.

In the unlikely event everyone was forced into retirement at age 65, Musman said, the obvious resultant tax increase would bring about the e-

## Mrs. Ramsey Descendant Of Revolutionary Soldier

This is the second in a series of sketches of Revolutionary soldiers who were ancestors of prospective members of the Rockcastle County DAR Chapter which is being sponsored by the Berea Laurel Ridges Chapter DAR. The date of the preliminary meeting of this chapter to be held late in August will be announced next week.

Francis A. Ramsey, Sr., was born December 17, 1764 in Virginia; and at the age of 15, enlisted as a drum major in the Revolutionary War. He was in the battles of Guilford Court House; Camden; Siege of Ninety-Six; and Eutaw Springs; under Gols, Abraham Buford and Harry Lee; and Capt. Wallace, Marks, and Eccleston. He was discharged at Georgetown, South Carolina in June,

1783. His military record states "that he was for the war."

In May, 1788, Ramsey was married to Martha Allen, daughter of Colonel Richard Allen of Cumberland County, Virginia. Ramsey received a land warrant for his service along the Virginia line, and sometime thereafter "removed" to the Rockcastle country. Ramsey and his family were listed as residents in the first Rockcastle County census in 1810.

The actual bible records are on file at the National Archives and they list the births of 13 children, and some of their deaths.

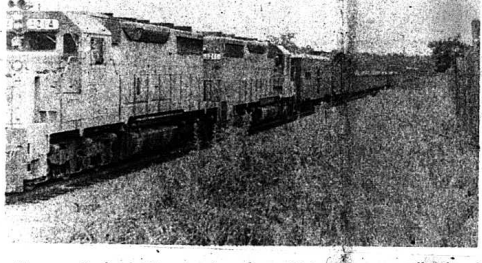

State and county officials conferred in Louisville, and it was decided to invoke the maximum \$500 fines in Jefferson County in an effort to curb overweight sand and gravel trucks there.

#### STATE CHECKS DOWN ON TRUCKS

loans to help Kentucky farmers, governor hopes

The \$48 million general-obligation State bond issue to be voted on in November includes \$400,000 to guarantee loans to small farmers, Gov. Louie B. Nunn pointed out.

In a speech at the ground breaking for the Eastern Kentucky animal diagnostic laboratory at Coldstream Farm, near Lexington, Nunn said the loan-guarantee provision should help to stem the continual migration of farm families to cities.

"With the State guaranteeing all or a portion of farm loans, many farmers will be able to continue operation and many young Kentuckians will be able to buy farms of their own," the governor asserted.

The \$400,000 will be multiplied by private lenders to more than \$10 million and will provide a significant incentive for agricultural growth," Nunn estimated.

Under a new system being installed in the State Department of Mental Health, the same treatment team will handle a patient from the moment he is admitted to a State hospital through his discharge to convalescent status.

In the past, patients have been switched from one specialized treatment unit to another during the different stages of their hospital stay.

The new system was worked out by a demonstration unit at the Kentucky State Hospital at Danville and was inaugurated recently at Central State Hospital, Lakeland. Later, it will be extended to all other State mental hospitals, Mental Health Commissioner, Dr. Dale Farabee, said.

#### BIDS TO BE OPENED

The State Highway Department will open bids Aug. 18 on the first remaining privately owned Green River and Somerset-Bowling Green toll roads.

Included will be: construction of piers for a bridge over Fishing Creek in Pulaski County and a bridge over the Green River in Butler County; grading and draining work on two five-mile segments of the Bowling Green-Owensboro toll road, in Ohio and Davless Counties, and similar work in Metcalfe County on a total of nine and a half miles of the Bowling Green-Somerset Parkway.

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# County Agent's Notes

## COUNTY AGENT'S NOTES BY: H. Lee Durham

### NEW DDT AMENDMENT BECOMES EFFECTIVE ON SEPTEMBER 1

A new amendment to the state pesticide law passed by the 1970 General Assembly goes into effect September 1. The new amendment limits the use of DDT to the control of household pest subterranean termites, bats, rats, and mice. Any other use of the chemical is now forbidden by the new law. The amendment also forbids persons from selling DDT in a quantity of more than one pound until the purchaser signs a written statement that the DDT will be used only for one or more of the authorized purposes.

Any person who violates the amendment will be "jointly and severally liable for treble damages to any person whose person or property is damaged by the misuse."

Termites, according to entomologists, have been on earth for more than 250 million years and are incidentally enough, in the United States alone, annually cause more than 250 million dollars in property damage.

Possessing a seemingly insatiable appetite and indefatigable energy, they will eat almost anything containing cellulose or wood fiber. In a pinch, they will even gnaw asbestos, or asphalt, and can and will bore through lead shielding or as much as five inches of concrete to get at a meal. They have been known to tackle and scar stainless steel while on their foraging.

Termites that cause the most trouble in the United States are the subterranean variety that live in colonies underground and feed on whatever they can find containing cellulose. They are particularly fond of the domiciles of man, especially those with central heating and warm basements. And once established under such structures, they can do enormous damage in a very short time. Therefore all homes containing wood, rural or urban, should be inspected at least once a year for infestation of these insects.

There are several ways of fighting and warding off termites and researchers are ever searching for new and more effective weapons. Since these insects leave scented trails to guide their companions to a feast, scientists are trying to duplicate this secretion in the hope of leading the predators to prepared booby traps. The scientists are also exploring a biological remedy whereby straggling termites are infected with bacteria-carrying fungi and sent back to the colony to start fatal epi-

demics. Currently, the most widely used method of termite control is the poisoning of the soil around houses and treating the wood foundations with repellants. This is an effective method, but not always completely successful.

Being very resourceful, termites have been known to climb trees and power lines, cross to the eaves or walls of houses, and start eating down instead of up.

Also, according to one authority on the subject, tugging out rock and roll music will help prevent termite infestation. In experiments at a San Francisco nightclub, an entomologist found that a blues band spurred termites to increased activity. But rock and roll tunes, he added, caused them to work even harder and literally go into a frenzy of chewing wood.

To best protect the home and outbuildings against termites and prevent their destructive proclivities, the homeowner will be wise to become acquainted with the insect, its habits, and way of life. There are a number of Extension and U.S. Department of Agriculture bulletins on the subject available in the office of most County Extension Agents. These bulletins not only give the life history of termites but also detail the best methods of thwarting their designs. To eat property owners out of house and home.

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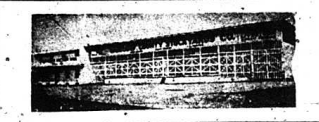

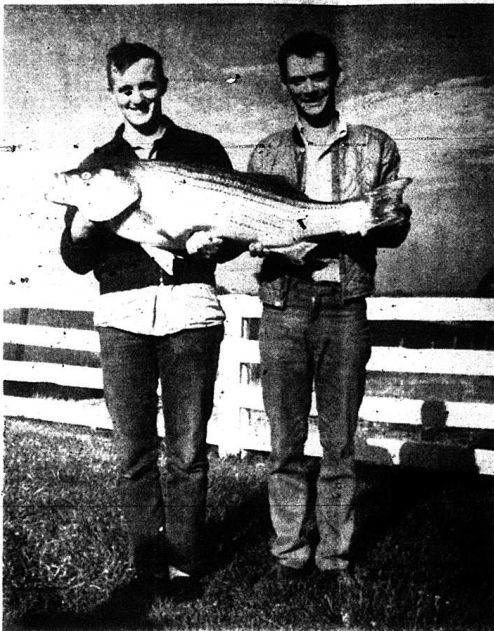
