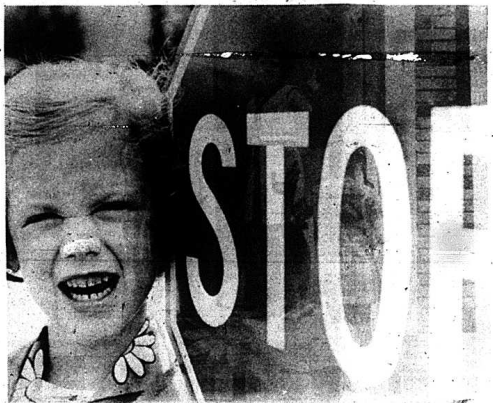

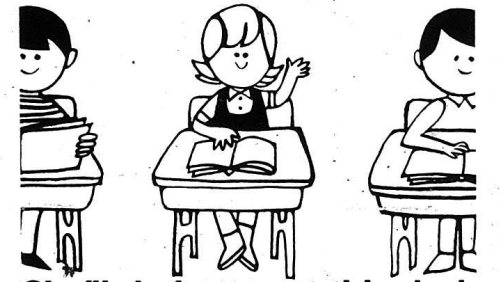

**Social Security News**

Some private insurance companies have been sending misleading advertisements to Medicare beneficiaries in the Rockcastle area, according to James Musian, Social Security Manager, in an effort to sell them health insurance to supplement their medicare protection. Musian said that the promotional literature distributed by these companies has been deliberately designed to give the reader the impression that the company is in some way connected with the social security administration, or that it has access to the federal agency's records. One company used a window envelope that was almost identical to the medicare offer valuable additional protection and advertise honestly in their sales literature. "However," Musian said, "a few companies have engaged in practices which clearly are intended to mislead medicare beneficiaries." Musian advised persons who are confused by material they get in the mail offering additional medicare protection to get in touch with their nearest social security office, or their state insurance Commissioner for further information. \*\*\*\*\* Social Security also for the young—over 3 million children in the U.S. get benefits. \*\*\*\*\* Brides should tell social security about name changes. \*\*\*\*\*

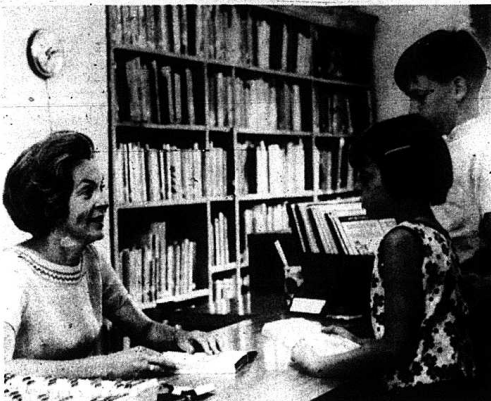

## Benjamin Metcalf, 48, Found Shot To Death

Benjamin Warren G. Harding Metcalf, 48, of Lamer, was found dead early Monday morning alongside of the Red Hill Road near the old U.S. 25 Bridge in Livingston.

Coroner Bill Dowell ruled homicide and said that death was caused by a 20 ga. shotgun wound in the left abdominal region.

According to reports, Mr. Metcalf had been missing from his home since early last Friday evening.

Charged with "Willful Murder" is Jesse Mobley, about 70, of Livingston, who reported finding the body Monday morning to Calvin Webb of Livingston.

After investigating the slaying, Mobley was arrested by Sheriff Billy Kirby and lodged in the Rockcastle County Jail pending examining trial Thursday (today).

William Hummons, Jr., 40, has also been charged in connection with the case with being an accessory. He was arrested but is now out on bond.

Mr. Metcalf was born in Rockcastle County December 18, 1922, the son of Franklin and Mary Hurley Metcalf and was married to the former Dula Simpson.

Besides his wife, he is survived by his mother,

## City Council Terminates Contract With B & R

The Mt. Vernon City Council voted Monday night to terminate their contract with B & R Road Boring, Inc., to construct an addition to the city's existing sewer system.

The action was brought about after the company, who was the low bidder on the lift-station project, went into bankruptcy soon after receiving the bid and were not able to even begin construction. The project was originally scheduled for completion the latter part of July.

Even though the city has terminated their contract with B & R, there is no danger of the project not being completed. Their bonding company had to guarantee construction of the lift-station and they will now take over and hire a firm to do the job.

The Council also decided to hold the bonding company liable for the "liquidating damages."

Under the original contract, the city can collect \$50 per day for each day the project runs over the completion date.

The City also has a problem of where they are going to get the \$11,000 needed to pay off all bills connected with the water project. This is the amount the city came up short when all grant and loan money had been received from the government.

## Trash & Refuse Collection Subject Of Grand Jury Order

"In the Matter of Trash and Refuse Collection in Rockcastle County" was the subject of an order, filed August 14 in the Rockcastle Circuit Court by the July Term Grand Jury.

The order, directed to the Fiscal Court of Rockcastle County, the City of Mt. Vernon, the City of Livingston, the City of Broadhead and the Department of Health, made several recommendations to these governing bodies concerning the control of trash and refuse disposal.

The order reads as follows: "We, the Grand Jury of Rockcastle County, Kentucky, July 1970 Term, do hereby make the following recommendations, to the above governing authorities: It has been brought to the attention of the Grand Jury that many areas of Rockcastle County have trash and refuse disposal problems. Several persons have made complaints regarding trash accumulation on public property and private property. This problem exists throughout the entire County, more particularly the problem is serious near the larger population areas of the County. The problem involves pollution of streams and water supplies and pollution of the air.

This Grand Jury has deemed it necessary that all citizens of Rockcastle County should be aware of this serious situation and the above governing authorities should make plans to cope with the problem before the situation becomes critical as it is now near that stage in certain areas of Rockcastle County.

The Grand Jury further recommends that future Grand Jury investigations be made concerning this matter and indictments be returned against those who fail to meet their responsibilities in the matter of trash and refuse accumulation and the resultant pollution.

In effect, the Grand Jury seems to be sending notice that if the local governing authorities do not successfully fulfill their obligations in the collection and disposal of trash and refuse, they (the Grand Jury) will take

the necessary legal steps to see that this obligation to the community is fulfilled.

A letter was written recently, on behalf of the Rockcastle Grand Jury by the Commonwealth Attorney and County Attorney to Commissioner of Highways Eugene Goss, who recently resigned that post, requesting the Highway Department to clean up trash dumps along old U.S. 25 south of Livingston. Goss answered the letter with a promise that these dumps

would be cleaned up but that keeping them clean would be the responsibility of the law enforcement agencies of Rockcastle County.

## VALENTINE COOK WAS REV. SOLDIER

Valentine Cook, Sr. was born in London, England in 1740. He was the son of John Hamilton Cook, who was a few cousin to the famous explorer, Capt. James Cook. When he was six years old, his father died and after the second marriage of his mother, Valentine moved

with her to Amsterdam, Holland where he received a fair education in English and German. The influence of this German education was shown in early court records of Green Brier Co., Va., where he settled before the Revolutionary War. When his name was occasionally listed as Felty Koch—the German form. During the war, he served as a patriot-furnishing hay and grain

for the Continental Army. Between 1781-1785, Valentine Cook took up land grants on 4800 acres of land in Lincoln Co., Ky. In areas which are now in Lincoln, Barren, Rockcastle and Garrard Counties. 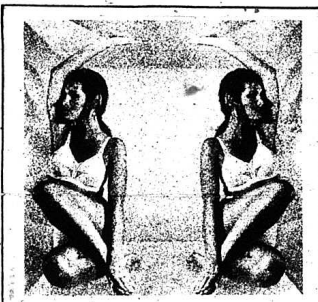

Beneath the surface smiles, tensions are building inside the administration over next year's election ticket. There's little chance of an open split with Gov. Louie Nunn holding all the high cards. But behind-scenes moving is intense.

This wasn't the cause of Eugene Goss' resignation as highway commissioner. But he saw that it was now or never to make a try for the Republican nomination for governor.

The feeling is that Public Service Commissioner Tom Emberton remains easily in front in the competition for the governor's backing. And time may be running out for other hopefuls.

So Goss, who's drawn high praise for his handling of the administrative jungles of the Economic Security and Highway departments, made his move.

And it was easy to find tension inside Emberton's camp over whether Gov. Nunn's statement at the news conference might seem to be an endorsement of Goss.

But the governor continued to walk the careful path around any commitment even on when he may have something definite to say.

Gov. Nunn thinks chances are good for Kentucky's first back to back Republican administrations ever. And he doesn't intend to toss the chance away with any hasty decision.

Emberton's backers are playing it cautiously too, feeling he's gathered enough support to prevail barring a major mistake.

This combination heightens frustrations elsewhere.

One commissioner may have lost all real influence inside the administration because of tactics to head off Emberton including keeping the name of Congressman M.G. Snyder in the picture.

The governor reportedly asked Snyder flat out whether he was interested and the Fourth District congressman said he wasn't. "He better have been serious because the governor sure was," reports one who should know. It

spot involves many more than those in contention, because the ticket will be a planned package.

And some who want a secondary spot know their chances depend on who's No. 1.

The wild card in figuring a hot GOP primary may be in Williamsburg, where former Congressman Eugene Siler, Sr. reportedly is considering another run for governor.

The strong-willed Siler isn't turned aside easily by talk.

Commissioner Goss, not one for much fancy talk, said in his resignation statement that not once in his two years in highly sensitive state posts had he been treated unfairly by the Capitol Press Corps.

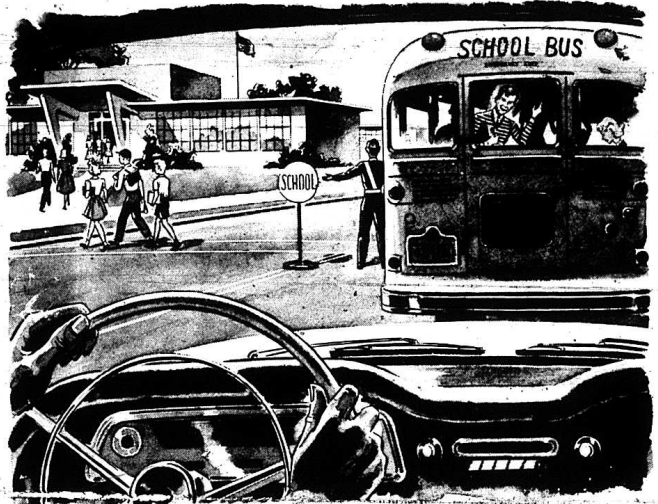

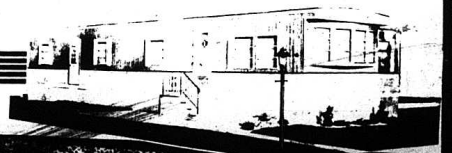

### County Agent's Notes

THINK TWICE-- About Potatoes

Are you diet conscious? Have you eliminated potatoes? Do you think that they are high in calories? If your answer is yes--think twice about potatoes. Maybe you didn't realize that they have approximately the same number of calories as a large apple or orange. U.S. Department of Agriculture scientists tell us that potatoes offer a high return in food value. If you eat a medium size potato-boiled, pressure-cooked, or baked--it's only about 100 calories. While taking only 2.5 percent of the food dollar, potatoes provide 16 percent of the vitamin C, six percent of the niacin, five percent of the thiamin, three percent of the iron, three percent of the food energy, and two percent of the protein in family diets. How's that for food value? To get the most food value from potatoes, cook them whole in their jackets boiling in as little water as possible saves the most vitamins. Today, records show that Americans eat approximately 112.6 pounds of potatoes per year or about 2 pounds a week. We don't suggest it--but--a diet of whole milk and potatoes would supply almost all the food elements necessary for the maintenance of the human body. Within the past decade,

USDA's Agricultural Research Service has reported on research of potato flakes, dehydrated frozen potatoes, and the "explosive puffing" potatoes processing method. Potatoes provide all these nutrients: riboflavin, iron, thiamin and niacin, vitamin C, calcium, manganese, potassium, copper, 27 or more amino acids and more than 1000 different enzymes. Tobacco in certain parts of the state has been hit hard by budworms this year. The light brown to green caterpillars eat holes in plant buds, resulting in reduced yield and poor quality of mature leaves. If infestations of the inch-long, tan, yellowish worms are heavy, severe stunting of plants may result.

Some farmers, in attempting to rid their fields of the budworm, have been causing chemical injury to their tobacco. The injuries aren't being caused by a failure to use the correct insecticides, but through improper application methods.

When sprays are used, nozzles should be held at least 12 to 15 inches above the buds to prevent bud-burning. This avoids an overly heavy concentration of chemicals in the tender bud area. Light coverings of sprays or dusts are most desirable. Using higher than recommended amounts only create new problems. Bud-burning possibilities are even greater if

mounts. This particular formulation of insecticide employs a solvent, in which insect-killing material is dissolved. These solvents are often harmful to plant tissue. Insecticides recommended for budworm control are Btrotol or Thionide, Sevin, and Dieldrin. If used according to recommendations and applied properly, any one of these materials will help solve the budworm problem.

These insecticides take approximately three days to kill budworms--so farmers should get impatient and apply another barrage of insecticide too quickly. If budworms are still present after the initial application, the field should be treated again in 7 to 10 days.

Farmers should remember to:

- Use recommended insecticides at the correct rates. When using hand or knap-sack sprayers, hold nozzle at least 12 to 15 inches above the

buds. Do not over-spray or spray too frequently--both practices may result in bud-burning.

Insecticide Recommendations for Tobacco Fields (misc. 270-G) may be obtained from respective county agents.

THINGS TO DO FOR NEXT YEAR'S GARDEN

Move Virginia blue bells anytime during the month. They prefer a location with shade and moist soil. Plant Madonna lilies now for bloom next summer. Lift and divide Oriental poppies. If transplanted in August, they should become established and bloom next spring. Water roses heavily (1/2 inches of water) at least once a week. Pick off decayed and infected leaves as they occur. Spray weekly with phthalan or maneb to control further blackspot spread. Remove fading blossoms. Check the rose insecticide and fungicide studies being carried out in the Landscape Garden Center at the corner of Cooper and Limestone at Lex-

ington. Enter the garden off Cooper Drive between the plastic greenhouses. Sow fall lettuce, mustard, kale and turnip seeds in garden areas vacated by early-harvested vegetables.

Sow winter cover crops in garden areas not needed for vegetables.

Prepare storage space for winter vegetable supply. Expect to harvest eggplant, muskmelon, watermelon, and pumpkin.

Maintain a rigid pest control program.

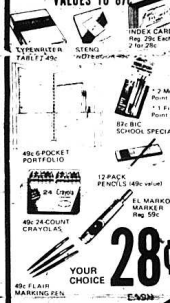

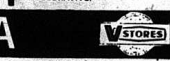
