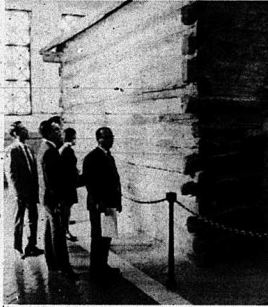
Five officials of Thailand spent a week in Kentucky studying state government. Each of the representatives hold the equivalent rank of governor in their nation.

Dooley Convicted

John Estill Dooley, 31, of Route 1, Orlando, was found guilty last Thursday of involuntary manslaughter by a Rockcastle County Circuit Court Jury.

Dooley was charged in October of 1969 in the death of Lloyd Bailey Pickle, 13, of Conway, who was struck by a hit-and-run motorist while riding his bicycle on U.S. 25 near his home at Conway. Dooley was later arrested by state police and charged with manslaughter.

The jury, which deliberated for two hours, was given six options by Circuit Judge Lawrence Hall under which they could find Dooley guilty or not guilty. The jury elected to find Dooley guilty under Instruction No. 2 and sentenced him to one year in the county jail and set his fine at \$1,000.

A Motion to Grant Probation has been filed on Dooley's behalf in Circuit Court by his attorneys Luker, Luker and Roberts. A hearing on the motion is set for August 28.

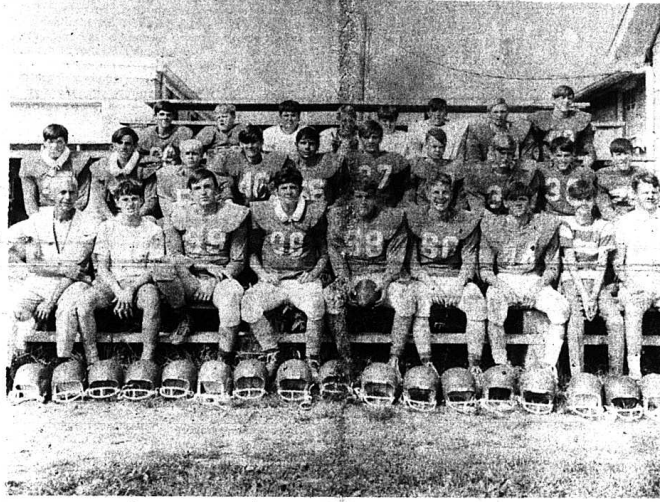

Capital Digest

Sentiment is growing among county health departments for the joint hiring of doctors, nurses, sanitarians and others whom single counties sometimes can't afford, State Health Department officials report.

The cooperative approach may solve many problems for counties whose public health programs are deficient, officials are convinced.

Making a statewide tour, Kentucky's health commissioner, Dr. William P. McElwain, and his top aides concluded that local health departments need to be strengthened.

Dr. McElwain and his staff were encouraged to note that public health work is attracting an increasing number of young people who are insisting that problems be solved.

Sometimes State doctors found local health officials were discouraged because of the lack of county or community support.

Last year the State provided \$3.8 million for county health departments, while the counties supplied about \$2 million.

SOUTH AMERICANS KNOW WHO CAN DELIVER GOODS

Kentucky's importance in the petro-chemical field, stressed continually by the State Department of Commerce, is well known in South America.

UK STUDENT CODE REVISED

The University of Kentucky board of trustees unanimously approved a revision of the Student Conduct Code designed to prevent campus disorders.

The trustees' code revision committee declared: "Acts of interference, coercion and disruption at the university cannot be tolerated.

This new section of the code authorized and directs the UK administration to respond to such acts in an effective manner."

Under the new provisions, the UK president will have wider authority to pro-er-normal university activities, including the power to, order the temporary suspension of students charged with disruptive acts.

Jurisdiction over such offenses was removed from the all-student Judicial Board and placed directly under the University Appeals Board, which consists of six faculty members and two students, all appointed by the president.

In other action, the trustees named Dr. Peter P. Bosomworth vice-president of the UK Medical Center effective Oct. 1.

RATES MUST BE FAIR

Explaining regulations issued under the new State law, Kentucky Insurance Commissioner Robert Preston told bondsmen they are free to set their own rates but "must treat everybody alike."

"Once you have decided on the rates, they must be applied to every individual exactly alike," Preston told a meeting of bondsmen. "You cannot do some a favor and penalize others."

However, the commissioner said variations will be permitted in such cases as where a customer obtains a bail bond on credit and then fails to pay up as promised.

BUILDING TO HOUSE TECHNICAL CENTER

A five-story building will house the Appalachian Technical Institute to be set up at Morehead State University.

The \$3 million structure will include two floors for parking and three floors for classrooms and offices. Over all, the building will comprise 109,000 square feet of floor space.

Financed by an \$800,000 federal grant and university revenue bonds, construction will start late this year and require about two years.

and pieces from separate actions in lower courts. But ultimately the high court must answer this puzzler:

How can its 100 percent assessment ruling be enforced fairly across the state with practices varying widely at the local level?

The key may be the court's view of the Revenue Department's authority. But even if the department is held to have sweeping authority over local assessors, the entire creaking structure seems likely to continue tottering dangerously.

Inflation, spotty development and the farmland assessment provision taking effect in January could combine into enough stress to rip things apart. This is the situation facing the court even though it's not spelled out in any case awaiting its return from summer recess.

And the court is all too aware, having taken repeated lumps for its 100 percent ruling, although it was a catalyst rather than cause of the problem.

Still, the ruling and the subsequent tax-rollback law have produced such pressures on—and by—local assessors, property owners and schools and other local units dependent upon property taxes that a major blow-up may come.

And whether your county is directly involved in any of the suits headed through the courts it certainly will feel the final impact.

One of the better county assessors or Property Valuation Administrators was caught in the middle of the type situation that's destroying public confidence in the system.

Owners of a tract sought for a school site priced at \$2,800 an acre—a rate that would make the farm worth more than \$300,000.

On the tax rolls it's listed at \$64 an acre — a total of \$10,000.

The assessor says he took the matter before the local board but nothing happened.

But something happened—someone else paid.

Gov. Louie Nunn isn't edgy but plenty of his people are when they think of the opening of a state colleges and universities this fall.

At almost every opportunity, the governor repeats his stand that campus disorder won't be tolerated.

And his aides have been moving quietly to set up procedures for cooperation with local authorities in case of outbreaks.

But they've also been campaigning quietly with campus officials to get ready to take stern steps to nip any trouble early.

Eastern Kentucky University President Robert Martin's reference to "gutless" campus administrators caused some chuckles.

One of the most formidable trenchermen ever produced by the Commonwealth, Dr. Martin's girth is ample tribute to his appetite.

Once, when a group of politicians were discussing an opponent's threat to "gut" an official, Martin patted his impressive stomach and remarked:

"He'd sure have a picnic with me."

The field of those hoping to get tapped for the administration ticket in next year's statewide races continues to grow.

Now being pushed for the nod for state superintendent of public instruction is the Rev. Douglas Moseley, who was appointed to the State Personnel Board by Gov. Nunn and now has moved to a post in the Parks Department.

The governor was twitting a religious group about one of its members' efforts to change the Sunday closing law, saying, "He's breaking one of the Ten Commandments."

One of the groups asked, "Which one this time?"

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County Agent's Notes

Southern corn leaf blight is causing both myths and questions. The most pressing question is: Can grain, green-crop, silage, and stalk be safely used as livestock feed?

Based on a limited number of controlled feeding trials, the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture plant and animal scientists say "yes." They have checked the results of other Southern agricultural experiment stations where corn is harvested earlier, and they found that the blight produced no toxic substances in the corn plant. However, there may be excessive mold in blight-damaged grain and silage. These will be the usual molds that develop in grain damaged by other causes and also in silage not properly packed and stored.

Mississippi State University researchers observed no sickness or deaths in test animals fed severely blight-damaged, green-chopped corn. Other stations doing similar studies have reported no toxic symptoms. When Mississippi scientists sacrificed the cattle, they found no signs of poisoning or toxic substances. Members of the Agronomy, Plant Pathology, Animal Sciences, and Veterinary Science Departments of the College of Agriculture who made the survey say they have checked out rumors of animal deaths resulting from feeding blight-damaged corn. They found these to be untrue. No animals that were fed blight-damaged corn in any form have yet been reported.

These most recent findings support previous statements of the College of Agriculture Cooperative Extension Service specialists concerned with this disease.

OBSERVE DDT, TDE BAN ON TOBACCO, UK WARNS

Some confusion still exists concerning the use of DDT and TDE on tobacco, Dr. W.W. Gregory, Jr., University of Kentucky College of Agriculture entomologist, reported this week.

"The use of these insecticides is strictly forbidden, and the farmer continuing to use them on tobacco will not be eligible for price support of his crop, and he will also threaten our foreign markets," Gregory warned.

check for residues of these materials when the crop is sold. Residues as small as 1 part per billion can be detected, and that's like finding one ounce of salt in over 31 tons of sugar, he said.

The point of confusion, Gregory believes, came about when the USDA Agricultural Research Service banned DDT in November 1969 and then DDE in March 1970. However, permission was given for current supplies to be used up, but no new shipments brought in.

Then later in March, the USDA Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service strictly banned the materials for use on tobacco. This agency mailed each farmer a letter informing him of the new regulation and that a certificate stating that he had not used the materials would have to be signed before the farmer could sell his crop.

"Some people may still be under the impression that the earlier regulation, the one allowing present supplies of DDT and TDE to be used, is still in effect; this is not the case," Gregory re-emphasized.

"The UK College of Agriculture removed these materials from its list of recommended insecticides even before the Federal ban," he said. "We replaced them with approved alternate insecticides which have been demonstrated to be effective," the entomologist added.

All local County Extension offices have these recommendations on hand. It should be apparent to farmers that this ban is now a matter of record -- it is law. Farmers shouldn't run the risk of having a crop condemned. Failure to comply could result in double jeopardy, both personal loss as well as placing the state's tobacco program in a serious situation. The tobacco program needs the help and cooperation of farmers in this matter. Farmers should make their contribution by not using DDT or TDE on their tobacco crops.

Arthritis Drive Seeks \$500

Ignorance and apathy in the face of crippling arthritis can be overcome through vigorous public support of the "Do Something!" fund raising campaign for 1970, Mrs. Glens Dick, chairman of the drive, declared yesterday.

She announced a goal of \$500 for the campaign, scheduled to open September 1. "This money is needed not only to help victims of arthritis and to support science's search for a cure, or preventive," Mrs. Dick said. "A good part of it will go toward educating the public on what it means to have arthritis, and what can be done about it. The fact is--and this will be good news to a lot of people if we can just get the message to them--that something can be done about arthritis."

As an example of The Arthritis Foundation's educational activities, she cited a flyer which will be given wide distribution during the campaign. Headed "Test Yourself on Arthritis," it offers these five statements which readers are invited to check off as

either true or false:

"Arthritis is mostly a disease of old people."
"Nothing much can be done about arthritis."

"Arthritis can be controlled by special diets and foods."
"Arthritis is never a serious disease."

"Once you have arthritis, crippling is inevitable."

Mrs. Dick pointed out that all five statements are false--a fact, she emphasized, which will surprise many people and which demonstrates the need for more public education about arthritis.

"Arthritis is largely a neglected disease problem because so many people seem to take it for granted," she said. "But it need not continue to be the nation's number one crippling disease. Seventeen million Americans with arthritis, including 1,096 who live here in Rockcastle County, need much more help than they are getting. Arthritis research scientists need more support for their investigations."

"The 'Do Something!' slogan is a slogan of protest," she concluded. "It

is an appeal for action against arthritis now. Everything that can be done about arthritis should be done, and the public can demand it by contributing to the 1970 fund campaign about to be launched by the Kentucky Chapter of The Arthritis Foundation." Volunteer workers in this

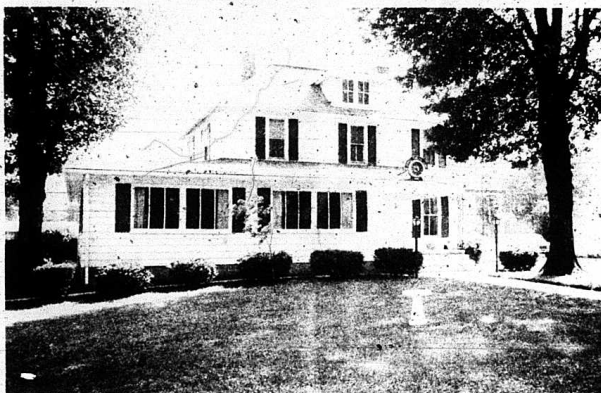
