

is causing both myths and questions. The most agressing question is: Can grain, green-crop, silage, and stalk be safely used as livestock feed? Based on a limited num-

Based on a limited number of controlled feeding trials, University of Kentucky College of Agriculture plant and animal scientists say "yes."

They have checked the results of other Southern agricultural experiment stations where corn is harvested earlier, and they found that the blight produced no toxic substances in the corn plant. However, there may be excessive molding in blight-damaged grain and silage. These will be the usual molds that develop

silage. These will be the usual molds that develop in grain damaged by other causes and also in silage not properly packed and stored.

Mississippi State Uni-

versity researchers ob-served no sickness or deaths in test animals fed severely blight-dam-

deaths in test animals fed severely blight-damaged, green-chopped corn. Other stations doing similar studies have reported no toxic symptoms. When Mississippi scientists sacrificed the cattle, they found no signs of poisoning or toxic substances, Members of the Agronomy, Plan Pathology, Animal Sciences, and Veterinary Science Departments of the College of Agriculture who made the survey say they have checked our rumors of animal deaths resulting from feeding blight-damaged corn. They found these to be untrue. No deaths or sickness in animals that were fed blight-damaged corn in have yet been reported.

tive Extension Service specialists concerned with this disease, OBSERVE DDT, TDE BAN ON TOBACCO, UK WARNS Some confusion still exists concerning the use of DDT and TDE on to-bacco, Dr. W.W. Gregory, Jr., University of Kentucky College of Agriculture entomologist,

Kentucky College of Agriculture entomologist, reported this week.

"The use of these insecticides is strictlyforbidden, and the farmer continuing to use them on tobacco will not be eligible for price support of his crop, and he will also threaten ourforeign markets," Gregory warned, U.S. tobacco exports approach 35 percent of the crop, and foreign buyers may not accept tobacco containing any insecticide residues. Government officials will

check for residues of these materials when the crop is sold. Residues as small as 1 part per billion can be detected, and that's like finding one ounce of salt in over 31 tons of sugar, he said. The point of confusion. Gregory believes, came about when the USDA Agricultural Research Service banned DDT in November 1969 and then TDE in March 1970. However, permission was given for current supplies to be used up, but no new shipments brought in. Then later in March, the USDA Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service strictly banned the materials for use on tobacco. This agency mailed each farmer alter informing him of the mew regulation and that a certificate stating that he had not used the materials would have to be signed before the farmer could sell his crop. "Some people may still be under the impression that the earlier regulation, the one allowing present supplies of DDT and TDE to be used, is still in effect; this is not the case," Gregory re-emphasized.

"The UK College of Agriculture removed these materials from its list of recommended in secticides even before the Federal ban,"—be said. "we replaced them with approved alternate in-

"we replaced them with approved alternate Insectificities which have been demonstrated to be effective," the entomologist added. All local County Extension offices have these recommendations on hand.

It should be apparent to farmers that this ban is now a matter of record—t its law, Farmers shouldn't run the tisk of having a crop commendations.

Arthritis Drive Seeks \$500

Ignorance and apathy in the face of crippling arabritis can be overcome through vigorous public support of the "DoSomething" fund raising campaign for 1970, Mrs. Glenis Dick, chairman of the drive, declared yesterday.

She announced a goal of \$500 for the campaign, scheduled to open September 1. "This money is needed not only to help victims of arthritis and to support science's

victims of arthritis and to support science's search for a cure, or preventive," Mrs. Dick said. "A good part of it will go toward educating the public on what "it means to have arthritis, and what can be done about it. The fact is—and this will be good news to a lot of people if we can just get the message to them—that something can be done about arthritis."

As an example of The Arthritis Foundation's educational activities, she cited a flyer which will be given wide dis-rribution during the campaign. Headed "Test Yourself on Arthritis," it offers these five state-ments which readers are invited to check off as

either true or false:

"Arthritis is mostly a disease of Jold people."

"Nothing much can be done about arthritis."

"Arthritis can be controlled by special diets and foods."

"Arthritis is never a serious disease."

"Once you have arthritis, crippling is inevitable."

Mrs.. Dick pointed out that all five statements are false—a fact, she emphasized, which will surprise many people and prise many people and which demonstrates the need for more public edu-cation about arthritis.

"Arthritis is largely a neglected disease, prob-lem because so many peolem because so many peo-ple' seem to take it for-granted," she said. "But it need not continue to be the nation's number one crippling disease. Seven-ten million Americans with arthritis, including 1,096 who live here in Rogicastie County, need much more help than they are getting. Arthritis re-search scientists need more support for their in-vestigations.


