Doug Moseley's decision to enter the Republican race for state school superintendent was reached without the blessing of Gov. Louis Nunn and his choice for governor, Tom Emberton.

Gov. Nunn's timing for the special session will allow preparation of a legislative redistricting ahead --and put pressure on for action so the lawmakers can file to run by March 31.

But Legislative Research Director James Fleming said: "There's no way you're going to be able to get mathematical precision" on equality--partly because census tracts don't follow precinct lines. And districts created across precinct lines would be chaste.

With legislators, prospective candidates and advisers trying to figure how to draw House and Senate districts to suit themselves and get an edge in Fleming's tentative plan--the weary-eyed LRC director said: "I've never seen the like of maps--the Highway Department must be running out of maps."

As in prior years, applications for conservation cost-sharing will be made at the County ASCS Office and must be approved by the County ASC Committee before work begins. The farmer-elected committees will continue to select practices best suited for meeting local needs, will determine which farm lands need treatment, and will fit the amount of cost-sharing to be provided each approved applicant.

An allocation of REAP funds for this County is expected to be made soon. Cost-sharing applications by farmers cannot be accepted at their county ASCS office until the 1971 REAP funds allocation for the county is announced, Mr. Mullins said. "Signup dates for REAP will be announced when the funds allocation is received. Meanwhile, farmers should determine the practices most needed and estimate total costs so they will be ready when the time comes."

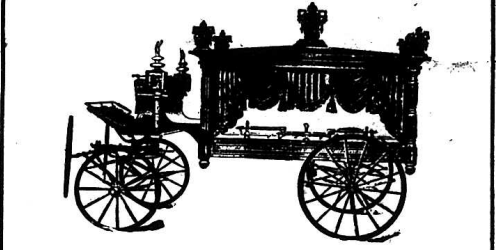

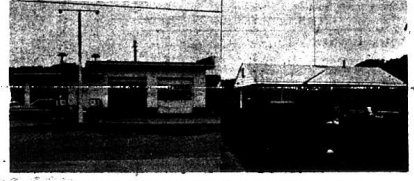
