of 6 percent each by 1974. With 30,000 teachers, the first raise would cost 13 million dollars. But if the 6 percent raises—not total salaries—would cost \$6 1/2 million a year. State finance experts have come up with estimates going above 70 million a year, including pension funding. But they say they're in the dark too on how to pin the figures down to spell it out. They all remember one who opened the campaign for governor some years back by hinting that the public must pay for what it gets. And he says: "I was called the only candidate who ever opened and closed a campaign the same way."

Gov. Frank Hoffmann hasn't disclosed the base for his plan for the state to share resources. But there's hints as to some areas indicate it would run about \$5 a year for each resident. A \$5 situation for each Kentuckian would total 16 million dollars. Neither Ford nor has an opponent in the Democratic race for governor, former Gov. Bert Coombs, wants to talk except money figures for schools.

That's understandable because of the vagueness of the Kentucky Education Association's 1972 legislative program and the stance of Republican candidate Tom Emmerston. Emmerston will avoid taking any unalterable position until his Democratic opponent is decided. But his thinking is geared to disclaiming any big spending plans.

The KEA won't help you with your math on its legislative program—in fact, won't even say where to start. But say you start with its figure on the average salary for Kentucky's classroom teachers—\$7,890 a year—and the KEA goal of four raises

Social Security News

One social security benefit not always understood, according to James Mustian Manager of the Somerset Social Security Office, is the lump-sum death payment.

"Even though a person now draws social security," Mustian stated, "it does not necessarily mean that a payment is due at the time of death. Rather, it depends on how a person is eligible to receive social security. The lump-sum death payment is paid only at the death of an insured worker is also insured."

Under current law, a lump sum payment is due the widow or widower of an insured person if the deceased and survivor were living together at the time of death. If there is no eligible spouse, the payment may be made to any person who paid the funeral

One of the main purposes of the F.F.A. is "to develop the Rockcastle County agricultural leadership."

Some of the ways the F.F.A. develops this leadership among its members are (1) Through the officers elected by members. (2) Through committee organization, which involves members in the F.F.A. (3) Through assigning members and officers to solve problems within the organization. (4) Allowing members to give their point of view on a given subject in chapter meetings. (5) Developing and using a program of activities for the chapter members.

The chapter program contains more than 75 activities which the members plan and carry out each year. There are nine parts to this program with a committee of five to seven members in charge of each part. The committee is a miniature organization with a chairman, secretary and members. The committees meet regularly to identify, plan and carry out their part of the program. (6) Learn to use parliamentary procedure in meetings.

to help develop leadership: Public Speaking, Impromptu Speaking, FFA Creed Speaking, Chapter Meetings (1 per year), Showing of crops and livestock, Attendance at Leadership Training Center, Dairy Judging Contest, Seed Identification Contest.

There are opportunities for each member of the FFA organization to develop his fullest potential leadership abilities if he will get involved in chapter activities.

Legislative Redistricting Will Affect Rockcastle

The northern tip of Pulaski County will be added to the Legislative District comprised of Rockcastle and Lincoln Counties. If the plans drawn up by the Legislative Research Commission for redistricting is approved at a special session of the legislature, which convenes February 25.

According to Rep. Harold DeMarcus, a member of the Commission, the mean population for the 100 Legislative Districts is 32,193. Rep. DeMarcus, who is Republican Floor Leader in the House, said that with the addition of a portion of Pulaski County (about 3500 voters) Pulaski would still have enough voters to qualify for a district for their county. However, he added that while the plans have been drawn up, the outcome in a Democratically controlled House (83 to 27) is not definite.

The Senate proposal for redistricting would involve more change for Rockcastle. He was

presently in the same Senate District as Clay, Owsley, Jackson and Laurel; however, under the proposed plan, Rockcastle would be put in with Pulaski, Casey, Lincoln and one-half of Laurel County. The mean population figure for the Senate Districts is 84,000.

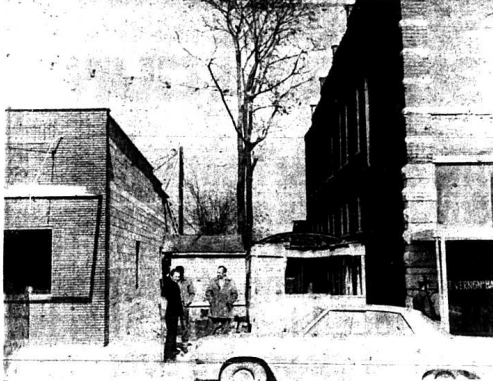

LAWYERS' DUN TEST STATE FEE POLICY

A court rest of Kentucky's non-payment policy toward court-appointed lawyers seems imminent after a Campbell County lawyer presented the state with a bill seeking \$200 for defending an indigent woman.

The request is currently being considered by Finance Commissioner Albert Christen who said, "As of now, it is not rejected and it is not accepted."

The attorney, Louis A. Ball, Newport, was appointed by the court to defend a 19-year-old woman charged with house-breaking.

Court-appointed lawyers in Kentucky have never been entitled compensation for services. Federal court allows "for reimbursement."

BELL COUNTY DAM CONTRACT SIGNED

A new water system for Pineville and surrounding areas has been assured with the signing of a contract by the state to build a dam and 243-acre reservoir on Cannon Creek in Bell County.

The contract for \$799,862 was awarded to Raymond Construction Co., Louisville. The firm was lowest of five that bid on the project last month.

The dam and reservoir will be financed by state and federal funds, some \$200,000 in bonds issued by the Bell County Municipal Properties Commission and tap-on fees.

The city of Pineville plans to build a new water treatment plant and install 30 miles of new pipeline to cure the city's long-standing water problem. The new plant will be located adjacent to the dam and reservoir, and will have a capacity of one million gallons per day.

GOVERNOR RECOMMENDS LIVE-IN VOTED SCHOOL AT LINCOLN

Governor Nunn has recommended that the Lincoln School near Simpsonville be used as a residential vocational training center under the auspices of the state Bureau of Vocational Education.

The school, which has dormitory space for some 200, has been closed since the end of the 1970 summer session.

Target date of opening will be fall 1971, providing funding can be arranged, the governor said. Funding will probably depend on receipts of federal dollars and the passage of the manpower training bill.

Governor Nunn said a state inter-agency task force would be formed immediately to design the program and make funding arrangements if the state Board of Education approves the idea.

It is hoped the Lincoln Center can have broader admission policies which will differentiate it from other vocational programs, the governor indicated. For example, the center could be involved with first-offenders, the handicapped, disadvantaged and others most suitable to a live-in learning environment.

MORE MONEY SPENT IN STATE LAST YEAR
A record \$5.5 million out-of-state travelers visited Kentucky last year and spent \$394 million, or seven per cent more than in 1969.

The figures were included in a recently released travel survey made for the state Department of Public Information.

The survey reported that visitors to the state provided over \$40 million in state government revenue and more than \$136 million in personal income for Kentuckians.

Also noted was \$146 million in out-of-state money traveling around their own state. Ten per cent of all retail business was generated by travel, the report said.

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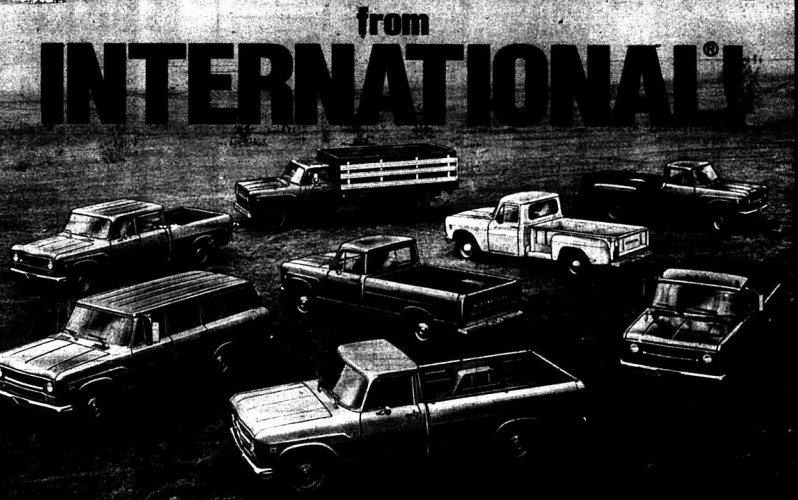
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
