\$97,029 Road Program Announced For County

Highway Commissioner B.E. King today announced a 1971-72 County Road Program allotment of \$97,029 for Rockcastle County.

Included in the program are 100 maintenance projects and three road improvement projects.

A total of 131.1 miles of county roads and nine bridges will be maintained under this year's program.

Bimonthly initial surfacing is planned for 0.7 mile of Flat Rock-Pine Hill Road beginning at KY 1004 and extending southeast.

Grade and drain work and rock surfacing are planned for 0.9 mile of Joppa Cash Road beginning at Ottawa School Road and extending southwest to KY 418, and for 0.6 mile of Ottawa School Road beginning at KY 1690 and extending south to Joppa Cash Road.

The County Road Aid Program was established by a general assembly appropriation of \$13 million annually to help the counties meet their responsibility for county roads.

CONGRESSMAN CARTER ANNOUNCES R.E.C.C. LOAN

Congressman Tim Lee Carter has announced a loan from the United States Department of Agriculture, Rural Electrification Administration, to Jackson County Rural Electric Cooperative Corporation of McKee, Kentucky. The loan amounts to \$630,000 and will be used to finance sixty miles distribution line to service 850 new consumers. It will also be used for extensive system improvements, including four miles of new line and conversion of twenty-eight miles of existing line and related facilities.

Rockcastle Remains In 80th District; Moves To 15th Senatorial District

Rockcastle will remain in the 80th House District, along with Lincoln County, and will form the 15th Senatorial District, along with Cass, Lincoln, McCreezy and Pulaski Counties, under the make-up of the new legislative districts to be enacted by the General Assembly Friday.

According to Representative Harold DeMarcus, who represents both Lincoln and Rockcastle in the 80th, the population of the two counties (Lincoln and Rockcastle) is 10,027 under the present population figure of 32,193 or a little over 3,200 population. In the Senatorial District, the five counties, which along with Rockcastle comprise the 15th District, amount to a little over the approximately 84,000 which was the figure worked toward in each district.

Rep. DeMarcus said, "I am happy the way it (the redistricting) is although I am worried about whether it will stand up to a court test." The court test could come anytime but it is expected that if there is a

suit file it will be within the next few months, Rep. DeMarcus said. On question, Rep. DeMarcus, who must stand for re-election to the House this year, said that he had no objection to running for the senate seat from the 15th district.

The way things shape up, until January 1, 1972, Mrs. Fred Bishop remains as the senator representing Rockcastle County and Rep. DeMarcus, of course, will represent the county. However, pending a suit in the near future and a different court ruling, whomever wins the General Election will take office January 1, 1972 and will become the Senator from the redistricted 15th District.

Hepatitis Outbreak Should Not Close Schools, Shepherd Says

A scare over the number of cases of Hepatitis which has been reported to the local Health Department since January 1, has prompted Dr. M.A. Shepherd, Medical Director of the Regional Health Office, to make an official statement concerning the outbreak.

Dr. Shepherd said that he had been contacted by Superintendent of Schools Charles Parsons concerning the advisability of closing the school system until the outbreak has been checked since there was a great deal of apprehension among parents that their children might contract the disease in school.

However, in Dr. Shepherd's statement, he has listed several reasons why he feels closing the school would be ill-advised. His statement reads as follows: "All evidence indicates that all reported cases acquired the infection from exposure to a home environment, which had previously had Hepatitis. Closing the schools would increase the chances of more children getting together in home situations where Hepatitis is more likely to spread."

Hepatitis is caused ONLY by putting things into the mouth that are contaminated and most contamination comes from un-

with unwashed hands. REMEMBER, you can only get Hepatitis by putting it into your own mouth."

The one fact which clears up the question of closing the schools is that in all 15 cases reported to the local Health Department since January 1, all of the sources of infection have been traced to visitation in homes or in the community. A State Epidemiologist was in Mt. Vernon Tuesday to assist the local Health Department in tracking down every source of infection known locally.

The area always is a political jungle and could be a key factor in the Combs-Ford race.

But running in a jungle is tricky at best.

Louisville Republican Rep. Bruce Blythe's oratory some times has the flavor of early Kentucky camp-meeting, sometimes a taste of vintage Coach Ed Ovide reverse-English.

As the House debated the need for a "land dangers" revising the Senate's map, Blythe ended an impassioned plea with this:

"Let's don't rush his thing through and blow our chances to mess things up."

With legislative races stepping full tilt the administration is taking a neutral stance. And word is going out that

no one has authority to speak for the governor on endorsements.

The new unity of Louisville-Jefferson County lawmakers on re-amping could signal a real power-base shift. The county is getting one more senior and 4,975 House seats, with the fraction helps meaning control of that seat.

So Jefferson could have eight of the 18 Senate seats and 22 of 100 in the House. The blocs that size often are decisive. Unity even on such matters as full state funding for the University of Louisville could mean a whole new ball game.

House GOP leader Harold D. Marcus says the Legislature has come a long way. He told the House of the days when governors used a "gray-ray" committee to bury distasteful bills.

Some sessions it didn't meet at all. DeMarcus repeatedly called lines—then one session he was named to the committee.

When it finally held its first meeting, Democrats asked him chairman, voted out all bills with a killing unfavorable report, then adjourned. As DeMarcus recalled:

"They all got up and left and I sat there three hours signing 437 bills, approximately 200 of them 'my bills.'"

District lines inside counties were left to local law-

makers if they could agree. So no one objected when Ed Brown and George Mossy shifted into Bowling Green precincts at the last minute to "correct a clerical error."

That "clerical error" was about to put them in the same House district—and one back to clerking as far as politics goes.

Cook Announces Hearings On Uniform Time Act

Senator Maxlow W. Cook today announced that hearings will be held by the Commerce Committee on his bill to amend the Uniform Time Act of 1966. Cook's amendment would shorten the period during which Daylight Saving Time is in use from six months to slightly more than 3 months.

Last year Cook's amendment died in committee, but the fact that hearings on the bill will be held this year may give hope to supporters of the change.

The hearings will be held March 23 and 24, and it is

anticipated that both Senator Cook and Congressman Tim Lee Carter, will testify before the Commerce Committee, of which Cook is a member. Also testifying during the two days of hearings will be representatives of the Agricultural and Educational fields.

In addition to Cook's amendment, the hearings will consider two bills that would allow states which are split into different time zones to determine if the entire state should be in the same zone.

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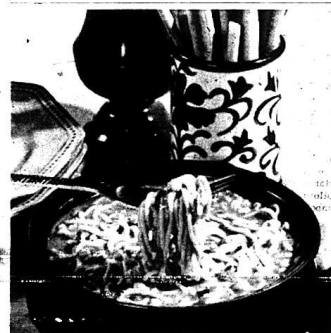

A savory spaghetti dish sauced with a rich tomato-clam combo and spiced with garlic, cheese, and olive oil. It takes a knowing hand, confident in sauce-making to produce this delicacy. It also takes time, patience, and practice... all of which busy moms have little of. But, no matter.

Sneak a bit of "can-craftiness" into your cooking methods and the flavor of Italy is seconds away. Start with canned Italian Style Spaghetti in Tomato Cheese Sauce. This enriched thin-style spaghetti, cooked and canned in a sauce made from plump, red tomatoes, Cheddar, Romano, and Parmesan cheeses, olive oil, and selected spices... lets you skip the tedious sauce-simmering ordeal.

To canned Italian Style Spaghetti simply add garlic, minced clams, chopped parsley, and additional olive oil and Mama mia, you've got a spaghetti great! As in the traditional dish, the sauce is thin so serve it in spaghetti plates or shallow soup bowls.

SPAGHETTI WITH CLAM SAUCE
1 small clove garlic, minced
1 tablespoon olive oil
2 cans (15 1/2 ounces each) Italian style spaghetti in tomato-cheese sauce
2 cans (1 1/2 ounces each) minced clams
2 tablespoons chopped parsley
Grated Parmesan cheese

In saucepan, cook garlic in oil. Add spaghetti, clams, and parsley. Heat; stir now and then. Serve with Parmesan. Makes 4 to 6 servings. *NOTE: Sauce is thin.

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County Agent's Notes

PREVENT ANTHRACNOSE IN TOBACCO PLANT BED

Ditch around tobacco plant beds to keep out anthracnose disease. Surface water flowing over plant beds may carry anthracnose disease organisms from sod areas that can cause serious damage to tobacco seedlings. Ditch all the way around the plant bed, and make the ditch deep enough to carry off hard, washing rains. Anthracnose is a leaf spot disease that causes many small spots on the tobacco leaves. You can tell the difference between anthracnose and other leaf spot diseases by the reddish-brown, elongated spots that appear on the underside of the leaf midrib and veins of plants affected by anthracnose, causing the leaf to pucker or break. If anthracnose appears in your plant bed, use one of the following materials for control: Polyzin, Spray-1, or 3 gal. water. Dust or wet-

table powder—80W; Forbam, Spray—5 tablespoons per gal. water. Dust or wettable powder—15W; Zineb, Spray—2 1/2 tablespoons per gal. water. Dust or wettable powder—10W; Manco, Spray—1 teaspoon per gal. water. Dust or wettable powder—25. Apply the spray, dust or wettable powder weekly, using enough to give uniform coverage of the tobacco plants. As the plants grow larger, more of the control material will be needed to cover them.

ORNAMENTALS
March is a good time to get all busy work done around the yard before you have to start those twice-a-week lawn mowing chores. Begin new construction work, such as patios, walks, edging, and patio covers now while your interest is high and the weather cool. If you didn't apply a commercial dormant oil spray to control scale insects, you still have time to do it if the

bush haven't swollen too much. Near the end of the month take the mulch, off your perennial beds. Consider saving some of the mulch for summer weed control and moisture retention.

LAWNS
Seed areas where the grass has been killed. Frost action will help work the seed into the ground. Don't expect the seed to germinate until the warmer days of April. In-lug areas, use two pounds of Kog-Blue Bluegrass per 1,000 square feet.

If you didn't fertilize your lawn last fall, apply 10 pounds of 10-10-5 fertilizer per 1,000 square feet or 20 pounds of 10-10-10 fertilizer per 1,000 square feet now. Apply the fertilizer before the grass greens. You might also consider the slow-release nitrogen fertilizers. Although expensive, they provide a longer effect. If you use a slow-release fertilizer, be prepared for twice-a-week exercise behind the mower. Wet areas in the home lawn should not be walked on. Excessive traffic compacts the

Hunting & Fishing

You And The Draft

This week we would like to describe a situation involving records that ultimately may have a very happy ending for a young man from the southeastern part of the state. Each year the high schools cooperate with the Selective Service System in providing the names of their students who will become 18 years of age.

The listing also includes their date of birth and the name and address of the parents.

When a young man whose name appears on this roster does not report within a reasonable period of time after reaching 18 years of age, it is the normal procedure for the local board to make inquiry as to whether he has complied with the law.

A young man whose first name is Wait was listed on the 1968 roster submitted by the high school. He was attending the local board in 1968 when he was 18 and the executive secretary wrote to inquire if he had registered for the draft.

On June 17, 1968, he reported to the local board for registration and gave June 14, 1950 as his date of birth. Inadvertently, the executive secretary recorded June 11, 1950 as the date of birth on some of his records.

In 1969, Wait was sent for a physical examination at an armed forces examining and entrance station (AFES) and was not found acceptable because of an ankle injury. AFES recommended that he be returned for re-examination in six months.

In the interim, the first lottery, Dec. 1, 1969, was held. The Random Sequence Number (RSN) for a young man born on June 14, 1950, was 356 and the RSN for those born on June 11, 1950, was 184. Wait was a home on leave prior to being sent overseas. Following his return to his temporary duty station, his

parents confronted a board member and charged that the draft board had treated their son unfairly. The board member asked the executive secretary to check the records to determine whether an injustice had been done. Her investigation brought forth that Wait's true date of birth was Feb. 18, 1950. Therefore, he had been four months late in registering. A selective service registrant with a birthdate of Feb. 18 from the 1969 lottery has a RSN of 292. RSN 292 was an unrecallable draft number in the year 1970. The executive secretary contacted our office for corrective guidance. Based on the facts which we have shared with you, we had no other choice than to recommend that Wait be discharged because of having been erroneously inducted. Only Wait and other members of his family know the true reasons for Wait not registering on time and not giving his correct date of birth. However, the facts we have set forth in this column would make him eligible to be placed in a lower priority selection group when he returns to civilian life. In recounting this situation which to some of our readers may be a "comedy of errors," we have purposely gone into great detail to emphasize the importance of registering promptly, giving a true date of birth, that it is "human error" (Cont. to 9)

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Many fishermen have been added down through the years. The rigs have been improved and it was found that fewer fish were spoiled if a boat was sculled noiselessly along the bank and the bait lowered and jigged up and down in the inviting areas. Also, the boat provided more fishable shoreline than could be had by walking the banks.

Back in the early days it was nightcrawlers almost exclusively for the jig fisherman. Later he found that large minnows jigged about four feet deep even in dirty or clear water would produce good results.

Then came the artificial nightcrawler and some fishermen rely on the artificials exclusively while some believe in using a mixture of the live and the artificial nightcrawlers.

"There's one group of jig fishermen who have devised a possum lure. They use a dollie with a pork rind attached. Others use spring lizards, both live and artificial, and some use a bait fashioned from a large hook and a gob of guinea feathers. Any of the methods will produce fish and big ones.

And, for your information, now is the ideal time for jig fishing. It can pay off handsomely either in daylight hours or at night.

PREPARE TO PLANT
Start Caladiums and Tuberos Rooted Begonias in a peat moss and soil mix during early March. Keep the moisture of the media rather dry until new shoots appear.

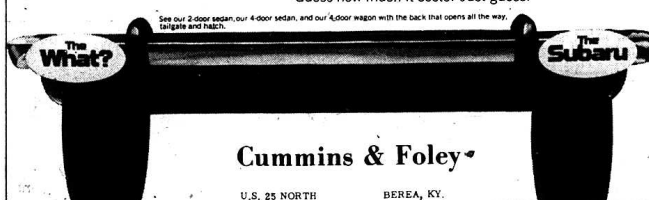
Divide Dahlias and Cannas in preparation for May planting. Be sure each division has an eye (sprout).

Berwick Roses can be planted in mid-March. This is one of the best times for planting roses. Annual flowers can be started indoors during March. Keeping them in a warm home for more than 8 weeks is usually difficult. Time the 8-week period from the last frost-free date. Marigolds and Zinnias can be seeded outdoors when the soil warms. These plants grow too fast for indoor culture.

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
