

Adequate Planting Key to Good Pepper Yield

Most of the pepper acreage grown in Kentucky has a plant population of 10 thousand per acre. Records indicate that yields may be reduced when less than 10,000 plants are set per acre. There is some evidence that yields may be better when more than 10,000 plants are set per acre. If rows are three feet apart and plants 15 to 16 inches apart, it requires about 10,000 plants to set an acre.

The plants you will get are ungraded, so unite the bundles and sort them. Put plants that are about the same size in bundles of 50 and retie them. Save the smaller plants and set them together in an area of the field, or save them for resetting. It is very difficult to set ungraded plants with a tobacco sifter. Unless plants are sorted, the farmer will waste time and end up with a poor-looking pepper field.

Place the sorted plants back in crates for easy handling and storage in case weather conditions force you to hold them for awhile.

It may be necessary for you to hold transplants for several days due to rainy weather conditions. If this is necessary, set the plant crates in two to three inches of water for five to six hours, making sure that you do not wet the leaves. You may need to wet the roots again if the plants must be held very long.

Transplanting is done best with a tobacco sifter. It is faster and easier, and the plants live better. Wilting plants are very difficult to set. Place the plants in wa-

ter the night before they are to be set, being careful not to wet the leaves.

A three pound package of starter fertilizers should be added to each 50 gallons of transplanting water. A starter solution quickly brings the plant to recover quickly from transplanting. Tests have shown that the addition of a starter solution has increased yields as much as three tons per acre.

The best and most economical way to fertilize peppers is to drill the fertilizer two to three inches to the side of the row. Pepper roots should be set so they are not in direct contact with fertilizers, as the fertilizers will burn the roots. The best guide in determining the amount of fertilizer needed is a soil test. If the soil is not tested, apply 400 to 800 pounds of 5-20-20 fertilizer per acre.

It is both practical and economical to control weeds chemically. For complete information on which chemicals to use and how to use them, obtain a copy of the UK Cooperative Extension Service Leaflet 373 "Chemical Weed Control of Vegetable Crops."

Use Sudan and Sudan-Sorghum Hybrids for Summer-time Pastures

If you are planning to seed some emergency summertime pastures in a few days, here are some tips that might be helpful.

1. Use good land. Land that will produce 100 bushels of corn or 5 tons of alfalfa per acre is the best.

2. When using the best land, an acre for each 3 to 4 cows

must be used because of feed shortage, feed dry forage with the fresh material. Better still, never allow hungry animals to gorge themselves on the green herbage. The use of a tester animal is advisable before allowing the entire herd to eat questionable plants.

Food Tips

Planning to re-stock your freezer soon? Remember - a hindquarter of beef will yield more steaks and roasts (but will cost more per pound) than a forequarter.

Looking for a good family steak for an early cook-out? How about a sirloin? Pick one with a small amount of bone (wedges or round bone), but for maximum tenderness look for the sirloin with a long, flat bone. Top sirloin is best, according to USDA.

Poultry products marketed "chicken barbecue" under USDA standards must contain at least 40 percent cooked, deboned chicken meat. Canned stew made with beef or lamb meat must contain at least 25 percent fresh meat (before cooking in the pan) under USDA standards.

Did you know that older eggs are supposed to be easier to peel? Fresh eggs are usually more difficult to peel - so remember to use your oldest eggs when preparing hard-cooked eggs.

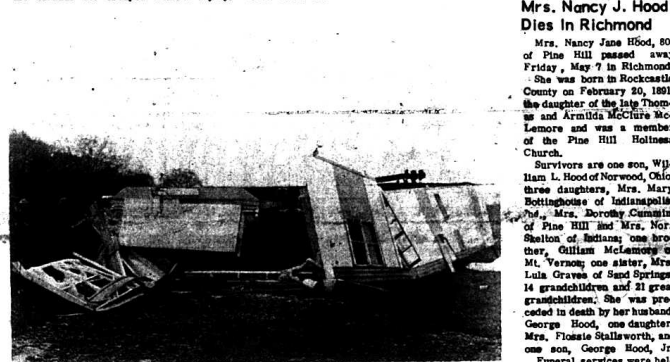

Tornado Touches Down; Destroys Two Trailers

Winds reportedly of tornadoic velocity swept through the county about 3:15 p.m. last Thursday afternoon and particularly hit hard the small county of Middle.

According to Bill Cox, who keeps the local weather records, 2.4 inches of rain also fell during the 24-hour period including Thursday and 4.9 inches fell in the county from Sunday, May 2 through Saturday, May 8.

Over most of the county, downed power lines, uprooted trees, a few shed and barn roofs and swells from the outside were the main evidence of the high winds and heavy rains but in Wildlife, two trailers were completely destroyed and the loss was set at approximately \$15,000.

Mrs. Shirley Bullen, who was asleep in her trailer at the time the highest winds hit, said the first thing she knew she had been rolled from her bed and was in the other end of the trailer. The sides and roof were taken off the trailer, appliances torn from their fittings and insulation and heating from the outside were strung all over the adjoining countryside. Mrs. Bullen, whose trailer was not covered by insurance and who estimated her loss at \$4,000, was unhurt.

A double-trailer, occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Nathan Clark and standing right beside Mrs. Bullen's trailer, stood the winds except for the loss of a back porch. On the other side of the Clark home, another trailer, belonging to Mr. and Mrs. Cecil Smith, was completely flipped over by the wind and came to rest on its top splitting the roof.

The trailer was occupied since all the necessary electrical wires had not been run to the trailer delaying occupancy by Mr. and Mrs. Smith and their baby, Mr. Smith said the \$9,000 loss was covered by insurance.

From Tuesday night on of last week it was a turbulent time across the state weather-wise. On Friday night, this area was suffering through a fierce electrical storm, whose bureau across the state

reported the sighting of five tornado funnels in different areas, although none reportedly touched down.

Thursday, just before the highest winds hit here, Mt. Vernon School principal Cles-ton Saylor was notified by the local radio station that there was a tornado watch out for this area. Mr. Saylor had the students line up next to inside walls and ordered elementary children brought inside the main building from the trailer-classes outside.

Nearby Danville was hit twice Thursday by severe winds and heavy rains which inflicted an estimated quarter of a million dollars damage and roads in and around Pulaski were closed by high water Thursday afternoon.

Central Kentucky counties leaving a trail of destruction. Injured and property damage amounting into the millions.

Greater Ridge, in Russell County, was one of the worst hit communities. The little town lost four houses, its only store, nine automobiles and stored extensive damage to three remaining houses.

Butler's Branch, in Adair County, was worst hit in terms of lives lost. At least six persons died at the small town.

The nine dead range from two seven-year-old children to a 70-year-old woman.

Highway employees, Division of Forestry personnel, the Red Cross, Job Corps, Neighborhood Youth Corps, volunteers and state and federal agencies are involved in clean-up operations.

Members of an American group in Fort Wayne, Ind., drove to the area to help. Church and private charities are offering food and clothing to help those who lost their homes and possessions.

HUGE CAVE'S PARKS PARKY INTEREST

The recent discovery of a huge new Kentucky cave under Pine Mountain—reportedly far bigger than Mammoth—is causing a flurry of interest in the state Department of Parks.

Geologist Ray Love, who discovered the caverns, said they may extend 60 miles underground with ceilings in some sections reaching 400 feet high.

He said one huge room makes Mammoth Cave in Central Kentucky seem "like a baby" in comparison.

In announcing the discovery Love said the cavern would mean additional tourist revenue to the state once the tunnels and grottoes can be opened to development.

It is that possibility that has attracted the attention of the Department of Parks.

"Our department is investigating the find at the moment so we can get an over all picture of this thing and decide what we're going to do," said Parks Commissioner S.W. Palmer-Ball.

"It is not yet one thing—we've found it very interesting."

Pine Mountain lies in parts of the Harlan and Bell counties in the south eastern part of the state.

Reported features of the cave include an underground river 20 feet deep, a 50-foot waterfall and a hole with a sheer drop of 325 feet.

Palmer-Ball said the cave opening is in the vicinity of Kingdom Come State Park on the border line between Letcher and Harlan counties.

He said his question in the discovery is just how much of the cave belongs to the state.

"We're going to need a lot of legal advice on this I'd imagine," he said.

STATE SEEKS UNIT TO COMBAT DRAINAGE

Kentucky is seeking to develop a portable facility to neutralize acid water drainage from strip mining sites.

Acid drainage has long been a problem to Western Kentucky mining areas because of the high sulphur content of the coal in that part of the state.

State Reclamation Director Elmore Grim said the only method now used to handle acid drainings is holding the water in impoundments until heavy rain dilutes it enough to be discharged into the waterways. He added that the method is not satisfactory.

Grim said the Cyrus William Rice consulting firm of Pittsburgh has been contracted to carry out a feasibility study on developing a portable device to improve acid drainage control.

Once that study is completed, Grim believes federal funds can be obtained to develop the facility.

No one has yet developed a portable neutralization unit although Pennsylvania has been working on the problem for several years.

Grim said Pennsylvania does have some neutralizing operations but they are for entire streams and cost millions of dollars to operate. Pennsylvania also does not have as much strip mining as Kentucky does he added.

He said a portable unit, when developed, could be moved from pit to pit and treat water so it wouldn't contain acid when it is discharged into streams.

Carter Comments

ANTI-WAR PROTESTS CONTINUE

During the past two weeks, anti-war demonstrations have been carried out in Washington. The first week was spent "hitting in" before individual government agencies. The high point of the activities came on Monday, May 3rd, when the demonstrators attempted to block rush-hour traffic in order to shut down the United States government.

Commenting on the intent of the demonstrators, Kentucky's Fifth District Congressman Tim Lee Carter remarked, "Of the thousands who are here, many are young people on a lark. The ones causing trouble are a small percentage, who believe that by their actions they will force the government to withdraw immediately from Vietnam. They have led the others into militant, destructive action." The demonstrators' original plan was to block bridge leading from suburban areas into the city. Large numbers of police and military troops, however, were able to keep these routes clear. The protesters turned their attention to key intersections through which many Washington commuters necessarily pass each day. They staked cars in the middle of thoroughfares; some cars were overturned; debris was thrown into the streets, and, in some instances, the young people themselves sat in the streets.

Although the protesters proved disruptive, police were on the scene and kept traffic moving. Representative Carter commended the police and the military for their skillful handling of numerous difficult situations. "Through the efficient removal of debris and stalled vehicles, the police kept the traffic moving and the government open."

By midday, the protesters had been dispersed in most areas of the city. Seven thousand had been arrested. Many government agencies reported higher-than-usual attendance rates. From all indications, the demonstrators failed in their attempt to shut down the government.

On Wednesday, those who remained marched on Capitol Hill. Congressman Carter described them as "a mob of ill-kempt, long-haired, bearded men and brassy women who swaggered up Independence Avenue and onto the steps of the Capitol. Some were carrying Viet Cong flags. One by one, these flags were removed, in some instances by Members of Congress. One of the many utterances heard individuals stripped to the nude on the Capitol steps. He was quickly arrested.

Representative Carter went on to say, "The police coolly and calmly arrested 1700 of what I call 'the lost generation.' During this week it has been proven that the policemen in your Capital City are a humane and effective group. They did their job and it was to arrest those guilty of breach of the peace, indecent exposure and attempts to stop governmental action."


