

STATE SEEKS UNIT TO COMBAT DRAINAGE

Kentucky is seeking to de-velop a portable facility to neutralize acid water drain-age from strip mining sites,

Acid drainage has long been a problem in Western Ken-tucky mining areas because of the high sulphur content of the coal in that part of the state.

State Reclamation Director Elmore Grim said the only method now used to handle acid drainage is holding the water in impoundments until heavy rain dilutes it enough to be discharged into the waterways. He added that the method is not satisfactory,

Grim said the Cyrus William Rice consulting firm of Pittsburg has been contracted to carry out a feasibility study on developing a portable device to improve acid

Once that study is com-pleted, Grim believes federal hinds can be obtained to de-velop the facility.

No one has yet developed a portable neutralization unit although Pennsylvania has been working on the problem for several years.

Grim said Pennsylvanth does have some neutralising opera-tions but they are for entire streams and cost millions of dollars to operate, Pennsyl-vanta also does not have as much strip mining as Ken-tucky does he added.

He said a portable unit, when developed, could be moved from pit to pit and treat water so it wouldn't con-tain acid when it is discharg-ed into streams.

# How Important Is Our Local Library?

The Rocksastle County Library Board this month asked the Rocksastle County Irbary Board this month asked the Rocksastle County for a small like in their tax levy percentage, Mrs. Majdra Randolph, one of the director's of the Library, explained to the Fincal Court that with their present levy the Library would once again go in the red in their operation without an increase, in spite on the tendence of the county of the Rocksastle of the Court was, to say the least, not encouraging about the increase and expressed doubt as to whether antocrease in the tax lavy would be approved by the Finance Dapt, at Frankfort. The library presently operates on a 1,2c per \$100 assessed value levy.

The Library has drawn up a bodget for 1971-72 of a little over \$8,000. This amount includes a salary for the librarian, a dilary for the bookmobile librarian, red, utilities, new books and various other items necessary to the operation of the library.

of the library.

This is not a large bodget, in fact, it is a very modest sum to pay for the many excellent services rendered by the Library and its very competent staff, most of which is volunteer work and given without charge to the taxpayer. Perhaps now might be a good time for those of us who use the Library to stop and analyze what this service means to us. Speaking personally, it was a great joy to me when we moved to this community aimost six years ago and ifound it attensively and so do choice, since there are an average of 12,000 books checked out mouthly. An increase in the tax levy for the Library would not be challenged by me at all and would in fact be encouraged and we think this is the feeling of everyone who uses it.

Without the public library and bookmobile, a tremendous reference source would be closed to us and our children. Without the library, many boring bours would be left us-filled by available reeding material, since many of us could not afford to buy outright the excellent selection of fletion and non-fiction novels available there. Without the library, many rilms used in instruction in the schools would not be

I could go on and on listing the advantages of the library but they are well known and it is unneccessary. The main point I am trying to make is that for the past several years, the library has had to borrow funds each years to operate on when their tax money ran out and this year will be no different. The bookmobile bus is on its last legs and seeds to be replaced but there are no funds.




