"I'm the candidate," says Lt. Gov. Wendell Ford.

"I'll go out early and stay out late. And I'll walk through the snow like I like it."

Ford's darts at Emberton who wants people whose thinking is in step with his in Democratic party and campaign headquarters when he hits the campaign trail.

Ford is a hard runner. And he doesn't want to be looking back over his shoulder.

Ford's differences with Shelby Kincaid, who's resigned as state Democratic chairman, were not all over financial party headquarters.

But Ford has absolute confidence in J.R. Miller, who's staid to be campaign chairman again, and Senator Dee Huddleston, who'll be campaign chairman. They're opposites but mesh easily.

Ford's first goal in the race for governor will be to heal any wounds from the primary—and from the Kincaid fracas.

And perhaps the most gracious of all in helping him has been the man he defeated, his one-time boss, former Gov. Bert Combs.

Ford credits his victory to early and thorough organization and "the tax issue," that tagged Combs with big school-money plans.

Although Republican Tom Emberton isn't likely to get in the same spot by endorsing the Kentucky Education Association package, Ford feels there will be an issue in the fall campaign.

He knows the first three cents of the sales tax came

In Combs' administration. But he thinks the two cents added in Gov. Louie Nunn's term have made the sales tax so regressive it hurts.

Ford's darts at Emberton who will jab mainly on the theme that he's a hand-picked candidate who's told what to do and what to say.

"I obviously can't go after his record—he hasn't got one," Ford says with good gleaming.

But he'll punch at what he considers soft spots in the Nunn record, especially growth of state government.

Ford's assessment of the mood of the people is simple: "They want someone to hold the line."

Emberton is fully aware of the problem of projecting himself as someone in his own right, not just the administration's man.

His first platform position statement was designed to begin the job without jarring the pace of a long campaign.

Emberton knows he must go beyond—if not against—Gov. Nunn's stand in some areas if only to show some independence.

But it must be handled like that tiger in the VW—carefully.

For example, Nunn says a severance tax could put Kentucky cost at a competitive disadvantage. But Emberton realizes it has become more than a money issue, an emotional one.

And emotion will beat money in a campaign every time.

Momay was already on the Republican side, and the effective arm-twisting for the Vice President award took place in Washington and New York, could make the campaign chest big enough to provide pensions for all hands if they lose.

Still, Ford won't be on the tight budget he was in the primary. It's no secret that many of the voters who backed Combs now are coming to the Ford camp flying a flag of peace—a green flag.

The professional poll in early 1970 that convinced Ford he could defeat Combs in the primary included this "observation":

"It is perhaps an over-stated word, but there is clearly a 'side' coming in, in which voters want new faces, new ideas, new candidates. No matter how good a governor Bert Combs may have been, the fact that he might be running again would probably work to his disadvantage. And ironically, it works to Ford's advantage that he is not as well known as Combs."

Ford, asked whether this advantage might tilt in Richardson's favor, said that for this race, "Embarton is Nuhn."

Embarton people say Combs backers describe the "Ford watch" as one that "runs like crazy—but you have to ask J.R. Miller what time it is."

ON DRUG ADDICTION IN THE MILITARY

As a member of the President's Commission on Marijuana and Drug Abuse, Kentucky's Fifth District Representative Tim Lee Carter is "vividly interested in the high rate of drug addiction in our nation today. Of particular concern to him are the young men serving in the military who have become addicts."

"It is no exaggeration to say that drug abuse in the military has reached epidemic proportions," he stated. "At least 80%, and undoubtedly many more, of the men in Vietnam habitually use marijuana and up to 10% of our personnel there use hard drugs."

He went on to say that "this 10% represents some 25,000 users of hard drugs who will eventually be turned out into our society with no hope for finding a solution to their problem. Among these are boys from the Fifth District who have come back to the United States from Vietnam as narcotics addicts. They have been given bad discharges, instead of finding help in trying to cure their addiction, they find that there is no place to turn."

Sunday afternoon, June 13, the Rockcastle Chapter DAR dedicated a bronze marker placed on the grave of Revolutionary soldier David Moore in the Moore Family Cemetery, which is located on the farm of Charles E. Mays near Bobtown.

Miss Janie Ramsey, Chapter Historian, presided with Michael Moore Ferguson of Louisville and William J. Henderson, Jr. of Mt. Vernon, descendants of David Moore, serving as flag bearers.

Mrs. John Lair, Chapter Chaplain, gave the invocation and Mrs. Raymond Powers, Chapter Treasurer, led the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.

Mrs. Wilson Evans, Vice President, explained the purpose of grave marking and Miss Janie Ramsey presented the guests. A READING, "The Flag," was given by Miss Laura Dickerson, Regent Kentucky Society, NSDAR and Mrs. Jon Henderson, Chapter, Vice-Regent and descendant of David Moore, gave a biography of David Moore. Master John Hodges Smith and Mrs. John Lair, descendants, unveiled the marker and placed the flag and Mrs. Paul Howard, Historical Kentucky Society NSDAR and Mrs. Elbert Eversole, Chapter Regent, dedicated the marker. A boxwood from the garden of General George Washington was presented by Mrs. V.G. Walker, Registrar Kentucky Society NSDAR and Mrs. Elbert Eversole, Regent, gave the benediction.

A brief biography of David Moore follows:
David Moore, son of Levi and Hannah Moore, was born September 17, 1758. As a young man of 18, he enlisted in Augusta County, Virginia and served in a Captain Kirk's Company commanded by Colonel Moffitt as Forage Master for the troops. He also served under Colonel McCary in the company of Captain Lowe. He took part in battles in Virginia and North Carolina. After the war David Moore married Miss Jane DePriest from Greenbrier, Virginia and they came to the frontier that would later become Kentucky to build their home and raise a family of nine children. Those children were Margaret F. Moore, Polly Moore, Jane Moore, Anna Moore, William DePriest Moore, David D. Moore, Levi Moore, Samuel E. Moore and George W. Moore. The Crawford family of Beckwithe County are descendants of his son Levi Moore.

As he prospered, David Moore began to replace the family's log cabin with a brick house, one of the first in this region. The house was not fully completed when Kentucky separated from Virginia, and it was left for one of his sons to complete this home begun in Virginia and finished in Kentucky. Thus the family homestead became known as "The Virginia House" and the last descendant of David Moore

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
