Emberton Platform...

Removal of Tax On Food

Tom Emberton said today he would "propose and actively support legislation that as remove the 5 per cent sales tax from food sold for home consumption" if elected Governor.

Emberton, a nominee for Governor in the November General Election, made the announcement at a series of press conferences held across the state. The first announcement was made at an early morning conference in Louisville.

Emberton pointed to the natural economic growth of the state; sound management and fiscal responsibility; instituting economies in state government; a proposed federal revenue sharing plan; a previously announced plan to create 200,000 new jobs in the state coupled with an improving national economy and a proposed severance tax on minerals as methods for continuing and expanding state

services after the tax is removed.

Citing "economics" as the greatest single concern of the citizens of Kentucky, Emberton said "I am convinced that state government must have a heart as well as a brain. It must care, as well as act. It must be concerned, not merely competent."

The economic issue is one that has been raised in our public hearings all across the state in recent months," he said.

Emberton said that those given the opportunity to leadership must do everything possible to make the family dollar go further," Emberton added.

Discussing a proposed severance tax on minerals he noted that the value of minerals extracted in Kentucky rose 38 per cent in 1970, as compared with a six per cent increase in food expenditures.

The gubernatorial nominee said "We can realistically expect that normal growth in state revenue will provide approximately \$160 million in the first two years of our administration."

"It is clear the state will have a substantial surplus for the present year," he added.

"We are proud to come to the people of Kentucky, not with the old political shell game of promising no new taxes," Emberton said, "but with the sincere pledge that we will lift a severe tax burden from the people."

Emberton concluded, "We offer more than a promise. We offer evidence of how tax relief can come and how the development of our state can

continue."

Jim Host, nominee for Lt. Governor, in a brief statement said Governor Louie Nunn had presented an opportunity for tax relief in the 1970 session of the legislature and "the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House responded by raising taxes; by raising interest rates and by robbing the Teacher's Retirement Fund."

"Let them decay," Host said, "but during the last 12 years they have been associated with every tax increase put on the people of Kentucky."

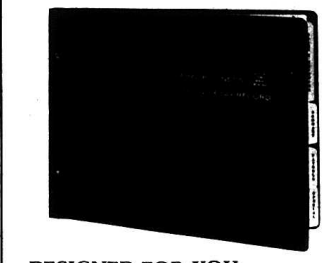

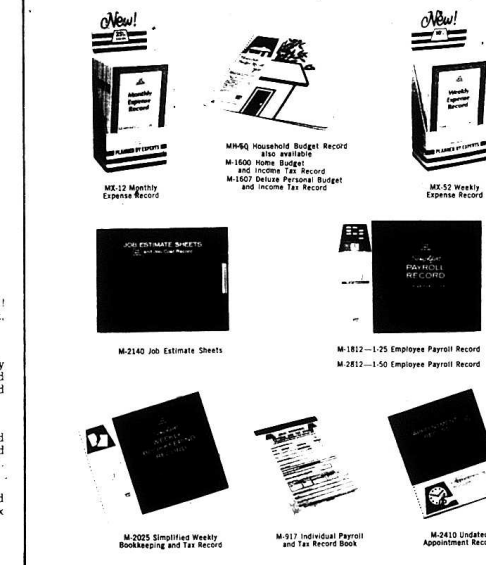

The tourist season is on. Just ask Albert Christian.

The dollar-conscious state finance commissioner can tell by the number of travel requests from state employees wanting to go anywhere from Maine to Miami or San Juan, Puerto Rico.

"It's always a damn workshop," Christian growls. And he blames "Washington bureaucrats" for setting many of them up simply to have a pleasant outing—and an audience.

But what grips him most is that a single state agency will try to send a half-dozen employees to the same meeting at a spot obviously not chosen for easy access but attractions.

"Have you ever been to Bebel, Maine?" he asked. "It's just a resort. And four or five people want to go up there at once."

Christian battles these requests one by one. An agency wanting to send seven employees to a meeting in Miami cut back to three after Christian challenged the deal.

But the problem has reached such proportions that Gov. Louie Bunn did some pretty stern talking on the subject at a recent cabinet meeting.

It's at the stage where Christian talks wryly of travel requests he can almost feel coming.

"I haven't had one for Hawaii for some time."

Capitol Digest

A long-range study of the state's Minimum Foundation Program is underway to evaluate the program through which the state finances its public schools.

The study by the state Department of Education will be conducted over the next three years by 17 different subcommittees. Each will study one facet of the 15-year-old program. Each subcommittee is composed of educators, plus one Department of Education staff member to furnish technical data.

James Melton, assistant state superintendent of public instruction in charge of finance and administration and Joe Alsin, director of the Education Department's finance division are co-chairmen of the study. Study coordinator is James Sandlin, of Frankfort.

Melton said the study's recommendations will be ready for the 1974 General Assembly.

He said that after the subcommittee completes their work, their recommendations will be evaluated by a not-yet appointed citizens advisory committee.

In addition, University of Kentucky consultants will study regional differences in school support and necessary local effort.

The 17 areas to be studied are capital outlay, compensatory education, current expense, differential staffing, exceptional children, extended school year, growth factor, incentive programs, kindergarten, merit pay for teachers, para-professional support, pupil-teacher ratio, pupil transportation, teacher certi-

OVER-USERS HALVED IN TEST

The Kentucky Medicaid pilot project that "locked in" 36 recipients identified as over-users has reduced by almost one-half the cost of their physician and pharmacy services.

Data compiled by the state Department of Health showed that before the project started, the average monthly cost of services for the 36 recipients was \$96.86, compared with a total program average of \$15.99.

Charles S. Walker, administrative director of the Health Department's Division of Medical Care, said the average monthly cost for a recipient "locked in" to one doctor and one pharmacy has dropped to \$46.51 since the project began Jan. 1.

Walker said the project will continue another six months in the original 10 counties. They include Jefferson, Boyd, Magoffin, Johnson, Lee, Pike, Letcher, Knox, Harlan, and Bell.

Walker said the "locked in" recipients received the same medical care as they did before the project began.

GOVERNOR SAYS COLLEGES MUST RULE OWN CAMPUSES
The responsibility of writing campus regulations and seeing that they are obeyed rests with administrators of America's colleges, Governor Nun said recently.

Speaking at a conference in Louisville of the National Assn. of College and University Attorneys, the governor said the American university system "is going to be destroyed" unless administrators exercise a firm hand in dealing with potential disturbances.

Nun said some colleges have lost sight of their duty to educate and have become centers of lawlessness and forums for irresponsible opinions.

However, he said he believes this trend is passing because of the influence of more students on the campus.

The right of the majority of students to get an education must be protected, he said.

"Until the students attain some degree of education or degree of maturing judgment, we as administrators and officials will have to provide the rules and regulations."

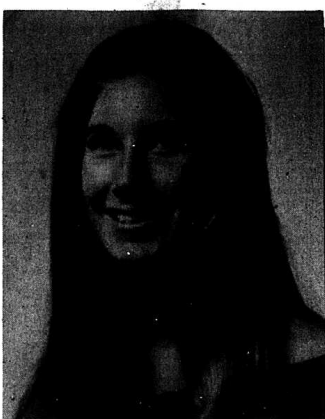
