Clyde Eugene Hasty, Jr. Victim of Car Wreck

Clyde Eugene Hasty, Jr., 36, of Mt. Vernon, became Rockcastle County's fourth traffic fatality of the year Friday night when he was killed in a two-car collision on Ky. 461 about 8 miles south of Mt. Vernon.

Hasty was a passenger in a car driven by Roman McFerron, 48, of Mt. Vernon. McFerron and another passenger, Estill Alcorn, 25, also of Mt. Vernon, both received Class A injuries. McFerron is a patient at the University of Kentucky Medical Center in Lexington and Alcorn is a patient at the Central Baptist Hospital in Lexington. Mr. Hasty was dead on arrival at the local hospital.

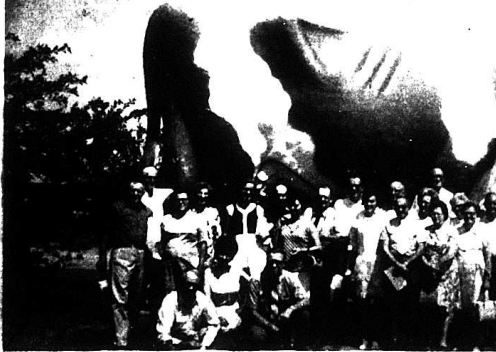
Boyd Hoover Morrow, 42, Route 4, Monticello, driver of the other vehicle involved, was treated at the local hospital for Class A injuries and released.

According to State Police reports, the accident occurred when Mr. Morrow, who was traveling south on Ky 461, attempted to negotiate a sharp right-hand curve and crossed a double-yellow line into the northbound lane in which the McFerron automobile was traveling.

Mr. Morrow has been charged with involuntary manslaughter and is free on \$3,000 bond. Mr. Hasty was born in Rockcastle County February 17, 1935, the son of Eugene and Gertrude Capps Hasty, and was a heavy equipment operator. He is survived by his wife, Rosella McFerron Hasty of Mt. Vernon, two sons, Larry and Gary Hasty, both at home; one daughter, Kathy Hasty, also at home; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Eugene Hasty, both of Route 1, Brodhead; and two brothers, Billy and E.J. Hasty.

County-Wide Waste Collection Subject of Development Meeting

County-wide solid waste collection and disposal will be the subject of a public meeting sponsored by the Rockcastle County Development Association on July 26 at 7:30 p.m. at the County Courthouse.

The meeting will feature an explanation of a recently completed plan for elimination of open dumping through provision of rural collection and sanitary landfills to serve as waste disposal sites for several counties.

The Plan for Rockcastle County includes sharing a large collection truck with Laurel County. This truck would be specially equipped to empty large steel waste containers placed along the roadside. Approximately 80 containers of four cubic-yard capacity would be placed at 42 locations throughout Rockcastle County. Such containers equals 16 barrels. The Collector Plan also includes a smaller collection truck which could collect from garbage cans at each house in the Cities of Brodhead and Mt. Vernon and also serve anyone near these Cities who would be willing to pay an additional fee. This small truck would be equipped with a compactation mechanism and a detachable container. Several of these containers would be provided, so that when one container became full it could be detached as a "transfer point" and an empty container could be put on. These full contain-

ers would be emptied by the large truck and the waste carried to the sanitary landfill, along with material from many other containers. It is proposed that both Rockcastle and Laurel Counties utilize an existing sanitary landfill, located near East Bernstadt in Laurel County.

The yearly operating cost to rural residents for such collection and disposal system would be approximately \$3.50 per person (less than one cent per day). House-to-house service (garbage can pick-up) would cost approximately \$4.95 per person per year, or less than two cents a day for each person served.

Applications Needed For Regular Housing Units

Applications are still needed for the regular 20-units of the Municipal Housing Project off of Town Hill, according to Jess Bullock, Executive Director for the Housing Authority of Mt. Vernon.

"There seems to be some confusion in the minds of people about whether they can work and live in this project," Mr. Bullock said, "and, of course, whether a person works or not has no actual bearing on his qualifications for an apartment, the only determining factor is income and number of dependents."

A standard scale for income and dependents, prepared by the federal government, to help define eligibility reads as follows:

One person in a family can make \$100 a year and be eligible; two persons, \$4,000; three persons, \$4,800; four persons, \$4,800; five persons, \$4,800; six persons, \$5,000; eight persons, \$5,100; nine persons, \$5,200; and ten or more persons in a family, \$5,300.

In addition to this scale, each family receives a deduction of \$300 for each dependent living in the home and a standard 5% deduction. This means that an average family of four, making \$500, after the \$300 deduction for each dependent and the 5% allowance, would be eligible for an apartment and would pay approximately \$70 per month, which includes utilities.

The apartments should ready within approximately sixty days. You may make application every Monday, Wednesday and Friday in the office of the Housing Authority of Mt. Vernon in the Courthouse from 2:30 p.m. to 4:30 p.m.

includes utilities (excepting telephone and television cable).

Of course, the number of bedrooms a family is eligible for is not determined by the number of dependents in a family. For example, a very large family with an income of \$2000 after deductions could be eligible for the largest apartment (four bedrooms and two baths) at a rent of \$40 per month, which would also include their utilities. There is a stove and refrigerator furnished with each apartment.

What it boils down to is that the source of income a family has (welfare, aid to dependent children, social security, a regular job, etc.) doesn't matter. The amount of income and number of dependents determines eligibility.

There is also still an opening for maintenance men for both projects (the ten-units for the elderly and the twenty regular units). This job would entail some plumbing and electrical work, moving lawn, painting, etc. The pay can be worked out by the hour or by the month and the person would have his choice of apartments in either unit for a nominal cost which would include the utilities.

The apartments should ready within approximately sixty days. You may make application every Monday, Wednesday and Friday in the office of the Housing Authority of Mt. Vernon in the Courthouse from 2:30 p.m. to 4:30 p.m.

Commissioner Dale Farabee has a hairy problem.
Not just the length of his own locks, although Dr. Farabee's hair is growing beyond the usual Nunn administration image.

But the commissioner of mental health does get plenty of stuff about some of his long-haired employees.

They include those trying to break new ground in the fight against drug abuse—trying to communicate with the abusers.

And if you don't think there's a problem in Kentucky take a look at the money the federal government is sending to help.

It's putting several million dollars into a "shotgun approach." Dr. Farabee says will attack the drug problem at all levels.

But he knows this means some money simply must be "wasted."

The thing is he doubts anyone can say what's waste until Kentucky tangles with something that we'd like to figure.

The trouble is that it just won't go away.

And solutions aren't easy. "They want simple answers to a complicated problem," says Dr. Farabee. "There just aren't any."

But Dr. Farabee does hold out some valid hope for the programs.

For example, an educational program started as a type of "hot operation" has handled 196 cases—196 people. And only three have been back in trouble.

"Busted" if you will. To a parent those odds seem good.

And if Dr. Farabee and his staff need long hair to communicate with youngsters trapped by drugs, let it grow.

And if money has to be "wasted" to do what works, let it flow. It might be your child who's saved—or mine.

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THE FAMILY LAWYER

Free Speech: The Outer Limits

At a large public meeting not long ago, about 25 dissenters stationed themselves near the back of the hall to heckle the speaker. Shouting slogans in unison, they made him almost inaudible to many members of the audience.

Someone asked an usher whether or anything could be done. "Not a thing," replied gloomily. "They're exercising their freedom of speech under the Constitution."

But the usher was wrong about the Constitution. He was making the all-too-common mistake of thinking that whatever is oral is lawful. The freedom of speech guaranteed by the Constitution does not mean that at all. Many kinds of oral conduct are unlawful.

Here are some examples:

- 1) a moviegoer, just for kicks, yells that the theater is on fire.
- 2) an envious spinster falsely informs the man next door that his wife is having an affair with the milkman.
- 3) a hardware dealer, selling a sledgehammer, tells a defective, tells the customer it is safe.
- 4) a drunk warbles "Sweet Adeline" outside a hospital window at midnight.

Each of these actions is oral—and each is unlawful. Furthermore, they are unlawful when the Constitution was adopted. So is the deliberate disruption of a public meeting, whether by shouting slogans or blowing whistles or ringing cowbells.

What the Constitution does guarantee is the freedom that really counts: the freedom to express and advocate ideas, however unpopular.

In fact, it is to safeguard this primary freedom that the law imposes reasonable limits on the time, place, and manner of speech. Judge Curtis Bok once put the matter in a nutshell:

"In the whole history of law and order, the longest step forward was taken by primitive man when, as if by common consent, the tribe sat down in a circle and allowed only one man to speak at a time."

It is this kind of common sense that enables a free society to function. It is the law that is all about.
