## Early Morning Fire Damages City Cafe

A fire, early Tuesday morning did extensive damage to the City Cafe building located on Main Street in Mt. Vernon. Jack Flash, a lodger in the building, just escaped with his life after the fire had trapped him in a room upstairs over the cafe. He came through a window and down a ladder just seconds before the room where he had been sleeping was completely engulfed with flames.

The fire reportedly began in a room occupied by Dave McMullin also upstairs, and was started in by him at an alarm box on Main Street. Two other men, who also lived above the restaurant escaped unhurt.

## BOND SALES ARE \$10,778 FOR JUNE

The citizens of Rockcastle County bought \$10,778 of Series E and H Savings Bonds and Notes during June. Sales for the six month period totaled \$4,518,189 and cumulative sales for the first six months totaled \$31,059,834 or 81.8% of the annual goal of \$37,940,000. This is an increase of \$2,230,623 over last year's year ago which were \$28,829,211.

# 1971-72 General Budget Is \$1,614,478 For Schools

The general budget of the Rockcastle County School System, recently compiled by the school superintendent's office, estimates that expenditures will be \$1,614,478 for the period from July 1, 1971 through June 30, 1972. This year's budget is up \$162,058 over last year's figure of \$1,452,420.

The largest expenditure in the budget is \$1,045,000 which has been allocated for instruction in the form of salaries for principals, supervisors, regular classroom teachers, clerical staff, etc.

Pupil transportation for the school year has been estimated at \$170,000. This includes salaries of bus drivers and other employees in the transportation system, plus fuel, repair parts, insurance and bus replacement.

Operation of the school plants including custodial services, utilities, contractual services, salaries, has been set at \$71,000, while maintenance of the plants and grounds, repairs and replacements has been fixed at \$20,000.

## \$170,000 Grant Made For Mental Health Bldg.

Senators John Sherman Cooper and Marlow Cook and Fifth District Representative Timmie Carter announced today that the Southeastern Kentucky Mental Health-Mental Retardation Board will receive a federal grant of \$170,000 from the Appalachian Regional Commission for assistance in the construction of a mental health facility in Corbin.

The new facility, they said, will serve Clay, Jackson, Knox, Letcher, Wayne and Whitley counties and will house administrative and other non-patient treatment programs operated by Southeastern Kentucky Mental Health-Mental Retardation in serving the mentally ill and mentally retarded.

Total cost of the project is \$400,000. The Appalachian Regional Commission is supplying 45% with the National Institute of Mental Health furnishing 25%, and the State and local sources contributing the remainder.

Attendance services, making up salaries of director of operation, school social worker, secretarial and clerical and travel expenses, has been allocated \$12,500.

Flood charges will amount to \$24,898. This includes social security payments, insurance, fidelity bonds, employee insurance and rentals. Capital outlay for the year will amount to \$80,000 and debt service (on the new high school and Roundstone School) will amount to \$172,000. The indebtedness on the Broadhead School was paid off from the 1970-71 budget.

Grand total of all estimated receipts for the 1970-71 school year coincides with the expenditure budget of \$1,614,478, with revenue expected from the following sources: Balance on hand, \$11,037.85; general taxes, \$159,836.00; bank shares, \$5,190.00; poll taxes, \$4,800.00. These receipts from local sources will be reduced by \$100,000 by the following deductions: cost of tax collections, \$70,000.00; operations, \$400.00; delinquencies, \$400.00 and discounts, \$3,200.00.

The school board also expects to receive \$138.35 from previous tax delinquencies, \$2,000.00 from rental of school facilities, and \$185 from all other revenue receipts.

Receipts from all sources other than local will amount to (estimated): Foundation Program Fund, \$1,313,828.00; other state aid, \$2,000.00; Public Law 864 (Title III and VA), \$4,500.00; Public Law 89-10 (ESEA Title II), \$4,000.00 and Public Law 874, \$20,000.00.

Total estimated income from sources other than district taxation, \$1,366,478. Grand total of all estimated receipts, \$1,614,478.00.

## School Board Meets

The Rockcastle County Board of Education met Monday night for their regular monthly meeting and opened bids for furniture and reading lab equipment for the Title I classrooms in the new high school.

The low bids for the furniture and reading lab equipment were submitted by Central School Supply and Fadden Film Company; Southern Belle and Chapin's Dairies for the equal prices on the one-half pint of milk and were both awarded bids with Southern Belle getting Broadhead, Mt. Vernon and Maple Grove and Chappella getting Livingston, Roundstone and remaining rural schools and Jerry's Tire Center was awarded the bid for school buses.

Also during the meeting, the board accepted a change order on the new high school which would bring the Home Economics Department in line with the State Department of Education's program necessitating \$1,012 in additional plumbing approved a \$1,614,478 general budget (the budget had been approved on the state level) approved eight substitute teachers for the 1971-72 school year: Cola Grace Wilson, Jeanine Cummins, Jane Smith, Elizabeth Mullins, Lucille Purcell, Lucille Parkerson, Deborah Wallace and Michael Bryant; agreed to allow Mrs. Lena Rucker, custodian at Roundstone, to rent the grounds located on school grounds and approved the use of buses for the Shrine Circus.

## Official Control Program Established By Board

The Rockcastle County Board of Education has established a driver control system for all bus drivers in the county school system. The program is a result of a regular meeting of the board.

State Farm finally agreed to insure the buses for a yearly premium of \$3,305.50 (up \$200.72) over the 1970-71 premium. If the board would establish the driver-control program.

airn't LIFE GRAND REFILLING the label is good Insecticides, like aspirin, automobiles and electricity, can be fatal when misused. Yet, when used according to manufacturer's label directions with observation of proper safety precautions, they become invaluable tools. Invaluable because the proper use of insecticides is essential to our production of a safe, abundant food supply.

The hazard to health is becoming more of a problem due to the major shift from the persistent chlorinated hydrocarbon insecticides to the more acutely toxic organophosphate and carbamate insecticides. It seems we all must develop

better insecticide safety habits. The following suggestions apply to weed and gardeners as well as farmers.

**Suggestion One: READ THE LABEL.** On each insecticide container before each use. Note all warnings and precautionary statements. Follow specific directions for application. An extra moment spent reading the label will mean more effective insect control and a greater margin of safety to you.

**Suggestion Two: Insecticides should be stored in their original containers, away from food and feed, and under lock and key.**

**Suggestion Three: Dispose of empty containers properly.** Suggestion Four: It would be easy to prevent most insecticide accidents—we could develop better safety and usage habits. Although we recognize prevention as the best treatment for poisonings, we must also know how to react to the freak accident which can happen even to the most cautious. Knowledge of symptoms, antidotes and nearby treatment centers could save lives.

You can drive hoppers out of the grass much easier than from your tobacco patches. By the time they get into your tobacco they are tall, grassy, hardy, and starved.

Starved because we have destroyed their food supply by moving the grass and tobacco patch, or mother nature's dry spell has made it less succulent than the tobacco.

In any event the time to Control Grasshoppers is before they move onto our tobacco. Most hoppers are still in the nymphal (immature) sta-

### Hunting & Fishing

Fishing for trout below a number of Kentucky impoundments is increasing in many areas during the hot summer days. It's increasing because from these swift waters good catches of rainbow may be made. Trout in other waters are at the boiling point.

For most species the August fisherman must usually try his luck at night, late afternoon or very early morning. But in the tailwaters the trout can be caught throughout the day and this new-type fishing is catching on fast in many sections.

A few years ago if a fisherman told you he was going trout fishing, you probably would have ignored him. Any person with average fishing sense knew that trout fishing in Kentucky (at that time) was not to be nothing.

Oh, a few stocked trout could be caught from scattered cool streams, but these were usually bonus fish caught incidental to other fishing. And at that time trout stocking was meager simply because trout were hard to come by.

But then the Department of Fish and Wildlife expanded its trout stocking program to include the tailwaters of a number of dams. Rainbows had been placed in the areas below Wolf Creek Dam, which impounds Lake Cumberland, for a number of years. They had survived in good numbers and were caught readily by many fishermen. The trout thrived in the other waters, too, and the fish that were stocked as eight-inch scrappers had soon turned into three-to-five-pound brualers.

Now a person may go trout fishing in the tailwaters of Nolli, Rough River, Buckhorn, Fairtrap and Grayson lakes. In addition to Lake Cumberland, and be almost assured of picking up a mess of trout. If the waters are high and muddy, of course, he is out of luck, but that's true of any kind of fishing.

Less productive, perhaps, but still offering trout fishing as the purists demand are a number of streams that have been stocked. They were stocked only after a survey conducted by the Department showed water temperatures well within the rainbow's range.

These tests went on for many years and streams that no one had dreamed of as possible trout waters were found to be very conducive to this species of fish. So they were stocked and are restocked several times a year and the fishermen are benefiting.

A total of 95 creeks are now in the trout stocking category. In addition, based on the success of stocking Lake Cumberland itself, several other lakes now are receiving trout and producing good fishing. Those stocked in the past few years are Herring Run, Mill Creek, Campion, Bert Cumber, Kingdom Come and Dale Hollow. They have all water qualities sufficient for healthy trout.
