Hobert Brown, 73, Killed By Truck

Hobert Brown, 73, of Route 3, Crab Orchard (in Rockcastle County) was fatally injured early Saturday morning, August 21, when he was struck by a truck in front of his home on U.S. 150 about 7 and 5/10 miles west of Mt. Vernon.

According to State Police reports, Mr. Brown had been to his mailbox, located across the road from his home, and had turned to walk back across the road when he stepped in front of a truck, driven by James Vernon Wood, 41, of Stanford, Wood, who was traveling east on U.S. 150, told police that he was traveling about 45 m.p.h. at the time of the accident. He (Wood) stated that when he was about 75 feet from Mr. Brown that he (Brown) turned and started across the road in front of him. Wood said he cut to the left in an attempt to avoid Mr. Brown, however, Wood told police that Mr. Brown apparently still did not see him and continued on across the road. The point of impact was three feet from the center line in the westbound lane. After impact, the truck proceeded 82 feet into a ditch and overturned on the edge of the road. Wood received Class C injuries.

Mr. Brown was born in Rockcastle County February 23, 1898, the son of the late David S. and Alice Southard Brown, and was a member of the Providence Church of Christ.

Survivors are his wife, Mrs. May Brown of Brookhead, one daughter, Mrs. Bonnie Hancock of Brookhead; two sons, David Brown and Eddie Brown, both of Brookhead; one sister, Mrs. Myrtle Anderson of Crab Orchard; three brothers, Jim Brown and Dan Brown, both of Crab Orchard and Brad Brown

of Lockland, Ohio and seven grandchildren. Funeral services were held Monday, August 23 at the Brookhead Baptist Church with Bro. John Zupancic officiating. Burial was in the Piney Grove Cemetery.

Southern Corn Blight Again Plagues County

Farmers are now experiencing a return of Southern Corn Leaf Blight disease in Rockcastle County. Even though the disease has been detected on most corn fields in the county, it is by no means in the epidemic stage since only an estimated one percent loss in grain caused by the disease has been reported. At this time last year, the county suffered a 12 to 15 percent loss of grain from the disease which is caused by the fungus Helminthosporium maydis and develops on the ear and stalk.

One of the major concerns in addition to the leaf blight phase is that the ear and stalk rot which can lead to several complications. The fungus can go through the husk and eventually cause deterioration of the grain. Usually

Info Center on Economics Is County ASCS Office

All residents of Rockcastle County may obtain answers to questions on operation and interpretation of the Presidential order of Aug. 15 on prices, rents, wages and salaries from the Rockcastle County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) office, according to Shellie Mullins, Chairman of the County ASCS Committee.

County ASCS Offices throughout the United States have been chosen as information centers to answer questions from all citizens on President Nixon's Executive Order which is designed to stem inflation and strengthen the national economy. The Rockcastle County ASCS Office is receiving official answers to questions concerning the President's action, and any person in Rockcastle County who wants or needs precise information should get in touch with the County Office, Mr. Mullins said.

The Rockcastle County ASCS Office is located in the County Courthouse on the first floor in Mt. Vernon. The mailing address is Box 125, Mt. Vernon, Ky. 40456. The telephone number is 254-2522. In charge of the office is Harold Ballinger, County Executive Director. The office has a staff of 2 persons, Emma Shutta, and Marguerite Harris.

"Ours and all ASCS offices throughout the nation, will function as information centers in all locations outside of highly urbanized areas," Mr. Mullins said.

County ASCS offices are not to handle complaints or appeals, he said. They will serve only to provide official information. Persons with complaints will register them with the most convenient district or sub-district office of the Internal Revenue Service.

"Neither will interpretations or guesses be made by ASCS county office people. They will answer only those questions for which they have been supplied answers. If they don't

know the answer to a specific question, they will say so. If a member of the public wants the county office to obtain an answer, the questions will go by phone or mail to the nearest IRS district office," Mr. Mullins said.

Check Serial Numbers For Contaminated Soup

The Campbell Soup Co. is recalling all chicken vegetable soup packed at its Paris, Texas plant and shipped to Kentucky and 15 other states. The company said botulism contamination was found in the soup but added that it had no reports of any illness.

The local health department was contacted by phone Tuesday by the State Health Department and requested to notify the news media and local grocers of the serial number on the batch of soup which was contaminated. The health department said Wednesday that all grocery stores in the area had been notified and any cans bearing the serial number of the contaminated soup had already been picked up by representatives of the Campbell Soup Company.

However, local health officials are also asking that everyone in the area check their shelves for any cans of Campbell chicken vegetable soup bearing the serial number 07,013,701A. If any of these cans are found, the label should be removed from the can and the contents burned. A refund may be obtained by mailing the label, along with your name and address to Campbell Soup Co., Paris, Texas.

Campbell estimated that slightly more than 2,000 cases of contaminated soup, 48 cans to a case, are still in circulation but estimated that they have picked up about 56 percent of the product.

Rep. DeMarcus Attends Conference

Representative W.H. DeMarcus of Stanford attended the National Conference of Legislative Leaders in Minneapolis, Minnesota, which began August 16 and ran through August 20. Participants met with federal, local, other state officials, and civic leaders on many topics of current interest-including education reform, public employee relations, consumer protection, transportation, health insurance, mayors and the legislature, criminal justice, and innovations in the legislative process.

Guest speakers appearing at the Conference included Vice-President Agnew, Chief Justice Burger, Senator Muskie, Secretary of the Treasury John Connolly and Ralph Nader.

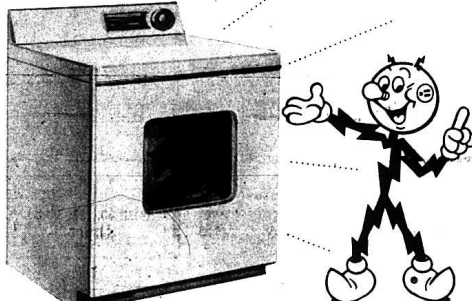
"RAMBLINGS" (Cont. From Front)

ATTENTION FARMERS

If you don't lime it, why plant it

Why Soils Need Lime

Only a few crops grow well on acid soils because they require calcium and magnesium which are replaced by applications of agricultural limestone. This material not only corrects the soil acidity, but also supplies the plants with the needed calcium and frequently magnesium.

Soil pH, which is a measure of the acidity or alkalinity of the soil, affects the availability of all elements which influence crop production. An application of liming material to an acid soil increases the availability of plant nutrients which are important to crop production. Among these are nitrogen, phosphate and others. Liming reduces luxury uptake of potash by the plants and reduces the availability of aluminum and iron manganese which are harmful to plants if they are present in sufficient quantities in the soil. Liming also helps increase the number and activity of beneficial soil bacteria. It helps improve the physical condition of the soil by supplying the calcium needed by leguminous crops to increase their growth. It increases root development and permeability of the soil.

Lime is the most economical factor involved in crop production on most soils in the humid areas, as they are acid in varying degrees. The application of needed fertilizers is also one of the most economical factors in crop production. The wise use of water - both rainfall and irrigation - still remains another factor involving crop production. However, the one which is most frequently by-passed is the application of agricultural limestone and this is the first step in a sound fertility program on most soils in the humid area. Failure to apply this material limits crop production and wastes fertilizer dollars as well as the producer's capital investment and his labor in crop production. To get a better picture of soil needs, a soil test made by an accredited laboratory is recommended.

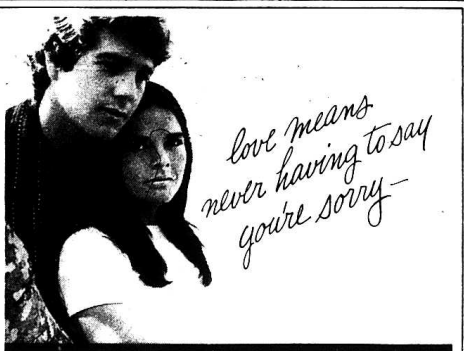

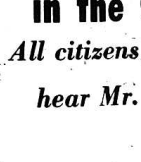

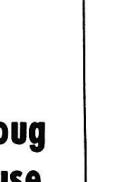

Mayor Winstead Names Sept. Arthritis Month

Mayor Edd Winstead today proclaimed the month of September as Arthritis Month and urged Rockcastle Countians to support the 1971 fund-raising Victory Campaign of the Kentucky Chapter of The Arthritis Foundation.

Victory over arthritis is the ultimate goal, the mayor said, and he appealed to volunteers and contributors to work together as a Victory Team against the disease.

Mayor Winstead called attention to the campaign catchphrase, "Arthritis is living hell."

"This statement represents a shocking truth for many many people in Kentucky," he said. "The public should appreciate that arthritis is not just a minor nuisance, but a serious and often crippling affliction. It takes a double toll on our people."

He pointed out that in addition to its toll in human suffering, arthritis causes a devastating drain on the economy both nationally and locally. "When you add up the costs of medical care, lost wages, welfare payments and other expenses due to arthritis throughout the country, it comes to annual economic loss of more than \$3.6 billion. Every Taxpayer pays his share," the mayor said.

In endorsing the Kentucky Chapter of The Arthritis Foundation's drive, he cited setbacks in funds for research on chronic diseases like arthritis as a special reason for greater support. He described contributions to the Arthritis Victory Campaign as "a four-fold service to your neighbor, to yourself, to your country and to your country."

The mayor emphasized the importance of reaching and surpassing the Victory Campaign goal, citing national research and educational needs and the necessity for improved care for arthritis victims.

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MOORE MEMBER OF INSPECTION TEAM

Herman Moore, Rockcastle County Health Department Sanitarian, has been chosen as a member of the 15-man inspection team of State and local Sanitariums covering the 1971 State Fair, August 19-28, in Louisville.

The team is under the direction of E. P. Conyers, Program Director for the State Health Department's Environmental Services.

The team will begin Wednesday checking to see that the food booths are set up in compliance with state regulations. During the ten days of the fair, the team's duties consist of daily inspections of all food concessions (some 122), all trucks bringing in food supplies to the concessions and all restroom facilities.

The team will also investigate nuisance complaints such as garbage and trash problems and animal bites. To expedite prompt handling of complaints, the team will use two walkie-talkies to speed up investigations.

Coverage will be provided by State and local Sanitariums from 9 a. m. to 11 p. m. during the ten days of the fair, covering some 20 acres under roof and "about five times that much acreage outside."

Conyers said that the State Fair is a tradition of long standing with the State Department of Health and local Health Departments. Team members vary from year to year and include both experienced and new Sanitariums.

"The fair is a good public relations course - learning how to get along with people and getting the job done," Conyers said. "For the new men, these inspections help to develop their self-confidence and enable them to do a better job when they go back home."

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
