THE FAMILY LAWYER

Classroom Copycat

Scene: a college classroom. The professor is delivering a lecture on philosophy. Most of his listeners are paying only intermittent attention to his pearls of wisdom.

But one alert young man is zealously taking down every word. For he has a great idea. He will gather the lectures together, publish them in book form, and then sell them to students who are less energetic than he is.

Could the professor block the young man's project if he so desired? This question arose long ago when a professor actually did go to court against a classroom copycat. He claimed that publication of the lectures would violate his "common law copyright."

The defendant retorted that the professor had lost the copyright by uttering his words in

public, thereby making them "free for all."

But the court sided with the professor and granted him an injunction. The court pointed out that he had spoken not to the general public, for general use, but to a limited group for limited use.

Other courts have agreed that a professor does not lose his common law copyright merely by delivering lectures to his students. By the same token, a minister probably retains rights in his sermons after delivering them to his congregation.

However, a copyright generally protects only the mode of expression, not the information itself. For example:

A professor of medicine complained in court that a new book contained certain details about surgery that he had described in his lectures.

But it turned out that the book did not use the professor's language at all—and used his data only in combination with material taken from other sources. The court decided that the common law copyright had no grounds for complaint. The court said he could not, simply by stating facts out loud, gain a monopoly on those facts for himself.

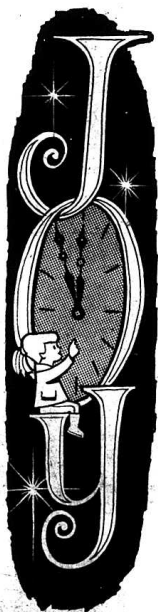

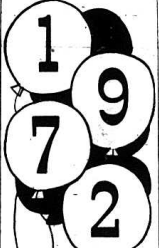

Medicare Deductible Will Be \$68, Starting Jan. 1

Starting January 1, 1972, the deductible under the Medicare hospital insurance program will be \$68, according to social security officials here.

"This means that the Medicare patient admitted to the hospital after December 31 will be responsible for the first \$68 of the hospital bill," a social security spokesman said.

The deductible is \$60 now. "The \$8 increase in the deductible is the result of a review of hospital costs during 1970," the spokesman said.

Under the Medicare law, the deductible must be adjusted to keep the amount in line with the average cost of one day's stay in the hospital.

The present deductible of \$60 will remain in effect for all Medicare hospital admissions during the remainder of this year. Any Medicare patient admitted to the hospital on or before December 31 will be responsible for the first \$60 of his bill.

"Because of the increase in hospital costs," the social security spokesman said,

"three other increases in the amount patients pay under Medicare hospital insurance program are required, beginning January 1."

For hospital stays of more than 60 days, he said, the Medicare patient will pay \$17 a day, instead of \$15, for the 61st through the 90th day.

For a post-hospital stay of more than 20 days in an extended care facility, the patient will pay \$8.50 a day, instead of \$7.50, for the 21st through the 100th day.

For "lifetime reserve" days, the patient will pay \$34, instead of \$30, for each day used.

The 1971 rates will remain in effect for people whose benefit periods under Medicare started before the end of this year," the spokesman said.

Among other factors, the beginning of a benefit period depends on when a Medicare patient was first admitted to the hospital. There's more information about benefit periods in *Your Medicare Handbook*. Or anyone with questions can call any social security office.



ing) on his first official visit to the draft board office.

The key to whether a young man remains in an available class or is classified "1-B" is the "lottery" and the national cutoff number. A combination of a high "lottery" number and a low national cutoff number would be a virtual guarantee of draft immunity provided the trend for a small armed force continues.

Another recent change allows young men to register 30 days before reaching 18 or 30 days after their 18th birthday.

Finally, we have some verbal orchids for 200 men who are "graduates" from the Selective Service System. The amended law does not provide for appeal agents and all such appointments were terminated Dec. 10. And, a person can no longer serve on a local or appeal board after age 65 or 20 years of tenure, whichever occurs first.

The sustained contribution of those dedicated Kentuckians affected by the two provisions will not be soon forgotten. SOME CAR OWNERS ENTITLED TO REFUND
Kentucky owners of passenger cars purchased and licensed between Aug. 16, 1971, and Dec. 11, 1971, are entitled to a usage tax refund on the amount of federal excise tax paid at the time of licensing.

The refund is also applicable to owners of light-duty trucks purchased between September 23, 1971 and December 11, 1971.

The seven per cent Federal Excise Tax on new passenger vehicles and the 10 per cent Federal Excise Tax on new light-duty trucks having a gross weight of 10,000 pounds or less were repealed effective Dec. 11. The state usage tax is based on five per cent of the excise tax.

Application for the refund must be sent to the Motor Vehicle Tax Division, Department of Revenue. A refund application will be distributed to county court clerks, to be completed and sent to the Revenue Department along with the check stub from the federal refund.

When a refund is approved by the Motor Vehicle - Tax Division, a refund voucher will be prepared and the State Treasurer to write a refund check, which will be mailed directly to the taxpayer.

Traffic Accidents Fatal To Three In Short Period

Two Laurel County men and a twelve-year-old Pulaski County boy lost their lives on Rockcastle County roads Tuesday and Wednesday in traffic accidents. The three deaths raised the number of traffic fatalities in Rockcastle County to ten for the year.

William E. Woodall, 49, and his son, Rocco Woodall, 59, were both killed instantly Monday shortly after noon when their car collided with a truck driven by Ellis Gregory, 21, of Sidal. The accident happened on Ky 80 at Billows near Laurel County line.

Gregory, who was not injured, told State Police that he was traveling east on 80 when he observed the Woodall car coming off of a bridge on the wrong side of the road. Gregory said he applied his brakes and slid sideways striking the Woodall car in the left side with his (Gregory's) left rear end.

The older Woodall was the driver of the car, his son was a passenger in the backseat. Another passenger, Mrs. William Woodall, also 79, was in the front seat. She suffered extensive head injuries.

About 2:30 p.m., Tuesday afternoon, an auto, driven by Mrs. Aha Petrey of Route 3, Eubank, collided with a gravel truck, belonging to the Lincoln County Road Department on Ky 70 in front of the D.L. Bullock Grocery.

Mrs. Petrey's twelve-year-old son, Charles Russell, sustained massive head injuries from the collision and was dead on arrival at the Rockcastle County Hospital.

Forms Available In January For Homestead Amendment

Residents of Rockcastle County, who qualify for exemption under the Homestead amendment which was approved by a 3 to 1 margin during the November General Election, will have to wait at least until after January 15 before applying for the exemption, according to Robert Cromer, Property Valuation Administrator for Rockcastle County.

Mr. Cromer said that he talked with James Calhoun of the Department of Revenue in Frankfort Tuesday and was told that the forms for filing for the exemption were in the process of being printed and would not be available before January 15.

Mr. Calhoun also said that the Department of Finance was in the process of checking the legality of the amendment and that it was uncertain at this date whether the amendment would take effect in 1972 or 1973.

The bill was originally scheduled to take effect in 1972 but there has been some questions raised concerning whether or not the Legislature should pass the bill to clarify the law. If the Legislature does decide to act on the amendment, it would not take effect until 1973.

The Homestead amendment provides for exemption from taxation of up to \$6,500 assessed valuation of a single family house owned and occupied by a person 65 years of age or older.

On the local level, Mr. Cromer said that this act would affect the assessment to the tune of about \$5,000,000 since

approximately 1,800 property owners would come under the amendment. In hard cash, the amendment will cost the tax coffers of Rockcastle County about \$27,000.00.

CITIES CAN MAKE UP HOMESTEAD TAX LOSS, OPINION SAYS

Kentucky cities may increase their general fund tax rates to offset revenue lost under the new Homestead Amendment according to an opinion released by the attorney general's office.

The Homestead Amendment, passed by state voters last November, exempts from taxation up to \$6,500 of the assessed value of the personal residence of persons 65 or older.

Local property tax rates still are under restrictions imposed by the 1965 "roll-back" law but that regulation permits rates which will produce the same amount of tax revenue raised in 1965.

Thus, as property is exempted from the tax roll due to the Homestead exemption, higher rates may be placed on the remaining property to produce the same amount of revenue.

Half a century back, when anyone asked a political expert what was coming up in the next legislative session, the safe and sure answer was "money."

Things have hardly changed. Money, or the lack of it, is going to be the high-or low point when the lawmakers begin their biannual session next week.

With all that's due to be said and done about finances, some of us can thank the stars that one issue is likely to be dormant or low key for the coming session—the slow versus fast time battle.

It's doubtful if any politician really came out ahead with his stand on time and it's certain several were embarrassed, maybe defeated, because of that emotionally-charged issue. But, come to think of it, we now have a governor who survived the mess—even though he voted unnecessarily on time while president of the Senate.

Of course, just about every previous controversy is back before the public again.

That local option Sunday closing law which Republican

Gov. Louie B. Nunn voted is bound to roar back strongly. Based on Democratic Gov. Wendell Ford's general philosophy, another version could pass and be left alone by him.

Consumerism, as both the press and consumers label it, also will be in the limelight throughout the session. The probability is that an agreed version will be approved that will strengthen consumer protection laws and put regulation in the hands of the attorney general instead of an un-certified segment of the government's office.

Environment, which really covers almost too much to list here, will come in the intensive study and a spate of bills. Whether they all will result in a net gain for conservationists can't be predicted yet, but look for consolidation of agencies designated to protect us from foul air, foul water and strip-mining abuses.

Oh, yes, we started talking about money. Let's take a quick look at what's involved and stick our necks out ever so

slightly. Education—Public school teachers won't do badly. They want an aggregate 24 per cent pay raise over the next two fiscal years and they may get a total of 10 per cent—which still is well ahead of their progress the past biennium. Higher education will squabble while holding its own, perhaps with a bit of growth money. The day of real expansion in that field is over.

Taxes—A severance tax of 4 to 5 per cent on gross receipts seems to be in the cards, despite the expected roar of anguish from coal operators. That should go far to compensate for the tax relief aspects—the removal of the 5-cent sales tax from take-home food.

On a possible addition to Kentucky's 7-cent gasoline tax, we'll have to straddle the fence for now.

Weighing towards a "yes" answer is the new administration's obvious need for new road fund revenue. Leaning towards a "no" for the moment is the tax promises while campaigning, plus the possibility that someone actually may find a way to avoid immediate rates. Like through a new tax bond issue.

A final cautionary note: Don't clip this folks. We may look silly when the legislative session opens.

A MURKIN GOVERNOR?

Capitol Digest

The Legislative Research Commission released a school district reorganization study recommending creation of multi-county districts and phasing out of all districts with fewer than 1500 daily students.

The study was authorized by the 1970 General Assembly. LRC Director James T. Fleming said the study was begun to determine how large school districts should be, how current districts compare with the optimum size and what alterations might be made to improve current district organization.

"Research indicates school districts below 1500 are inadequate in size to offer a modern educational program, except at exorbitant costs," the study said.

Specifically it recommended creation of seven multi-county school districts. It

considered the Fayette and Jefferson county systems of sufficient size to operate efficient programs.

The seven recommended districts would utilize the boundaries of the 15 area development districts and provide educational services to whole regions that individual districts are too small to provide.

90% DROP IN MEDICAID OVERUSE TEST
The state Health Department has reported success in its program to curb overuse of Kentucky's Medicaid program.

The project was begun with some 88 patients in 10 counties who were considered to be overusing the program, averaging 19.4 drug prescriptions and five visits to a doctor's office per month.

Since the project has been underway costs of drugs and visits to doctors have been cut from a per-person average of \$91.56 per month to \$10.43, nearly a 90 per cent decrease.

Dr. Howard Root, chairman of the program's advisory council, said the figures will require "further analysis," but the potential of the program "is tremendous."

By "locking-in" Medicaid recipients to just one doctor and one pharmacist instead of allowing them to "shop around," prescriptions were reduced to 0.63 per month and doctors' visits to four per month.

James Rogers, director of the program for the Health Department, said about 3000 other persons are potential candidates for the program but further analysis will be done before more are added.

He added that investigations show the quality of care patients receive has not suffered under the program.

Hunting & Fishing

If you should catch a 13-pound, 9-ounce largemouth bass or a 13-pound, 15-ounce rainbow trout from Kentucky waters you would have a state record in each instance by the margin of one ounce.

If you should exceed the state record smallmouth, which weighed 12 pounds and 15 ounces, you would have not only a state record but also a world record.

This is not to say that all fish grow large in Kentucky but they do grow fast here, and overall state records for many species of fish caught in Kentucky compare favorably with the records of any other state.

Of course, the title with which Kentucky fishermen are most pleased is the one for the world's largest mouth bass caught from the waters of Dale Hollow in 1955 by Letchfield, Ky., man. It is a world record that has held up against all competition for 16 years.

Kentucky's Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources is the custodian for the record list of all species of fish caught from Kentucky waters by pole and line. Perhaps larger fish have been caught than those recorded, but it is doubtful if a fisherman is lucky enough to tie into one of the big ones he's pretty apt to let it be known and to reveal his record or near record, properly verified, to department personnel.

To be eligible for the record list the fish must be weighed on acceptable scales and measured in the presence of two additional persons who, along with the fisherman, must sign an affidavit as to the authenticity of the claim. In that manner all records can be kept legal and valid.

To give fishermen something to shoot at during the upcoming season, a partial list of Kentucky's record fish follows:

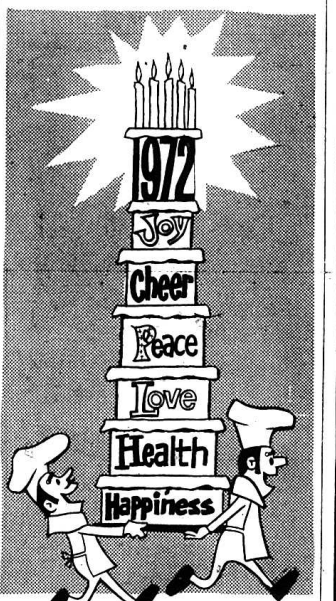

Congress, and after drawing on the expertise of a consult-ing firm, the IRS decided to open three additional ser-vice centers to be located in Memphis, Tennessee; Fresno, California; and Brookhaven, Long Island, New York. These locations were chosen after extensive investigation and evaluation by the consulting firm, based on IRS specifica-tions.

In redistricting the national workload, the IRS made every effort to let existing ser-vice centers continue to process returns and other documents from states they now serve. However, to meet the primary objective of assuring fast, efficient service to the public, all taxpayers in 15 states will be required to file their re-turns with different ser-vice centers. Except for this change, taxpayers will be un-affected.

Beginning January 1, 1972, Kentucky taxpayers will file their individual Federal in-come tax returns at the In-ternal Revenue Service Cen-ter, Memphis, Tennessee.

19810. Individual tax returns are Internal Revenue Forms 1040 and schedules and Forms 1040 K and 1040-2S. The 1040 package received by tax-payers will contain a pre-ad-dressed envelope with the new service center designation.

From January 1, 1972, until June 30, 1972, Federal tax returns other than individual will continue to be sent to the Internal Revenue Service Center, Cincinnati, Ohio 45298 as usual. Beginning July 1, 1972 all Federal tax returns from Kentucky are to be sent to the Memphis Service Cen-ter.

of Appeals should be reapportioned.

The action resulted from a suit filed Oct. 18 by Louis-ville lawyers who charged Kentucky's urban population is not fairly represented on the high court and that it should be reapportioned along "one man, one vote" guide-lines.

Judge Bratcher said a three-judge panel is required be-cause the suit questions whether the court's districts vio-late the "due process" clause of the 14th Amendment.
