January 31, F.D.R. Day, and February 21, Washington's Birthday have been included in the school calendar as holidays.

In preparing the 1971-72 school calendar, school officials were cautioned by the State Department of Education to keep in mind the fact that Christmas and New Years both fall on a Saturday. Under State Board Regulations, no Saturday may be included in a school calendar even as a holiday unless the school term runs beyond June 15.

Since teachers are allowed four paid holidays a year and Christmas or New Years could be counted, the calendar committee had to look for other legal holidays to substitute. It was suggested that since F.D.R. Day and Washington's Birthday fall in the heart of winter, the ground could be covered with snow and these two days might be good substitutes. However, regardless of the weather, school will be closed January 31 and February 21.

Sen. Cooper Will Not Seek Re-Election

for state or national office in Kentucky except that of President Johnson in 1964.

Senator John Sherman Cooper officially announced last Friday at a meeting of the Kentucky Press Association that he will not seek re-election this year. Cooper, a native of Somerset, has served 19 years and six months and at the conclusion of this term, his total years of service will be longer than that of any Senator from Kentucky excepting that of the late Senator Barkley.

Upon announcing his decision to retire from office, Senator Cooper indicated that he would support former Governor Leland B. Borene for the office and a general election battle could well shape up between Huddleston, who successfully managed Governor Ford's bid for office, and Gov. Nunn.

Senator Cooper was born August 23, 1901 in Somerset, a son of John Sherman and Helen Gertrude (Tartar) Cooper, one of seven children. His father was a lawyer, farmer and banker and served as County Judge.

He was educated in Somerset public schools, Centre College, 1918-1919; Yale College, A.B., 1923; Harvard Law School, 1923-1925. His honorary degrees include LL.D. degrees from Centre College, University of Kentucky, Georgetown College, Berea College, Yale University and the University of Pittsburgh. He has received an honorary LL.D. degree from Lincoln Memorial University in Tennessee and a D.C. degree from Nasson College in Maine.

His political career began in 1928 when he was elected a Representative to the Kentucky Legislature; he served as County Judge of Pulaski County from 1930-36; was defeated in his candidacy for the Republican nomination for Governor of Kentucky in 1938; elected Circuit Judge, court of general jurisdiction, and highest trial court in Kentucky, 1945 for six-year term. Elected to Senate in 1946 for two years to fill unexpired term; defeated in 1948; elected in 1952 for two years to fill unexpired term; defeated in 1954; elected in 1956 for four years to fill unexpired term; re-elected 1960-66 and 1966-68.

VA Spent Over \$332,787 In Rockcastle Last Year

The Veterans Administration spent over \$332,787 in Rockcastle County last year, according to J.C. Raloff, Director of the VA Regional Office in Louisville.

Total expenditures for the State of Kentucky amounted to \$17,794,718, according to Raloff.

The largest segment of the expenditures was for compensation and pension payments which amounted to \$108,979,646. Of this total, Rockcastle County received \$564,821. Compensation is paid to veterans who received some sort of disability while of active duty. Pension payments go to disabled veterans who have little or no income because of disabilities suffered in service, in Rockcastle County. His VA spent \$39,597 for readjustment and vocational rehabilitation costs. These figures include the costs involved in the GI Bill which provides money

for Vietnam veterans to attend colleges, technical schools and below college schools. State-wide VA expenditures amounted to \$16,295,201 for these benefits.

Insurance and indemnities account for \$28,369 of the county's share of VA expenses. Kentucky veterans received \$1,074,464.

The Republicans are a minority in both the House (27-73) and the Senate (11-27), but they seem determined to be a vocal minority in the lower chamber.

Last week they sounded off in all directions, got the back of the hand from Democratic leaders and emerged slightly bloodied but unbowed.

First, the GOP leadership offered to "help" Democratic Gov. Wendell Ford with his tax cut plans. Of course, Ford neither asked for nor needs such aid—not from Republicans anyway.

No matter, House Minority Leader Harold DeMarcus, the sage of Stanford, outlined a spot-point tax relief program that has as much chance of passing as DeMarcus does of becoming U.S. president.

The retorts were quick in arriving. House Speaker Norbert Blume of Louisville said unkindly that DeMarcus "is becoming the Charlie McCarthy of the Republican Party."

Majority Leader John Swiftford was gentler, allowing as how the proposal showed that the previous GOP administration really was collecting more taxes than it needed if the latest proposals are feasible. What do you say in answer to that? It's simple. You counterattack in another direction, and so a day or two later the freshman Republicans in the House complained about the snail's pace of progress.

They had a splendid joker in their proposals. Why not stretch the 60-day session by working days for which the legislators would not get paid? It could be done simply by eliminating Saturdays as work-days which count in the ses-

Up and Down—If you visit the Capitol during the legislative session, why not get some exercise and just walk up to the third floor?

The building has only two elevators and one was out of commission for several days last week, causing long delays and crowding in the only one available.

Then, no sooner had the other one been fixed than two people got stuck between floors. They sounded the alarm buzzer, but it was awhile before anyone paid attention during all the hubbub.

Kentucky Legislative Report

Seven more bills in Gov. Wendell H. Ford's consumer protection package have been introduced in the House of Representatives by Majority Leader John Swiftford, D-Cynthiana, and Rep. Terry McBrayer, D-Oreopolis.

In a prepared statement Governor Ford said, "I have every confidence that the General Assembly will decide in the best interest of the consumer as well as the legitimate businessman."

Two other bills in the governor's package already have been introduced in the Senate.

If enacted, the House bills would: "Require foods sold by weight to be marked with the selling price and the price per measure." "Prohibit the use of referral selling." "Require labeling of all perishable foods to indicate the day they were first offered for sale." "Eliminate incentives for using balloon payments in consumer loan or credit transactions by making a debtor to refrain without penalty any scheduled payment more than twice as large as the average of earlier scheduled payments."

Bill Would Create Agency

Rep. Joe Clarke, D-Danville, has introduced a bill that would bring most of the state's environmental activities under the control of one agency.

Currently environmental matters are the responsibility of four separate state departments and commissions.

Some significant environmental activities were excluded from the proposed agency including those related to strip mining. Clarke said a "super agency" covering all environmental matters would be too cumbersome.

"We excluded strip mining because there is more involved in strip mining than just environmental considerations," he said.

"The present Division of Strip Mining and Reclamation is in charge of regulating that industry, not just solving its environmental aspects."

If enacted, the bill would abolish the current air and water pollution control commissions, transferring their authority to the new department. It also would create an Environmental Protection Board composed of five members appointed by the governor, four by the lieutenant governor and four by the Speaker of the House. No member would have

a major interest in any firm regulated by the board. The board would serve as the final authority over the new department's rules and regulations.
