## Decision Reversed By Circuit Judge Hail

Circuit Judge Lawrence Hall last Thursday reversed the conviction of two men found guilty of Vagrancy in Rockcastle County after a hearing on a writ of Habeas Corpus filed by the two men's lawyer Jerry Cox, in his "Finding of Facts, Conclusion of Law, Judgment" Judge Hall noted that "KRS 436.520 (Kentucky's Vagrancy Statute) has been declared unconstitutional by a three judge district court on October 13, 1967 in the case of Baker v. Binder, 174F.Supp.85," and that "By reason of said case of Baker v. Binder the judgment of the Rockcastle Quarterly Court is void because the said court did not have jurisdiction of any offense."

Judge Hall ordered the immediate release of the two prisoners, Dudley Zinke and Paul Clark.

In the finding of the three judge district court which acted on the Vagrancy Statute, the court declared that "This statute is a 'catch all' or what is in expression as to no specific

## School Board Adopts Resolution To Refinance School Bonds

A representative of Dupre and Co., financing agents, met with the Rockcastle County Board of Education Monday night to discuss with them the refinancing of \$1,450,000 of school bonds sold to finance the new high school.

It was pointed out to the board that when the school bonds were sold, they were sold on the highest day of the highest year of the highest fifty years as far as interest rates were concerned and the bond interest rate was high at 7.65%.

Since the bonds were sold originally, interest rates have come down considerably and the object of refinancing the bonds would be to hopefully obtain a considerably lower interest rate. It was pointed out to the board that they could not lose on financing since it was guaranteed to them that if the bonds were not sold at a much lower interest rate the old money would be paid off with the bond interest at, at least, one-half percent more than the interest on the bonds, then the refinancing would be off with the bond interest to one cent.

It is a complicated and highly technical deal and also a first since a refinancing plan of this type has never been used in the State of Kentucky to date; however, there are several in the making at present with other school boards throughout the state.

What it all seems to boil down to is that the Board wouldn't realize any immediate cash saving under the refinancing plan but would realize a long-term saving in that the bond under the old financing plan will be paid off in 1997 and if refinanced at a desirable rate of interest would be paid off in 1995 saving the board some \$369,570 in the last two years of payments.

The board voted to set the wheels in motion by adopting a resolution to refinance the bonds.

Also on hand at the meeting was a group representing STABLE (Student Taught Adult Basic Literacy) Faculty, a program presently in progress in Rockcastle County and three other counties financed by Berea College with federal funds.

Ernest Walker of Berea College, who wrote the original program, acted as spokesman for the group who requested that be allowed to use the Spring School house one night a week for their class of seven or eight students. Mr. Walker told the board that the class is a well-known size that could meet effectively in a private home since child care was also provided for their children at the meeting place.

However, instead of granting the request, the board decided to contact Mr. Cox, chairman of the State Adult Education program and see what could be done toward setting up a class funded by the state and operated through the local Board of Education. They told the group they would have an answer for them by the May meeting of the board.

Bids on the library furniture for the new high school were also accepted by the board. Hadden Film Co. received the bulk of the bid at \$11,894.70 with Crown Equipment Co. having a bid of \$9,735.41 accepted on the remainder of the furniture.

Bids on other school furniture were also accepted by the board and they were also split up with Central School Supply, School Supply Company and Crown Equipment Company.

Several other appointments were made by the board. These were: Tom Payne, principal, Roundstone Elementary School; Charles Norris, assistant basketball coach RCHS; Mrs. Nancy Williams, Director of Pupil Personnel; Willard Whitaker, Director of Transportation; Lloyd Shutter, Finance Director and Douglas Hamm, Supervisor of Instruction.

A change-order on the new high school, was also approved by the board. One of the problems involved the miscellaneous partitions in the Science area. It was found that when the planning was installed that the

partitions would not fit over the pipes and their use as movable partitions would have been lost anyway since they could not have been moved because of the pipes. Any way, the board voted to install concrete block walls in this area rather than the partitions. Another part of the change order involved the floor tile which is presently being laid at the school. The tile contractor had laid quite a bit of the tile before he noticed that the pieces were flawed. He immediately called the architect

who got in touch with Mr. Parsons and who then inspected the tile. Mr. Parsons reported to the board that although almost all of the tile was flawed, he would recommend that the board approve the use of the tile on condition that the tile manufacturer approve a \$2,500 deduct from the total contract and guarantee the tile for five years. He also told the board that if the tile was not used, it would take at least six weeks to get shipment on new tile. The board

## County Road Aid Program Approved By Fiscal Court

Indictments Returned By Grand Jury

The County Road Aid program for 1972-73 was presented to the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court at Tuesday's meeting. The program calls for \$98,179.00 to be spent in the county this year on the maintenance of 136.0 miles of roads and 9 bridges. This is an increase of almost five miles over 1971-72's program.

Added into this year's program is: CR 1001-Cover Branch Road beginning at Ky 1004 and extending 4 miles; CR 1164-Sand Hill Road from Sand Hill Church to CR 1167, 11 miles; CR 1165-Chestnut Ridge Road to CR 1164 and CR 1164 to CR 1165, a distance of 3.3 mile and CR 1282-John Mason Brown Road from Ky 618 to Ky 70 at Willilla, 1.5 miles.

The Court was told by representatives of the highway department that there would be no improvement projects coming out of the County Road Aid program this year. Any improvement projects will have to be funded out of some other program.

The Court voted unanimously to accept this program.

## Hospital To Acquire Services Of Radiologist

The University of Kentucky Medical Center has agreed to furnish a Radiologist to the Rockcastle County Hospital one day a week, beginning immediately. The services of the Radiologist will be furnished to the hospital free of charge.

The hospital board has also decided to send one registered nurse from the hospital to the Medical Center for cardiac care training. This training would enable the hospital to have qualified personnel to operate the latest heart machine equipment and to handle almost any cardiac emergency which might arise.

## L&N Lines Are Being Cut Down

The L & N Railroad Company is presently faced with a serious problem in Rockcastle County, that of having their communication lines cut down by vandals and apparently sold as scrap copper.

Harry Bowling, an assistant inspector, said that there had been thefts of the wire recently in White, the Sinks and at Broadhead.

Mr. Bowling said that not only does cutting the wire knock out communications between Louisville and Corbin but that it also created the danger of a false signal being transmitted to trains which could cause wrecks.

L & N is asking for the help of the public in keeping an eye on the lines which run along the tracks and reporting anything unusual to the State Police.

The game of the chickens and the foxes was played out in the final hour of filing for the U.S. Senate race, but it's hard to identify who was in the confusion.

It ended up with former Gov. Louie B. Nunn filing as a Republican candidate to succeed GOP incumbent John Sherman. Nunn's opponent is Democrat Carl D. Huddleston drawing no major opposition.

For all practical purposes, despite several other candidates for party primaries, the contest is between Nunn and Huddleston. But—it almost was between John Brown, Jr., and Kentucky Fried Chicken tycoon, and Huddleston.

Strange how chance played its role and perhaps spoiled the game. Brown and his allies waited at Louisville until the last hours, ready to storm into the big flourish and hand Mrs. Thelma Stovall Brown's papers.

They were under the impression, skillfully fostered by certain aides and friends of Nunn, that Tom Emberton was going to be the major Republican entry.

Emberton, defeated by Gov. Wendell Ford last November, apparently never intended to get into the race.

His name was handed about by the Nunn forces to attract Brown into the Democratic primary—the idea being that Brown could resist the temptation of running if Nunn were not

event the Republicans would not have been able to run against the Democratic administration, their basic strategy.

**WET WITH SWEAT**—As the final minutes ticked away before the Senate primary filings, a newspaper reporter who had Nunn's assurance he would run was beginning to sweat. Nunn had not showed up.

The writer called Nunn at home, saying, "But governor, you said you'd run."  
"Oh well, why don't you write something up for the Big Yellow Pardon Column?" Nunn joked.

**DON'T PANIC, FELLOWS**—As all of Kentucky awaited a decision on whether there would be a special session, the office of Gov. Ford showed admirable restraint.

It dragged its feet for days, treated the matter like a minor bit of lost legislation and finally let the cat out of the bag with a routine handout, saying the session would indeed be called sometime early in the summer.

How about details—such as the topics besides the election laws? No hurry, folks, the news release didn't say. That's restraint.

## KU Cites Reasons For Rate Increase

Rising fuel costs, major investments in environmental protection equipment, higher interest expense and the need for a sound financial condition to attract new capital were cited as factors requiring electric rates increases for Kentucky Utilities Company at KU's annual stockholders meeting March 28.

W.A. Duncan, president, said fuel costs have increased 75 percent since 1968 with further increases in the future expected and that bond interest rates are two or more times as high as only a few years ago.

"We conservatively estimate that within the next five years facilities for environmental control systems will cost the company at least \$75.5 million," he stated.

The company is seeking approval by the Public Service Commission of Kentucky of an increase in its retail service rates. The next hearing on the request is scheduled for April 15.

Stockholders voted to double the authorized number of common shares to 15 million and preferred shares to 400,000. The company plans to sell some of the newly authorized stock late in 1972 or early in 1973 to finance part of the 1972-1973 construction program expected to cost \$134.6 million.

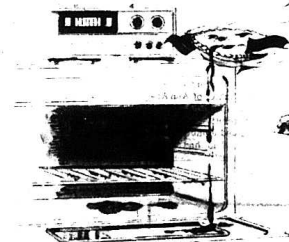

**County Agent's Notes**

**Preventing and Controlling  
Cockroach Infestations**

If you do not already have a roach problem, guarding against entry and good housekeeping will greatly reduce the chances that a bad problem will develop. Inspect all produce you carry in for roaches and their egg cases. If you keep food in tight containers and get rid of hiding places, you can prevent an infestation or keep it small if it occurs.

When a roach infestation does occur, insecticides are usually needed to get rid of the pests. These insecticides may be in the form of dusts, sprays, baits or fumigants.

Fumigants give immediate results but they are inconvenient and dangerous and should be used only by trained pest control operators.

Baits are handy but are not always effective against German roaches. They must be placed where children and pets cannot get at them.

Pressurized sprays are handy but expensive and not always effective. Sprays containing only pyrethrins and piperonyl butoxide must hit the roaches to kill them.

Dusts and sprays are less convenient but are the most effective preparations the home owner can use. Some of the sprays may be purchased ready to use but the oil in which they are mixed may dissolve asphalt tiles and other materials.

Some of the more commonly used insecticides for cockroach control are: Chlorane - as a 1% dust or a 0.5% spray (2 level TBS of 40% wettable powder or 2 tsp. of 45% emulsifiable concentrate per quart of water).

Diazinon - as a 1% dust. Malathion - as a 4% or 5% dust or a 2% spray (4 level tsp. of 50% wettable powder or 2 tap to 37% emulsifiable concentrate per quart of water.)

Rommel - as a 2% spray (4 tsp of 24% emulsifiable concentrate per quart of water). Boric acid and borax - as a 100% dust.

**Landscape Notes**

Some of the ornamental plants will have dead branches from winter and now is the time to remove them. The young growth will have started, revealing where the dead begins. The pruning should be done by cutting down in the young growth to the first live growing bud. Sharp pruning shears or knife should be used for this because the new growth is easily injured if a dull pruning instrument is used.

Young shade trees may have some overlapping branches which should be removed now. There should be no hurry in removing the lower branches from young shade trees. It is best to wait until the tree trunk is at least 6 inches in diameter. At that time one can decide how high to leave the lower limbs for shading the lawn.

Many people want to start cutting the grass very early in the spring, cutting it as soon as it is about 2 inches high, instead of letting the grass grow until it is 4 to 5 inches tall. This is a mistake because this early spring growth is badly needed in order that the bluegrass will have some reserve when the weather gets hot in the summer.

There is plenty of evidence that bluegrass simply cannot live when it is constantly clipped close. Crabgrass and other troublesome weeds thrive on lawns when the grass is cut one inch or shorter. On the other hand, lawns that are cut about 2 1/3 to 3 inches high will have fewer weeds and wild grasses such as crab grass. Some may say the lawn that is clipped high is not neat. This is a mistake because the length of the grass is little to do with neatness if the top is kept even.

The lawn that has grass-clipped high is just like a good, thick rug and that is the way it should be. If fact, if the homeowner will follow a definite program of feeding twice a year, sowing some seed every September and then clipping high, the sod will be thicker, with fewer thin or bare places and far fewer weeds.

Now is the time to examine all young plants that were set last fall of this spring. Very often one or more of these often one or more of these plants will not start to grow, and by loosening the soil 2 or 3 inches deep and applying lots of water, they will get started and come along all right. Otherwise, if the plants are neglected for as much as a month, they will die. By lots of water, we mean 5 to 8 gallons poured slowly around the stem of the trees, shrubs and evergreens every 7 to 10 days until the plants begin to grow. For flowers, the amount of water will be much less - one or two quarts.

If the young tree starts to grow, in fact, even just out new leaves which do not grow should not become discouraged and discontinue watering until far in summer. Then if it does not respond and start growing, it should be sawed off about 2 inches above the ground. If there is any life left in the roots, some shoots may appear. These shoots should be allowed to grow for a couple of years, then the best one selected and the rest cut off. This is what is known as "training in the oxygen tank," but it often works.



Miss Lamb To Attend Washington Youth Conf.

Kentucky 4-H'ers from every area of the state leave April 8 for the annual Kentucky 4-H Older Youth Conference in Washington, D.C.

Attending the conference will be nearly 200 young people and 22 adults, according to Garland Bastin, UK Extension 4-H program specialist. The group will travel to and from the conference on chartered buses, returning home on April 15. In Washington, they will stay at the National 4-H Center, where most of the conference sessions will be held.

Planned especially for Kentucky 4-H'ers who are freshmen or sophomores in high school, the conference will give these young people advanced citizenship - leadership training that they can pass on to other 4-H'ers and to their high school classes at home. Conference speeches and discussions are planned to give the

delegates more understanding of the legislative process and of their heritage as U.S. citizens. As background for their citizenship studies, the 4-H'ers will take field trips to national memorials and government buildings in the Washington area. Among the places they will visit will be Capitol Hill, Arlington Cemetery, Lincoln Me-

morial, Mt. Vernon, and the Smithsonian Institute. Most of the delegates also will have an opportunity to visit their Congressmen's offices on Capitol Hill, and Kentucky's Senators and Representatives have been invited to meet the entire group at a special banquet on Thursday.

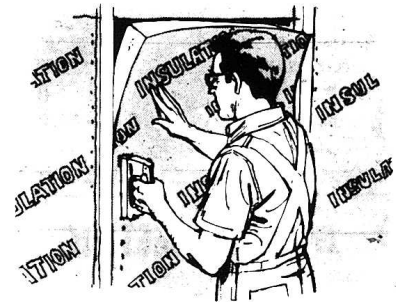

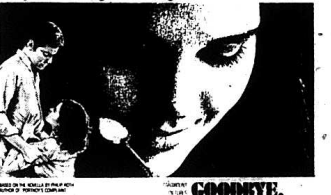
