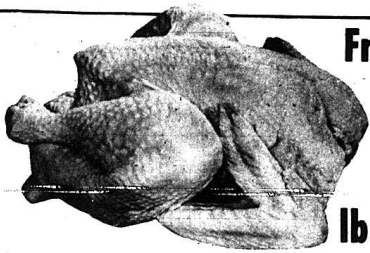

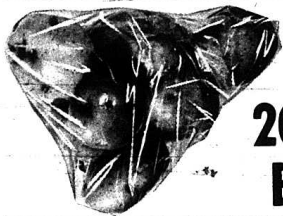

## Rockcastle Co. Goes With State Trend In Voting

Rockcastle County pretty much followed the state-wide trend in voting Tuesday in the Republican Senatorial primary as former Governor Louie B. Nunn carried the county with 569 votes over his nearest opponent Robert E. Gable, who could only garner 221. Gable had run long and hard and, it is reported, spent in excess of \$400,000 on the campaign to win a little over 18,000

votes. Statewide, Nunn received almost 60,000 votes.

Other Republican candidates in the U.S. Senatorial race were: Gene Wooten with 23, W. Howard Clay, 9 and Thurman Jerome Hamlin, 11.

On the Democratic side of the U.S. Senatorial race, Walter Hudleston carried Rockcastle County with 294 votes. His nearest opponent was James E. Wal-

lace with 47. Sandy Hockensmith got 12, Willis V. Johnson, 16 and Charles Vanwinkle, 4. Statewide, Hudleston got over 100,000 votes with his nearest opponent, Hockensmith, getting 15,000.

So now the stage is set for the November General Election between Hudleston and Nunn, who will be on the ballot along with the president and U.S. Representatives, besides, locally, three school board races.

In November, Rep. Tim Lee Carter, who was unopposed in the Primary, will face Lyle L. Willis who collected 50% of the Democratic vote in the Fifth District Primary race.

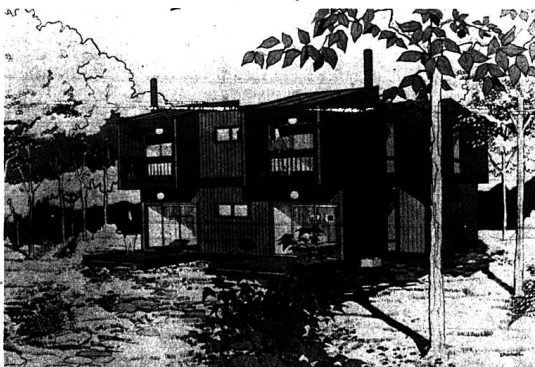
## \$45 Million Dollar Recreation Resort To Be Built On Lake Cumberland

A \$45 million private recreation resort, the largest of its kind in the United States, will be built on Lake Cumberland near General Burnside Island State Park in Pulaski County. The recreation resort, called Woodson Bend, was announced today in Louisville by Stephen Kelley, a Somerset physician who is President of Woodson Bend, Inc.

Woodson Bend will provide a total recreational environment on the shores of Lake Cumberland, the fifth largest man-made lake in the world. 3,000 condominium dwelling units will be constructed at Woodson Bend along with an 18 hole championship golf course, a swimming pool, tennis courts, riding stables, nature trails, a club house and a boat launching and storage facility.

When fully operational, Woodson Bend will create 260 new jobs with an annual payroll of over \$1 million. Additionally the Resort will create an estimated 412 related jobs in the community.

## John Nichols' Frankfort Watchline

When you pull up to the gasoline pump on July 1 and thereafter, the cost of gas per gallon will be up 2 cents.

With the prices of gasoline fluctuating so much, you may not even notice or remember why the new increase has taken effect. Certainly the administration is not going to hold a dedication to the event.

Gasoline will be higher because Gov. Wendell Ford convinced or pressured the 1972 General Assembly into raising the state's gas tax from 7 to 9 cents a gallon. It's that simple.

Yet, the Democratic regime will continue insisting that the governor merely presented alternatives to the lawmakers—who in their wisdom passed the new levy because the state's road fund was almost depleted and federal aid otherwise would all but cease.

This was Ford's pitch, and it appears to be valid. But the governor conventionally forgot to mention he had pledged no new or added taxes during his campaign—except for the severance tax.

Ford's alibi was that he was not talking about the General Fund as though the average Kentuckian knows the difference between the General and Road funds!

Fortunately for the administration, the dust kicked up by the severance tax—and removal of the food tax (that comes next fall)—kind of eclipsed the gas tax boost.

Morover, Lt. Gov. Julian Carroll, who at first made noises like he was going to fight the gas increase, later "clarified" his stand—which turned out to be no stand at all or quiet agreement

with the administration. The new rate will put Kentucky in the nation's upper bracket of states in the gas tax area, probably darn high for a so-called poor state.

Will the Republicans make it an issue for November? Maybe. But, let's see now, who was it back in 1967, running for governor, who also pledged no new or added taxes, Right? Louis B. Nunn.

TO MOVE OR NOT—The governor's mansion may look great to visitors, but many an occupant has complained about obsolete plumbing and obsolete everything else that goes wrong too often. Almost as often, a legislative committee has complained that maybe the first family ought to move to a more comfortable, private home.

In fact, that's just what happened in the last session. But it's not that easy. Resistance has arisen from Mrs. Simson Willis, a former first lady and chairman of the Kentucky Heritage Commission.

Joining her ranks are some chapters of the Daughters of the American Revolution and a few state garden clubs. Truly formidable array of opposition.

The pro-mansionists believe the building remains one of the most beautiful in the nation for that purpose. The anti-contents it's a waste of money to fix what could be turned into a nice museum, or even a quiet spot for the Court of Appeals, which is looking for another home.

The usual proposed site for a new mansion is Berry Hill, above the Capitol grounds, where the state library currently is

moving out of an old mansion. Gov. Ford's office does want to set the record straight on a rumor he is behind the suggestion to move. Not so, it says.

And, for once, the question is not partisan. The Nunn family, occupying the place previously, seemed to favor another solution, too.

LIGHTS (AND SOUND) OUT! —As Ford was delivering a forceful address at the Kentucky Broadcasters Association in Louisville the other day, the microphone system quit. It was fixed, the governor resumed and then—total darkness. The battery of TV lights blew a fuse. Ford finished the speech, and tactfully did not mention the difficulties. But one irate TV newsmen likened the affair to the lightning at the other day, declaring: "It just wasn't the right place for all that to happen."

## Capitol Digest

Gov. Wendell H. Ford and Highway Commissioner Charles Pryor announced that highway resurfacing projects in 44 counties costing an estimated \$4 million, will begin in mid-June. Governor Ford said the bulk of the money for the projects, which will affect 60 Kentucky roads, was provided through economy measures in the reorganization of the Department of Highways.

Commissioner Pryor said when he entered office there were 3600 employees on the Highway payroll but the figure has been reduced to 3200 in five months.

State Adj. Gen. Richard Fry-

"The money for these projects was initially earmarked for our payroll, the commissioner said.

Governor Ford said the improvement program "was a promise. I made to the people of these areas during my campaign. I am pleased to announce that I am fulfilling this commitment."

The Highway Department began accepting bids on the work May 12 and the contracts will be let on June 12. Pryor said all projects are expected to be finished by late summer.

The strictly resurfacing projects will cover more than 268 miles of roadways.

U.S. DROPS PLANS TO CHANGE GUARD MISSION  
The National Guard Bureau in Washington has halted a plan that would have changed the mission of the Kentucky Air National Guard and reduced its strength by more than 200 men.

Earlier, the U.S. Department of Defense had proposed to shift the Kentucky Air Guard from its current reconnaissance mission to close air support, add a change its RF-101 aircraft for A-37 attack fighters. The change would have meant the loss of 27 full-time technician jobs and 180 part-time Guardmen positions.

State Adj. Gen. Richard Fry-

mire said the change also would have required retaining some personnel into the munitions field.

Frymire said he felt the plan was dropped because of "unavailable" of the A-37 aircraft, currently being used in Vietnam, protests from Kentucky congressmen and the "basic unfairness" of drastically reducing Air Guard strength in a state with only one flying unit.

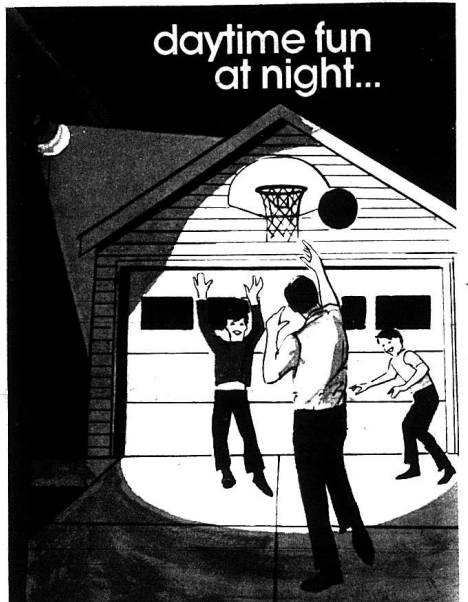
DISCLOSURE LAW CALLED VOID  
A part of the penalty section of the 1972 state financial disclosure law was called unconstitutional by the Kentucky attorney general's office.

Atty. Gen. Walter Herdman said a constitutional officer cannot be removed from office for failing to disclose his finances, as the law provides. However, he said the law still would apply to candidates for such offices and to appointed state officers.

Because of a severability clause added to the law before it was enacted, the rest of its provisions will stand.

Herdman also extended unconstitutional a section of the law which would brand its provisions to include employees of large newspapers and radio and television stations owned by such papers.

### PANEL DRAFTS BILL TO ALTER RESIDENCY LAW

The Interim Committee on Elections and Constitutional Amendments approved a bill which would reduce voter residency requirements to 30 days for all Kentucky state and local elections.

It is expected to be introduced during the special legislative session, which Governor Ford has called for June 8, to bring Kentucky into conformity with a recent U.S. Supreme Court decision.

The court ruling overrode Kentucky's constitutional requirement that voters reside in the state for one year, in the county for six months and in the precinct for 90 days.

The court action originally had been expected during the 1976 General Assembly session and the legislature had planned a bill to bring Kentucky into conformity at that time.

However, the Supreme Court did not act until after the session, without a rally the legislature had to retain residency requirements as set out in the state Constitution.

### NATIONAL CRIME INSTITUTE FUNDED FOR SECOND YEAR

The National Crime Prevention Institute, located on the University of Louisville campus, has been re-funded for a second year of operation with a \$182,000 grant from the federal Law Enforcement Assistance Administration (LEAA).

Operated by the U of L and funded through the Kentucky Crime Commission (KCC), the Institute was opened with a similar grant last year to provide police officers with training in how to prevent crime.

Some 62 policemen, representing departments in 27 states, attended last year's sessions.

Charles L. Owen, KCC executive director, said the latest grant will permit "significant" expansion of the Institute's programs and reflects a general acceptance of the policeman's role in preventing as well as controlling crime.

"The Institute holds much hope for actually reducing crime as a program originating by the Kentucky Crime Commission," he said. "Moreover, we expect Kentucky to benefit significantly from locations of the Institute in Louisville."

Owen said the commission will offer funds to Kentucky first and second class cities which agree to create local crime prevention bureaus in their own police departments.

munity and pour an additional \$9 million into the local economy not including millions of dollars in tourist revenue. Woodson Bend property owners will contribute over \$2 million in local property tax revenues annually without significantly increasing the need for additional schools, roads or public services.

According to Dr. Kelley, Woodson Bend represents the culmination of the recreation resort boom that has occurred nationally during the past 10 years.

We candidly admit to having studied other resorts in developing the Woodson Bend concept. We have incorporated certain features of other resorts such as the condominium concept which has been successfully used on Hilton Head Island in South Carolina and in Aspen, Colorado. We honestly believe we have eliminated every negative associated with other recreational developments plus having added some new advantages other developments just don't have.

Dr. Kelley credited the Woodson Bend concept to the corporation Vice President Wm. F. Clarkson, III of Louisville, Mr. Clarkson who has developed recreation resorts in 5 other states pointed out the unique aspects of Woodson Bend.

"Our greatest advantage versus other resorts is Lake Cumberland itself—the fifth largest man-made lake in the world. Beyond this, we believe the condominium concept is a substantial advantage because it removes the purchaser's concern over property maintenance and assures that the resorts long term appearance and value will be protected through planned development."

Mr. George Brown, the Secretary Treasurer of Woodson Bend discussed the financial impact of Woodson Bend. "Most of the press attention will probably be focused on the size of this project, \$45 million dollars. But to those of us who have been intimately involved in developing this concept, the truly new worthy aspects of Woodson Bend are these:

FIRST, that a qualified purchaser can get 95% financing on his condominium thus eliminating the financing problem that purchasers of recreational property have historically experienced.

SECOND, the condominium owners may put their property in a tax depreciable asset. Or, of course, the fact that we will have the potential to rent a substantial portion of the 3,000 condominiums to tourists will have a significant impact on the travel and tourist business in the

Lake Cumberland area. Everyone knows that the tourist dollar means to Kentucky and Woodson Bend means more tourists."

Dr. Kelley emphasized that all of those associated with Woodson Bend are native Kentuckians. "We are here to stay," said Dr. Kelley, "we are determined that Woodson Bend is a credit to us personally and to the commonwealth where we have been reared." That's why we have committed almost \$2 million for a sewage system that will protect Lake Cumberland; that's why our planning has put aesthetic values ahead of economic efficiency in the placement of roads, homes and

the other recreational amenities."

Dr. Kelley predicted that Woodson Bend will set a standard for other recreational resorts to imitate and that it will stimulate additional private development around Kentucky's State Parks. The net result, according to Dr. Kelley will be to reaffirm Kentucky's national leadership in the field of travel, tourism and outdoor recreation."

The announcement of Woodson Bend's construction was hailed by State Commerce Commissioner Damon Harrison, Ralph Danford of the Discover American Travel Organization, Paul Cook of the Southern Travel Director's Association, Louisville

Tartar of the Lake Cumberland and Dale Hollow Tourism Council, and Steve Fischer of the Somerset-Pulaski County Chamber of Commerce. Each made statements which underscored the long term contribution that the Lake Cumberland area, Commissioner Harrison pointed out that Woodson Bend will be within one day's drive of 65% of the nation's population. Woodson Bend, also announced

that Wildlife artist Charles Crum has agreed to serve as an environmental advisor to the project. Crum indicated he had agreed to serve because the developers were genuinely trying to plan "with nature" by locating buildings and roads so as to maintain the maximum number of trees on the heavily wooded site. Crum expressed pleasure over the 1 & 3/4 million dollar sewage system being installed to protect the ecological balance of

Lake Cumberland. Crum's sentiments were echoed by Dr. William McEwain, Commissioner of Health for Kentucky who said "I can commend the efforts of the development to assure that there will be no degradation of the environment but rather an enhancement of the beauty of the surroundings."
