Colson To Retire June 30 After 35 Years In Conservation

Clay A. Colson, District Conservator for Rockcastle County will retire from the Soil Conservation Service, Friday, June 30, 1972 after more than thirty-five years of service in the Department of Agriculture.

He began work in Rockcastle County as assistant County Extension Agent under Robert F. Spencer on June 7, 1937, On January 1, 1938, he moved to Leitchers County as County Extension Agent. Mr. Colson served as County Extension Agent in Leitchers, Jessamine, and Estill Counties until August 31, 1944 when he transferred to the Soil Conservation Service.

The Rockcastle County Soil Conservation District (formerly the Broadhead Soil Conservation District) was organized in 1944, and Mr. Colson was assigned to Rockcastle County as District Conservator, the position he has held until his retirement.

Mr. Colson was on leave from Soil Conservation Service for one year while he served in the Navy. He served in the U.S. Navy Reserve for twenty-three years, and is presently on retired status. He retired as a Lieutenant in USNR.

Mr. Colson was a graduate of Berea College and also holds a Master of Science Degree in Agriculture from the University of Kentucky.

Mr. Colson says his present plans are to spend full-time farming. He has made his residence on his farm on Brittle Ridge near Oak Hill for the past two years.

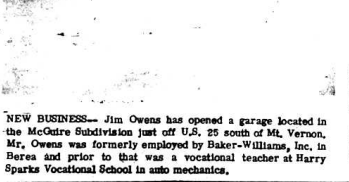

The Rockcastle County cucumber station will open Monday, July 3 at Sandro Valley, according to William K. Bullen, station manager.

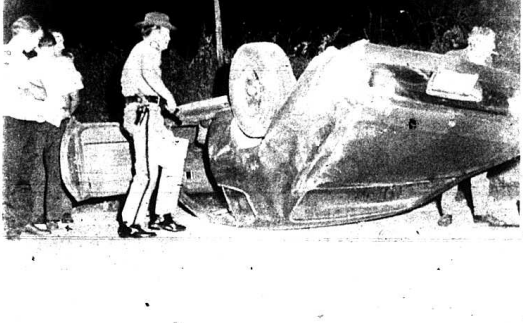
There are approximately 80 cucumber growers in the county this year who are expected to crop about 12,000 bushels for a cash crop of \$30,000.

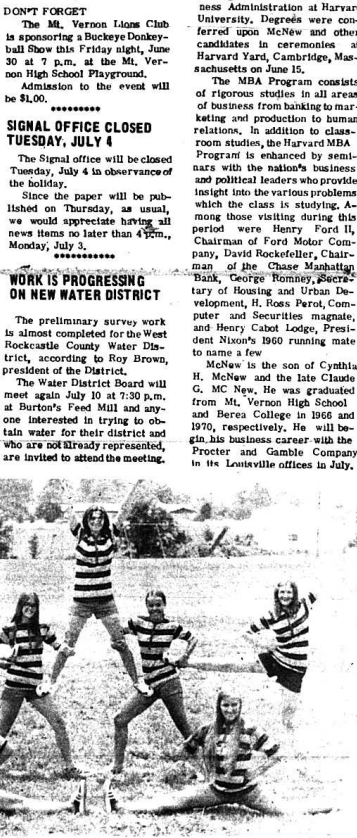

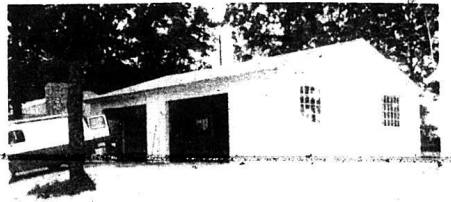

The Ice Cream Story
Back at the turn of the century the concept of an ice cream cone was conceived from necessity. It all started when a vendor ran out of ice cream plates. He wrapped the ice cream in a twisted wafer - the forerunner of our present day cone. It all happened at the St. Louis Fair in 1904 ... or so the story goes.
Some people say that ice cream was known by American colonists in the 1700's but it did not become popular until after 1822 - according to the books of yesterday.
Nostalgia - the looking back to yesteryear and the longing for what was - the sound of the hand cranking of the ice cream freezer - the sweet taste of cream. Once you've experienced such pleasant, festive occasions of preparing home-made ice cream with each member of the family taking part in the making as well as in the consuming of

the delicious finished product - you don't forget it.
Ice cream - America's favorite dessert - has been part of our menu since it was discovered five centuries ago. Jacob Fussler, who opened the first wholesale ice cream factory in the world in Baltimore, Md. in 1851, knew he had a good product. Since then the commercial sale of ice cream has continued to climb. Still, the lure of making ice cream at home has intrigued each generation; this one is no different. More freezers for home-made ice cream have been sold in the '70's than in previous years.
Ten to fifteen percent of the total U.S. milk production goes into ice cream. To be called ice cream, a product must contain not less than 10 percent butterfat, at least 1.6 pounds of milk solids per gallon, and weigh 4.5 pounds per finished gallon. Federal regulations call for ice milk to have at least 2 percent but not more than seven percent milkfat, and not less than 11 percent of nonfat milk solids. Each gallon of the finished product must weigh at least 4.5 pounds after freezing. Milk sherbet must contain between one and two percent milk fat and a two to five percent total milk solids. Sherbet must weigh at least six pounds per gallon.

NUT ICE CREAM: Before freezing add 1 cup finely chopped nut to Philadelphia Ice Cream, peppermint stick ice cream; Substitute 1/2 pound crushed peppermint stick candy for sugar and vanilla in Philadelphia Ice Cream. A little pink coloring may be added.
PEANUT BRITTLE ICE CREAM: Substitute 1/2 pound crushed peanut brittle for sugar in Philadelphia Ice Cream.
Strawberry Ice Cream 1 cup sugar
1 to 2 cups strawberries, crushed
2 cups thin cream or 1 cup thin cream and 1 cup milk
Add sugar to berries, let stand 15 to 20 minutes. If sweetened frozen berries are used, sugar should be decreased. Add cream and freeze as for Philadelphia Ice Cream.
APRICOT ICE CREAM: Substitute apricot pulp for strawberries in Strawberry Ice Cream. Decrease sugar to 2/3 cup and add 1 tablespoon lemon juice.

Medicare Premium Rate Will Increase 20 Cents

The basic premium rate for the medical insurance part of Medicare will go up from \$3.60 to \$3.80 a month beginning July 1, according to social

security officials here. The medical insurance part of Medicare helps pay for the doctor bills and a variety of other medical expenses for

people 65 and over. The program is funded by individual premiums matched by the Federal government.

The 20-cent increase in the premium in July compares to a 30-cent increase in 1971 and a \$1.30 increase in 1970, "a social security spokesman said. The increase this year reflects savings in the administration of Medicare as well as lower anticipated medical costs because of the Price Commission guidelines limiting physicians' fee increases to an average 2 1/2 percent a year," he said.

The Medicare law requires an annual review of the cost of the medical insurance program. The premium rate is adjusted to cover the estimated medical expenses of Medicare patients during the 12 months beginning July 1.

The cost of the program was \$35 million under estimates made last year," the spokesman said. "Yet without the Price Commission limit on physicians' fees, it would have been necessary to increase the premium to at least \$6 a month."

The medical insurance part of Medicare paid \$2 billion in benefits on behalf of 9 1/2 million people in fiscal 1971. Almost everyone 65 and over is enrolled—about 20 million people, according to the spokesman.

The medical insurance supplements Medicare hospital insurance, which is funded by social security contributions and helps pay for hospital bills and certain follow-up care of people 65 and over.

Medicare is administered by the Social Security Administration of the U. S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare.

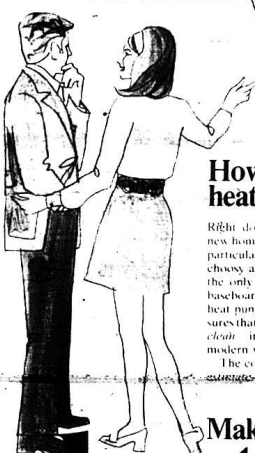


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
