4-H Field Day to be Held at Rockcastle County Fair

4-H'ers, join in the fun of the fair. On Friday afternoon, July 28 at 1:30 p.m. there will be a field day for 4-H members of Rockcastle County. One dollar prize will be awarded to winners of each of the ten events. There will be a 90 yard dash for 9-11 year old boys, 50 yard dash for 9-11 year old girls, 50 yard dash for 12-15 year old boys, a baseball throw for girls, a basketball throw for girls, an egg toss for both boys and girls, a pie eating contest for both boys and girls - Now's the time to prove you can eat the most. A sack race and a horseshoe contest will be held for boys and girls. Challenge your friends to a race.

Individuals will be competing with other individuals 4-H'ers. So any 4-H'er has a chance if other members of his club are not present. An individual may enter in more than one event.

The highlight of the field day will be an old fashioned hog calling contest. Any 4-H'er may enter this contest with a baby pig going to best hog caller in Rockcastle County.

Food Clips

Try to keep your vegetable crispier in your refrigerator at least two-thirds full. It performs better according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture. If crispier is almost empty it will be crispier. Leftover cooked rice? Don't throw it away—use it for your croquettes or fritters. Rice may be used as an extender for hamburger, if you may add it to your soups.

If a fresh pineapple is fully ripe, you may refrigerate it for a day or two. Wrap tightly to prevent other foods from taking up the odor of the pineapple. In warm, humid weather, keep dried fruits in tightly covered containers in the refrigerator. If you have places of stale bread don't forget you can use it to make cinnamon toast, French toast or even use the bread to make a pudding or a Fondue.

Making gravy? The real secret of making smooth gravy is to blend flour thoroughly with fat or with cold liquid and incorporate it with hot liquid.

Mock sour cream may be made from creamed cottage cheese, buttermilk (equal amounts) and a couple teaspoons of lemon juice. It's easy to make in a blender.

Don't wash potatoes before you slice them. If you do, they are that are bruised or cracked and use them first.

voluntary set aside minus the 1973 voluntary set-aside acreage. Program acreages are those reported and accepted for compliance in 1972.

"The announcement of voluntary set aside is being made much earlier than last year so the winter wheat producer can plan his wheat operation before investing any money in his 1973

crop." Secretary Butz said in outlining the 1973 Program. Loan rate for 1973 will be \$1.25 per bushel National average—the same as in 1972—and farm-stored and warehouse-stored loans are available to producers who participate in the program.

Farmers who elect to participate in the voluntary option may set aside additional acreage up to 150 per cent of their domestic wheat allotment.

Payment rates for this additional set aside will be \$.88 per bushel, times the farm's established yield, times the acres set aside. In 1972 the voluntary option was limited to 75 per cent of their domestic allotment with a payment of \$.94 per bushel.

Substitution provisions of the 1973 Wheat Program are identical to those in 1972 with corn, grain sorghum, barley or soybeans allowed for preservation of allotment history.

Producers will again receive preliminary payments after July 1, 1973, equal to 75 per cent of the estimated face value of the wheat certificate. Any remainder will be paid after December 1, 1973. Face value of the wheat certificate will again be the difference between 100 per cent of the July 1, 1973, parity and the National average market price received by farmers during the first five months of the marketing year. Failure to plant at least 90 per cent of the farm's 1973 domestic wheat allotment to either Wheat, Corn, Grain Sorghum, Barley or Soybeans can result in reduction of allotment by as much as 20 per cent.

Under the Agricultural Act of 1970, if no wheat or substitute crops are planted for three consecutive years, the entire allotment may be lost. All allotments removed from farms will be reallocated to other wheat farms.

Acreage which is not planted due to drought, flood or other natural disasters or a condition beyond the control of the producer will be considered planted to wheat. Also, any producer who makes a required acreage set aside but elects to receive no payment will not lose allotment.

Other provisions of the 1973 Wheat Program, unchanged from 1971 and 1972, include the requirement that farmers maintain their conserving base requirements as well as set aside acreage.

Processors of wheat for domestic food use will continue to pay \$1.15 per bushel toward the domestic wheat certificate value. Again in the 1972-73 marketing year, no export marketing certificates will be issued.

Established summer-fallow farms which devote at least 55 per cent of their cropland to that use will not be required to set aside any additional acreage in order to maintain

program benefits.

Producers who wish to qualify for program benefits need to sign up to participate. Sign up dates will be announced later for the 1973 program.

Producers who participate in the Wheat Program on any or all farms in which he has an interest, as he wishes.

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Rockcastle to Profit From 1972-74 Budget

The complex maze of figures, estimates and projections cannot obscure the fact that a state's budget is a very human document. As Gov. Wendell Ford said in his budget message to Kentucky legislators last February, "Never in the history of our Commonwealth have so many programs been available to each of our citizens."

On March 15, with the endorsement of both houses of the legislature, the Governor signed the budget for the 1972-74 biennium into law. Under its provisions, Rockcastle County residents may expect to see increased expenditures in the school foundation program, public assistance programs, child welfare and highway services as well as additional monies for local health programs.

For instance, county schools will receive \$296,992 more during the 1972-74 biennium than in the previous one, a 11 per cent increase. Public assistance funds will be increased locally by 28 per cent with some \$2,408,979 in state money appropriated.

Local health funds have been increased by 6 per cent with \$79,586 allotted for the 1972-74 biennium.

Governor Ford said these specifics are indicative of the overall theme of his administration which is to serve people.

"This is only a part of what we are doing for Rockcastle County, but it does represent the type of leadership people are demanding," the Governor added.

A special newspaper critique for the fair was printed by the council with proceeds paying for premiums on the exhibits and prizes.

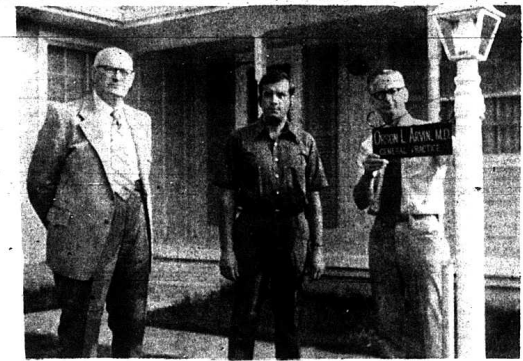
MAURICE MITCHELL BURIED IN ELMWOOD

1973 Wheat Program Provisions Announced

Major provisions of the 1973 Wheat Program were announced today by Secretary of Agriculture, Earl L. Butts. They include the set aside required for participation, an option to voluntarily set aside additional acreage and the payment rate for the additional set aside.

To participate in the Wheat Program, a producer must set aside an acreage equal to 86 percent of the farm's domestic wheat allotment—the maximum provided by law. Producers will again be allowed to substitute Feed Grains or Soybeans for Wheat to preserve allotment history. The Secretary further announced that Barley will again be included in the 1973 Feed Grain Program.

In addition to the set aside required for participation, a producer may earn payment for setting aside additional acreage up to 150 per cent of his 1973 domestic wheat allotment—twice the amount of additional acreage allowed in the 1972 program—at a payment rate of \$8.88 per bushel. 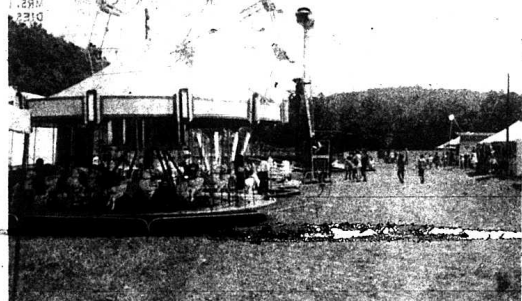

If you missed the Democratic national convention in person, cheer up. It wasn't all that memorable.

As a guest or delegate with the Kentucky delegation, you would have been housed in plush comfort at a beachfront hotel—but it was in Fort Lauderdale, away from the political action in Miami Beach, a traffic-clogged hour from the hotel.

Gov. Wendell Ford chose the accommodations in part to lead a family atmosphere to the proceedings, though he stayed at the condominium apartment of a friend while recuperating from surgery and his back injury.

Every morning at 8:30 breakfast was served for the delegation on the penthouse floor. Nice and thoughtful, even if little had to be done politically, which brings us to the main point. The 47-member delegation seemed to be frozen in a McGovern-anti-McGovern tangle.

The 10 delegates who supported Sen. George McGovern stuck together like glue, huddled on one floor of the hotel. We'll say this much: They worked like demons and behaved themselves until McGovern definitely was nominated, then followed their majority brethren with an early morning celebration.

As for the other 37, we honestly can't say much in praise or criticism. They were just as rigid as the McGovern backers and simply never went their own way or were allowed to.

Of course, one could claim the majority bloc was loyal first to Ford—we know they all did not support Sen. Edmund Muskie.

But it seems to us that ad-

Muskie dropped out, the delegation should have been released to vote its conscience.

No, the governor hung on in the face of hopeless odds after the first night of the convention.

He discovered a possible savior in Sen. Henry Jackson and, obediently, everyone in the majority bloc went along except for two who sought Ford's permission to vote for Terry Sanford for sentimental reasons.

The governor rationalized the situation fairly well, we must acknowledge, declaring that McGovern was a likely loser in Kentucky next November and that boosting Jackson might help Jackson to get the vice presidential nomination.

But there's another practical side to the matter. What if, just what if, McGovern became president? How much influence would Ford be able to exert for Kentucky after his last-ditch battle against McGovern?

HUDDLETON DUMPED... Dee Huddleston, the Democratic nominee for U.S. Senate, spent the political week with his home delegation at Miami Beach and lived things up a bit with a reception at poolside in the Fort Lauderdale hotel.

Fortunately, we suppose, he was hit up and dumped into the pool by some high-spirited party guests.

He did come up to the surface, and one was proclaimed that fact as a good omen for November.

CIVICS LESSON—The administration was deciding whether to reject the low bid on the University of Kentucky sta-

dium because of a clerical error.

If so, it could have chosen the second lowest bidder—who we're told planned to sub-contract the electrical work to Lawrence Wester of Lexington, brother of William Wester, chief aide to Ford.

The decision was to let the low bidder have the job anyway, which in effect deprived Lawrence Wester of the sub-contract.

Who made the recommendation? Way, William Wester. This heartening story comes from administration sources, but we have no reason to doubt it.

THAT OLD STOPPED CLOCK. The Kentucky Bar Association, somewhat belatedly, has criticized the hourly practice of stopping the clock at midnight on the final day of a legislative session—thereby allowing passage of the legam bills through the early morning.

Since this illegal practice has been practiced as far back as anyone can remember, why the sudden concern by the bar's Board of Governors?

Sure it's illegal. But who has tried to stop it since 1934—when Lt. Gov. A.B. Chandler refused to sign some legislation passed after midnight?

Instead of getting better, the situation seems to get worse every biennium. Despite vows that everything would be clear by 10 p.m., groggy newsmen emerged from the final session at 6:15—that's a.m., not p.m. There's Lt. Gov. Julian Carroll's suggestion that no final passage be considered of any legislation after the next to the last day? It might work.

But what's to keep the clock from being stopped the next to the last night, instead of a night later?

Premium Increased

On Medical Insurance

The basic premium rate for the medical insurance part of Medicare will go up from \$2.50 to \$3.00 a month beginning July 1, according to Henry Tackett, social security district manager in Somerset.

The medical insurance part of Medicare helps pay for doctor bills and a variety of other medical expenses for people 65 and over. The program is funded by individual premiums matched by the Federal Government.

"The 20-cent increase in the premium in July compares to a 30-cent increase in 1971 and a \$1.30 increase in 1970," Tackett said.

"The low increase this year reflects savings in the administration of Medicare as well as lower anticipated medical costs because of the Price Commission's guidelines limiting physicians' fee increases to an average 2 1/2 per cent

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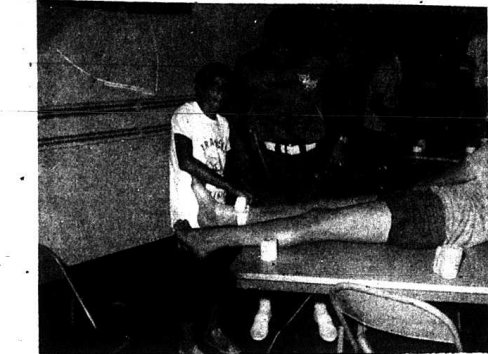

CARTER COMMENTS

Congressman Tim Lee Carter of Kentucky expressed pleasure that the House of Representatives recently passed by overwhelming margins three important measures aimed toward improving the health and well-being of many people. "My colleagues and I on the Public Health and Environment Subcommittee," stated Representative Carter, "worked long and hard for the development and final passage of these bills."

H.R. 14424 would establish a National Institute of Aging to serve as a focal point for activities of the National Institute of Health which relate to the elderly. The bill also seeks to improve mental health care facilities for the aged.

H.R. 14455 would extend the Public Health Service Act for three years and would authorize grants for specific communicable disease prevention programs. Kentucky's Fifth District Representative was the manager of this bill on his side of the state during the debate on the floor of the House, and he pointed out that he was "pleased with the success of this effort."

H.R. 15081 would advance the national effort against heart and lung diseases by enlarging the activities of the National Heart and Lung Institute and the National Institutes of Health. Diseases of the heart, blood vessels, lungs and blood are among the major causes of death and disability in the U.S. Cardiovascular disease afflicts more than 27 million people annually, another 20 million people are disabled with diseases of the lung. Carter stated, "We have made great strides in this area, but much more needs to be done if we are to determine primary causes and apply effective preventive measures. I shall continue to work for legislation which makes these programs more effective, and I hope that we will be able to conquer the many diseases which hinder our productivity and our national well-being."

a year," he said. The Medicare law requires an annual review of the cost of the medical insurance program. The premium rate is adjusted to cover the estimated medical expenses of Medicare patients during the 12 months beginning July 1.

"The cost of the program was \$95 million more estimates made last year," Tackett said. "Yet without the Price Commission limit on physician fees, it would have been necessary to increase the premium to at least \$6 a month."

The medical insurance part of Medicare paid \$2 billion in benefits on behalf of 9 1/2 million people in fiscal 1971. Almost everyone 65 and over is enrolled — about 20 million people, according to Tackett.

The medical insurance supplements Medicare hospital insurance, which is funded by social security contributions and helps pay for hospital bills and certain follow-up care of people 65 and over. Medicare is administered by the Social Security Administration of the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare.
