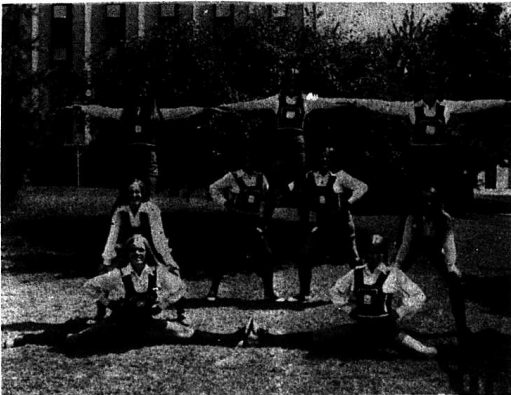

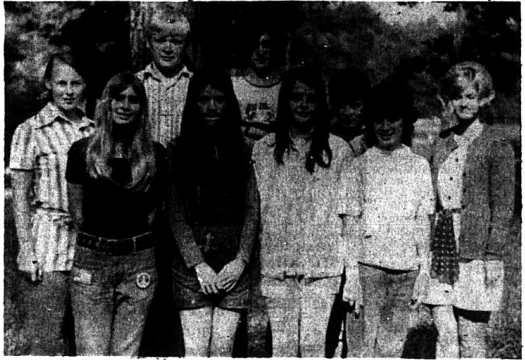

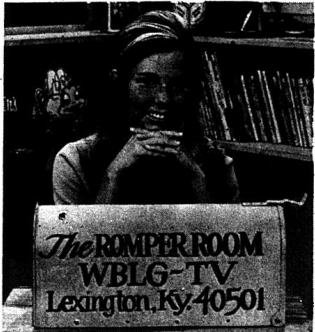

NOTICE

S.2507, the Bayh bill, has passed with amendment the Senate of the U.S. by a vote of 88 to 25. It will next be up for consideration in the House of Representatives. This bill has been widely misrepresented as a proposal to prohibit the sale of poor quality, crudely made and unsafe handguns. The term used for these handguns is "Saturday Night Special," a meaningless catch phrase never successfully defined.

Actually, the Bayh bill goes far beyond its stated purpose. It would restrict the sale or delivery of handguns to those models approved by the Secretary of the Treasury. It would eliminate the sale or delivery of one-third of all handgun models now made in the United States without reference to quality or price, or their use for self-protection or the defense of home and business.

Attempts were made on the floor of the Senate to amend this bill to make it far more restrictive, including registration of all firearms, licensing of all firearms owners and the outright banning of private ownership of all handguns. These amendments were soundly defeated. However — there is certainly a likelihood that the attempt will be made again in the House.

Your representative in the Congress of the United States will be at home for at least part of the Congressional recess beginning August 14. Bear in mind all congressmen want to know how you feel on this vital subject. Call him, write him, see him, write him, but be most important this matter to you. Never underestimate the importance to him of your voice as a member of his constituency.

Time is critical! Action is urged! There must be a flood of letters, calls and telegrams from sportsmen to their congressmen.

PRINCIPAL PROVISIONS OF S.2507 AS PASSED BY THE SENATE AUGUST 9, 1972

1. No federal firearms license (manufacturer, importer, dealer or collector) may sell or deliver any handgun model which has not been approved by the Secretary of the Treasury.
2. The Secretary shall not approve for sale or delivery by a licensee any handgun model unless representative samples of such handgun model have been tested and evaluated and found to meet the criteria set forth in the bill. (The emphasis in the criteria relates to overall size, barrel length, frame construction and weight, virtually without regard to quality, safety or price.)
3. No pistol shall be approved for sale or delivery if it has an overall length of less than six inches and a height of less than four inches; no revolver shall be approved if it has a barrel less than three inches and an overall frame length less than four and one-half inches.
4. No person may reduce the length of the barrel or the overall length of a handgun previously approved by the Secretary if, as a result of such modification, the handgun no longer meets the standards for approval.
5. A person may voluntarily transfer at any time any handgun which he owns or possesses to any Federal, State or local law-enforcement agency. If the handgun so transferred is a model which the Secretary has not approved for sale or delivery by a licensee, and if the person transferring the handgun has proof of lawful ownership, he shall be entitled to receive from the United States "a payment equal to the reasonable value of such handgun." The value will be determined as of the day prior to the enactment of the Handgun Control Act of 1972.
6. The following principal amendments were adopted by the Senate during floor debate: (a) No recordkeeping is required for over-the-counter sale of .22 caliber rimfire ammunition; (b) a non-licensee may import without going through a licensee one rifle and one shotgun a year; (c) a non-licensee may transfer without going through a licensee a rifle or shotgun to non-resident immediate family members; (d) a technical writer for a professional journal or magazine may receive for testing and evaluation firearms in interstate commerce without going through a licensee.

POLICY STATEMENT ON BAYH BILL, S.2507

HANDGUN CONTROL ACT OF 1972

1. The National Rifle Association is compelled to oppose the Bayh Bill, S.2507, because it has been misrepresented to the American public and, in reality, represents a long and dangerous step toward disarmament law-abiding American citizens at all levels of our society.
2. The Bayh Bill has been described by its supporters as a measure only to outlaw so-called "Saturday Night Specials," a meaningless catch phrase for a kind of small handgun that has never been successfully defined.
3. If the bill merely outlawed the sale of handguns which are unsafe or unsuitable for sale, it would be a good law, not an object. Such is not the case. This bill minimizes the question of safety, and the major criteria provided are size and barrel length. The Secretary of the Treasury could add other restrictive criteria, should he choose to do so, and to outlaw by regulation their sale and manufacture.

(The provision above underlined was removed by Amendment in the Senate)

4. Further, the Bayh Bill would require the Government to, buy banned handguns at a tremendous cost to the taxpayers, with no assurance of taking them away from criminals.
5. Beyond that, the Bayh Bill, by prohibiting further U.S. manufacture of virtually all small revolvers and pistols, would mistakenly deprive millions of law-abiding citizens of a type of firearm particularly suited for the defense of their families and businesses. Its enactment would leave the American public more at the mercy of criminals than ever before and could encourage a sharp rise in crime. This effort to disarm the people should be rejected by the Congress.

Preheated 375° oven
PASTRY SHELL:
1 1/2 cups all-purpose flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 tablespoon butter
3 tablespoons lard
1 cup water
1 teaspoon lemon juice
FILLING:
9 slices bacon, cooked and crumbled
1 cup (3 oz.) shredded Swiss cheese
2 tablespoons packaged bread crumbs
1 egg
2 cups light cream or half and half
1/2 teaspoon dry mustard
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/8 teaspoon cayenne pepper
1 tablespoon butter, cut into small pieces
1/2 cup (4 1/2 oz.) evaporated milk plus 1/2 cup water may be beaten with eggs and seasonings in place of the 2 cups light cream or half and half.

To prepare Shell: In a bowl mix together flour and salt. Cut in butter and lard until mixture resembles coarse meal. Gradually add water and lemon juice mixing lightly with a fork. Roll out on lightly floured surface 1/4-inch thick and 13 inches in diameter; place in pie pan. Trim off excess dough around edge; decorate edge with lines of fork. Cut waxed paper into a 12-inch square; butter one side and place buttered side down on bottom of shell. Pour 2 cups uncooked rice or beans onto waxed paper (this keeps pastry flat while baking). Bake 8-9 minutes. Remove waxed paper and rice. Return shell to oven and bake 10 minutes. To prepare Filling: Sprinkle 2 tablespoons cheese and bread crumbs over bottom of pastry shell. Top with 1/2 the cooked bacon. In mixing bowl beat eggs, cream, mustard, salt and pepper until well blended; stir in remaining cheese. Pull out oven rack, place pan on rack, paper and rice. Return shell to oven and bake 10 minutes. To prepare Filling: Fill with egg mixture. Sprinkle remaining bacon on top; dot with butter. Bake 20-25 minutes or until a knife inserted near center comes out clean. Sprinkle over parsley OR scallions. Let stand 10 minutes before serving.

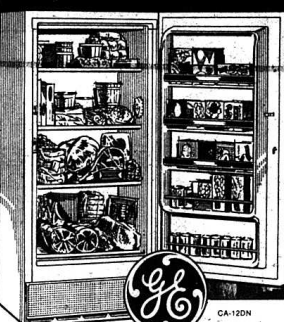

Sandwiches—A British Legacy
Although the British gave the colonists a very hard time during the Revolutionary War, they also have given Americans many wonderful gifts. And probably the least appreciated, but most useful gift, has been the sandwich.

Americans eat more than 266 million sandwiches every day. And since August is Sandwich Month, and wheat products are in good supply, now's the time to make sure you're eating your share.

There are many different stories of how the sandwich was born, but most "sandwich experts" give credit to a British nobleman, John Montagu, the Fourth Earl of Sandwich. Some say he invented the sandwich while playing cards—that he ordered a servant to bring him two slices of bread with some roast meat between them so he could continue to play.

Others claim the sandwich was discovered when the Earl was forced to make a hasty escape from a lady friend's home due to an unexpected visitor. He grabbed his coat, hat and dinner on the way out the door, placing the meat between two pieces of bread to keep from soiling his clothes.

Just as there are countless stories about the Earl and how he invented the sandwich, there are countless ways to prepare sandwiches. So try out your own concoctions.

Be sure to include fresh summer vegetables, eggs, peanut butter, chicken or turkey. All these foods are in plentiful supply.

Consumer Clips
Most sandwich fillings freeze well. But you'll want to avoid freezing cooked egg whites, which become tough; mayonnaise and some salad dressings, which separate; and raw vegetables, which lose their crispness.

For fresh-tasting, non-soybean sandwiches, spread softened butter or margarine evenly to the edge of each bread slice. Peanut butter and moistened cream cheese also prevent moist fillings from soaking into the bread.

Sandwich Making

Save yourself some time when you're making sandwiches. First, line up the bread slices in matching pairs on your kitchen counter. Then spread the filling on alternate slices. For even spreading, use a flexible spatula. If you have the filling spread, put on the top bread

slices. Then stack two or three sandwiches, one on top of the other, and cut with a sharp knife. And there you have your sandwiches....all made and ready to wrap.

Before-The-Concert Party Recipes
Open Face Hero Sandwiches
2 Hero rolls
Softened butter or margarine
6 to 8 slices hard or soft cheese, salami, bologna, summer sausage or canned ham

3 to 4 slices American or Swiss cheese, cut in quarters
Thinly sliced onion, optional
Thinly sliced cucumber
Thousands Island Dressing

Cut each roll in half lengthwise, top to bottom, to within 1/4 inch of bottom crust. Spread cut surfaces with butter. Fold most slices in quarters and arrange in rolls. Place a half or quarter cheese slice in each sausage slice and fill with onion and cucumber slices. Serve topped with dressing, as desired. Place each sandwich in a plastic container; seal. Makes 2 sandwiches.

Frankfurter Dice
8 frankfurters
1 1/2 cup peanut butter
8 bacon slices
8 sliced frankfurter buns
5 1/2 frankfurters, lengthwise.
Spread about 2 teaspoons of peanut butter in each slit. Wrap a bacon slice diagonally around each frankfurter and fasten with toothpicks. Broil, turning so bacon cooks on all sides. Remove toothpicks and serve in frankfurter buns. Serves 20.

Meat'n Cheese Salad Sandwich
1 package (3 ounces) cream cheese, at room temperature
1/3 cup salad dressing
2 tablespoons well drained sweet pickle relish
1 tablespoon prepared mustard
2 cups finely chopped fully cooked wieners, sliced bologna, cotto salami or boiled ham

12 slices white or whole wheat bread
Combine and beat cream cheese, salad dressing, pickle relish and mustard until smooth. Stir in chopped meat. Spread an equal amount of butter over one side of each bread slice. Spread an equal amount of sandwich spread evenly over 1/2 of buttered bread slices. Cover each with a second bread slice, buttered side down, making 6 sandwiches.

If desired, these sandwiches may be made 1 day or a week ahead of time, packed in plastic containers and frozen. When packing lunches for school, work or picnics, sandwiches may be transferred from freezer to lunch box and allowed to defrost on-the-way.
