Turkeys, Fresh and frozen, cucumbers, sweet corn, cabbage, celery, carrots, watermelon, rice, cranberry sauce and cranberry juice.

It is time to can or freeze some of the delicious fresh fruits and vegetables that are in your garden. Not only will home canned vegetables taste

good next winter, but they will help to keep your food cost down.

Here are some general rules to follow when you are canning fruits and vegetables:

1. Gather foods when they have the best flavor. The quality of the canned food will not be any higher than the quality of the raw food. The flavor changes very fast after food is gathered, and should be canned as soon as possible.

2. All Fruits should be ripe but firm. Fruits that are partially green usually do not have as good a flavor. Small fruits such as berries and plums should be picked over carefully, discarding the sour or bruised ones.

3. Vegetables should be young and tender and freshly gathered. Vegetables that are too old for canning will be darker and will not have as good a flavor as you are expecting.

4. Get everything ready for canning before you start preparing. Get the canner cleaned, and the color and flavor of the food will be better when you prepare food for canning as quickly as possible. Check jars to make sure they are sound and wash and scald them. Turn while you are preparing the food. Check screw bands to make sure they are in good condition.

5. Use the pressure cooker for canning meats and vegetables except tomatoes, barb, sauerkraut. This is recommended by U.S. Department of Agriculture. Use the boiling water bath for fruits, including tomatoes, rhubarb and sauerkraut. Fruits are acid foods and can be safely canning at boiling temperatures. For more information, contact your county Home Economics Extension Agent.

**Food Clips**

What makes potatoes green? Greening is caused by exposure to natural or artificial light. Sometimes only the skin is affected, but greening may penetrate the flesh. Green portions contain the alkaloid solanine which gives a bitter flavor.

Remember dehydrated vegetable flakes may be used for flavoring in place of fresh vegetables in equivalent amounts such as two sprigs of parsley equal one teaspoon of dehydrated flakes. One half medium stalk of celery equals one tablespoon.

It's still melon time. If you're buying ripe cantaloupes, look for a yellowish surface color; honeydews, a creamy color; casabas, a yellow color; and Persian melons, a dull gray-green color. A ripe cantaloup has no stem; other melons however, have stems attached.

Members of the red pepper family, (red and chili pepper, paprika, and bell pepper flakes) lose quality in about six months. Use tightly covered containers to help retain the quality.

Beet, caraway, celery, parsley, and tarragon are often referred to as "salad herbs" because they are used in salads.

Mixes can be stored on the kitchen shelf but use them within a reasonable time. They do not keep well in extremely warm temperatures and they do deteriorate with storage. Under cool conditions, however, mixes normally have a shelf life as long as a year.

Word to the wise homemaker! Don't mix new milk with old unless you are going to use it immediately. Just to be safe—don't put unused milk back in the original container.

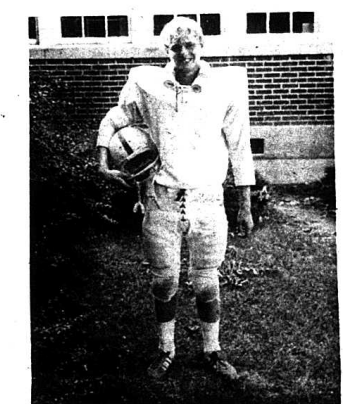
Fixing summer fruit cocktails? Don't forget that ascorbic acid helps to keep fruit and vegetables from darkening. Add one-fourth teaspoon of crystalline ascorbic acid (vitamin C) to a quart of fruit or vegetable before processing. It retards oxidation, one cause of darkening of home canned foods.

Can you refreeze meat? Thawed meat or poultry may be refrozen if it contains ice crystals or has been kept cold and has been held at refrigerator temperature for no more than a day or two. In general, if a food is safe to eat, it is safe to refreeze.

If you have forgotten to take the meat out of the freezer in time—try fast defrosting—just place product in watertight wrapper in cold water or in closed double paper bag at room temperature. This will help to keep surface of product cool while it defrosts, thus protecting against bacteria growth. What is freeze safe? It is the drying out of the surface tissues of food giving it a white appearance. It is not harmful, but does make the dehydrated areas tough and tasteless when cooked.

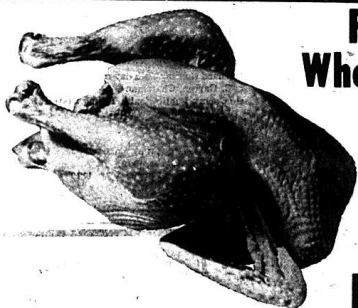

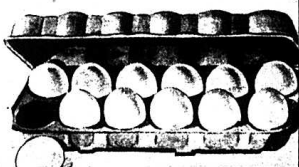

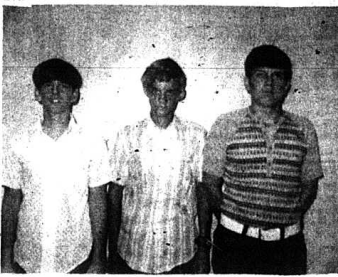

## Six Day Care Centers Planned For Rockcastle Co.

The Rockcastle County Economic Opportunity Council has formally selected John Gary Hamm as its County Supervisor for Rockcastle's Child Development Centers. Mr. Hamm was formerly employed by the Rockcastle County Board of Education as a teacher and assistant basketball coach at Broadhead School. His office will be located on the second floor of the school administration building, Richmond Street in Mt. Vernon and will be opened September 1.

This new service will consist of day care and/or child development services to be offered at six locations within

the county. These locations are: Mt. Vernon, Broadhead, Livingston, Roundstone, Maple Grove and Sand Springs. Transportation service will be provided to serve as many as possible.

Mr. Hamm explained that the centers are expected to be opened and ready to receive children by January 1, 1973. His time, beginning September 1, will be devoted to consulting with applicants for the different positions (which will be advertising in forthcoming issues of this paper), arranging for center space, office space, attending training sessions and planning program content.

The RCEOC, as the governing body, is composed of nine directors representing the following institutions or agencies: the County Judge's office; the County Attorney; Health Department; Department of Economic Security; Rehabilitation County Schools; Farmers Home Administration; County Extension Service and the Cumberland Production Credit Association as a lending institution. The corporation has adopted by-laws which provide that a Council Advisory to the board will consist of all other agencies and service organizations that care to participate. The center will provide service care for pre-school four years and older, with emphasis being placed on families in the lower economic bracket. It is especially designed for the lower income working mothers or those that may be able to accept a job as a result of this service. More specific guidelines for eligibility will be made public when determined.

## Ky. Tel Announces New Direct System

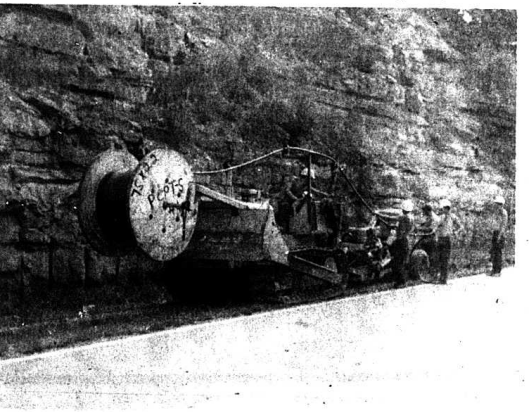
Don Partin, Southern District Manager of Kentucky Telephone Company, announced that construction is in progress on the new Long-Distance calling system for residents of Mt. Vernon, Livingston and Broadhead. This system, consisting of underground cable, will replace the existing microwave system installed in 1959. The present system was designed for a 20 year growth period; however, due to the increased demand for telephones in Rockcastle County, it is now operating at full capacity.

The new cable system will travel an underground route from the toll center in London via Livingston to Mt. Vernon and Broadhead. This cable is being placed underground to insure a minimum amount of service interruptions. Partin stated, "and is an integral part of our company's overall program to

place our lines underground." Upon completion on November 15, 1972, a 50% increase in long distance lines from Broadhead to London will be realized. A 30% increase from Mt. Vernon and 25% increase from Livingston to London will also be included in the new system.

Work is scheduled to begin in December, 1972, for the enlargement of the Broadhead central office building. New switching equipment is now on order for this office with the final completion of the building addition and installation of this new equipment scheduled for February, 1974.

Beginning in January, 1973, an additional 400 lines and 400 numbers will be installed in the Mt. Vernon central office. This work is scheduled for completion in May, 1973, and will enable the company to provide telephone service to new applicants.

ate race--the major candidates trying to get good grip on the tax issue before the enemy could seize the initiative.

So we have the spectacle of Democratic Rep. Huddleston talking the people that Republican Louie B. Nunn broke his promise not to raise taxes after becoming governor. And the spectacle of Nunn, who did indeed raise them, charging Huddleston's "men-

Well, why not? Both were in the Capitol at the time in different influential roles and actually can take some credit. May we simplify matters on a non-partisan basis? Nunn promised in 1967 not to increase taxes. That pledge was broken the next year. Ford promised in 1971 not to increase taxes--except for the coal severance levy. That pledge was broken the next year.

Well, is there a shade of difference in this conglomeration of charges, countercharges and subtleties? We think so, though you have to look a little beneath the surface. The Ford-Huddleston forces claim, and with considerable reason, that their taxes impose a burden which is heaviest on those most able to pay. Granted, the coal operators don't see it that way nor do many businessmen who were socked with higher levies this year. But they--and those similarly situated--do have more money than the blue collar worker or low-income family.

That's the basic story of "progressive" taxes. Keyed to raising income on a broad base from everybody. But there's another angle. The Ford-Huddleston team is heralding the repeal of the sales tax on food, due to go into effect only a month before the November election. This repeal does benefit those least able to pay. But we seem to recall it first was proposed by Tom Emberton, the Republican candidate for governor last year, and was not taken up by Ford for quite a while. And Nunn certainly has some telling points when he lists the types of fees and taxes increased under Ford--such as the gasoline tax, college tuition, water bills, the Jefferson County occupational tax and higher interest on industrial loan rates.

Those kinds of increases hit at the lower income citizens in varying degrees. Conclusion: In the political squabbling over taxes, neither side is pure or candid. What did you expect? \*\*\*\*\*

WAITING ROOM BLUES

While Dr. Robert Martin, the president of Eastern Kentucky University, was trying to get in to see Gov. Ford about a complaint he had in regard to the law enforcement school there, Dr. Ois Singletary, president of the University of Kentucky, was invited in by the governor for an hour-long chat. \*\*\*\*\*

Capitol Digest Mount Vernon Signal

TAX RECEIPTS UP DURING JULY Revenue Commissioner John Ross says total General Fund receipts during July, the first month of the new fiscal year, were up 9.9 per cent over the same period last fiscal year. Road Fund receipts increased fractionally over last July, totalling \$22,970,587. However, Road Fund tax receipts jumped 56.3 per cent, totalling \$31,983,607. Ross said non-tax receipts decreased significantly during July, because no receipts from federal matching funds were processed during the month. Individual income tax receipts increased 35.6 per cent during July, while sales and use tax revenues were up 8.3 per cent. Corporation income tax receipts were down 53.4 per cent during the month, primarily because of delays in processing, Ross said. Coal severance tax revenues totaled \$2,684,731 for the month. Motor fuels normal tax receipts totaled \$16,234,010 for the month, a 71.2 per cent increase over July, 1971. Ross attributed the increase to the advancement of the filing date for the tax. July receipts included gasoline tax payments for May and the first half of June. Also included was \$33,000 in two cents per gallon "motor stocks" tax due on seven-cents-per-gallon inventory on hand at the close of business June 30.

OPINIONS TOUCH ATTORNEYS, VOTERS The state attorney general's office says a state attorney may hold a state Highway Department contract for title work without conflict of interest as long as he performs no title work in his home county. "The state Highway Department informs us that title work involving lands in the county attorney's own county is not assigned to county attorneys," the opinion said. It also said pay for such work "would be money received in private practice" and would not apply toward the \$12,900 maximum salary for county attorneys. 

- 1 pound ground beef
- 1 chopped onion - large
- 2 tablespoons butter
- 4 cups coarse chunked cabbage
- 2 medium potatoes - sliced

- 1 can mushrooms (optional) (drained)
- 1 cup EVAPORATED MILK

Heat shortening and brown meat. Add potatoes, onions and carrots; salt, oil and pepper to taste. Fill kettle with water to within 1 inch of top. Cover and simmer about 1 1/2 hours. Keep ample water to cover. When vegetables are tender (may be less time), add carrots and water. Cook until gravy thickens; then add peas, mushrooms and milk. Drain mushrooms; may be substituted. Stir just long enough to blend and serve immediately.
