free news media are protected by the United States Constitution and are essential to a democratic state, and

WHEREAS radio is a sound medium which depends to a great degree upon taped recordings of news events to function properly, and

WHEREAS meetings of public bodies such as county school boards are of public interest and open to everyone.

BE IT RESOLVED that the University of Kentucky Chapter of Sigma Delta Chi, a national professional journalistic society, opposes the action by the Rockcastle County (Ky.) Board of Education, barring WRVK Radio, Renfro Valley, Kentucky from recording public meetings of the board;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the University of Kentucky Chapter of Sigma Delta Chi calls upon the journalistic community to show its support of WRVK Radio and its opposition to the actions by the Rockcastle County Board of Education.
Adopted December 3, 1972

In the letter sent to Mr. Parsons from Sigma Delta Chi, it states, quote: "We can't help but view this as an unnecessary restraint upon a free press and hope that the board will reconsider its position."

WRVK now feels that we should tape school board meetings for reporting and the school board should not have any reason not to permit us to record meetings which are open to the public.

WRVK does not understand why Mr. Parsons wrote the letter to Mr. Miller at all if he did not intend to keep WRVK from recording school board meetings.

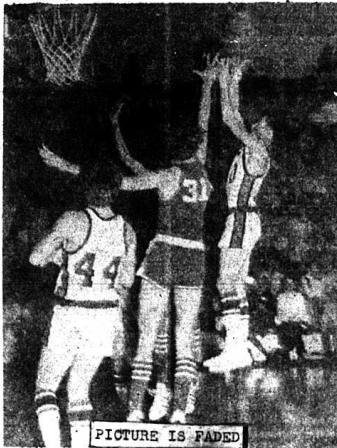

LIONS DISTRICT MEETING HELD HERE

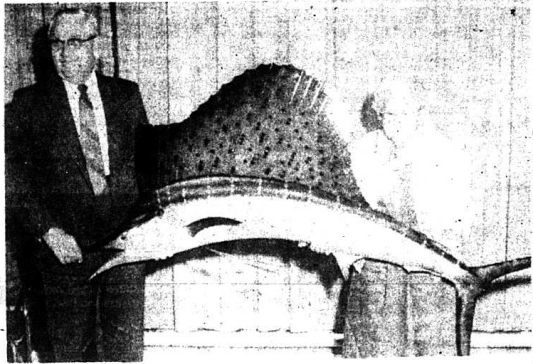

3,471 PERSONS RECEIVE FOOD STAMPS

During August, 3,471 low-income persons in Rockcastle County received food stamps valued at \$62,785., the Department of Economic Security announced today.

This record compares to 3,455 low-income persons who received food stamps valued at \$82,513.00 during July 1972.

\$55,388 received here in Revenue sharing funds

A total of \$55,388 was received Monday by the four governing bodies in Rockcastle County from Federal revenue sharing funds. The total amount breakdown as follows: County Government, \$39,293; City of Brodhead, \$9,937; City of Mt. Vernon, \$5,477 and City of Livingston, \$1,681.

The amount of each check was a surprise to the recipient, the county and Brodhead had not expected to receive that large an amount and Livingston and Mt. Vernon had expected to receive more.

Bobby Proctor, a member of the Brodhead Town Board, said that the Board had not decided definitely what to do with the money but would release a statement, probably in the week's paper, as to how the money would be spent. Mt. Vernon City Clerk Errol Cromer said that the Council had not decided how to best use the money either but were first going to contact someone and see if there was a possibility that a building might be made in figuring their (Mt. Vernon's) share. An informed source from Livingston reported that they had expected to use their share on a fire truck and on repaving city streets but there doesn't seem to be much chance of improving any public service on \$681.

Of course, the county has already decided to spend over \$17,000 on a grader and possibly a sizeable portion on a county-wide garbage collection system on which bids will be taken at a later date. Other

than these two items, Fiscal Court has not made public any other project to benefit from the share.

Beginning Rockcastle Recollections

By John Lair

Rockcastle is one of the very few counties of Kentucky with no published history and every year that goes by makes the task of writing one a little harder. With the wealth of memories of the county's history fifty years ago, Ralph Griffin, with a complete file of the old Mt. Vernon Signals, plus his own note books, plus his very unusual writing ability, could have done an excellent job if he had had been spared a few years longer. Now, with the old Signal files in my possession, plus access to Ralph's note books, plus Bill Davis' and other accounts of Mt. Vernon in the late eighties, I guess I am next in line for the difficult task of trying to get into print some of our earlier history that might otherwise be someday forgotten.

With a little time on my hands now, I am willing to take on the job if I can have the help of all who are interested in such an undertaking. In the strictest sense this will not be a factual history since all our earlier records were destroyed in three originating in the county clerk's office February 13, 1873 and again on August 13, 1873, in the Circuit Court Clerk's office, according to information furnished me by Judge Charles H. Hays. I have decided to title the book "Rockcastle Recollections" since it must be largely based on what the older folks remembered and passed on to succeeding generations.

The earlier part of the proposed book, having to do with the pioneer movement across this part of Kentucky, the trails followed, the troubles encountered and the settlements made, will be factual and historically accurate up to the forming of the county in 1810. I have already spent much time and research on this and hope to present the discoveries that have not yet found their way into any history of the Commonwealth. It is the period, beginning with the keeping of county records, that we cannot cover in any other way than the traditions of our older people.

Generally a county historian will spend from six to ten years in preparing his manuscript. This one will have to be finished much quicker than that. With the help of others in the county, I believe it can be done not later than sometime next year or early in the year following. It might speed up matters if my job is that of editor rather than author. I am expecting Logan Bryant to write the chapter on transportation. I am asking Judge Charles Carter to write on early legal activities, court trials, etc. Ema Hays Coffey and Janie Ramsey can help a lot in family stories, Linda Ashley (formerly Linda Ramsey) is so situated as to be able to check old state records, Lella Mae O'Parr and other older persons with good memories can give us a pretty good picture of early Mt. Vernon and we Judge Bill Davis' good account of the old Mt. Vernon in the late 1800's. I especially want somebody to write the history of churches in Rockcastle and somebody to give an account of early schools and teachers. Someone is needed to tell the early history of Livingston, Brodhead, Pine Hill, Mareburg and other settlements and communities. I will be short on information on the section around Quail and Laurel Green and need some good historians from that part of the county.

What almost everyone can do to help is to send in the history of their own family. We will particularly want to know when the first of the name came to Rockcastle County and where they came from originally. Tell me what you can about your folks and maybe from wide research I can add something to it. For instance, the Mullins family trace their history back to Nathan and Varrilla Mullins who came to America on the Mayflower. They fail to record that Francis Mullins, hero of "The Courtship of Miles Standish" was of the name and that his last name was Mullins, also no doubt, the daughter of the said Nathan and Varrilla. Mail a copy of your family history in, or bring it in, together with any very old picture you may have of your ancestors, I am creating a big indexed file and can take care of all such things and see that they are not lost.

The Mt. Vernon Signal will be sort of a clearing house for much of the material in this book. When I have a story I am not quite certain about I want to run it in the Signal to see if some reader can make correction in it or furnish additional facts so it will be correct before going into the book. If you know something of interest to the county send it in and let's get it in print before it is lost.

Gov. Wendell Ford has reviewed his first year in office and found it -- ho-ho! your breath -- good!

Of course, nobody at the news conference in which he went over the "short bus" 12 months expected him to do much other than point with pride.

As objectively as possible, we must acknowledge that the governor has considerable reason to do so, if you count the 1972 General Assembly's new laws on environmental protection.

Come to think of it, so did Republican Louis B. Nunn, when he finished his first year. Many people were commenting at the time that, after all, Louis was doing all right.

Naturally, Nunn was in a better position to do all right than Ford has been, namely

because he had scads of new money after "persuading" the 1968 Legislature to raise the sales tax 2 cents.

That move, as it probably turns out, was a key factor in Nunn's defeat for the U.S. Senate last month.

Ford was hampered by a no-tax promise that he had to keep although his opponents question his faithfulness to that pledge.

Anyway, he was burdened further by a promise we feel was made reluctantly in the political crosswinds -- the elimination of the entire 5-cent sales tax from most groceries.

To offset the revenue loss, Ford announced there would be a severance tax. The administration has claimed this transfer of the tax burden benefits the little fellow.

Granted that Ford is doing

a good, maybe excellent job so far, we now come to politics as usual.

As one observer commented the other day, every new governor spends his first six months denouncing what the opposing regime has done politically, then begins to try to justify the same thing in the new administration.

Maybe an example is in those 48 newly-created non-merit system posts where "skilled professionals" are inspecting junkyards and doing all they can to beautify our state.

In my memory foggy, or do we vaguely recall that the Ford camp was accusing the GOP officials of doing some-

thing similar under Nunn? The posts had other titles -- " aides" or the like -- but the people that held them also were magically exempt from such mundane matters as examinations and strict standards.

There is indeed a difference, though. Today's crop are all Democrats and yesterday's batch, was purely Republican.

MS BRADSHAW? -- Finance Commissioner Don Bradshaw, who has been designated secretary of the cabinet under Ford in the reorganization plan, also had a quip.

He said he since has received an invitation to join the National Association of Secretaries.

WE SLIPPED -- Speaking of foggy memory, we goofed last week by noting that the Ned Breathitt administration backed Katherine Peden for Senate in 1968.

Breathitt certainly did, but his term as governor ended in 1967.

BEHIND THE EIGHT BALL AGAIN -- Just our luck. No sooner had we given some substance to Ford's hints he just might consider a Senate race in 1974 than he up and says he was just joshing the press -- and that he is obligated to finish out his term as governor.

That's commendable. We think fried chicken king John Y. Brown, other prospective Democratic candidates -- and even Republican incumbent Marlow Cook -- may be relieved.

But, a couple of thoughts. Why tease the newsmen at all? Why even hint he might run?

One obvious reason is that Ford might want to avoid being bothered by other prospective candidates who want his endorsement or encouragement. Okay, then why the change of mind a few days later?

Let's assume the governor ran for the Senate in 1974 and won. That would leave Lt. Gov. Julian Carroll to finish the term.

Does Ford really want to do that?

CAUSE FOR CONCERN -- James Fleming, the governor's aide in charge of state reorganization, was telling a legislative committee about it the other day and mentioned that the Mines and Minerals Department is moving under the Human Resources cabinet program for good reasons, even if the classification raises some eyebrows.

He added that the federal government is talking about taking the same position in some proposed reshuffling.

"That's the only thing that makes me feel uneasy," Fleming quipped. "If the federals are taking the same position, you wonder whether you're right."

Having received this information, WRVY was curious whether or not we would be permitted by the school board to tape the meetings, so we attended meeting December 4th and took our tape recorders. Nothing was said about the tape recorders and we were permitted to tape the meetings.

However, after returning from the meeting Mr. Grider phoned Mr. Parsons and asked for permission to use portions of the tape on the news broadcast. Mr. Parsons replied, "No way." Only portions of the tape could be used for broadcasting because only the most important points of any report are

used for a news broadcast. Anyone knows that it is not ethical for a radio or TV station to play a whole tape of a meeting on their news broadcast. Time does not permit and it would become monotonous.

On December 5, WRVY received a letter, a copy of a

resolution passed by University of Ky. Chapter of Sigma Delta Chi, and a copy of a letter which they sent to Mr. Parsons.

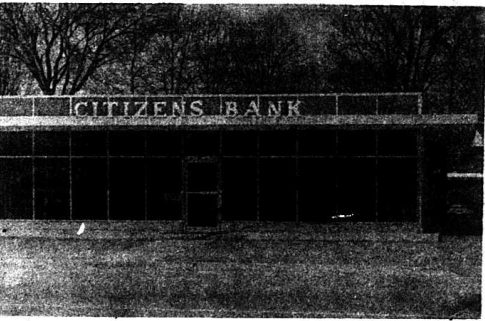

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Home Line

How to Buy a Christmas Tree
 The tradition of a decorated Christmas tree in the United States may date back to the Revolutionary War, when homesick Hessian troops cut and decorated fir trees as was their German custom. Since then, the Christmas tree—with its forest fragrances and freshness—has come to represent the Yuletide season. It is the mainstay of both indoor and outdoor holiday decorations.

Today, selecting the perfect Christmas tree is one of the highlights of many families' pre-holiday preparations. Choosing a tree that is "just right" for you will be easier if you know what species you

are looking for, the different features that indicate a good tree, and how to select and maintain freshness.

Practically all species of evergreens are used for Christmas trees, although some are more popular and are in greater supply than others. No one species can be considered the best all-round Christmas tree, for each has its own individual characteristics. Although people in some areas of the country have a preference for a certain species, the Christmas trees that are most widely grown and sold are those that are most available to consumers in every part of the country: Balsam Fir, Douglas

Fir, Eastern Redcedar, Scotch Pine and White Pine.

In selecting just the right tree for decorating, most people look for a tree that is healthy, free from damage, and well-trimmed. They generally want a tree that appears gently from a full bottom and has an ample number of branches for hanging ornaments.

Trees meeting a U.S. grade will have characteristic features, since the grade standards require that the trees be:

- Fresh—with pliable needles that are firmly attached to the branches. Clean—almost completely free of moss, lichen, vines and other foreign matter.
- Healthy—fresh, natural appearance for particular species.
- Well-trimmed—free of all barren branches below the first whorl and smoothly cut at the butt.

Christmas Tree Care
 If you buy your tree several days before it will be set up and decorated, store it outside. Cut the butt of the tree at a diagonal about one inch above the original cut—this opens the pores and aids in the absorption of water. Place the butt end in a container of water. When you bring it into the house, saw the butt again, squaring off the diagonal. This facilitates placing the tree in a stand as well as aiding absorption.

Keep the butt end of the tree in a container of water the entire time it is in the house. Refill the container daily as the tree requires a lot of water. Sprinkling water on the branches and needles before you decorate the tree will help retain freshness.

Be sure that the base of the tree is supported and the tree is placed away from fireplaces, radiators, electric heaters, televisions or any other source of heat.

Candles, such as lighted candles, should never be used on or near the tree. In addition, never leave your home with the Christmas tree lights still on.

The longer the tree is indoors, the more combustible it will become. Check electric light cords for fraying and worn spots that could easily lead to fires. Also do not overload the electric circuit. In avoiding placing electric toys directly under the tree, be sure to avoid the use of combustible decorations.

Following these care and precaution measures should insure an attractive tree that stays fresh indoors for more than a week and a holiday season free from Christmas tree mishaps.

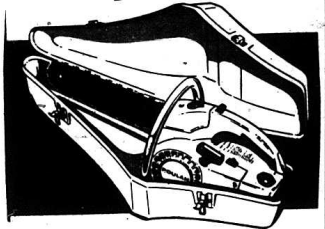

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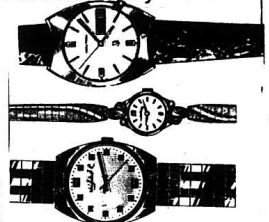

A White Christmas in Kentucky
Chances are Slim, Records Show

If you are dreaming of a white Christmas such as Grandpa used to tell about, the chances of your dream coming true range from about six percent in the extreme western end of the state to 10-20 percent over most of the rest of Kentucky.

These percentages, according to A.B. Elam, Jr., climatologist for Kentucky at the National Weather Service Office, University of Kentucky College of Agriculture, were based on snowfall records kept for many years. He emphasizes also that these are probabilities, not forecasts, and warns against snow enthusiasts setting their hopes too high. Records of white Christmas past indicate that such meteorological events are not usual occurrences in the Commonwealth.

In the past 23 years, says Elam, there have been only seven Christmas Days with any significant snow cover over Kentucky -- and all seven of these circumstances occurred during the past 12 years.

In 1960 and 1961, there was a snow cover of one inch or more over most of all of the state. In 1961 and 1962, snow covers were limited chiefly to the south and southeast. And, in 1966, snow cover was general except for much of the Bluegrass region and the northeast.

In 1969, snowfall on Christmas Day was general and the heaviest since the 1930s. Snow cover ranged from one to six inches over the greater part of Kentucky and probably was even deeper in the higher elevations of the southeast. On December 25, 1970, some snow fell in most sections of the state in the afternoon and evening with up to two inches in parts of the eastern third.

Christmas Day last year was snowless. Rather, it was a cloudy drizzly day with temperatures averaging from 10 to 30 degrees above normal. As a matter of fact, except in the higher elevations of the southeast, there was little snow at all in Kentucky during the entire month of December -- less than in any December since 1940.

So for those dreaming -- or longing -- for a white Christmas, and for others who would just as soon see it green, there are the probabilities based on records of years past, Elam says. This form of precipitation might be present this Christmas -- and then again it might not.

As December 25 approaches, you can be more certain by looking for extended forecasts and then reading weather forecasts. The National Weather Service prepares these from current weather observations, which are periodically revised to take later information and changing conditions into account.

Ordinance

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF MOUNT VERNON, KENTUCKY, ACCURATELY DEFINING THE BOUNDARIES OF THE UNINCORPORATED TERRITORY PROPOSED TO BE ANNEXED

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MOUNT VERNON, KENTUCKY DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. That the City of Mount Vernon, Kentucky desires to annex the following unincorporated territory to the now existing boundaries of the City of Mount Vernon, to-wit:

TRACT NO. 1 A certain tract

Beginning at a point in present north city limit line and property of Edgar Mullins and Hillview Sub-division, said point being 71.5 feet south of the back lot lines of No. 3 and No. 4. Lots of said Hillview Sub-division; also being 4032.9 feet east from the northwest corner of present city limit concrete marker; thence with back lot line of Lots No. 4, 5, and 6, North 27 degrees 00' East, 294.5 feet to northwest corner of Lot No. 6, and corner to Edgar Mullins and Harry Chastain; thence with line of Chastain and Bert Herrin South 74 degrees 30' East, 44.0 feet to point in line of Hart and being the northeast corner of Lot No. 14, of said Sub-division; thence with back lot line of Lots No. 14 and 13, South 24 degrees 00' West, 161.9 feet to point, said point being 43.1 feet north of southeast corner of Lot No. 13 and present north city limit line; thence with present north city limits line, Due East, 496.0 feet to point of beginning, containing 2.48 acres more or less.





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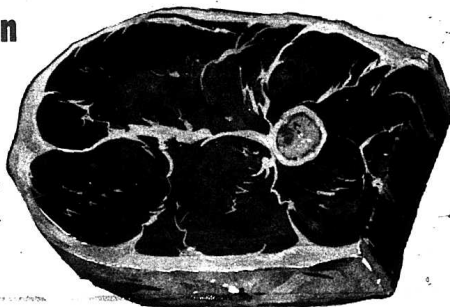
