Beginning Rockcastle Recollections

Rockmatle is one of the very few counties of Kantucky with no published history and every year that goes by makes the task of writing one a little harder. Cohend James Maret, with the wealth of material at his disposal, should have publishes such a history fifty years ago, Raiph Griffin, with a complete file of the old Mr. Vermon Signals, plus his own too books, plus his very unusual writing ability, could have done an excellent job if had had he been spared a few years longer. Now, with he old Signal files in my possession, plus access to Raiph's notebooks, plus Bill Davis' and other accounts of Mi. Vernon in the late eighties, I guess I am next in line for the difficult task of trying to get into print some of our earlier history that might otherwise be someday forgotten.

With a little time on my hands now, I am willing to take on the job if I can have the help of all who are interested in such an undertaking, in the strictest seases this will not be a factual history since all our earlier records were destroyed in firse originating in the county clerks office February 13, 1973 and again on August 13, 1973, in the Circuit Court Clerks offices, according to information furnished me by Judge Charles Carter, With this in mind I have decided to till the book "Rockmattle Recollections" since it must be largely based on what the older folks remembered and passed on to succeeding generations.

The earlier part of the proposed book, having to do with the ploneer move-ment across this part of Kentucky, the trails followed, the troubles encounter-ed and the settlements made, will be factual and historically accurate up to the forming of the county in 1810. I have already spent much time and re-search on this and hope to present some discoveries that here only effound their way into any history of the Commonwealth, it is the period, beginning with the keeping of county records, that we cannot cover in any other way than the traditious of our older people.

Generally a county historian will spend from six to ten years in preparing its nanuscrity. This one will have to be finished much quicker than that. With the help of others in the county, I believe it can be done not laier than that. With the help of others in the county, I believe it can be done not laier than sometime next year or early in the years following. It might spend up maters if my job is that of editor rather than author, I am expecting Logan Byrant to write the chapter on transportation, I am asking Judge Charles Carter to write on early legal activities, court trials etc. Elma Hayes Coffey and Janie Ramsey can help a lot on family stories, Londa Ashley (formerly Linda Ramsey) is so situated as to be able to check old state records, Leila Mac O'Marra and other older persons with good memorites can give us a pretty good picture of early Mt, Vernon and we have Bill Davis' good account of the residents of the late 1850's. I especially want somebody to write the history of churches in Rockcastle and somebody to give an account of early schools and teaching. Someone is needed to teal the early history of Livingston, Brochead, Pine Bill, Margetburg and other settlements and communities, I will be short information on the section around Cauli and Level Green and need some good historian from basi part of the complete.
