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Rockcastle Recollections ...

While waiting for other Rockcastle family histories to be sent in by living descendants, we are putting some attention on trying to determine the very earliest settlers of this area. Collins' Kentucky history mentions Stephen Langford as being one of the first. D.N. Williams wrote several years ago that Robert Langford, probably Stephen's father, brought his family here in 1792. I have seen reference to a Langford boundary line in 1790 and Stephen Langford is shown as being the head of a family in the Census of 1790. I have recently discovered that there were two Stephen Langfords, which has complicated matters somewhat but the Stephen who settled here was the older.

James Renfro took up several land grants on Rockcastle River and along Renfro Creek, which was named for him, but apparently never settled here. His nephew, Johnny Renfro, built the first cabin in Renfro Valley around 1798.

At least three of the Long Hunters who were in here more than two years before Daniel Boone cut his path to Boonesboro made what is now Rockcastle County their home. They were James Dysart, John Baker and Valentine Harmon. Dysart took up 1500 acres of land and died here in 1818, after serving as an officer in the War of 1812. Are any of his descendants still living here or does anyone know anything about him? His hunting companion, John Baker, was the man who discovered Great Saltpetre Cave, in 1794. Some time after 1774, he moved to Rockcastle County to make it his home, doing here in 1820. His second wife was Aaa Williams. He was the father of at least four children. Who knows their names or the names of any of his descendants? Valentine Harmon, a native of Germany, was a member of the Transylvania Convention held at Boonesboro in 1775. He settled first at Harrodsburg but later moved to Rockcastle County where he made his home until his death about 1815. He hated Tories and long after the Revolutionary War gave a former Tory a sound thrashing. His friend, James Dysart, was with him at the time and held the crowd back from interfering with the fight. Harmon was married but left no descendants.

The list of soldiers of the Revolution which we are now working on names many of them who eventually moved to Rockcastle County but the dates of their coming are in many cases unknown.

Terry, Mordecai, Spencer, Champ and Gardner Mull, as five brothers, were on White Oak Branch in 1793 with their families, on the way to a spot near Boonesboro where they first settled, later moving back to White Oak Branch and making it their permanent home.

The Fish family, as mentioned in a previous article, were early farmers and built two of the oldest houses yet standing in Rockcastle County.

Solomon Griffin brought his family here at a very early date not yet determined, settling early in the Cove district which seemed to be one of the first settled communities, along with Singleton Valley and the area around Great Saltpetre Cave.

Many of the early comers to the county seemed to have settled first around the cave, probably being lured here by employment offered in the saltpetre works there, which by 1824 employed 72 men, making it the biggest commercial enterprise in Eastern Kentucky.

Amer and Lucy Peaslie Hiatt, propagators of the Hiatt family, settled first in Singleton Valley, where he almost died from being bitten by a rattlesnake. Their son, William Peaslie and Bennett, were among the early settlers of Renfro Valley. They married Bailey sisters, living at the time with their parents in the Johnny Renfro cabin located where the water fountain now stands in Renfro Valley. Nothing more has ever been learned of the Bailey family except that they had a son, Peter James Bailey, who died in the Alamo. Albinworth Adams, a son of "Devil Bill" Adams accompanied him but got out before the Alamo was taken by the Mexicans.

A letter from James B. Proctor, 33, a former resident of the Brush Creek neighborhood now living in Richmond, Kentucky, informs me that his grandfather, James Proctor, was among the first settlers here. He does not know the exact date of his coming but the facts he gives concerning him show evidence of an early arrival.

He says that his great grandfather and great grandmother, formerly a Miss Ramana, whose first name is not remembered, came here from Pennsylvania and settled in the Cove neighborhood with two small children at a time when the nearest store was at Logan's Station, now Stanford, a distance then of approximately thirty miles and when his hat to go to the store for supplies of any kind it meant a journey on foot that required three days for the round trip. While away on such a trip, his wife and two small children would be left along with only an axe as a defensive weapon. Through the long dark night bears and panthers would often come sniffing at the cracks between logs. Who knows of other early settlers and the dates of their coming?

Response to the invitation to send in family histories for inclusion in the proposed county history has not been as heavy as we had hoped for. Of course, you still have time to get your family history sent in but we will appreciate having considerable information but welcome any additional facts or names that might be added to any of them: Renfro; Proctor; Hiatt; Fish; Langford; Griffin; Mullins; Coffey; Hayes; Ramsey; Parson; Dysart; Parsons; Purcell; Lutz; Houk; Chastey; Stranman; Moore; Lawrence; Adams; Singleton; Marow; Pennington; French; Baker; Cox and Williams.

The above represents only a very small percentage of the Rockcastle families that should have a place in a history of this county. With the time and work involved in covering the many other subjects which must be treated with in a historical work, I will not be able to devote the time and research necessary to dig up histories of all families. If you would like to see your family represented for the benefit of future generations, please send us what you can of its background.

School Board Votes

No Taping Of Meeting

The Rockcastle County Board of Education met Monday night for their first regular session of 1973.

The first order of business was the swearing in of three members who were elected to office during last November's election, by County Judge Charles Carter.

Sworn in were: Mrs. Isabelle Mason, who was unopposed; Kenneth Adams, who defeated Larry Burdette and was re-elected; and Willie Taylor, who was unopposed for re-election.

On the subject of a recent controversy over the taping of school board meetings, the board passed the following motion unanimously: "The Rockcastle County Board of Education invites WVKV and other interested news media to attend any and all school board meetings and to take notes and prepare their own news reports. The board will also provide interested news media with a copy of the minutes and can read them over the radio or publish them in the paper, and the minutes of the meetings will be permitted. All

school board meetings are open to the public." The motion was seconded by Kenneth Adams.

In other business, the board accepted the low bid of \$8,075 by J.M. Ray Co. of Kingsport, Tennessee for a serving counter for the cafeteria at RCHS at \$300 per month. Federal non-food assistance act.

Additional personnel were authorized by the board. They are: Mabel Cash, nurse aide at RCHS on temporary basis at \$200 per month; Donald Mason, bus driver and maintenance worker at \$300 per month; Lorene McClure, teacher aide at \$200 per month and Jesse Bradley, custodian at RCHS at \$300 per month.

Two substitute teachers, Phyllis Noe and Renee Burdette, were also approved by the board, subject to certification.

On a motion by Willie Taylor, seconded by Kenneth Adams, the board approved an option to purchase 1.2 acres of land from Joel C. Gentry located at the rear of the new high school at a price of \$2,400 on July 1, 1973.

REAP Funding Ended

As most farmers in Rockcastle are aware, funding under the Rural Environmental Protection Act (REAP) program has been terminated. The urgent need to win the fight against inflation has prompted a thorough and searching review of federal expenditures. The large federal farm outlay has brought REAP under close scrutiny. A higher priority was given in the review of those programs which generate farm income rather than to those which supplement income.

Since REAP fell in the latter category, it was the most vulnerable of the ASCS programs. In addition, record farm income which is due in large part to your efforts in successfully administering ASCS programs is enabling farmers to bear, without serious economic consequences, more of the kind of expenses supplemented by REAP. Therefore, this program was revealed to the budget review.

Even so, said the office of Kenneth Erick, ASCS Administrator, this was no easy decision. One cannot eliminate a program that has benefited many for three or more

decades without distress. However, the unbalanced budget requires drastic measures following a critical assessment of federal programs as to direction and results.

Farmers have much to gain if inflation is curbed. The corner has been turned on farm income but it could be meaningless if inflation continues to erode money values. To curb inflation, federal expenditures under control, the gains of the past few years can be solidified as the effort continues to provide an efficient united states agriculture through an improved set-aside program. In turn our exports will keep climbing with further boosts in farm income.

Support these actions if we are to curb inflation, improve the set-aside and increase exports which together will create the climate for added improvement in the farm sector. By meeting our objective of high farm income, we will make it possible for farmers to protect the soil and water resources under their stewardship without resorting to help from the U.S. Treasury.

Fiscal court awards Garbage bid to Cromer & Parsons

Rockcastle County Fiscal Court met January 2 and awarded the bid for county garbage collection to Stewart Parsons and Kenneth Cromer for a yearly contract fee of \$13,975. For this amount, Parsons and Cromer agree to furnish eight cubic yard containers for thirty-three sites in the county, to pick-up the garbage at these sites weekly and to maintain the area around the closed containers.

One other bid, of approximately \$15,200, was received from Container Waste Corp. of Lexington.

Swane Hillon, District Highway Engineer, met with the Court to set-up the 1973-74 County Road-Aid program. This year, the state appropriated \$28,318 for Rockcastle's share of money for the program. In addition to the 138.7 miles of road and 9 bridges already set-aside under the program for upkeep and repairs, three more roads were added to the program. They are: CR 210 (Carter Ridge Road), 9 miles in District 5; CR 1386 (Bowling Ridge Road), 1.2 miles in District 3 and CR 1414, Rose Hill Road of Haysinger Road in District 1. Magistrate Cleith Thacker asked Mr. Hillon about the Hummel Rd, which, according to Mr. Thacker, he had been promised would be added to the program as soon as it was upgraded to meet standards. Mr. Thacker said he had spent quite a bit of money on the road and wanted to know why it hadn't been put on the program. He was told by another gentleman from Mr. Hillon's office that the road was still not up to the required standard to be added to the County Road Aid program. Mr. Thacker also questioned the fact that he had been told by a state rock hauler that the road from the home of Otis Miracle to old U.S. 25 had been removed from the program. After studying the road map, he was told that due to a typographical error the road had not been included in the program this year but should have been and would be added immediately.

The court approved the program for 1973-74 unanimously. County Attorney William D. Cragg, with a check in the amount of \$5,000 which he had received from an attorney representing Bayless, Clotfelter and Johnson, architect for use and C. Marcus Jones' contractor for the pro-

ject, in settlement of any and all present and future claims against them over the courthouse. The Court accepted the settlement and decided to use the money to repair and improve the courthouse.

Anthony Wilhoit, State Public Defender, was present at the meeting to talk with the Court about the law passed by the last State Legislature concerning Public Defenders for each judicial district in the state. Mr. Wilhoit told the court virtually the same thing that the Pulaski County attorney (with whom Rockcastle is in the same judicial district) had told them at their December meeting.

The new law, which everyone seems to agree is not the best one ever written, gives three alternatives to each judicial district in obtaining a public defender other than having State Public Defender Wilhoit appoint one.

However, each judicial district was asked to come up with a plan other than the one of just letting an appointment be made since, as the law reads, if a lawyer is appointed for the job, he would be paid the entire \$14,000 per fiscal year allotted for this district and the two counties would be out the expenses of his office such as rent, utilities, secretary, mileage, etc.
