Mrs. Rodena Milburn, 58, of Louisville and formerly of Livingston passed away Saturday, January 13 in Libertyville, Illinois.

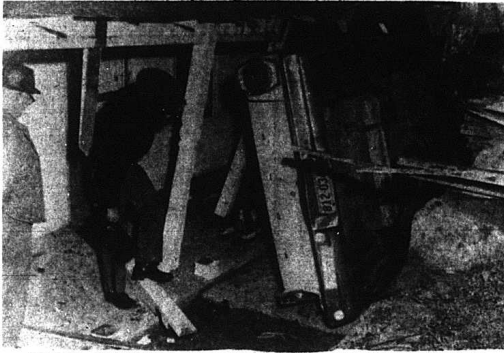

Willis Johnson Presented With 70-Year Masonic Pin

Willis Christopher Johnson of Mt. Vernon was recently presented with his 70-year Masonic membership pin.

Mr. Johnson, 95, petitioned for membership into the Mt. Vernon Ashland Lodge 640 F.A.M. in June, 1902. He received his first degree in July and in September of that same year, was made a Master Mason.

According to Mr. Johnson, his greatest ambition was to become an officer in the Grand Lodge of Kentucky, but his poor vision handicap prevented him from reading enough to acquire proper knowledge for such high distinction.

Mr. Johnson's first office position was that of treasurer for his small hometown lodge, Dodley Lodge 770 at Branch Creek.

In January, 1904, he entered the Royal Arch Chapter 140 in Mt. Vernon and held every office in the lodge several times during the past years.

He helped organize and set-up other chapters, one at Oueda in Clay County and the other in Brodhead. He has been a regular attendant in his local lodge and the Mt. Vernon Royal Arch Chapter since the year 1904.

J. Henderson Brock of Bradenton, Florida, a retired citrus grower, has made the City of Brodhead a gift of \$10,000.

Mr. Brock presented Brodhead, his native home, city officials with the check because, in his own words, "I wanted to do something for my home town."

Mr. Brock has been in business for the past 23 years in areas ranging everywhere from cattle ranches to furniture stores, to real estate, an automobile agency, the stock market and finally into the citrus growing business in Florida.

City Council Awards Bid For Boat Dock To Ramsey

The Mt. Vernon City Council met Monday night in a called meeting with all council members except Councilman James Robinson present.

The first item of business taken up by the Council concerned the letting of bids on the Rentro Valley Boat Dock and facilities. A discussion had arisen at the January regular meeting over the possibility of rejecting the high bid of William Ramsey for the lower bid of Rentro Valley, Inc.

At that time, Mayor Roland Mullins agreed to get an opinion on whether or not the highest bid could legally be rejected from City Attorney Carl Clontz and to discuss it with the Council at Monday night's called meeting.

Mayor Mullins read Mr. Clontz's opinion to the Council which was as follows: "It is my opinion the city must award the contract to the highest bidder unless there is a good reason not to, and the fact that the council might prefer one bidder over another is not a sufficient reason."

Almost no discussion followed the reading of the opinion and Councilman Chester Hallard made a motion that Mr. Ramsey's bid of \$4,300 per year for five years be accepted. The motion was seconded by Councilman Dennis Halcomb and passed with Councilman Conrad Parrett abstaining.

Present at the meeting to talk with the Council was Larry Patrick, Executive Director of the Regional Crime Council.

Mr. Patrick discussed the new Point-To-Point Communications system presently being set up in an eight-county area which includes Rockcastle County.

Under this system, according to Mr. Patrick, police officers in Rockcastle County would be able to check with other police departments

throughout the state concerning previous records of anyone apprehended. By using this system, all long-distance charges would be eliminated.

The system, if being established in this region from funds granted by the Federal Government in the amount of \$31,500, Mr. Patrick said the

Oh, the excitement of it! When the Legislative Research Commission met last Thursday, the main subject appeared to be the US (Meaning Press Row in the Capitol).
 Director Jackson White told

the legislative leaders gravelly that two incidents in the past two months have put in question the reliability of the LRC. One, according to him, is the acquisition by a reporter of some material from a forth-

coming audit of the Kentucky Racing Commission. No names mentioned, but believe us, White means Jay Gourley of the Kentucky Post, who obtained the material from the printing room in the Capitol basement.
 The other sin, according to White, was the acquisition and publication of certain comments on the Louisville crime scene by a former member of a federal strike force.

White said the matter was published, should never have been. And he said the first incident violated the law.
 "Damn it," responded House Majority Sergeant Bernard of Louisville, "That's wrong and should be punished."

Newsmen are employees in a known as a profession, admittedly with higher ideals than most businesses, but still under employers with a profit motive. They are not on the public payroll and certainly not accountable to public officials unless they commit a crime or serious breach of ethics.

We have not grilled Gourley, who had a role in both controversial stories and really on what he did or anything else.

That's his business as a one thing setting shy away from is news in judgment on their colleagues for trying to get the facts. After all, that's the goal, isn't it? And, we may ask, how is the public hurt?

The effort of the LRC to find out Press Row's thinking and policy on the issue is almost laughable. Have you ever talked to two newsmen who felt the same for very long about anything?

But, we can understand the bureaucratic mind, which wants everything to function according to Hoyle—which is another way of saying: "We'll hold any news until we're ready, then we'll give it to you for release."

But the public officials and legislators should realize the counterbalance always existed—the media's push to get the story sooner and also to dig behind the phony releases.

only two of the city would be a \$15 initial installation fee and a charge of 10c per inch 1/10 of a mile from an antenna site to the base station.

Since Rockcastle's base station would probably be in the office of the county jail and the antenna would, perhaps, be located above the courthouse, he would like to see monthly charges unless Kentucky Telephone has a minimum charge of a few dollars a month.

After discussion, the Council decided to give Mr. Patrick permission to have Kentucky Telephone make a survey here concerning the Point-Point system.

They then decided to return to Bradenton, Florida to retire but instead wound up purchasing a 44-acre citrus grove, later adding an additional 20 acres. In April, 1951 the Florida Bankers Association gave Mr. Brock a plaque for being the "best grove man" in Manatee County.

In 1957, the Brocks purchased 350 acres of land in DeSoto County, Florida and developed a ranch. Their last project was a 162-acre grove which Mr. Brock sold in June of 1972.

Mr. Brock's friends and business associates attribute his success to his and Mrs. Brock's hard work and their fair and honest business practices.
