APPLESAUCE - A FOOD FOR ALL SEASONS

During the days of Johnny Appleseed, people cooked their own applesauce from fresh apples, and the only time they could enjoy applesauce and apple pie was when apples were in season.

Now, new methods of preservation give us the opportunity to have these apple products the year round. Anytime you go to your grocers, you're sure to see quantities of applesauce and apple pie on the shelves.

Quantities are large now, since they're among the foods reported plentiful.

APPLESAUCE PANCAKES

1/2 cup packaged biscuit mix; 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon; 2 tablespoons sugar; 2 eggs; 1 cup milk; 2 cups canned applesauce.

FOR THE SPICED SYRUP:

1/2 cup butter; 2 cups maple flavored syrup; 1 teaspoon cinnamon; 1/4 teaspoon mace and 1/4 teaspoon allspice. Combine biscuit mix, cinnamon, sugar, eggs, milk and applesauce. Beat until smooth. Bake on hot, lightly greased griddle, using about 1/3 cup batter for each pancake. Makes about 12 large pancakes.

Serve hot with maple syrup or spiced syrup. To make the spiced syrup, combine all ingredients in saucepan. Boil two minutes over medium heat. Beat with egg beater until blended. Makes 2 1/2 cups.

APPLE SPICE MUFFINS

3/4 cup milk; 1 egg, beaten; 1/4 cup melted butter; 1/2 cup applesauce and 2 cups flour; 1/2 cup sugar; 1/2 teaspoon salt; 1 teaspoon cinnamon and 1/4 cup raisins, chopped.

Add milk to egg, stir in butter and applesauce. Mix dry ingredients thoroughly, then stir in raisins. Add liquid mixture and stir just until most of the dry ingredients are moistened. Do not overmix, as batter should be lumpy. Fill greased muffin tins two-thirds full. Bake at 400 degrees until golden brown. Makes 12 muffins.

APPLE-GINGER DESSERT

1 envelope unflavored gelatin; 1/4 cup orange juice; 2 cups canned applesauce; 1/4 cup sugar; 1/2 teaspoon ginger; 1 teaspoon grated lemon rind; 1/2 cup chopped, candied ginger; 1 cup heavy cream; 1/2 cup chopped walnuts and Giant Cookies.

Soften gelatin in orange juice. Dissolve over boiling water. Combine gelatin, applesauce, sugar, lemon rind, ginger and candied ginger. Chill until partially thickened. Whip the cream and pour half of it into applesauce mixture. Spread applesauce mixture over giant cookie. Garnish with remaining whipped cream and chopped walnuts. Serves 6 to 8.

THE GIANT COOKIE

1/2 cup butter; 3/4 cup light brown sugar; 1 egg; 1 tablespoon milk; 1 teaspoon lemon extract; 1/4 cup flour; 1/4 teaspoon baking powder and 1/4 teaspoon salt.

Cream butter and light brown sugar, add egg and mix well. Add milk and lemon extract. Sift flour, baking powder and salt, then add creamed mixture. Mix until dough is smooth. Spread on greased baking sheet in 9-inch circle. Bake in 375-degree oven for 30 to 35 minutes. Remove cookie to cake rack and cool.

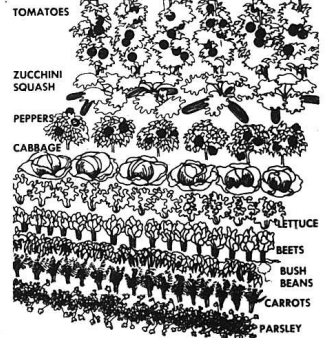

For the beginner, fertilizer and tools may be an extra expense, but clearly the potential savings are worthwhile. Time spent in the garden can be written off as healthy exercise.

People who have never gardened in their lives before are suddenly digging up weed patches to plant productive vegetable gardens. The big incentive for doing this is economy, since a family of four can save up to \$100 on grocery bills by growing garden produce essential fresh vegetables such as tomatoes, lettuce, beans, zucchini squash, bush beans and peppers.

Even a small area just 10 feet wide by 15 feet deep can provide bountiful harvests of tasty vitamin-rich vegetables from spring until fall, with time spent on weeding and fertilizing written-off as healthy exercise.

The garden design shown above fits into the average backyard with ease, will provide a family of four with fresh vegetables from just \$3.10 seed cost, and requires no backbreaking work to take care of. It's a versatile garden, and the rank beginner can cut it down to even smaller size if wanted. Also, other vegetable preferences can be substituted for those shown in the diagram.

Radish, for example, can be added without much extra space; eggplant could be substituted for peppers; cauliflower instead of cabbage; sweet corn in place of zucchini squash—and so on. As few as six hybrid tomato plants will produce bushels of fruit. Beets can be planted and harvested within 30 days, then started again. Zucchini squash grows fast and forms a dense bush, producing the fruits over a long period if picked regularly. Carrots are best picked

when young and tender, and parsley is the most useful herb to have in the garden, providing extra flavor to so many dishes.

Bush beans are extra productive, and many varieties will mature within 50 days if the garden produces more beans than the family can eat, they are easy to freeze.

The tomatoes, peppers, and cabbage are best started early indoors—about six to eight weeks before transplanting into the garden. Lettuce, carrots, parsley, bush beans and zucchini squash are best direct-sown into the garden.

In order to obtain full value from a vegetable garden, try succession sowings. For example, sow cabbage in spring, then again in midsummer. At least two crops of lettuce are possible by the same procedure. Also, two plantings of bush beans and carrots will stretch out the supply of fresh vegetables. With beets, three sowings are possible from a single packet—one in April, another in June, and a third in early August.

Clothing Workshops Begin In February

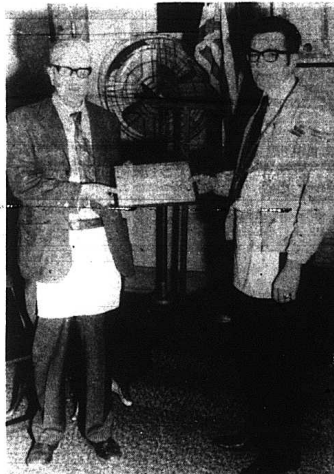

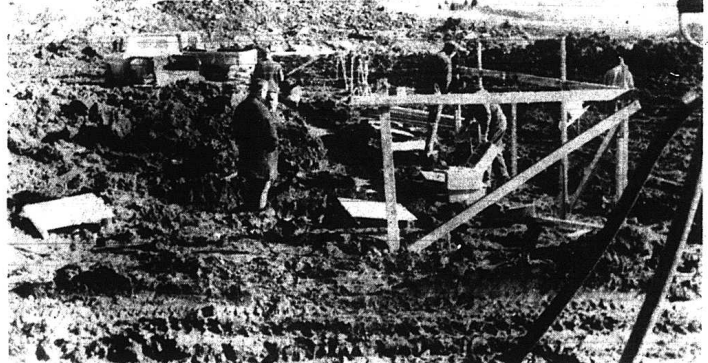

Rockcastle Recollections.

If I can clear up one point, I will be ready to write the first chapter of our county history and perhaps some of our readers, familiar with the country along Rockcastle River, can help me with it.

The first white man to visit Kentucky and keep a written account of it was Dr. Thomas Walker who in 1750 came through Cumberland Gap and penetrated as far as Rockcastle County before he turned back to his home in Virginia. He had with him a party of five men and he had been sent out by the Royal Land Company of Virginia to locate an area of good land large enough to satisfy a grant of 800,000 acres which had been awarded them for settlement. It was thought that such a body of level land lay somewhere behind the high wall of mountains to the north of them and that somewhere there was a break in this mountain wall, known as Cave Gap, that would let them through to it.

After locating and naming Cumberland Gap, the Cumberland Mountains and Cumberland River, they proceeded in a generally northerly direction, as Daniel Boone was to do twenty-five years later, in cutting out a path to this settlement at enough. They crossed and named several rivers, coming at last to one which Walker named Lawless River in honor of Henry Lawless, a member of his party. After floundering around for a few days among the steep and rocky hills bordering this stream and despairing of finding the type of land they were searching for they followed it up to its source, crossing the Kentu., Licking and Big Sandy rivers and went down over the mountains to Staunton, Virginia where they disembarked.

Although they failed of their primary purpose of finding a large tract of fertile land for settlement, their journey was by no means wasted, Walker had discovered and named Cumberland Gap, the mountain chain through which it passed, and an important river, on the banks of which he erected the first cabin ever built by white men in the country later to be known as Kentucky. The names he gave to many streams in honor of his companions were all changed. Seventeen years after he had named Lawless River, its name was changed to Rockcastle River by Isaac Lindsay, a hunter from South Carolina, who is supposed to have given it that name on account of a huge, castnut like nut it flowed. This account is sometimes disputed by writers who say that the name comes from the big shalving cliffs, often called by early explorers rock "houses," or rock "castles," that were common to the area through which it flowed.

And now we come to the point of my request for help. Who knows of such cliffs, or rock houses, and where are they located? One in particular is very important. Doctor Walker tells of spending some time at the mouth of a cave or under a big cliff that would shelter two hundred men from rain at one time. He says it was some distance from the river itself and was located on a small stream or creek. He does not say on which side of the river. He mentions that they found here a sort kind of yellowish rock with something of the taste of alum, which may well have been salpêtre such as is abundant in Great Salpêtre Cave.

Since the names he gave streams and points of interest were not the same as they now bear, it has been very hard possible to follow his meanderings and locate this big rock. We know it was somewhere south of the head of Rockcastle River and it is likely that he struck the river somewhere between its head and The Narrows. I do not believe he came onto it below the Narrows. If he had, it is very likely that he would have mentioned this scenic wonder in his report. Somewhere between the Narrows and hot head, adjacent to the river but some little distance removed from it and situated on a small stream still stands the rock or cave to which he had reference.

Stoddard Johnson, in a book entitled, "First Explorations of Kentucky," published in 1898 under the auspices of the Filson Club, states that Dr. Walker never crossed the Rockcastle River but turned back on the southern side of it. His entire book was based on the reading of the journal kept by Dr. Walker, as there is no other known evidence outside of this report. I have made a careful study of Walker's journal and am not entirely convinced that Johnson is right, especially in view of the fact that in trying to actually locate this rock shelter he indicates that it might have been near Sinks, Ky., which is certainly north of the Rockcastle. The first copy of this report I ever saw was in the possession of Mrs. W.R. Gott of Mt. Vernon who was a descendant of Dr. Walker and it was identical in every way with the original used by Mr. Johnson in his book.

If some of you coounters or fishermen familiar with both sides of Rockcastle River in the area indicated can name a

shalving rock which would live up to Dr. Walker's description in his journal, we might rewrite a little Kentucky history.

But regardless of whether or not he crossed Rockcastle River, Rockcastle County can still claim credit for his visit. According to information of the original boundaries of Rockcastle County furnished by Judge Charles Carter, the first line run took in land south of the river and was not changed until 1828 when part of Rockcastle County was taken and included in the bounds of newly-formed Laurel County. Anybody who can locate a rock shelter that will fit all the points of Dr. Walker's description of it will get his name, picture and complimentary write-up in the history when it is published.

Moving on now to the question of a list of the heads of families in Rockcastle County for the first fifty years of its existence we will soon have on file all US Census Reports covering that period. Judge Carter has furnished the one for 1810 Linda Ramsey Ashley has come up with the one for 1820 and I have made arrangements with the Margaret King Library, of the University of Kentucky, to be allowed to copy those for 1830, 1840 and 1850. Since Rockcastle County was not in existence prior to the 1810 census, I am checking Lincoln and Madison counties for the reports of 1790 and 1800. Many of the people in those counties, at that time, were later listed as belonging in Rockcastle. I also have had for some time taxpayers lists for 1814 and adjacent years.

Before long, I expect to have a definitive history of Henry Shaggs, an important man in the early exploration of Kentucky, about whom very little has ever been published.

Another subject we will be going into soon is that of buried treasure. The John Swift story will, of course, be the big one. Many people have some information it is as if affected Rockcastle County. The Liberty Langford story of buried wealth should come up for closer scrutiny, and I am sure there are others to tell about. In the early days here, as elsewhere, there were no banks or safe places of deposit, so everyone took care of themselves by burying or otherwise hiding out such hard money (usually gold) as came into their possession. Most of it, of course, was later dug up by its rightful owners and disposed of, but it is not unreasonable to believe that some of it is still out. So, when you hear a wild tale of somebody burying money or hiding it around an old house or barn, or in a cave or sinkhole, don't be too quick to laugh at it as a big fake. We already have a diary of a story connected with a buried fortune around Crews Ferry and another that will make your eyes pop out about loot from a Jesse James raid found along Rockcastle River in the heyday of the old Rockcastle and Sublimity Springs summer resorts of years ago.

Maybe you have a good story about buried treasure that you believe. Maybe we won't dig up any money, but we can dig up some mighty good stories for the buried treasure pages of Rockcastle's history.

Again, don't forget that if you have an old picture you treasure that would go well in the book, but don't want to let out of your hands, let us know about it. If it is something we can use, Jim Taylor will make a copy for the printers and leave the original in your hands. There is no charge for this.

Law Requires Permits To Operate Food Serv. Estab.

The large certificate-type forms that hotels and restaurants display as evidence of permission to operate will soon become collector's items, says Tony Hopkins, Rockcastle County Health Department Sanitarian.

"The current type of permits are being replaced by a simpler, smaller computer card permit to operate," he says.

"And all hotels, motel and food service establishments operating in the state who have not applied for such a permit to operate were required by the Kentucky Hotel and Food Service Establishment Act of 1972 to do so before the new year."

After January 1, 1973, operators of new establishments or those which have changed owners must meet all sanitary requirements, submit an approved application with the fee and obtain a permit prior to opening for business, Mr. Hopkins says.

During December, local health department officials contacted all known hotel, motel and food service establishment operators in Rockcastle County to supply them with applications for a permit. If facilities were in good repair and were capable of being maintained in a safe and sanitary manner, the applications were approved and mailed to the State Department of Health with the required fee.

By law, public, private and parochial schools with food service facilities through the twelfth grade are exempt from paying the fee. All food ser-

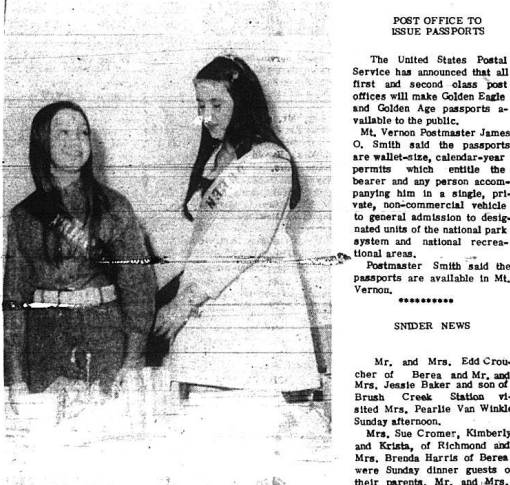
