## Producers Get Notices of 1973 Bases and Allotments

Notices of farm, feed grain bases, wheat allotments, conserving bases and established yields for 1973 are being mailed to producers by the Rockcastle County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) County Office, reports ASCS Committee Chairman Homer Hale.

Producers should take a good look at the official notice as soon as it is received, Mr. Hale said, pointing out that if a farmer believes a mistake has been made in figuring his yields or feed grain base or feels he has been treated unfairly, he has 15 days from the date of the notice to file a written request for reconsideration.

"If a farmer has any questions, he should get in touch immediately with the ASCS county office," Mr. Hale said. "If he wants the ASCS county committee to reconsider, he must file this request in writing within the time limit."

Mr. Hale pointed out that farmers may appeal to the state committee if he still feels there is a mistake or an inequity after the county committee has reconsidered.

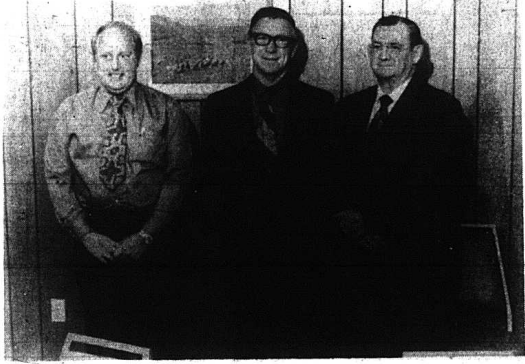

# Rockcastle Recollections...

By: John Lair

A letter from David Singleton, long-time resident of the Great Saltpetre Cave area but now living in Tallon, Ohio, tells me that he was told by his uncle, Charles Anderson (Biggie) Mullins that in a big stinkhole near the cave, there used to be a slab of rock with the initials D.B. and J.S. carved on it. Anderson said there was an advanced age Daniel Boone and John Stewart who had spent the winter there while waiting for Squire Boone to come back from the Watauga Settlement with ammunition and supplies so they could continue their hunting and exploring of the Kentucky wilderness. Singleton said this uncle also told him that one of the older Mullins men pried this rock loose from its bed and took it to his home and either set it up in his yard or else used it as a doorstep. I would now pay a sizeable reward for this rock if anybody knows where it is or how to locate it. It would be a big help in the promotion of Great Saltpetre Cave.

Letters from Signal readers are now coming in about as fast as I can answer and most of them have been very helpful. Pearl Chestney has straightened me out to some extent on the Baker family. She says William (Wise) Baker was the son of Eliza Baker and Polly Campbell Baker. Their children were: Wilson, Rev. James, Hardie, John, Bob, Mary and Susan Baker. This John Baker could not have been old enough, of course, to be the man we're looking for. He could possibly have been a brother of Eliza Baker, who was a Revolutionary soldier and at the Battle of Bunker Hill. Singleton says this family of Bakers was not related to Uncle Reuben Baker, who gave someone families in the advanced age. He could possibly give us his ancestral line? The Eliza Baker family, by the way, came into Rockcastle County from Clay County, but I have not been told the date of their coming.

Clayton Ponder has given me, by phone, some good leads toward locating the big rock spoken of in Dr. Walker's journal of his travels up Rockcastle River, but more definite information is needed. The following, copied from Walker's report, may give someone families with the country an idea of where this rock might be: "May 9th, We got to Lewisess (Rockcastle) River which is much like the others. The mountains here are very steep and on some of them there is Laurel and Ivy. We left the river and after traveling some miles, we got among trees that had been blown down about two years and were obliged to go down a creek to the river again, the small branches and mountains being impassable. May 10th, We stayed on the river and dressed an elk skin to make Indian shoes -- most of ours being quite worn out. May 11th, We left the river, found the mountains very bad, and got to a rock by the side of a creek sufficient to shelter 200 men from rain. Finding it so convenient we concluded to stay and put our elk skins in order for shoes and made them. May 12th, Under the rock is a soft kind of stone, almost like alum in taste, below it a layer of coal about 12 inches thick and white clay under that. May 13th, The Sabbath, May 14th, When our elk skin was prepared, we had lost everyawl that we brought out and I made one with the shank of an old fishing hook, the other people made two of horsehoe nails and with these, we made our shoes, or moccasins. We wrote several of our names with coal under the rock, and I wrote our names, the time of our coming and leaving this place, on paper and stuck it to the rock with mortar, and then set off. We crossed Hughes River (now Horse Lick Creek) and lay on a large branch of it." This is taken directly from a copy of Dr. Walker's journal, telling in his own words all that anybody now has to go on in locating this sheltering rock, or cave. If we can find it, we might make an important change in the early history of Kentucky as well as that of Rockcastle.

What about an account of early Livingston? When was the name changed from Fish Point to Livingston and who was it named for? Some have said it was named Livingston in honor of an official of the railroad when it reached there, but Charlie Rice, recently deceased in his eighties, told me last summer, it was named for Brothar Livingston, an early minister in that part of the country. Who did the big sawmill belong to that stood near the spot where Roundstone Creek empties into Rockcastle River and when was it built? I will remember the big log and stone dam across the river that backed up the water used as a catch pond for logs waiting to be sawed. I also remember the big log boom across the river above the mill that caught the logs floated down from Jackson County and the upper stretches of Rockcastle. Who operated

the big mining company that erected an electric trolley system to bring coal cars down from the mountains and when did they cease to operate.

My father built most of Eight Gables Hotel for Sam Fields between 1890 and 1900, when and by whom were Sambricks Hotel, Mullins Hotel and River Mansion Hotel, sometimes known as the Dillon House, built? Who knows the history of Lettered Rock? In fact, who knows anything at all the history of Livingston, in an early issue of the Signal, I will give all I know about Livingston, Pine Hill, Broadhead and Wildie and ask for any additional facts that anyone else can give us on these and other communities and settlements in the county. Mr. Willis Johnson has been so kind to tell me quite a bit about Climax and I would like to get a good account of Level Green and Quail at an early date.

Don't forget that we need information on the early schools and churches of the county. Given time enough I suppose I can eventually dig all this up, but it will take visits to every community in the county to do it, while if every church would send in its own history, it would be a mighty big help and get the book out that much sooner.

And, let me remind you again that somewhere in the county, unless it has been destroyed in recent years, there is an old county court record book, very likely the oldest in existence, that somehow escaped the courthouse fire of 1874. It is said to be strictly handmade and covered with decorative leather for years without any success to find it. Maybe it will show up in the seeming revival of interest in historical matters now in evidence.

What about family histories? Need more on the Williams, Miller, Dethurum and Nicely families. Nothing at all has come in the county.

She says William (Wise) Baker was the son of Eliza Baker and Polly Campbell Baker. Their children were: Wilson, Rev. James, Hardie, John, Bob, Mary and Susan Baker. He could possibly have been a brother of Eliza Baker, who was a Revolutionary soldier and at the Battle of Bunker Hill. Singleton says this family of Bakers was not related to Uncle Reuben Baker, who gave someone families in the advanced age. He could possibly give us his ancestral line? The Eliza Baker family, by the way, came into Rockcastle County from Clay County, but I have not been told the date of their coming.

Clayton Ponder has given me, by phone, some good leads toward locating the big rock spoken of in Dr. Walker's journal of his travels up Rockcastle River, but more definite information is needed. The following, copied from Walker's report, may give someone families with the country an idea of where this rock might be: "May 9th, We got to Lewisess (Rockcastle) River which is much like the others. The mountains here are very steep and on some of them there is Laurel and Ivy. We left the river and after traveling some miles, we got among trees that had been blown down about two years and were obliged to go down a creek to the river again, the small branches and mountains being impassable. May 10th, We stayed on the river and dressed an elk skin to make Indian shoes -- most of ours being quite worn out. May 11th, We left the river, found the mountains very bad, and got to a rock by the side of a creek sufficient to shelter 200 men from rain. Finding it so convenient we concluded to stay and put our elk skins in order for shoes and made them. May 12th, Under the rock is a soft kind of stone, almost like alum in taste, below it a layer of coal about 12 inches thick and white clay under that. May 13th, The Sabbath, May 14th, When our elk skin was prepared, we had lost everyawl that we brought out and I made one with the shank of an old fishing hook, the other people made two of horsehoe nails and with these, we made our shoes, or moccasins.
