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### Rockcastle Recollections...

@ JOHN LAIR 1973

In 1840, the following Revolutionary War veterans were still living in Rockeastle County:

NICHOLAS HOUK, the oldest living at that time was 100. He died in 1841 and his widow, Sally Houk, continued to draw his pension until the death. Nicholas and Sally Sarah Houk moved to Rockcastle County from Washington County January 23, 1819, settling on on easy mate was long known as the Old Houk Plexon ow owned by Oliver Dowell. It was here that a grandson of his later built and operated the first horse mill in Rockcastle County.

GEORGE HARLOE, next oldest, at 89. We have no

WILLIAM ABNEY was 86. He has many descendants living in Rockcastle and it is hoped that some of them will furnish us information on him for our county history.

JACOB STEPHENS, 84. No information on him.

GEORGE SIGMON, 83. He was the head of a well-known Rockcastle family identified with Sigmon Cave, near Green Hill and the old Sigmon homeplace near Roundstone Creek on old 25. I have the old grandfather's clock he once owned. We will expected one of his descendants to furnish information on him and on the

Sigmon Izmuy.

REUBEN C. PEW was 81 years old when this list was made in 1840. He enlisted in New Jersey in 1776, served 3 years and in 1781 enlisted in the Virginia Militia. He was married in Rowan County, N.C., in 1785 and in 1803 moved with his family to Rockcastle, settling on Skeggs Creek. He applied for his pension in the Circuit Court of Rockcastle County. He did here in 1849 and his widow, Fanny Smith Pew, applied for his pension. A son, Reuben Parke Pew, was drafted at Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, in the War of 1812. His second wife, Nancy Yester, was born in Rockcastle County in 1786. A deceedant of Rouben C. Pew, Mirs. B.B. Waterman, 2008 N.E. 49th Perr., Kansas City, Mo., 64119 is attempting to lind his grave, which may be in the family center of the farm he then owned on Okeggs Creek.

WILLIAM SWEENEY was 80 years old in 1840 and living in Rockcastle County at the time. No information on him. Apparently, he had come to Rockcastle after 1830 as the census for that year does not list him.

MOSES FARRIS was 78 and was living here when the 1810 Cennus was taken as were Hesekhit and John Farris, all three listed as heads of families. Prior to that time, several pioneers of the name had been active in Indian affairs in both Lincolin County and what was later to become Rockesstte and Laurer Counties:

ELIJAH DENNY, 77, was in this county in 1830, but where he came from is unknown. The Dennys in this area are probably descendants of his and should be able to furnish the regular information. He died in Rocksastle at the age of 110. He fought in the Battle of Stony Point, among other historic eigagements. I wo years after his death in 1897, the last survivor of the Revolutionary Army died at the age of 199.

WILLIAM LAWRENCE was 76 years old in 1840. There were two lines of Lawrences in Rockcastle. Those settling in the Level Green section are represented by Mrs. Rocco Allen and the Albert was 1840. FRANCIS RAMSEY, also 76, was born in Virginia and at the age of fifteen enlisted as drummer in the War of Independence. In May, 1788, he was married to Martha Allen, daughter of Co. Richard Allen of Virginia. The exact time of their coming to Richard Allen of Virginia. The control of their craves is not known but they are likely buried in the Renfro Villey Cemetery in unmarked graves since many of their relatives are interred three. His brother, Thomas, who was also a Revolutionary veteran, lived and died in Garrard County.

HUMPIRY BATES, vongest of the living veterans in 1840, was listed in Collins' history as living in Rockcastle at that time. If so, he must have come here after 1890, as his name does not appear on any of the Census reports prior to 1840.

This is by no means the complete list of Revolutionary soldiers who settled in Rockcastle County, but only those living here in 1840. Many had died here before that date and many others, who were here before the county was formed, were listed in Lincoln and Madison Counties in areas which were later taken to form Rockcastle.

How many readers have old land grants awarded to an ancestor in the early days? A great many were given to early settlers, some of them by Virginia before Kentucky achieved statehood, many by the earlier land office set up by Rentucky, many of these for considerable acreage, and very many more smaller platts under a later. Kentucky Homestead Law. A grant made in 1802 to George Montgomery of Virginia, embracing Great Saltpetre Cave is labeled Kentucky Land Office Warrant No. 2. This was rather confusing, as I felt sure a great many others had been granted prior to 1802. When I consulted Col. Chinn of the State Historical Society in Frankfort, I learned that, this represented a certain division rather than a numerical priority, I would like to hear from anyone having one of these old land grant occuments in their possession. In fracing bace on senty deeds to General William Smith and John Pearl going back into the early 1900's when land was selling for twenty-free cents an arc a ray presently investigating a 1,000 acre grant to William or Alexander Henderson made in 1795 and including the land on which Mt. Vernon was later located, I am sure that among the old family papers in many homes in Rockcastle are old land grants signed by early Kentucky governorsor maybe even Patrick Henry, governor of Virginia in the days when Kentucky was only a country of the Old Dominion.

Getting back to Revolutionary War veterans, I am sure the all DAR would like to know the location of the graves of any of ees old soldiers in order to have them marked by the U.S. verement with the official brones marker provided free for the proces. We would also like to know their last resting place to more them in our county, history.


