Cold Injury to Tobacco Plants Not Serious—The recent drop in temperatures has produced cold injury in some of the tobacco plants in Rockcastle County tobacco beds, reports H. Lee Durham, County Extension Agent in Rockcastle County.

Durham says bud leaves of plants affected by cold injury are almost white, probably because of damage to the chlorophyll, which is the green coloring matter in plants. Partially developed leaves appear constricted or pinched a short distance from their tips and they are often white along the edges near the tips.

Signs of cold injury often do not show up until a week or ten days after the weather has turned warm again, notes Durham. Sometimes farmers blame the damage on fertilizers or insecticides or on some disease like wildfire or blue mold.

Plants affected by cold injury usually recover quickly and grow normally, except that affected leaves keep their pinched shape for some time. The pinched leaves may remain until the plants are pulled for setting. During the recovery stage, the plants may appear faintly mottled, but this soon disappears.

The only damage from cold injury is a few days' delay in growth, according to Durham. He notes that cold injury can be greatly reduced or eliminated by using heavy cotton.

Anthraxnose Infects Tobacco Plant Beds—Anthraxnose is a disease which hits some tobacco plant beds in Rockcastle County every year. It usually gets into plant beds when water flows over the bed from outside, according to H. Lee Durham, Rockcastle County Extension Agent. Because of this, heavy rains such as we have had this spring tend to increase anthraxnose problems.

Durham says anthraxnose causes many small spots on tobacco leaves. These spots at

first are reddish brown but later turn paper white, sometimes giving the plants a silvery appearance. Brown, elongated spots also appear on the underside of leaf midribs and veins, causing the leaf to pucker or break. Several spots on a small leaf often merge into a single dead area, killing the entire leaf.

The disease may be accidentally severe in wet weather, killing large as well as very small plants. If the plants are not killed, they remain yellow and stunted as long as the disease remains active. In these advanced stages the plants over the entire bed appear to have been scalded. Although anthraxnose is held back by clear, dry weather, it can remain active in warm or cool weather. Anthraxnose is caused by a fungus which is also common in grasses and clovers. Tobacco beds can become infected by the shoes of workers who have walked through pasture fields and stepped onto the surface of the beds. Livestock walking across the beds can also bring in the disease. However, since water is the most common carrier of the fungus, plant beds well-ditched and raised above the surrounding ground should be safer than beds on flat ground.

Several materials have been proven to be effective in controlling anthraxnose, notes Durham. These include polyam, fernox, zink, and maneb. These can be applied as sprays or wettable powders. When using polyam, one treatment is usually enough. The other materials should be applied once a week. Durham points out that it is important to read the label and follow directions carefully when using these materials.

Virus Diseases and Leptospirosis—Leptospirosis and the virus diseases, IBR, BVD, and F3 are profit-robbing diseases often overlooked in dairy herds. The symptoms are not always manifest in the same way in each herd. Problems associated with these diseases are abortions, difficult breeding, respiratory infections, mastitis, eye infections, and many other symptoms. These diseases are fairly widespread, and chances of contacting them are quite high. There are effective vaccines to prevent these diseases. It would be wise, if you haven't already, to consult with your veterinarian and set up a regular vaccination program against these diseases.

3. The Calling Off Period Bill—If you have been pressured into buying as a result of a home solicitation sale, you may now have three days in which to cancel the contract by giving the seller written notice, if the cost of the merchandise is over \$25.00. In such cases, the seller may retain, as a cancellation fee, 5% of the cash selling price but not to exceed the amount of the cash down payment. Always send the written notice by certified or registered mail. (KRS 367.410)

4. Unsolicited Goods—When unsolicited goods are delivered to you, you have the right to

accept delivery of the goods and are not bound to return them to the sender unless you have requested such merchandise or it is addressed to or intended for another person and you received it by mistake. (KRS 367.710)

5. The Selling of Magazines, Encyclopedias, Bibles, etc.—If a salesman of printed material such as magazine, encyclopedia, Bibles, etc. contracts you in an attempt to sell you his product, ask if he has complied with Kentucky law requiring him to register with your local Chamber of Commerce or local Sheriff's Office. Any orders or contracts for printed material are void and unenforceable at the option of the consumer if the salesman soliciting the order fails to comply with the registration law. You should also know that Kentucky law requires all magazines (excluding newspapers) mailed into Kentucky to have affixed to the magazine or its wrapping paper the expiration date of the subscriber's subscription. (KRS 367.510)

6. Furnishing Information to Used Car Customers—If a used car salesman attempts to sell you an automobile from his lot, he must, upon your request, give you the name of the previous owner of the vehicle. We strongly urge all consumers

in the market for a used car, to telephone the previous owner so that the car's condition can be resolved, immediately call the Consumer Hotline at 1-800-372-2950.

Turkey may be taken with the aid of hand-operated or mouth-operated calls, or both. Electronic calls are prohibited.

Turkey hunters may use shotguns, muzzle-loading shotguns, muzzle-loading rifles and modern breech-loading rifles. Shotgun must not be larger than 12 gauge nor smaller than 20 gauge. Only shot shells are permitted. Slugs are prohibited. No sidarms are permitted.

Bow hunters must use barbed arrows with broadhead points at least 7/8 inch wide.

Crossbows are legal only on the Pioneer Weapons Hunting Area in Bath and Menifee Counties. Crossbows must be of at least 80 pounds pull. Arrows must be barbed with broadhead points at least 7/8 inch wide.

In addition to the above designated counties, there are three special areas where turkey hunting will be permitted: Fort Knox Wildlife Management Area, Land Between the Lakes Wildlife Management Area and the Pioneer Weapons Hunting Area. The special regulations for the Fort Knox and Pioneer Weapons hunts are available from the Department of Fish and Wildlife, Frankfort, 40601. Legislators have gone through their usual motions of agonizing about the way sessions always fail to be efficient, speedy and admired by the public.

The occasion the other day was a special meeting presided over by Lt. Gov. Julian Carroll. On hand were dozens of lawmakers, many of whom had ideas of their own.

This is all to the good. Let no one fault the General Assembly for trying to improve itself, even with the occasional plugs we heard for the annual sessions amendment on November's ballot.

Anyway, Carroll had a couple of ideas that certainly deserve consideration.

First, he got at the heart of what ails the Legislature, the spectacle of stopping the clock at midnight on the last night and continuing to meet—which among other things paves the way for as much bad legislation as we see in the previous 59 days.

Carroll suggested simply making the next to last day the last day. The final day then would be used only for amendments, not bills.

Sounds good, and certainly is sincere. Ah, but will it work? We think not.

The objections voiced by lawmakers present did not go into the main pitfall as we view it. If the next to last day becomes the last day, what's to

keep the clock-stopping spectacle from happening on the 59th day?

In other words, a deadline is a deadline. If it is not observed on the last day, it presumably won't be observed on the next to last day. So much at the moment for the first proposal.

Carroll next suggested a cutoff date beyond which no measure at all could be passed.

This appears more realistic and enforceable. At least it will move things along faster so that the bulk of bills get floor consideration before the Legislature is so busy everything piles up on the final ten days and most of them the last day.

We were impressed by the way the lawmakers chimed in with ideas of their own and listed weaknesses that should be plugged.

However, we were most impressed by the realistic attitude of Republican Rep. Gene Stuart of Louisville, who said he has been around long enough to know that nothing much changes under either party.

Stuart's theme is that until the governor can't get his hands on the Legislature—and such a prohibition would have to be imposed by statute—the Assembly is going to continue to be a weak sister to the executive branch.

That's telling it like it is. All the rules and reform prin-

Exercise in Futility? — Another aggrieved class these days consists of state officials in the profession of social services who'd like to know what the federal government is planning on cuts and guidelines.

It was kind of amusing to hear them complain during a Kentucky Welfare Association meeting the other day about how they don't know what to do about the edicts of the U. S. Health, Education and Welfare Department.

Well, there's a lot of truth in that, what with President Nixon's budget-cutting angering or confusing many.

We couldn't help smiling, though, at the righteous indignation of state bureaucrats against federal bureaucrats when the fact is that we—the public—often don't understand what our state bureaucrats are saying when they talk to us.

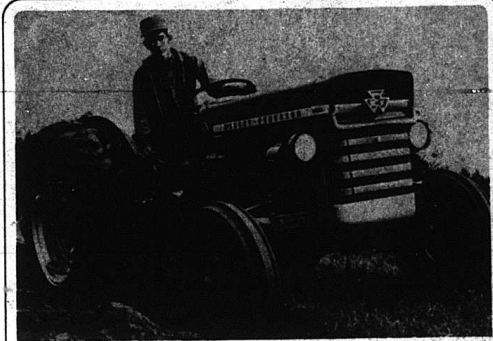

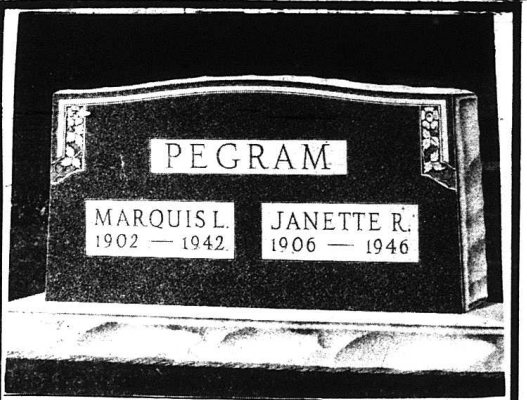

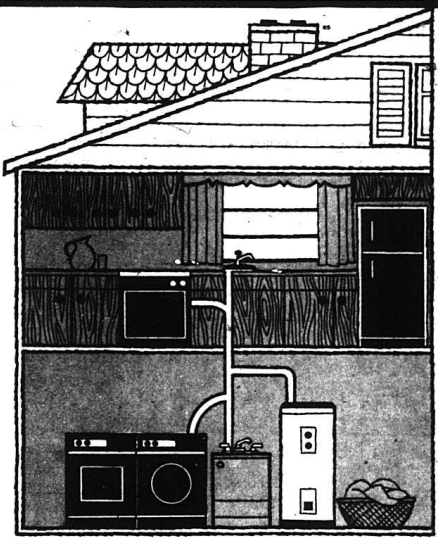

Klaren, State Bicentennial Chairman and Regent of Transylvania Chapter of Lexington, spoke on the National Society's "Gift to the Nation" the renovation and refurbishing of the Governor's Council Chamber on the second floor of Independence Hall in Philadelphia. This bicentennial project, sponsored by the President General NSDA, Mr. Donald Spicer, at a cost of \$200,000 is well under way. Mrs. Klaren showed slides of the building before the

renovation by the National Parks Board was begun and sketches and plans for the completed project. She gave a brief history of the building. She said that William Penn received a land grant on which he wanted to build a city of brotherly love - a family project. Penn died in 1718 without seeing this project started. However, his family undertook the project and by 1730 an administration canteen was needed. In 1732 excavation for the Pennsylvania State House was begun. It was owned by the Penn family as were the original furnishings. When the Penn family eventually deeded the building to the state they kept the furnishings. The Parks Service has been able to retrieve some of the original furnishings but most of them will be replaced by authentic period pieces.

Mrs. Klaren gave some interesting little known facts about the early history of the building. The early governors received all visitors in the Governor's Council Chamber. Any Indian was received gladly by William Penn and the other governors as long as the guest was sober. However, one chief complained that he and his friends had not been offered "punch." If the Indians were pleased by the transition with the governor, they would immediately do a dance of appreciation in the chamber. The early governors frequently used the Council Chamber for entertaining and before and at the time of the Declaration of Independence the governor's banquets would serve as cook and waitress for the occasion. In the summer dinners were held on the governor's yacht and the charwoman would preside, frequently presenting a bill later for dishes lost in the river.

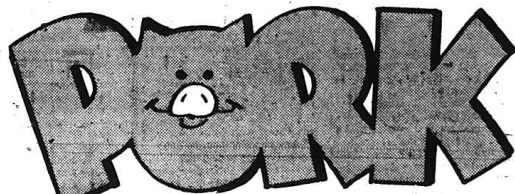

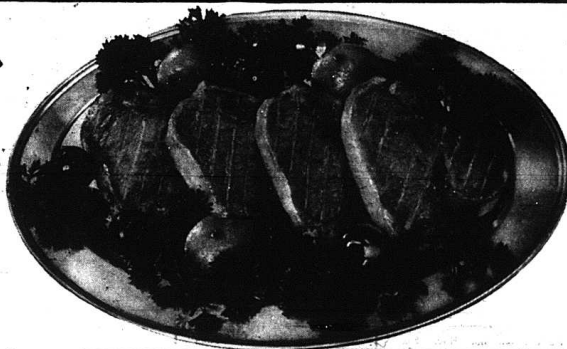

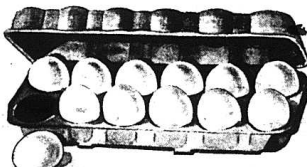

Mr. Holbrook Visits Italy To Study Chianina

In March, John E. Holbrook, Social Services Supervisor for the Department of Child Welfare, made a trip to Italy to study Chianina cattle. Mr. Holbrook, whose trip was affiliated with International Genes, Inc., farms two hundred acres in the Brothead area.

Below is an account of his trip.

"While in Italy, I saw several herds of Chianina, with each herd consisting of about

twenty head. The manner of housing the cattle in Italy is unique in that each animal is kept tied on the first floor of a building with the family living on the second floor.

"The Chianina is an old breed, probably dating back to the Roman Empire where it was used for work and beef production. It is the largest of all cattle breeds. Some mature bulls stand six feet and weigh up to 4,000 pounds. The largest

bull I saw on the trip weighed 3,400 pounds. The females are smaller with the largest ones weighing 2,400 pounds. I saw two females which weighed 2,400 and 2,280 pounds each.

"Structurally, the Chianina exhibits excellent uniformity of body depth, trimness of the middle, an absence of excessive dewlap and brisket, strong legs and hard hooves, developed through centuries of selection for work, a fine small head and long and well developed, but not bulky muscling.

"Birth weights for the male Chianinas average about 95 pounds and for females about 80 pounds. Due to the fine head and long narrow body, the breed is notably free of calving difficulties.

"In terms of modern beef production, the Chianina offers two basic advantages: (1) rapid and continuous growth to 24 months of age, and (2) high proportion of lean meat.

"Probably the greatest contribution to the United States beef industry, however, will be found in using the Chianina bull as a terminal cross on a large high milk producing cow, which the contribution to rapid growth, efficient feed conversion and lean carcasses will be manifest since it isn't unusual for Chianina to weigh 1,000 to 1,200 pounds at twelve months of age.

"Roy R. Crawford and I have six 1/2 blood Chianina heifer calves from Angus cows that are exhibiting rapid growth rates. The five months old 1/2 blood Chianina heifers have exceeded seven months old Charolais X Angus heifers in size and weight."

the process of transferring draft records from the state's 120 local board locations to designated area offices. The system is phasing down to assume a standby status and under this situation funding is not available to maintain and staff an office in each county.

Alphabetically, offices have been closed in the following counties and the records are now located in the city shown in the parenthesis:

Allen (Bowling Green); Anderson (Frankfort); Bourbon (Lexington); and Bracken (Newport, temporarily); Elliott (Morehead); Grayson (Elizabethtown); Hancock (Owensboro); and Henry (Frankfort).

Jessamine (Lexington); Madison (Lexington); Marshall (Paducah); and Martin (Prestonsburg);

McCrary (Somerset); Monroe (Columbia); Montgomery (Morehead); and Nicholas (Lexington).

Robertson (Newport, temporarily); Rockcastle (Somerset); Spencer (Shepherdsville, temporarily); Whitley (London); and Woodford (Frankfort).

The draft law still requires registration at age 18 (anytime during the period of thirty days before or after a young man's 18th birthday). Failure to register can result in prosecution in federal court. Penalties of fine and imprisonment are provided for those convicted.

Although the draft board offices have been closed in some counties, registration still can be accomplished within the county — at designated locations, in counties where the draft office has been closed, posters have been placed listing where a young man may register. Also, the law provides for registration at other localities than his home office for convenience. Should the individual choose to register

away from home the address he gives at the time of registration determines the local board, once this is established it cannot be changed.

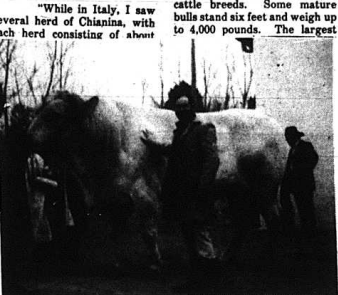

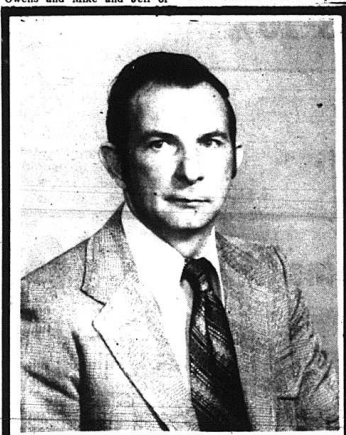

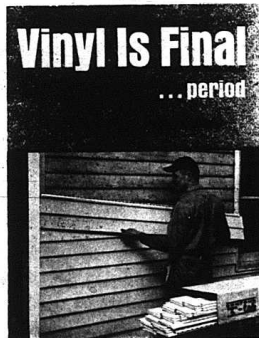

There are many vivid stories told by the grandfathers who hunted this majestic bird in the early 1900's. The last statewide season was held during the 1915-1916 season. Then the season was closed until 1960, when a special wild turkey hunt was opened for a short period in what is now known as Land Between the Lakes.
Of all the game species that Kentucky's ardent hunters pursue, none is more elusive or more prized than the wild turkey. It is considered by many to be the most intelligent of all North American game species.
This year Kentuckians will again be seeking this coveted trophy in designated counties and special areas of the Commonwealth during the latter part of April and the first part of May.
The Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources started a stocking program back in 1946. Over the years it has been successful in reestablishing this great bird in several areas of the Commonwealth.
Turkey flocks require areas of ideal habitat, 2,000 to 5,000 acres of mature hardwood forest in order to thrive.
Their main food is wild fruits and seeds. Beech and acorn mast are two of the prime items of their diet.
Each season there are some 10-20 turkey gobblers harvested from the open hunting areas. These trophies will average close to 20 pounds each.
Department game biologists estimate that today's overall turkey population is approximately 1,300 - 1,500 birds.
The turkey season runs from April 28 through May 6 in the following designated counties or portions of counties: that part of McCreary County east of U. S. 27 and north of Ky. 92, Pulaski, Clay, Leslie, Jackson, Owsley, Wolfe, Bath, Menifee, Powell, Laurel, Rockcastle, Lee, Rowan, and that part of Whitley County north of Ky. 92.

salesman do now that you've been "baited" with the advertised merchandise? He tries to "switch" you to a more expensive, more profitable item. And yet, later you find that the product you were led to believe was "sold out" is still being advertised. This type of practice should be reported to the Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division.

2. "Get Rich Quick" Schemes—If you are persuaded to make an investment with the representation that you will receive fabulous earnings—be aware—investigate to determine that such earnings are usual and regular before you invest.

3. "Bargains"—Articles offered at prices which are hard to believe are in the long run rarely the bargains you think they are. The quality of merchandise and the guarantee should be carefully checked out to make certain the advertised article is what it is claimed to be.

Check the price with that offered by other companies, since it might not be a bargain at all.

4. Blank Checks and Blank Contracts—Never sign a blank contract or contract with blank spaces in it, and don't forget to read a contract, especially the fine print, before you do sign. Insist that all details be in writing and get a copy of the contract you are to sign. Never sign a statement which states that you are finished until it actually is. Also, never sign a blank check in which the amount has not been written in.

5. Merchandise Left on Approval Basis—Some door-to-door salesman leave merchandise on an "approval basis." Too often these salesmen never come back and you wind up with the bill. Always check a salesman's credentials and don't let him talk you into anything you don't want.

6. Oral Guarantees—You are legally bound by what the contract says—not what a salesman tells you. Therefore, do not accept oral guarantees. Get it in writing. Make sure you understand what it says and that it protects you fully.

7. Referral Selling—If someone tells you to sign up as one of his customers and earn extra cash simply by "referring" other customers to him, Beware! The contract you are signing is for merchandise you're buying, whether you think so or not. In Kentucky referral selling is illegal. If you are urged to make a purchase and use referrals to get the merchandise "free," contact the Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division



STATEMENT OF SUPPORT—Gov. Wendell Ford recently signed a Statement of Support for the National Guard and Reserve. Part of a nationwide movement, the statement encourages employers to allow employees to actively participate in Guard and Reserve programs without limiting their opportunities for career advancement. The Governor presented the statement to Sgt. Harold Reynolds of Lawrenceburg, a member of the State Headquarters Attachment, Army National Guard. Watching the signing was Maj. Gen. Richard L. Frymire, the state adjutant general.

8. Golden Opportunities—Never allow yourself to be rushed into buying anything by talk of a "golden opportunity," or that it is your "last chance to get in on a good thing." You're probably the "last chance" that person has to make a sale. Take your time and, to satisfy your self, shop around and compare prices before buying.

9. Financial Commitments—Don't make financial commitments which will be hard or impossible for you to meet. State and federal laws require disclosure of finance charges in most consumer transactions. Make sure you know the entire costs of each transaction you make including credit.

10. Oral Estimates—As with guarantees, oral estimates are no assurance that you will wind up with the bill you expected. If a repairman wants to take a household appliance, radio or television set from your home for repairs, first get a written estimate of the probable repair cost. Also, get written assurances that no additional charges will be made without your consent.

LAWS YOU SHOULD KNOW ABOUT:

1. Consumer Protection Act—The Consumer Protection Act states: "False, misleading, or deceptive acts or practices in the conduct of any
