Buying Beef:

Meat is perhaps the most difficult food to buy with complete confidence. How can you be sure you are making the best choice for the money? To become expert in buying all meats, especially beef, you must learn to select the cut best with the complete control of the control of

Points To Consider - When you buy beef cuts, whether retail or wholesale, look for the following important points:

1. How much bone is in it in proportion to the meat?

2. How much fat is scattered through the lean meat

scattered through the lean meat (called marbling). Some is desirable for flavor and tenderness.

3. Firm, creamy white fat around the edges (for freshness).

4. How much fat is in it in proportion to the meat?
5. Red, porous, textured bones (indicating young, tender





But what if re-registration fails to catch but three-quarters of current or new voters and the margin becomes something like 900,000 to 400,000. 
