Buying Beef:

Meat is perhaps the most difficult food to buy with complete confidence. How can you be sure you are making the best choice for the money? To become expert in buying all meats, especially beef, you must learn to select the cut best suited for the cooking method you want to use.

Points To Consider - When you buy beef cuts, whether retail or wholesale, look for the following important points:

- 1. How much bone is in it in proportion to the meat?
- 2. How much fat is scattered through the lean meat (called marbling). Some is desirable for flavor and tenderness.
- 3. Firm, creamy white fat around the edges (for freshness).
- 4. How much fat is in it in proportion to the meat?
- 5. Red, porous, textured bones (indicating young, tender meat).

What's In A Name? - Learn Many Names For Cuts - One of the problems in buying is that some cuts can be found in retail markets under a variety of different names.

To be able to identify the cut, regardless of the name used, you need to become familiar with the most common

Kentucky Names given to cuts from the same location on the carcass.

Comparative Shopping - How To Do It (1) Learn to price the cost-per-serving, rather than the cost-per-pound.

Estimate four servings per pound from boneless meat - for

example, boneless steaks, liver, ground beef, boneless roasts. Divide the cost-per-pound by four to get the cost-per-serving. For meat with an average amount of bone, such as a chuck pot roast or Swiss steak, allow from 1/2 to 3/4 pound per serving.

This gives you either three or two servings per pound, depending on the amount of bone and fat in or on the cut. Divide the cost-per-pound by either three or two to get the cost-per-serving. For cuts with a high per-

centage of bone, such as short ribs, allow 1/2 to 3/4 pound per serving. If the short ribs were cut from the rib (the wholesale cut), two pounds would give you three servings. If the short ribs were cut from the plate, three

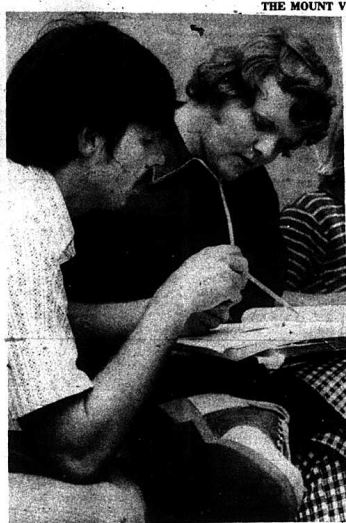

the short ribs cut from the plate. Find the cost-per-serving on this basis.

You can see that in calculating the cost-per-serving, rather than the cost-per-pound, you really need to understand and recognize the amount of bone and fat you can expect in the cut. Visualize the cut's location on the carcass and the bones which support the cut there.

(2) Learn how to get the most protein per serving. (This is closely related to the cost-per-serving consideration, but differs a little.)

The protein is in the lean muscle, not in the fat. Although we want enough fat to provide flavor and juiciness, a fatty cut is wasteful from the standpoint of providing the two-serve-ingly of protein to the family needs.

Many of the cuts which need to be cooked by moist heat methods should be selected with family.

cost by the number of people served to get the cost per serving. In some instances, a pot roast could be served for just two meals - first as a hot sliced roast, and then as a cold, sliced roast or in a beef hash or pot pie.

A homemaker will of course consider her family's preferences when she decides what cooking method to use and what cut to buy.

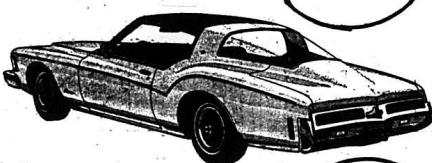

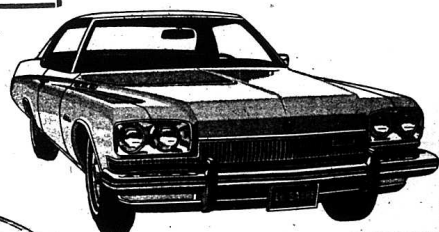

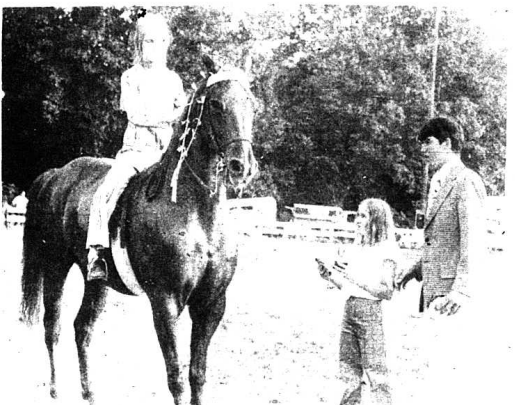

Pension hike to Add \$134,000 locally

To what extent will residents of Rockcastle County benefit as a result of the boost in social security payments recently voted by Congress?

Under the new schedule, how much will retirement checks average in the local area? Based upon figures released by the Social Security Administration, detailing the number of local recipients and the amounts going to them at the beginning of their year, their annual benefits will rise by approximately \$134,000 when the new rates go into effect.

Under the bill, across-the-board increases of 5.9 percent are provided for retired or disabled workers and their dependents who are getting social security checks.

In general, the average benefits for a retired worker and his wife will rise from the present \$3,324 a year to \$3,516.

A single worker who is now receiving \$1,932 will get \$2,040. For those who are now getting the minimum of \$1,014 a year, the new amount will be \$1,072.

In addition, checks going to the aged, the blind and the disabled will be increased by \$120 a year for individuals and \$180 for couples, on average. Those in other categories will benefit proportionately.

All in all, an additional \$3.2 billion or so will be distributed to some 30 million Americans in the next fiscal year.

In Rockcastle County, according to the latest annual report of the Social Security Administration, payments to local beneficiaries have been at the average yearly rate of \$1,110 per recipient.

This will rise to \$1,170 a year when the new schedule goes into effect next July.

For the local community as a whole, payments will then total close to \$2,522,000 annually, as compared with approximately \$2,388,000 a year at the present scale.

Payroll taxes will also be raised to help pay for the increased benefits. Starting next January, social security taxes will be levied on wages up to \$12,600. The cutoff point currently is \$10,800.

The change will bring the maximum tax next year to 7.37% instead of the going maximum of 6.52%.

Drag boat races Almost bring tragedy

The day was hot and humid, the crowd was large and expectant and they weren't disappointed.

The occasion was the first Drag Boat Races to come to Rockcastle County last Sunday on Lake Linville at Renfro Valley.

Around 70 very expensive racing rigs from all over the eastern United States were entered in the races and the day promised to be an exciting one with boats reaching speeds of 150 m.p.h. and upwards in the 1/4 mile distance.

Tragedy almost marred the day, however, when early in the race Palmer Bagwell, 31, of Annapolis, Maryland, traveling at an estimated 150 m.p.h., flipped his boat three times just after crossing the finish line. Mr. Bagwell had to be rushed to

the hospital; but was fortunate to escape with a few broken bones, cuts and bruises. He will still be laid up for eight weeks.

Mr. Palmer, an employee of U. S. Champ Mariner in Annapolis and the father of four children, was driving a blown fuel flat bottom speed boat, called the Banabee, powered by a 1500 h.p. 392 Chrysler engine. Mr. Bagwell said he was injured mainly because he had trouble kicking himself free from the boat. However, other racers said he was the first man to ever wreck a speedboat at that speed and live through it.

Divers recovered the \$17,000 rig late Monday afternoon about 1/8 of a mile beyond the original finish line of the race. The hull of the boat was ripped through and half of the plates were gone. According to other members of the racing association, the boat can only be insured while they are not racing.

In an interview with Mr. Bagwell and his wife, Jean, Monday, Mr. Bagwell said he had no idea what caused the accident. He said he had been racing for a number of years and this was the first major accident he had been in. However, he said he had no intention of quitting but would be back on the circuit as soon as he was able.

Mr. Bagwell had planned to go on to California to participate in races there following the one here.

Another meet of the Drag Boat Races, sponsored by the Derby City Boat Club in Louisville, will be held at Lake Linville on October 7.

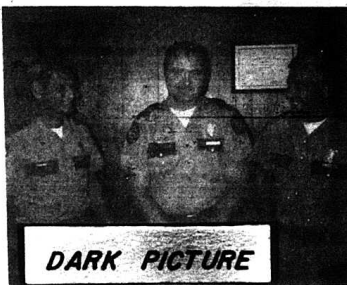

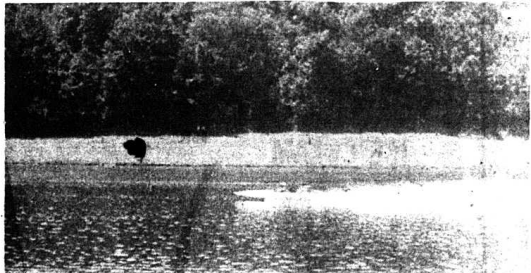

There could be a hidden danger to Kentucky Democrats of city political machines in the state's massive effort to re-register all voters by September 24.

The Democrats seem to recognize this, as witness their well-organized attempts to sign up old and new voters before the deadline.

The city folks may not be aware of the political peril that could cost them influence in

state politics. This is what we mean.

Reliable figures that have been compiled showing that certain urban areas, mainly in Eastern Kentucky, have a far higher proportionate registration than sections such as Louisville, Northern Kentucky and the Bluegrass.

Why? Our guess is that the people in the mountains, from both parties, take politics much more seriously and practice it, if

nothing else, to help pass the time.

The result is that, for example, the Republicans' stronghold of the Fifth District has more than 80 percent of citizens 18 and older registered whereas all of Jefferson County has only half on the voter rolls.

Allowing for, shall we say, lack of purgation of disqualified voters in many rural counties, it still portends an imbalance towards the country and mountain folk by the way. They've all been guilty.

But at least someone is trying to do something, and we've got to take our hats off to Pryor. At least until his critics have any success in showing that this is just another passing thing.

No longer, it appears. Pryor has established restrictions which include justification of the work, evaluation of it, invoices by the contractor to show what he did, along with a few other little roadblocks to easy money.

How can you argue with that sort of progress? You also can't fault any particular administration for winking at the worst abuses of the personal service contract system - and which there's no competitive bidding by the way. They've all been guilty.

But at least someone is trying to do something, and we've got to take our hats off to Pryor. At least until his critics have any success in showing that this is just another passing thing.

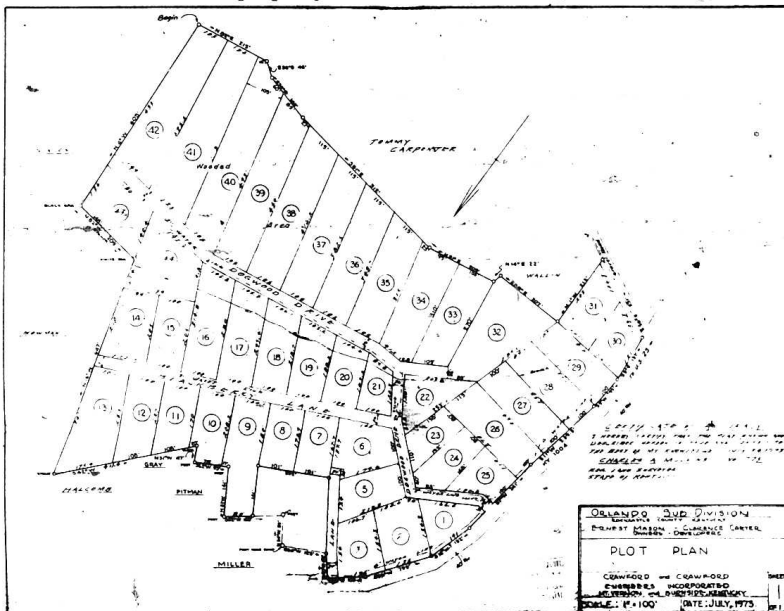

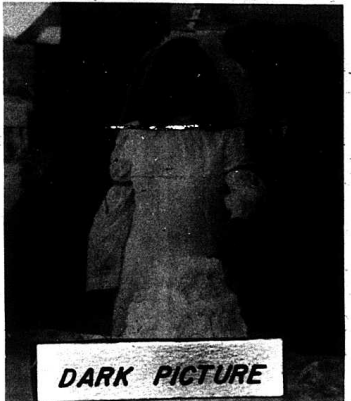


