





Rockcastle Recollections

Although by no means finished with gathering material on the Civil War period in Rockeastle County, we find it advisable to turn from it for the time being unifig their sources have been explored and take up other subjects on which we may need corrective information.

For instance, what was the actual location of the old gallows, or hanging tree? I had understood since boyhood that it stood by the side of the old Brodhead road, at about the foot of the hill behave he old Jim Rickels place. Years ago an old partly-decayed timber lying by the side of the road in that particular apolt was pointed out to me as a remnant from the old gallows.

According to lately unearthed records, however, the location of the road itself has been changed from what it was in the 1870's when the gailows saw its greatest-use. At that time the old road ran from approximately the location of Attorney Johnny Allens present some the control of the big possible of the control from the vocational school building, runninging from to the big Devil Bill Adams log house, later occupied by the Bowman family, the Tom Noe family and others before it was torn down. From there it went down the hill back of the Kenneth Cornelison home, crossing Little Renfro Creek in front of the Staverson place and on through the old gap in the hill near George Burton's homeplace, passing in front of old Red Bud School House before entering the gap.

This routing would have had the gallows located approximately behind Emmett Roberts' residence, or a little to the left of it. Who has a different or more definite spot for it?

Another point needs clearing up. Some county historians have stated that there was only the one gallows and that the three legal hangings in the history of Rockcastle County, took place three. Others have related that the first man hanged, a white man named Davidson, was hanged on a scaffold which was cut down and burned the night following its use, by his eighteen year old son.

Davidson was convicted and hanged for the killing of Henry Langford, stabbing him to death in an encounter on the streets of Mt. Vernon. Date unknown.

The next scaffold was built in 1870 for the hanging of Tom Pearl, a 17-year old colored boy who, with his mother, had elected to remain in the home of Judge Pearl, then living near present Burr. Kentucky, when the slaves were freed. Circumstantial evidence pointed to the belief that he had molested the small daughter of the Pearl Jamily and he'was arrested, tried and convicted and sentenced to be hanged, which sentence was executed with promptitude to prevent a possible lynching. It is said that this sallows was erected across the road and about 200 feet north of the one on which Davidson was hanged. The rope broke on the first attempt but was quickly mended or replaced and the second attempt, at his execution was successful.

Three years later another colored boy, Joe Taylor, was hanged on the same gallows, C. C. Williams, then a young man approximately the same age as Joe, vividly remembered the entire fair. He said Joe was well liked and accepted by white boys his age [21] and was engaged with a group of them in a game of marbles just back of where the LEN depot used to stand when the game was interrupted by another colored man, Dan Design, who was under the influence of liquor at the time. For this he was sentenced to hang and Williams was present at his execution. He often declared that he would never be able to erase from his memory his recollections of all norrible seens. By the terms of the agreement, the doctor was to furnish the convicted person with all the candy and peanuts he could eat for as long as he was alive, and after he was hanged the doctor was to have his body for such use as he proposed to make of it. Years later, old people who were children at the time of the hanging, toldiff walking along behind the wagon which carried the victim to the hanging grounds. The boy, in seeming candy some some remembered that as the rope was peing adjusted around his north confections for his last minute enjoyment. Which of the two boys was it?

In addition to the three legal habgings, there were others. Joseph Ramsey, a Givil War veteran, hanged himself in the flat woods near where Uncled Jim Myers used to live, using a small grapevine instead of a rope. It was said that he had been unjustly punished by the KKK for something he did not do and that suffering from the disgrace of such punishment he hanged himself. Another hanging which raised a lot of speculation was that of William Peasley Hiatt. Soon after the freeing of the alaves he was found dead in his log barn, his head between two logs and his fodly suspended from it: It was reported that he had hanged himself on account of the financial loss in the freeing of his many slaves, but few people believed it. He was one of the wealthlest and most usbatantial citizens, and it seemed unreasonable that he would take his own life, especially in such a barberous manner. It was alregely assumed that he had been murdered by a vindictive ex-slave or one of the bands of outlaws that roamed the countryside after the close of the war.

A mass lynching took place in 1877, when four men were hanged at one time without any semblance of legal authority. The four men. Andy Cummins, James Smith, J. O. Gibbs, and Kirk Kenk, were an other than the contract of th




